

BRITAIN RESUMES
A NORMAL ASPECT

Coal Strike Has Been Declared Off and Nation Recovers From Deplorable Condition That Proved Worse Than War in its Financial Losses Upon the Various Industries and Trade Generally

London, April 6.—The decision this afternoon of the officers of the Miners' Federation to resume work in the mines brought intense relief to the whole country. The termination of the coal strike virtually amounts to raising a ruinous siege upon the nation's industries. It has inflicted a financial loss larger than would have been caused by a war of a similar duration against one of the great powers.

The Scottish miners return to work in the collieries on Monday; the British workers go back to duty

on Tuesday, Monday being a holiday. By the end of the week every colliery in the country will be in full swing.

Comox-Atlin Is Well Looked
After by the Member
H. S. Clements

If there was ever any doubt in the minds of anyone that the Comox-Atlin district was not being well looked after by the sitting member, H. S. Clements, it is entirely dispelled by an analysis of the estimates for the past session of the Parliament. It will be seen by them that the member for the riding has been keenly alert to the needs of the district and has made a magnificent showing. Mr. Clements is an indefatigable worker and the results are seen in the splendid showing that he has made.

The city of Prince Rupert was not forgotten by any means by the member. The estimates show in every department that this city and its needs were ever in the mind of the member and he has secured for it splendid recognition. He has shown that in the choice which the constituency made of a member there was no mistake. There have been no details that were beneath his notice. He has watched carefully the progress of legislation and has kept in close touch with the different departments, securing for his riding many valuable concessions.

Reference has before been made to the good service rendered by the member in the securing of the night letter on the Dominion telegraph line from here. Merchants have already had reason to feel grateful to him for this and every night the line is in use along this improved condition.

In connection with the fishing industry there has been as a result of the good work of Mr. Clements many valuable concessions that have worked to the advantage of this coast and to this city in particular. One of these is the boat rating changes whereby the fishermen are to be allowed to sell to the highest bidder. This alteration in the regulations has been the means of enabling the Canada Fish and Cold Storage Company of this place to begin the erection of an immense cannery here—the largest on the coast.

The supplementary estimates that have been brought down and put through the House before the prorogation are now to hand, and show

that that there have been some very substantial votes put through affecting the district which Mr. Clements represents. There has been another vote of \$25,000 towards the public buildings in this city in addition to the \$74,000 contained in the main estimates. Then there is provision in the supplementaries for \$6,000 for the immigration building in this place. Under this one head there is provision for \$105,000 for this city. In addition to this there is the \$60,000 for the quarantine wharf here.

Mr. Clements has not forgotten the promises he made that he would make provision for better communication with the outside world for the more inaccessible points in the constituency. In keeping with this he has made provision for Bella Coola getting a telegraph service. This is to come in by 150-Mile House and an ample vote is made for it. Alice Arm, Goose Bay and other points within the radius of this port are to be given wharves so that there may be better means of communication provided them.

On Porcher Island and at many other points where settlement is but beginning the member has made provision for facilities for the landing of vessels with mail and supplies. The telegraph service throughout the district is to be improved in many ways so as to bring the residents of parts hitherto beyond reach in touch with the outside world. The service which Mr. Clements has rendered has been of prime importance to the district as a whole.

A list of the votes, both in the main estimates and in the supplementary ones taken from the votes, shows the items and figures given below. These are the votes that are essentially for the Comox-Atlin district and do not include votes that will affect this riding in common with other parts of the province, such as the allowance for fishery protection boats that are to be built, and many others that will affect this place perhaps more than any other riding in the province. FORTY THOUSAND
PERSONS HOMELESS

Floods in Sections of United States Have Wrought Terrific Havoc—Military Authorities Are Providing for Those Who Are in Need of Shelter and Food—No Cessation in the Mississippi River

Washington, April 6.—After a conference with President Taft Major General Wood, chief of staff, predicted that 40,000 persons had been rendered homeless by the floods and more than 10,000 have to be fed. The military authorities are providing tents and making provision every way for relieving the distressed.

At Wyankell, seven miles south of Memphis Tenn., the levee broke today, the water rushing through the crevice at a terrific rate. It is expected by tomorrow the gap will be a mile in width. The Mississippi

flood of water now covers an area of 500,000 square miles of land.

At Hickman

St. Louis, Mo., April 6.—The large government levee at Hickman, Ky., broke late this afternoon and 150 square miles of territory was inundated. As this district was thickly populated there is sure to be a heavy casualty list.

The known dead since the floods number eighteen and the property damaged amounts, it is estimated, to a million and a half dollars. The waters are still rising.

WILL REACH POLE

Christchurch, N. Z., April 6. —A letter received here from Captain Scott's Antarctic expedition, dated October last, says he will adhere to the original plan to journey to the South Pole and will not be influenced by the presence of Amundsen in the Antarctic to make his dash to the Pole.

SKIDEGATE NEWS

Oldest Resident of the Queen Charlottes Died—Was Over One Hundred Years of Age.

Work in Progress on the Islands—Fishing Company Carrying on New Buildings

There is widespread regret felt that the C. P. R. is taking their boat off this run. QUIET AT YALE

Superintendent Campbell of Provincial Police Reports Upon Condition on the C. N. R.

Victoria, April 6.—The attorney general has received the following telegram from Yale from Collin Campbell, superintendent of the provincial police:

"Everything quiet here. No work is being done on construction work. About 500 men here and about that many have gone to Vancouver. The I. W. W. has appointed a committee to look after their drunk and disorderly and fined some of them \$5, which sum goes to soup kitchen fund."

BENEFIT TO TRADE

Treaty With West Indies will be of Decided Advantage to the Dominion

Canada Will Have Market for Furniture and Various Other Lines of Manufacture

Ottawa, April 6.—The trade agreement about to be consummated between Canada and the West Indies will greatly benefit certain lines of Canadian manufactures, such as furniture, woodenware, etc.

The conferences between Canadian and West Indies representatives regarding 'closer trade relations between the two countries will result in sweeping reductions of the tariff on articles of interchange which will be mutually of advantage to both countries. The agreement will involve the preference, it is stated, to a list of commodities which will give substantial benefit to Canada as well as the West Indies. Canadian breadstuffs, fish and lumber will be found in the schedule with West Indian molasses, fruits, cocoa, etc. Arrangements for improved facilities of transportation and cable communication will likely follow the coming agreement.

NEED EVIDENCE

One Woman Fined for Selling Liquor—Two Others Say They Kept It for Private Use

As a result of the raid for sellers of liquor in the restricted district there were called upon to answer charges in the police court yesterday morning.

The first, a colored "lady," pleaded guilty and was fined \$100 and costs.

The remaining two in turn pleaded not guilty to selling liquor, stating that any they had on hand was for their own consumption and not for sale.

Fred Peters, K. C., representing the city, said that evidence would have to be forthcoming.

The magistrate agreed. He said that as far as he was able to see by the statute governing such cases that he could take it for granted that because the liquor was there that it was for sale.

Mr. Peters agreed and the cases were adjourned until Tuesday morning.

IN NEW ROLE

It is reported that in the raid
which the police made of the re-
stricted district on Saturday night
the mayor of the city led the forces
in person. In pursuing such a
course His Worship is setting a dan-
gerous precedent. Surely the police
force of the city can be depended
upon to conduct its work without the
assistance of amateur detectives.
But apart from this aspect of the
situation the presence of the chair-
man of the police commission on an
occasion like that savors too much
of recognition in an official way of
that section of the city.

We took objection earlier in the
year to the formal resolution that
was passed by the commission to
the effect that this restricted district
be allowed to continue. We objected
that no matter whether it was con-
sidered politic to allow such condi-
tions to exist in the city or not it
was eminently unbecoming that the
police commission should come out
and by resolution say that it was
allowed to exist. This savored
too much of issuing a license. The
conditions that exist in the district
are not lawful. It has been found
expedient on the part of the authori-
ties to wink at it and take no cogni-
zance of the existence of such a
section. This is surely bad enough
without the authorities coming out
and openly sanctioning an unlawful
condition and then leading in the
raid to collect toll from those who
inhabit the district.

We do not for a moment advocate
that this section should not be kept
stringently in order. On the con-
trary, we believe in strict regard
being paid to the maintenance of
order in these places. If they are
deemed necessary the police force
should see that the district is ren-
dered as unobjectionable to the city
as a whole as it can be made. The
course which the mayor is taking in
connection with it is not calculated
to produce this condition of affairs.
Unless he has some much better
methods of handling this vexed
question which has given so much
trouble, especially on the Pacific
Coast, than he has so far shown it
will be wisdom on his part to leave
it to the experienced hands of the
police rather than try his own crude
methods of dealing with it.

The city has many large questions
that require the fullest attention at
the present. The citizens generally
would, we feel sure, feel much safer
to have the chief of police left to
administer the restricted district ac-
cording to his experience rather than
have the mayor playing the part of
detective. If on the other hand the
mayor is not prepared to grapple
with the many other very important
matters that affect the material wel-
fare of the city we feel satisfied that
the citizens would probably be satis-
fied to allow him to amuse himself
as a detective and turn the more
proper duties of his office over to
the chief of police.

A WORTHY MEMBER

The return of H. S. Clements to
the city will be the occasion of a
fitting reception being recorded him
by citizens generally. The repre-
sentative of Comox-Atlin in the
House of Commons has done excel-
lent service and there are general
expressions of satisfaction with his
course. These expressions are not
from Conservatives alone but from
Liberals, who recognize in the mem-
ber a valiant fighter for the district
and a faithful guardian of its in-
terests.

In the first session upon which
he has been called to represent the
district Mr. Clements has covered
himself with credit. He has looked
after the outlying parts as well as
the more populous centres like
Prince Rupert. As a candidate Mr.
Clements put forward a strong plea
on behalf of the residents of the
scattered portions of the constitu-
ency. It is gratifying to know that
he did not forget them when he
attended to a place where he could
be of assistance.

TO ESTABLISH CAMP

Work to Start at Once on the Rock
Cutting for the G. T. P. in
This City

Representative of Contractors Now
Here to Get Ready for Making
Start Upon Big Undertaking

the rock excavation that the G. T. P.
is to carry out in this city to pre-
pare for the station and for drydock

paratory to starting.

essary machines will reach here in
tow of the tug Escort on her next
trip and it is the intention to start
up at once.

DIVISIONAL POINT

Amundsen May Be the Name of New
Town on G. T. P. to Be Put
on Market Soon

Amundsen and Anderson are pre-
sumably fellow countrymen. There-
fore, what could be more natural
than Mr. Anderson, the original owner
of the land at Mile 119 on the
G. T. P. should wish to honor the
distinguished explorer. This appears
to be the explanation for "Amund-
sen," which is the proposed name for
the new town, the first divisional
point on the Grand Trunk Pacific
east of Prince Rupert, says the Van-
News-Advertiser.

There is a world of romance about
the building of railways, towns and
cities in Central British Columbia—
the romance of adventure, of riches
and great rewards—and the new di-
visional point appears to share in
this to the full. So the prophecy
is that the new town will be a verit-
able hive of industry from the start.
Amundsen (the proposed name
for the new townsite) looks to be
the town chief in importance be-
tween Prince Rupert and New Ha-
zelton. The G. T. P. has bought
nearly all the land available at this
point for their roundhouse, yards
and freight divisional purposes. A
large force of men has been busy for
many months in clearing the land.
The G. T. P. has started work on
the roundhouse for twelve engines.

Those who know the route of the
line agree that the railway chose the
best possible location in this moun-
tainous valley for this important di-
visional town, and even here the
mountains and the river are such
rigid boundaries that it will only be
possible to provide about 150 lots
for the population of the new pro-
posed town of Amundsen.

Mr. Anderson, the original owner
of the land at Mile 119, has sold a
large portion of his interests in the

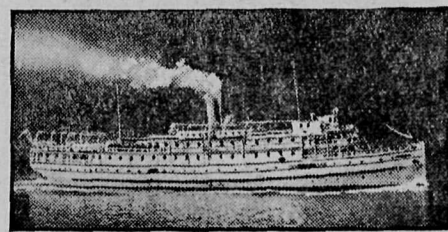

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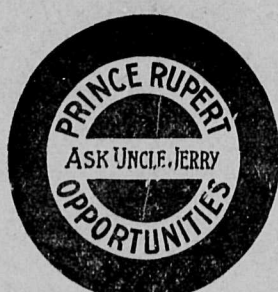

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

Any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section (160 acres more or less) of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

DUTIES.—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties.—must reside six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres, and erect a house worth \$300.

Now that the deal is concluded the plans will be forthcoming at once.

The entire area of the site purchased will be built upon. The structure will be a 'Class A' building of steel and reinforced concrete. The interior and exterior finish will be of the very best quality, and the ten-storey building will be a credit to the city. It will be the largest in point of floor space in Vancouver, and as large as any in the country.

"When the building is completed it is the purpose of the Canadian Home Investment Company to occupy the basement floor, part of the ground floor and the mezzanine floor for the head offices of the Vancouver business of the company. The remainder of the space in the building will be apportioned in suites of offices for which leases will be made.

"Preparing for this new project the capital stock of the Canadian Home Investment Company was recently increased from \$100,000 to \$1,100,000 for the purpose of organizing and erecting this building. On completion of the Vancouver building it is the intention of the company to proceed with the erection of a similar building in the metropolis of each of the other provinces of the Dominion.
