B. C. Fisheries Ltd. Has Been Floated With Capital of \$1,500,000 to Exploit the Fisheries of Northern B. C.

## PLANTS AT PORCHER ISLAND AND SKIDEGATE

Sir George Doughty of Grimsby Fulfils His Promise Made Two Years Ago to Establish a Big Fishing Company—Two Big Steam Trawlers to Come Out at Once-Will Have a Fleet of Twenty or More Vessels

Victoria, Dec. 12 .- A new concern, to be known as the B. C. Fisheries, Limited, has been floated, with Sir George Doughty of the Great Grimsby herring industry at the head. .The capital is \$1,500,000.

Two steam trawlers, the first of a large fleet, which will include twenty or more, are to be brought out at once and two large plants, to cost \$250,000, will be erected, one on Porcher Island and the other at Skidegate Inlet. Arrangements have been made with the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway to provide trackage at Prince Rupert.

The new fishing enterprise is the result of a visit paid to Northern B. C. two years ago by Sir George Doughty, when, at the instance of Earl Grey, he investigated the fisheries of the province.

### THE CITY AND THE WARDS.

How slight a thing might have affected the future government of the city was seen last night when the bylaw to divide the city into three unequal and inartistic fragments was defeated. The debate showed that not a single member of the Council really wanted three wards, neither the Mayor, who spoke for the bylaw; Alderman Kirkpatrick, who introduced it, nor Alderman Hilditch, who supported it. All of them in turn announced that they individually did not care a rap whether the city had two or three or a dozen wards. All of them intimated that they would prefer to see the city with no wards.

And yet with no convinced or convincing advocacy behind it, the city would have had three wards thrust upon it but for the chance return to the Council of Alderman Newton, whose vote just turned the scale against the proposed redivision of the city.

The decision to give the bylaw a six months' hoist will cause general satisfaction. Ward 1 already contained every liquor license in the city. To have carved a small portion off Ward 2, which-inadvertently, perhaps-had for an appendage the tenderloin district, and then to give each of these artificial divisions an equal representation of three members, was apt to be interpreted—or misinterpreted—as a division that placed the government of the city at the mercy of the downtown elements.

The hotelmen—and the residents of the tenderloin, too, for that matter—are entitled to fair representation on the City Council. The proposed division might have been used to give them unfair representation.

The only argument advanced was that the proposed division brought the assessed values of the different fragments to a near-equal status. This attitude, while admittedly contemplated in the Municipal Clauses Act, is based on a wrong conception of representative government. It makes dollars, not citizenship, the test of value. Starting two years ago as a bantamweight, he has grown so rapidly that the present time he has all he can do to make 146 pounds. In a short time he will be in the middleweight division. His career has been almost uniformly successful, he having accounted for nearly all the prominent light and welter weights in England in addition to Josephs.

On his feet he is quick and a puzzling customer to a slower rival. He hops about the ring like a rubber ball and then springs back at his antagonist as quick as lightning and with the grace of a panther. If ever he develops into a heavyweight then will there be a prospect of a white champion.
