

THE RUSSIANS HAVE STRONG POSITIONS ALLIES IN BELGIUM ARE FIGHTING FOR POSITIONS THE INDIAN TROOPS ARE IN THE FOREFRONT NOW

German Column Mowed Down

This Situation In Belgium Has Not Been Materially Changed—British Have Had to Retire A Little From Trenches That Had Been Taken

Paris, Dec. 19.—The official statement from headquarters says that in Belgium in the region of Stenstraete an attack of the enemy has been repulsed. We made sensible progress in the neighborhood of Korteken Inn.

The British troops in the vicinity of Neuve Chappelle again lost several trenches which they had captured yesterday. In the meantime the Indian corps has advanced a few hundred metres towards Richebourg and Lavoue.

The enemy has displayed activity in the direction of Thiépyal and Lihons. At the latter place a detachment of the enemy was taken by surprise while marching in column and were literally mowed down.

A Prisoner in Germany.

Officer Duff of the city police force has received word that a brother-in-law of his who is Sergeant-Major in the First Welsh Fusiliers, is now held as a prisoner in Germany. In writing to his wife, who is a sister of Officer Duff, the prisoner of war says that he and his fellow-prisoners are being well treated. The Fusiliers were surrounded after a bloody encounter in which a very large proportion of the officers were killed.

C.N.R. TO OPERATE BY MARCH NEXT

OFFICIALS OF THE RAILWAY
ANNOUNCE TRAINS WILL
RUN.

The Through Service Will Commence in the Spring of the Year.

The reiterated statements from the Canadian Northern railroad officials that the road across the continent would be physically continuous by January 1, 1915, is now augmented by the statement of D. B. Hanna, third vice-president of the C. N.R., who arrived in Winnipeg with M. H. McLeod, general manager of the road, to the effect that the first transcontinental passenger train would be operated by March of 1915. Says the Winnipeg Free Press. A regular service would be put on by that time and thus the all-across-the-continent Canadian Northern would be an established fact after many years of tremendous work under great constructional difficulties.

The statement was made by Mr. Hanna in a most matter of fact manner which left no doubt in the mind of the one who heard him that the date for the first train across had long ago been settled and every contingency had been covered to allow for this opening. Mr. Hanna gave it as his opinion that in all probability the war would be over by March, 1915, also, so that the transcontinental would start under very favorable conditions. The well known pioneer of the Canadian Northern did not think that there would be any official opening of the physical completion in January, that is to say, any opening conducted with the pomp and eclat that usually accompanies the completion of so great an undertaking, the time not being propitious for such a display. Work has gone along quietly and steadily and the transcontinental dream is at last about to be realized.

REGIMENT TO HOLD ROUTE MARCH

THE PRINCE RUPERT LIGHT INFANTRY WILL TODAY HAVE A MARCH OUT.

Battalion Will Parade Under Commands of Captains Clayton and McMordie.

The local regiment, the 68th Light Infantry, will parade this forenoon at the Exhibition Building at 10 o'clock. The parade is for the purpose of a route march, which will be from the building along Fulton Street to Third Avenue, McBride Street, and either Fifth or Sixth Avenue, in the direction of the Cold Storage. This march will take place if the weather conditions are suitable. The parade will be under the command of Capt. W. B. Clayton and Capt. S. P. McMordie.

The enlisting in the local regiment is proceeding steadily. With the arrival of the clothing and the accoutrements the interest will, it is said, be still further increased.

There are already enrolled sufficient for one company and it is expected that it will take but a short time until two full companies will be enrolled here. The members are taking a deep interest in the drills that are being conducted twice a week at the Exhibition Building by Capt. Clayton and McMordie.

PROPOSED CHANGES IN BASIS OF UNION

Churches to Again Consider Important Matter at Toronto Meeting.

Rev. Dr. Bryce, of Winnipeg, has gone east to attend the meeting of the union committee of the Presbyterian, Methodist and Congregational churches in Toronto. Dr. Bryce has been a member since the time of the first negotiations of these churches.

The subjects to be discussed at the meeting are as follows:

- 1—The proposed changes in the basis of union suggested by the general assembly of the Presbyterian Church.
- 2—Any changes to be suggested by the denominational committees on church union.
- 3—The name to be given to the united church, and the names to be given the courts and officials of the united church.
- 4—The legal aspects of the whole question of church union.
- 5—Any other matters preparatory to the final recommendation regarding church union which is to be presented to the courts of the negotiating churches.

Dr. Bryce states that Western Canada, with very few exceptions, is strong for union—and that soon. Local unions in Manitoba have been consummated at Dryden, Ont., Macgregor, Glenboro, Cypress River, Wawanesa, Beresford, and also in Beausejour, Stuartburn, Teulon, La (Continued on Page Two.)

CONCERTS FOR LOCAL REGIMENT

CANADIAN PATRIOTIC COMMITTEE HAS PLANNED SERIES OF ENTERTAINMENTS.

Proceeds Will Be Devoted to the Benefit of the Prince Rupert Light Infantry.

At a meeting of the committee of the local branch of the Canadian Patriotic Fund Association it was decided, in line with the example set by many other towns of the Dominion, to ask the people of Prince Rupert to assist in providing an additional fund for extra comforts and necessary emergency expenses for the members of the Prince Rupert Light Infantry.

This movement is under the direction and patronage of the above committee but is entirely independent of the general objects of the Association in the sense that all moneys realized will be devoted solely to the one object mentioned.

It is not intended to solicit subscriptions. On the contrary the committee has decided to provide a series of entertainments and fix the admission fee at fifty cents for each.

The moneys realized will from time to time be forwarded to the officer in command of the company, wherever it may be located, and disbursed by him as the members of the company may direct and for the purposes mentioned.

The first entertainment will be given in the Empress Theatre on Wednesday evening the 6th of January, 1915, commencing at 8 o'clock. Canon Rix will deliver an address on "The Flag." In addition there will be instrumental music, songs and recitations. Remember the date.

The attendance at the first entertainment will indicate to the committee whether the move is a popular one or not and will be a guide to future efforts in this respect.

CANADA'S PROFIT FROM THE EUROPEAN WAR

How Orders Have Been Placed in This Country for Bel-ligerents.

A careful estimate places the expenditure for war supplies in Canada by the Canadian, British and French governments to December 1 at nearly \$40,000,000. This estimate includes the sums spent for flour and grain, as well as for military equipment.

That Canadian manufacturers are delivering satisfactory goods is evident from the repeat orders now being placed by Mr. Frederick Stobart. On Saturday an order for 750,000 pair of socks, to be delivered by the end of March, was received by Mr. Stobart, and will be placed among the hosiery manufacturers. With the present orders not filled, the entire capacity of Canadian hosiery mills will be taxed until spring.

Russians Held Back Germans

Attempt On Part Of Enemy to Cross From Right Bank Of Vistula Has Proved Unsuccessful --- Thousand Germans Captured At One Point

HISTORY OF INTERIOR
NAMES IS REVIVED
Victoria Colonist Refers to the Derivation of Tete Jaune and What It Means For.

A few days ago a man from the northern interior was in this office, says the Victoria Colonist, and the conversation turned upon the country through which the Grand Trunk Pacific runs. He was asked if he knew Tete Jaune, and he said: "What?" The name was repeated and he then said, "I guess you mean T. John." He did not spell the name but he pronounced it just as if it should be written that way. He was somewhat disposed to be indignant when told that his pronunciation was wrong, because he said he had been there. A Prince Rupert business man on another occasion gave the same pronunciation. We would like before it is too late to enter a protest against the mal-treatment of this historic name. It is just as easy to say Tete Jaune as to say T. John, and no one would think of saying the latter if we British people were not so stubborn a bunch that we insisted upon pronouncing any foreign language just as we like.

Tete Jaune, which was the name of a mountain pass now called Yellow Head, and of a cache at a point on the upper Fraser River, has a history. Jasper Hawes was a trapper in the days gone by. He passed into geography and history as Jasper, but the Grand Trunk Pacific people have rescued his surname from oblivion. (Continued on Page Four.)

Petrograd, Dec. 19.—An official announcement says that on the right bank of the Vistula there has been no change. The attempt of the enemy to proceed from the right bank of the river near Dobren was repulsed by our artillery fire. The enemy was compelled to evacuate quickly an island in the Vistula which he occupied. We seized at this point several pontoon bridges.

On the Bzura.

Fighting on the Bzura River has begun to develop. We have repulsed several German attacks in other regions.

On the left bank of the Vistula there have been engagements only by the advance guards.

Prisoners Captured.

In West Galicia on the left bank of the Dounaetz on the night of December 17 and 18 we captured 1,000 prisoners belonging to a German division which had already been engaged in this region. A strong force from Pizemysl attempted to open the railway in the direction of Bierca. Our troops are fighting, however, under favorable conditions for them.

WILL WORK BENEFITS.

At the annual meeting of the Bank of Montreal Sir Frederick Williams-Taylor, the general manager of that institution, made at the close of his address an allusion to the financial situation in Canada as related to the war. He said, in conclusion, the financial position of our country now is that, consequent upon the prompt measures adopted by our minister of finance, and, owing to the elasticity and excellence of our banking system, Canada is standing the strain without collapse. We are adjusting ourselves to a heavy burden thrust upon us without warning whilst in the constructional stage and though here and there weak spots will develop, the general structure will surely stand the strain, and we hope and believe, we, as a country, can safeguard the situation.

It is obvious to everyone in the Dominion and to our friends abroad that we are cast upon our own resources, that we are on trial, and that our future development will depend in no small measure upon the condition in which we emerge from this trying ordeal. The longer the duration of the war, the more will the colonial props of the Empire, including Canada, suffer, but good will come out of evil, for our energies will be turned to the development of our great natural wealth, particularly our vast agricultural resources, and we can then look forward with confidence to eventually emerging from present conditions a wiser people with our affairs on a healthier, more normal and a sounder basis than that with which we were threatened.

Canada's Aid.

Canada's contributions to the Belgian Relief Fund in food, clothing and money amount to over \$900,000, and another \$100,000 is said to be forthcoming.

Day of Prayer.

Sunday, January 3, has been set aside by the Dominion Government as a day of special intercession and prayer on behalf of the British and allied cause and to the memory of those who have fallen in battle. The same Sunday will be observed in Great Britain in the same manner.

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HOW BRITAIN WILL PAY THE WAR BILL

Lloyd George's War Budget Seems to Meet With General Approval Says The London Statesman--Faddists Are the Only People Disappointed

The most significant comment on Mr. Lloyd George's 'War Budget' is that it calls for no comment, says the Statesman of London. The 'coal-heaver filling the bunkers of the battleships,' as the Chancellor of the Exchequer described himself, has taken the course which seems to everybody necessary and desirable; and what is remarkable is only the fact that this course should commend itself so universally. Almost the only people disappointed are the amateur inventors of new imports. It is one of the depressing experiences of every Chancellor of the Exchequer to discover that all the 'fancy' taxes that are pressed upon him, taxes on cats, on moving pictures, on Christmas cards, on theatre receipts, on head of game killed, on billposting, on maid servants, on pet birds, on advertising circulars (especially those of moneylenders), on books printed at their authors' expense, and all the other suggestions—have the cardinal defect of making a great fuss and yielding next to nothing to the Exchequer. Mr. Austen Chamberlain could not avoid, we suppose, paying lip homage to 'Tariff Reform' in the phrase in which he expressed his regret that more things were not to be taxed. But as we can now import only from our own Dominions, or from the Powers with whom we are in alliance in the war, or from the very few neutrals whom we are anxious not to offend, it may be supposed that even Tariff Reformers would not find the occasion propitious for those import duties on manufactured articles which sound so plausible on platforms and shrivel so uncomfortably on financial analysis. Moreover, the need is for money, not votes. What is even a million or so when the sum to be found (including the cost of the war up to next July) is £535,367,000! And yet, as Mr. Lloyd George aptly reminded the House of Commons, even this unprecedented total for the government expenditure is less than three months' normal income of the nation, which he puts at £2,300,000,000 per annum. It is considerably less, he might have added, than the most moderate estimate of those economic 'margins and surpluses'—of which the most typical are rent and dividends—which might, as Mr. J. A. Hobson tells us, theoretically all be absorbed into the Exchequer without affecting the remuneration of any person in any way engaged in any productive enterprise. It is less, in fact, than that part of its income that the nation found that it did not need for present consumption and voluntarily 'saved' during 1911 and 1912; and thereupon invested, be it added, in profitable new enterprises, mostly at the ends of the earth, rather than devote it to rehousing our own people. The obvious course under these circumstances, and the one which the Chancellor has taken, was to seize as large a proportion of these 'unearned incomes, as a Parliament of property owners would stand, and to see that all the rest of the nation's spare money was this year invested by means of a thumping war loan in the trenches along the Yser and the bunkers of the battleships.

How fortunate it was that the Income Tax stood already at a nominal sixteenpence in the pound, and the Supertax at an additional 6d. to 1s. 4d.! It is clear that the Chancellor's best reserve against war-time is not, as Gladstone and Liddle-

leigh fondly imagined a low Income Tax in time of peace, but a high peace tax, especially now that it is a graduated one. For the real difficulty of getting additional revenue in this land of the wealthy is not economic but psychological. Now, the operation of doubling the income tax, as Mr. Lloyd George reminded the dumbly acquiescent House, is practically now prescribed by precedent as the course to be immediately followed whenever we are engaged in a serious war. With an Income Tax at twopence or threepence in the pound, the doubling for which capitalistic patriotism is prepared only brings in six or eight millions. With an Income Tax at sixpence and a Supertax at about one shilling, the same operation yields forty-five millions. If Mr. Lloyd George had found the Income Tax at half-a-crown in the pound and the Supertax at two shillings as the accustomed peace level, he would have had no more difficulty last Tuesday in taking ninety millions than he had in taking forty-five. Let him take the hint, and resist all temptation to go back in future from the modest tribute of ransom, ranging from three-and-sixpence to five shillings in the pound, that we are now to ask from the happy possessors of more than three thousand a year.

The only things to be regretted in the new budget are that there is to be no systematic overhauling and simplifying of the Income Tax, and that no part of the expenditure is to come from an increase of the Death Duties. Both these involve, it is understood, more work and a greater degree of rehanding than either the cabinet or Parliament can at the moment find time for. Even as it is the Death Duties are being largely evaded by transfers from father to children, only a small proportion of which are caught by the provisions protective of the revenue that are now in force. The resources of the Inland Revenue Department are not exhausted, but time cannot now be spared. With regard to the Income Tax, it is a little absurd that the small knot of people who enjoy unearned incomes between £700 and £2,500 a year, without any earned incomes, should be the only people, out of the million and a quarter income tax payers from whom no return of income is required. Nor is this a mere desire to complete the statistics. No section which has been brought to the requirement of a return has yet failed to yield a new revenue, out of odds and ends that had hitherto escaped taxation. And we really ought to put an end to the feeling of the man with a salary of two hundred a year, that he is paying at the rate of half-a-crown in the pound. By the curious device of the abatement and the allowance for earned incomes, instead of the proper system of graduation that Mr. Chiozza Money urges, such a man will quite properly be paying next year at the rate of a little over threepence halfpenny in the pound only, and still less if he has children. Why cannot we call the rate what it really is, instead of exaggerating the demand?

To balance the doubled Income Tax and Supertax, the Chancellor of the Exchequer again follows precedent in increasing the indirect taxation that falls mainly on the multitudes below the Income Tax level. It is significant of the rapid growth of enlightened opinion that, whilst the wealthier one-ninth of the nation is to contribute forty-five millions, the poorer eight-ninths are asked only

for twenty millions. We have broken quite away from the figment of equal contributions from direct and indirect taxation respectively, for which no economic or other intellectual argument was ever adduced. And it is important to notice that (apart from the extra three millions brought in by the added threepence on tea, which is imposed merely because the nation is not prepared to let the teetotalers go scot-free) the real contribution which the average workmen is to be asked to make will be the sacrifice of some of his beer. Though Mr. Lloyd George hopes to get no less than seventeen millions out of an extra halfpenny per half pint, the falling off in consumption from all causes is estimated at thirty-five per cent. One half pint in every three is, so to speak, to be offered as a libation to the god of war. There is no denying that the sacrifice is widely felt to be appropriate. Mr. Lloyd George confessed that it was only the fact that he feared nothing would thereby be secured in hard cash that prevented him exacting a like sacrifice from the spirit drinkers. There are those who would lay sacrilegious hands even on the pipe of peace! Conscious as we are of each other's extravagances, we offer them up on the country's altar with the minimum of reluctance.
