

GREEK LOAN HAS BEEN PLACED IN GREAT BRITAIN FRENCH LINER FRANCE WAS SUNK BY THE GERMANS Survivors Of Ancona Wreck Landed At Several Points British Torpedo Boat Captured A German Submarine

More Havoc Played Among Shipping In The Mediterranean

Paris, Nov. 10.—Reliable assurance has been received that British torpedo boats captured a German submarine in Greek waters last week. In doing so the crew of the submarine were taken prisoners.

The France Sunk.

Rome, Nov. 10.—A German submarine has sunk the French liner France. The crew landed at Cagliari. The France is a large vessel only about four years old. She was over 700 feet long.

Mercia Attacked.

London, Nov. 10.—An official report says:—Outward bound the

transport Mercia was attacked by gun fire from an enemy submarine in the Mediterranean. The vessel reached harbor safely. The casualties as a result of the attack were 23 killed and 50 wounded, who were landed and sent to a hospital.

Sunk German Submarines.

London, Nov. 10.—A telegram from Algiers, via Madrid, states that a British cruiser has sunk two German submarines in the Straits of Gibraltar.

British Loss.

The British destroyer Louis has been wrecked in the Mediterranean. No lives were lost.

MENNONITES TO TREK INTO BRITISH COLUMBIA

Offshoot From Old Manitoba Colony —Want To Grow Good Fruit.

Several hundred members of the Mennonite communities in Manitoba and Saskatchewan, as a result of conferences held this week and after hearing reports of investigating delegates, have decided to migrate to central British Columbia, and settle on land made accessible by the construction of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway, says the Winnipeg Free Press. This will be the fourth offshoot from the original colonies in the two prairie provinces since the establishment of the first one in Manitoba forty years ago.

While the younger element of these industrious and thrifty people have

grown out of many of the customs and habits of their forbears, they still cling tenaciously to their community style of living and to their religious beliefs; some of them have become so far Canadianized, especially in Saskatchewan, as to drive fast horses and compete in races. In trekking to British Columbia they will take with them their own storekeepers and mechanics. They do not require doctors, lawyers, missionaries or newspaper men, which to them would only be so much impedimenta.

One of their principal reasons for leaving the prairies is a desire to get a location where they can grow a variety of fruits as well as general agricultural products. It is understood that the first B. C. colony will be located in the Salmon River district. Men will go in this winter to get out timber for houses and other farm buildings, and their families will follow next spring.

THINKS WHEAT WILL REACH DOLLAR

ADVANCED PRICE IS LOOKED
FORWARD TO BY ONE IN
TOUCH

Big Demand Anticipated By Secretary Of Alberta Elevator Company.

"Wheat is destined to be stronger. I look for dollar wheat in the west." This was the statement of W. H. Moore, Secretary of the Alberta Farmers' Co-operative Elevator Company, last Saturday morning, says the Winnipeg Free Press. Mr. Moore, in his position as secretary of the big Alberta elevator company, is probably as well informed on wheat values as any one in the west.

"Take notice of the quotations on options," Mr. Moore continued, "December and May are now selling at about the same figure in Chicago. On Friday the closing quotations at Chicago were 104 3-4 for December and 105 1-8 for May. Usually there is 5 cents difference or thereabouts, between these futures. The fact that they are practically the same at this time leads me to the belief that the professionals in the big United States pit anticipate a keen demand in the near future. In my opinion the wheat situation is getting to exactly the same status as it was last fall about this time, when, foreseeing a great demand for flour and wheat, the quotations rose to very high levels. I do not look to see the same high prices as prevailed last year because of the great yield, but I do look for dollar wheat in Calgary."

BANKERS OF NEW YORK ARRANGE FOR CREDIT

The Final Details Will Be Consummated Within A Short Time.

It is expected that the plans which are under discussion for the creation of acceptance of credits in New York for the London joint stock banks and other banks in Great Britain will rapidly crystallize, and that final details will be consummated within a comparatively short time. Bankers state that it is as yet too early to make any predictions as to the probable amount that will be determined, although a nominal total will promptly be arranged, with provisions for further sums to be added from time to time, as funds are needed and as security for the credit is provided and deposited with the Bank of England.

Eventually, it is asserted, the amount of credits or loans so arranged will probably reach a total of \$300,000,000, although it would not be surprising if the first amount provided would not be more than \$50,000,000. The money so provided is to be utilized in payment for the purchase of cotton, grain and similar products in this country.

A prominent New York banker states that the plans are as yet in tentative shape.

BETHLEHEM WORKS SUFFER BY FIRE

NEW MACHINE SHOP SWEEPED OUT
WITH MILLIONS OF
LOSS

Munitions Destroyed Run Into Millions In Value Alone.

Bethlehem, Pa., Nov. 10.—Early this morning fire destroyed the new machine shop of the Bethlehem Steel Company, Limited. The fire started through a spark falling into a pool of oil. The flames spread with startling rapidity and soon enveloped the whole building. There were 800 men on night work at the time and many of them had narrow escapes from death.

The building destroyed was 700 feet long, 250 feet wide and was four storeys high. The shop was given over entirely to the manufacture of guns. The guns under construction were valued at several millions, while there were over a thousand machines, worth several millions more. The fire department of five adjacent towns were called in to help fight the fire.

GERMANY PILING DEBT UPON DEBT

Britain, France And Russia Are In Strong Position.

Even if the war should stop immediately all the big nations of the world, with the exception of Germany and Austria-Hungary, would find themselves in strong positions financially, is the forecast made by Joseph Leiter, the Chicago financier.

"In Germany they are simply piling one debt upon another. The buyer of German obligations puts up other German obligations. The Government is taking all the money.

Germany Will Be Crippled. "When the war ends German manufacturing interests will be unable to borrow money abroad, because the feeling will be strong against Germany. The result in Germany will be disastrous.

"England is in a much stronger position. There the obligations are being met with money drawn from the banks, and by a direct tax on increased through the American comes. France is strong financially. The Russian debt is very small when considered in relation to Russia's ability to pay."

Survivors Of Ancona Are Gathered At Many Points

Rome, Nov. 10.—The Italian-American liner Ancona was torpedoed by an Austrian submarine shortly after leaving Naples for New York. She had 482 passengers on board and a crew of 160.

Americans Lost.

Washington, Nov. 10.—About twenty-seven Americans are believed to have been lost on the torpedoed Italian liner Ancona. This is according to a cable to the State Department from Ambassador Page at Rome.

Bringing In Survivors.

Bizerta, Nov. 10.—Survivors from the Ancona to the number of 161 have been brought here by a mine sweeper and torpedo boat. They have been taken to the hospital where they are being aided by the consuls of Italy and France. Four of them have died since being landed.

TRADE COMMISSIONER TO START FOR RUSSIA

Canadian Government Decides To Open Office In Petrograd.

A vigorous campaign to encourage and develop commerce between Canada and our great European ally, Russia, is being instituted by the Trade and Commerce Department. Hon. George Foster has decided to open up a trade commissioner's office in Petrograd, and Mr. C. F. Just, former Canadian Trade Commissioner for Germany who recently made a report on the opportunities for Canadian commerce in the land of the bear, has been appointed to the post. Mr. Just will leave within a couple of months for Russia. He will be accompanied by at least two assistants who, after becoming acquainted with Russian conditions, will likely open offices probably at Moscow, and Odessa.

Later he was exchanged through the American consul for a German trade commissioner who had been located in South Africa. Naples, Nov. 10.—The owners of the Ancona have received advices that 320 of those aboard the Ancona have been landed at ports in Tunis and fifty at Malta.

Well Known Vessel.

Rome, Nov. 10.—The vessel had been engaged in the Atlantic trade for the past six years and was a steamer of 8,200 tons and 482 feet long. She had never carried munitions, but last trip carried 1,250 Italian reservists from New York to Naples.

CYCLONE SWEEPED THROUGH GREAT BEND WITH HEAVY LOSS

Denver, Nov. 10.—A cyclone early tonight swept through Great Bend causing heavy property damage. The wires failed after meagre reports had been received, so that but little is available as to the extent of the damage done.

GREECE FLOATS BIG LOAN IN LONDON FOR THE WAR

London, Nov. 10.—A loan for £1,600,000 from Great Britain to Greece has been concluded. The money is now at the disposal of the Hellenic Government.

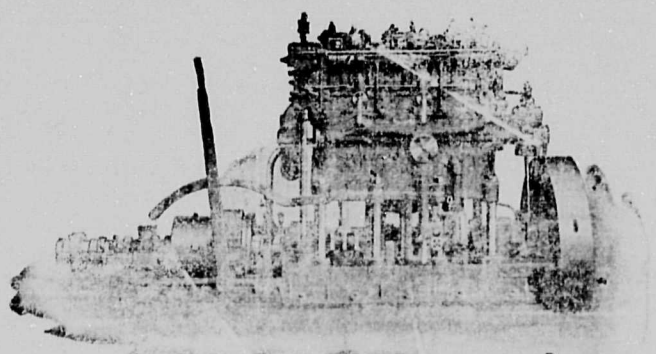

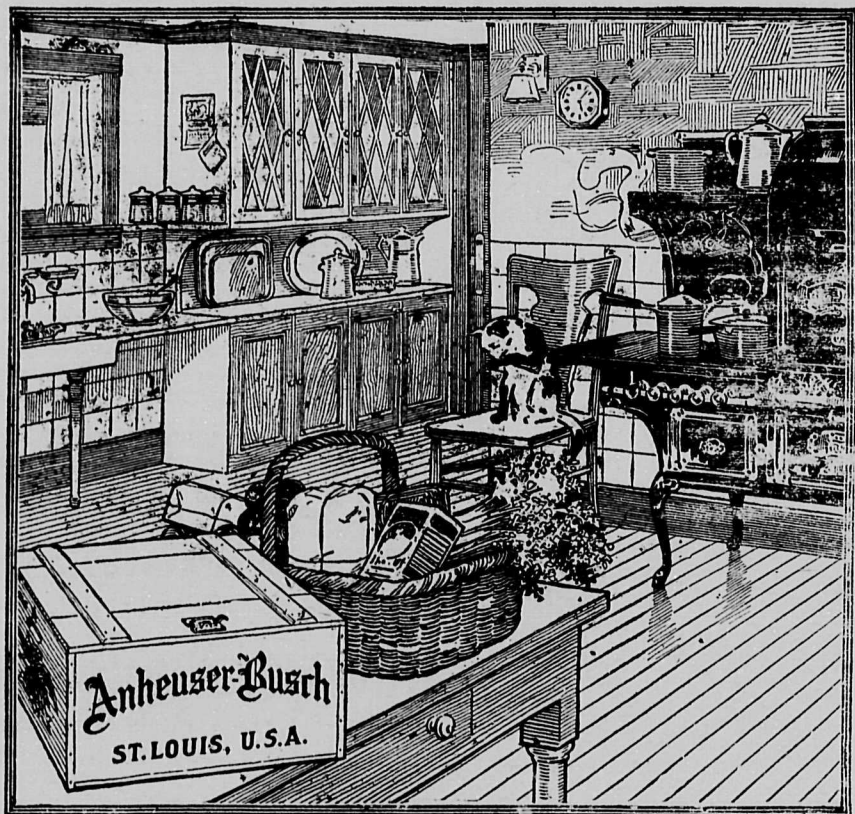

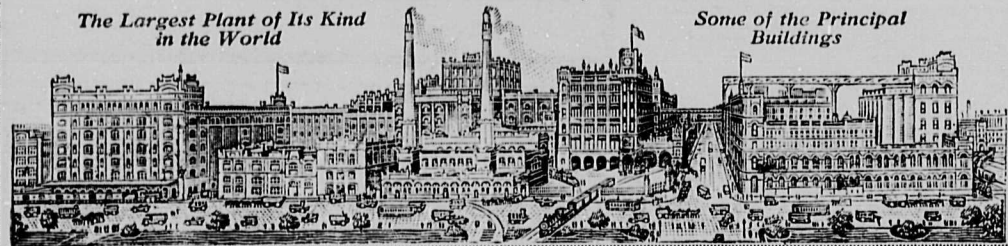

SHELL MAKING IN CANADA.

What an industry shell making is
now in Canada was revealed by Sir
Sam Hughes in a recent address.
There have been turned into shells
360,335,000 pounds of Canadian
steel, and 329 industries have been
established for the making of war
material, while 250 more are or-
ganized ready in case of need. Ten
thousand young men had put their
names down on paper as being anx-
ious to make shells, and 90,000 work-
men have already been engaged.
Twenty million shells have been
turned out in Canada, representing
\$220,000,000 in value. Forty-four
million pounds of copper and ten mil-
lion pounds of lead have been pro-
duced and a zinc industry has been
created. Canada has produced 3,000
tons of zinc at fifteen cents a pound,
while zinc in the United States has
been selling for 40 cents a pound.
The Minister of Militia has reason
to speak with satisfaction of the suc-
cess that has attended the entry of
Canada into the field for the manu-
facture of munitions of war. And at
this the Minister has not revealed
half of the activity of this Dominion
in the industrial phase of the war.
