COAL MAY COME INTO ITS OWN

R. C. CAMPBELL - JOHNSON
TELLS OF NEW
METHOD

It May Be Fed Like Oil Through
Nozzles To Ad-
vantage.

Old King Coal is coming into his
own again.

Pulverized coal as a substitute for
oil fuel has been demonstrated to be
a safer and a cleaner form of fuel,
according to R. C. Campbell-Johnson,
the well known mining and metal-
lurgical engineer of Vancouver.

The new method has gone beyond
the experimental stage in bringing
coal into competition with oil in re-
gard to cost. The coal is crushed as
fine as sawdust with compressed air,
and it can be fed through the same
nozzles that are now used for oil
burners and no renewals will be
necessary.

Used By The Navy.

"In our fighting navies it means
smokeless steam coal, an absolute ne-
cessity to hide the whereabouts of
any warship. The British Admiralty
will publish no information, yet they
are known to have perfected this
process from the fact that they pur-
chase large quantities of crushed coal.
There is no danger in storing it, and
it can be produced from any local
coal, successfully replacing the cele-
brated Welsh coal used in the British
and all other navies.

Smelter Use.

The experiments that have already
been carried out are past history
with the British smelter at Swansea.
Long ago they used coal and coke
dust in this way as a fuel. Seven tons
of copper ore are now being smelted
with one ton of crushed coal, where-
as formerly the ratio was a ton of
coal to a ton of ore.

"There has been a difficulty in
smelting fine ore derived from the
mechanical oil flotation process. With
the new process for combustion blast
furnaces are done away with and the
cost of erection of smelter plants is
reduced nearly nine-tenths. Plants
can be built at the copper mines and
the freight charges saved.

Clean Cities.

"In cities perfect combustion
means absence of smoke, cleaner
cities and better health. Paris is the
cleanest city in the world, and, given
a fair chance, our cities may rival
the French capital. The unsightly oil
tank will be conspicuous by its ab-
sence.

"One object among others in elimi-
nating oil and replacing it with coal
is to prevent foreign concerns from
rigging the price on us. The railways
and local shipping concerns have
been persuaded to use oil fuel. Once
they are fitted up for this kind of
fuel they are tied hand and foot to
the producers of oil. With our coal
collieries turning out a substitute
they will be forced to down prices.
Besides this the end of the visible
supply of oil on this continent is in
sight. The Californian oil supply will
hold out but another twenty years,
according to the best authorities in
the United States. The next genera-
tion have, therefore, to find some
other kind of fuel.

"What all this means for British
Columbia's mineral industries is be-
yond computation. Britain's indus-
trial supremacy was built up on her
splendid coal supply. The coal min-
ing industry will receive a great fillip

Greek Shipping Prohibited.

London, Nov. 18.—Further load-
ing of Greek ships in British waters
has been prohibited. Sixty Greek
vessels have received warning that
they will not be allowed to leave the
British coast until the status of
Greece has been settled.

Greece Cut Off.

Paris, Nov. 18.—The French Gov-
ernment has issued orders to all port
authorities that they are to accept
no further shipments from Greece in
the meantime.

GREEK SHIPPING HAD GREAT DEVELOPMENT

The Merchant Vessels Of Greece Have Increased At Rapid Rate.

Of the smaller merchandise fleets
of the world, that of Greece has dur-
ing the last few years undergone a
surprisingly rapid development. The
growth of the tonnage in five periods
is shown in the subjoined table:

Among the ships which go to
make up this vast increase in tonnage
there are a very large number of
second-hand vessels, but as the Greek
mercantile marine is burdened by
practically no restrictions with re-
gard to the utilization of cargo space
and the accommodation of crews the
shipowner is able to achieve consid-
erable success with these old ships,
even in cases where the previous
owner has worked at a loss. It is the
profits thus obtained which have re-
sulted in the rapid growth of the
mercantile marine of Greece and the
addition during the last few years of
newly built ships.

In the period from July 1, 1913,
until the end of 1914—only eighteen
months—no fewer than eighty-five
ships, representing altogether 219,
450 tons, were added to the Greek
register, an increase which can be
shown by no other maritime country
with the exception of England, Ger-
many and the United States.

HERRING INDUSTRY SHOULD PROSPER

DEMAND FOR GOOD QUALITY OF CANADIAN FISH IS ACTIVE

Prof. Prince Tells Of The Outlook
In This Line Of
Business.

The herring fishing industry of
Canada has great opportunities be-
fore it just now. The North Sea, the
main source of the herring supply for
Great Britain, is practically closed
to fishermen, and in that fact lies the
chance for the Dominion to furnish
the needs of those whose supply has
been cut off. Canada has the richest
herring fisheries in the world. These
facts were brought out by Prof. E.
E. Prince, of the Marine and Fish-
eries Department, in an address to the
fish and game committee of the con-
servations commission. He showed
that the Canadian herring was quite
as good as the Scotch fish, yet Scotch
herrings were sold from \$10 to \$15
a barrel, compared with Canada's
\$2.50 per barrel. The herring is also
as nutritious as beefsteak and so
makes excellent food.

"Recently," said the speaker, "an
American firm offered, through the
government, to purchase fifty thou-
sand barrels of Maritime herring, pro-
vided that quality equal to the Scotch
product could be guaranteed at the
unprecedented price of \$25 a barrel.
This order alone amounts to a mil-
lion and a quarter dollars."

GOVERNMENT AID TO LUMBERING

REPRESENTATIVE TO BE SENT TO LONDON TO ASSIST IN MARKETING

J. G. Woods Has Been Appointed To
This Position To Represent
Province.

The heavy orders for lumber for
the United Kingdom placed through
the Provincial Government during the
past summer, as a result of the visit
of Lumber Commissioner MacMillan
to Europe, show what results can be
obtained by governmental action in
assisting the lumbering industry. In
order to follow up the advantage al-
ready gained in this new line of work
the Hon. W. R. Ross announced that
the Provincial Government is send-
ing a business representative of the
industry to London.

Investigation has already shown
that before the European market can
be entered, on any scale, by our
manufacturers a great deal of pre-
liminary work must be done in ex-
plaining to buyers the qualities and
methods of manufacture of our British
Columbia woods. There are many
misconceptions which are very pre-
valent, and which act as a barrier
to the introduction of our lumber
products. These can only be over-
come by energetic personal work
among the buyers by a representa-
tive thoroughly conversant with every
phase of our lumbering industry.

Successful Attack In Dardanelles By The British Troops

London, Nov. 18.—An official re-
port says that in the Dardanelles the
fifty second division has carried out
a very successful attack on the Turk-
ish trenches, for which careful pre-
parations had been in progress for
considerable time. Three mines were
exploded successfully under the
enemy's trenches, in the neighbor-
hood of Kethia Nultah. The infan-
try pushing forward immediately
afterwards, captured 160 yards of
trenches.

East of the Nullah, and 120 yards
to its west, we captured trenches. We
at once consolidated and bombing
parties were rushed to the combina-
tion trenches where we erected bar-
ricades.

Simultaneously with this assault
our artillery opened on the enemy's

reserve support trenches. H. M. S.
Edgar, a protected cruiser, co-operat-
ing with the land forces maintained
its fire until the position was report-
edly consolidated.

The enemy's batteries replied
heavily, but very erratically and did
little damage. The Turks in the
neighboring trenches, who fired
heavily, were caught by our machine
gun fire.

A rifle counter attack was made
by the enemy until the night of No-
vember 16 and 17, when it was easily
repulsed.

Our casualties were under fifty
killed and wounded. Over seventy
dead were seen in the captured tren-
ches. A wounded prisoner reported
that over thirty dead were buried by
the explosion of one mine.

ments which are designed to meet the
case of Swedish and Russian lumber,
but which are not properly applicable
to the very different timber species
of the Pacific coast. In many such
cases slight modifications of the cus-
tomary specifications would not affect
the interests of the old country buyer
in any way, while they would cheapen
production here, and so enable the
saw mills of this province to quote
lower prices and secure a larger
share of this trade. Through general
work of this character the Provincial
Lumber Commissioner will be of con-
siderable assistance, not only in pre-
paring the way for the future de-
velopments, but also by co-operating
with the various brokers and agents
who represent the interests of Brit-
ish Columbia lumber firms now do-
ing business in the United Kingdom
markets. So active has been the
campaign conducted by American
shippers, and so largely have they in-
creased their representation in Euro-
pe recently that the Minister of
Lands has decided that a strong ef-
fort is necessary to counteract this
action and protect British Columbia
business.

Mr. J. G. Woods, the well known
lumberman, has been appointed as
the new Lumber Commissioner to the
United Kingdom. Mr. Woods has been
long and intimately connected with
the lumber business of the coast.
After being manager of the Leamy &
Kyle Company, one of the first mills
established at Vancouver, he became
manager of the Moodyville Sawmills,
and was for many years engaged in
the cargo export trade, an experience
which is of particular value, in view
of his present mission. Mr. Woods
was subsequently owner and manager
of the firm of Woods & Spicer,
shingle manufacturers. He thus
brings to his task a thoroughly prac-
tical knowledge of all branches of
the industry, whose interests he will
further in the European market. The
new commissioner's duties also in-
clude the carrying out of various ar-
rangements made with the British
authorities in connection with the
lumber orders placed through the de-
partment.

HARRISON STEAMERS TORPEDOED BY ENEMY

Line Is Hardest Hit Of Any British Company By The Submarine Cam- paign Of Germany.

The submarine warfare being wag-
ed by the Germans off the United
Kingdom coasts has probably result-
ed in the loss of more vessels owned
by the Harrison Line of Liverpool
than those of any other corporations
operating fleets on the high seas.

The sinking of the steamer Chan-
cellor by a German submarine recent-
ly, brings the total of vessels lost
through this cause up to six. While
another was seriously damaged by a
torpedo, but kept afloat and subse-
quently made port. As far as records
show no other British steamship com-
pany has lost so many merchant
ships since the outbreak of war.

The first vessel to be lost by the
Harrison Line was the steamship
Diplomat, a new vessel of over 10,
000 tons, which, by the way, was not
a submarine victim. The Diplomat
was overhauled by the raiding Ger-
man cruiser Emden while steaming
in the Indian Ocean and she met the
fate of a number of other steamers
which about that time had the mis-
fortune to run foul of the raider.

Since the inauguration of the sub-
marine campaign last February there
came in quick succession reports of
the sinking of the Harrison steamers
Candidate and Centurion off the Irish
coast, and of the Crown of Castle, a
vessel operated under the direction
of the Harrison Line. All three of
these vessels had been regular trad-
ers in the Harrison Direct Line ser-
vice between Glasgow, Liverpool and
this coast by way of the Panama
Canal.

The Wayfarer, the largest ship in
the Harrison Line fleet, was torpedo-
ed by a submarine, but she kept
afloat and later made port. Repairs
were effected to her and she is now
again in service.

The Dictator, another big vessel of
this fleet was sunk some time ago,
and later the Chancellor was sent
under. Both these vessels were
operated in the trans-Atlantic trade.

Traffic Through Suez Canal.

The number of vessel which passed
through the Suez Canal was 5,373 in
1912, 5,085 in 1913, and 4,802 in
1914; of which 3,335 in 1912, 2,951

AN ERA OF PROSPERITY.

Mr. T. Kelly Dickinson, editor of
the Montreal Financial Times, is very
optimistic regarding the general
situation in Canada. "Canada has
been kicked into prosperity," he said
recently. "It is a fact," he continued,
"Canada has indeed been kicked into
prosperity; more, she has been
shoved, jostled, taken by the scruff
of the neck and landed into a posi-
tion of strength the extent of which
will not be realized for years to come."
"The stock market boom is only
an incident in the general condition
of financial improvement, though it
must be admitted that before the in-
flation of the moment, much of the
market appreciation has been a re-
flection of that very state of pros-
perity."

"The real pivotal point of the
situation is the accumulation of un-
told wealth, through the sale of, in
the first place, our agricultural pro-
ducts at high prices; in the second,
of industrial products previously
made in Canada, and in the third
place, of war munitions such as ships,
small arms and shells."

"Canada today is not only capital-
izing her future industry and agri-
cultural growth, but is rapidly wiping
out past indebtedness and at the
same time squeezing out an enor-
mous volume of water from her in-
dustrial securities."

"By the end of the present calen-
dar year," Mr. Dickinson said, "Can-
ada will have a national balance
sheet unusually strong in working
capital, something sadly deficient
even in the so-called prosperous days
of greatly extended credit."

"We were told recently by the Hon.
T. White, how Canada's balance of

trade had turned to her favor, but
the real figures of the finance minis-
ter do not really represent the true
value of the favorable trade balance.
Even yet there are millions of dollars
of imports that will very shortly go
into exports, being largely on manu-
facturing account."

"As against the above favorable
factors, we must not lose sight of the
fact that heavy taxation is imminent,
also that Canada will make a domes-
tic loan approximating some \$60,-
000,000."

SYNOPSIS OF COAL MINING
REGULATIONS.

Coal mining rights of the Domini-
on in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and
Alberta, the Yukon Territory, the
Northwest Territories and a portion
of the Province of British Columbia,
may be leased for a term of twenty-
one years at an annual rental of
\$1 per acre. Not more than 2,560
acres will be leased to one applicant.

Applications for a lease must be
made by the applicant in person to
the Agent or Sub-Agent of the dis-
trict in which the rights applied for
are situated.

In surveyed territory the land
must be described by sections, or
legal subdivisions of sections, and
in unsurveyed territory the tract ap-

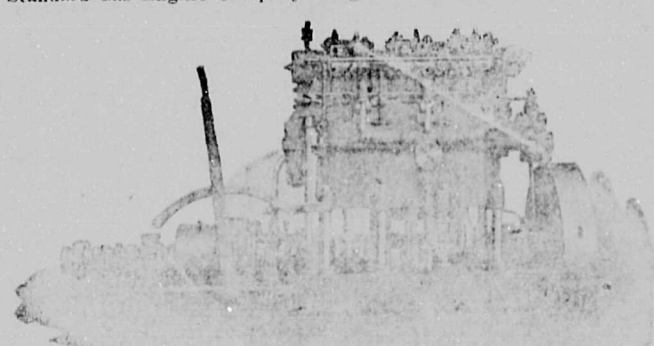

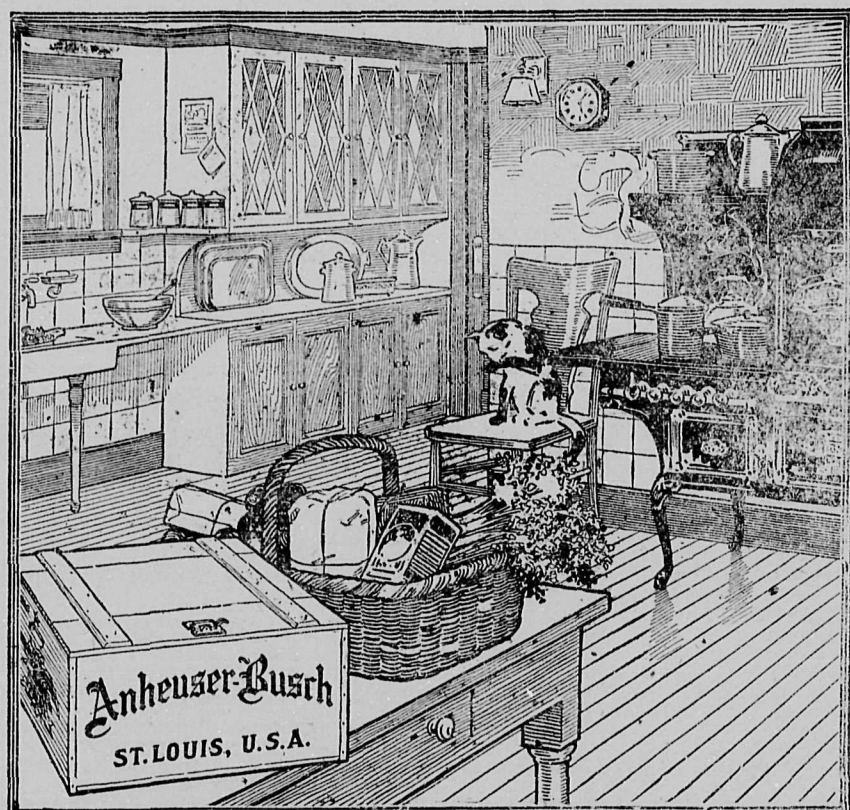

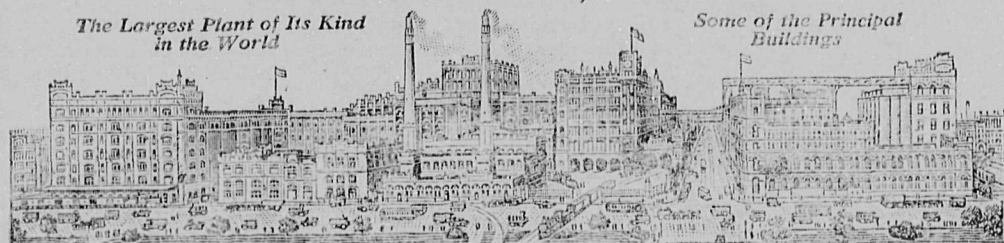
