

SCOTT CANNOT BE FOUND BY PROVINCIAL OFFICERS M. P. COTTON FEELS SATISFIED AS TO DRYDOCK DEAL

Liberals Had Audacity To Engage Detective To Watch Conservatives

Although workers in the Liberal ranks were in the heart of the plugging plot in the Vancouver by-election they had the astounding audacity to engage Charles F. Reddington, Manager of the Thiel Detective Agency, Vancouver, to watch the Conservatives for pluggers. One of his men operated in the Conservative Committee Rooms. Reddington said that no evidence was found that any plugging was planned or attempted by the Conservative party. Reddington said he was employed by M. A. Macdonald and J. T. Scott. Hugh S. Jones, Vancouver, said that Scott, who seems to be the chief factor in the plugging campaign, lived at his house and sometimes went by the name of Stewart and this statement corroborates the evidence of Mrs. Annance, who said that under the name of Stewart, Scott had phoned her up from a telephone number which Jones today said was his. Frederick Moore, proprietor of the Robson Rooms, stated that Herbert Pearce, one of Scott's workers, had rented two rooms from him on election day, allegedly for the purpose of using while fishermen signed up for work in Prince Rupert. The contracting fishermen was introduced to Moore as Johnston, but he was told later that he was Jack White. It will be remembered that the Seattle pluggers said that they met White there. Another witness was W. Percy Eldridge, a Vancouver shoemaker, who was one of the men working for Annance at the Calumet Rooms. He got \$10 for the day. He had been instructed to meet White at the Calumet Rooms, if Annance was not there, but he did not see White. Eldridge helped Annance get twenty men for the work on election day. Annance gave them

tickets to plug on. Eldridge said the name on his ticket was "Flannigan." He told the committee that he informed the several Liberals of his engagement with Annance. Some evidence regarding the funds of the Provincial Liberal Association was given by A. M. Pound, the Treasurer. Mr. Pound declared that as far as he was concerned he had nothing to hide with respect to the expenditures of money. He said he did not know much about Scott as he was not employed by the Provincial Association, but by the Provincial Organization Committee, of which Mr. M. A. Macdonald is chairman.

Confirmation of much of the story told by John L. Sullivan on the witness stand last week, was given by F. W. Welsh, a Conservative candidate in Vancouver. Mr. Welsh said that he had been informed by Sullivan in two wireless messages from the Seattle boat, that the pluggers were on their way to Vancouver from Seattle. He immediately got into touch with the police and the immigration officers. The matter had been mentioned to Hon. M. Bowser on election day, said Welsh, and the Premier expressed the wish that, if it could be shown that these men in Vancouver were there for plugging purposes they should be arrested. A curious thing about the situation is that the Albany Rooms, in which a number of the pluggers were kept, is above Mr. Welsh's grocery store. He did not know, however, until two or three days after the election that the impersonators had been busy so near him.

Most of the Conservative evidence will be in by tomorrow, and the Liberals will commence rebuttal on Wednesday. It is likely that the committee will sit until the end of the month, as the Legislature is expected to be in session until that time.

WILL GO EAST ON DRYDOCK SCHEME

M. P. COTTON, WHO IS HERE IN
CONNECTION WITH PROPOSITION,

John T. Scott Cannot Be Found To Be Served With Warrant

(Special Correspondence.)

Victoria, May 24.—If John T. Scott the Liberal worker, who is alleged to have manipulated the plugging for M. A. Macdonald at the Vancouver by-election, can be found by the Provincial Police he will face a criminal charge under the Elections Act, as a warrant for his arrest has been sworn out. Scott will be charged, it is said, under the same section of the Act that Annance was tried on, that is to say: Attempting to personate.

Annance received a nine months' sentence and a fine of \$300.

Scott, who was also known in several of his haunts in Vancouver as "Stewart," had disappeared. He was in Victoria about ten days ago and at that time had a conference with Mr. Brewster in the Liberal Committee Rooms, but insofar as has been ascertained here has dropped out of sight since then. One report has it that he is in Seattle, in which case, of course, the Provincial warrant for his arrest will be of no value, as he cannot be extradited under a provincial act.

The Vancouver Plugging Committee sat for several hours this morning, but its session lacked the interest which previous sittings have had. Morrison, the keeper of the Calumet Rooms, was examined by the committee as was also Purser Bird, of the Princess Adelaide. Bird is the man from whom John L. Sullivan

All Soldiers From Province Will Have Vote At Election

The soldiers' Vote Bill, introduced in the House specifies that every soldier from British Columbia who has resided in the Province for six months prior to enlistment shall have a vote. His vote being for the riding in which he resided during the last month prior to enlistment. The Agent-General shall appoint a presiding officer for a poll at each military camp in the United Kingdom, and at each hospital, and if practicable also at each poll that may be established at the front in France, Belgium or elsewhere. In short, all British Columbia soldiers on duty, no matter where they are, will have a vote at the next elections. Upon nomination day the list of candidates will be telegraphed and the soldiers will have from that time on until election day to vote. In connection with the referendum they are on the voters list or not.

Another important measure which the Government brought forward was an amendment to the Provincial Elections Act. The chief feature of this amendment is the provision that the presiding officer at each poll shall require every elector applying for a ballot to sign his name, address and occupation in a signature book. This it is believed will put an effective stop to plugging, as the returning officers will be able to compare these signatures with those on the applications to get on the voters list. Power is given in the amendment to the returning officer or deputy returning officer to arrest any person at the poll who arouses a suspicion that he is about to personate an elector or deceased elector.

The bill provides that the elections this year shall take place forty-two days after the formal nominations, this it is presumed is in order to give the soldiers at the front time to cast their ballots prior to election day. In the past the period has only been two weeks.

Mr. Brewster, leader of the Opposition, has also got an amendment to the Election Act on the order paper. His deals with the proposed requirement in connection with electors signatures, but is permissive and not obligatory as is the Government's. Speaking on the second reading of his bill, Mr. Brewster declared that the present system lent itself to the practice of plugging and it was almost impossible to avoid illegal actions. Mr. Brewster said his bill did not apply to the country districts. He suggested that he did not desire in getting the list reduced to cut off the soldiers.

OPEN NEW COLONY IN SALMON RIVER DISTRICT

British Columbia Government To Settle Up Its Rich Farming Country.

A new colony in the Salmon River Valley district of British Columbia will be opened by the Government of that Province on June 20. The Grand Trunk Pacific Railway, on whose line the colony will be, is now arranging for excursions, which will be commenced shortly.

Large numbers of easterners are expected to settle in the new colony. (Continued on Page Two.)

NOME ISOLATED SINCE OCTOBER LAST

June 1 Will See Steamship Service To Most Northern Of All Cities.

Steamship service to Nome, the most northerly city in the world, which has been isolated since last October, will be resumed on June 1, with the sailing of the steamship Umatilla from Seattle, followed by the steamship Victoria on June 2. Soon after the last southbound steamer left Nome on October 28 last, Behring Sea was entirely frozen over, and it was necessary, because of the winter cold, to suspend mining operations at Nome. The 2,000 or more people who were left behind when the last steamer sailed prepared to face the long winter. During the winter there was a letter mail service by dog team from Fairbanks, but newspapers, magazines and parcels were not carried. The United States signal corps maintained connection with the outside world by means of cable and wireless.

The arrival of the first steamers from the south, in the last week in June, is the occasion of even greater excitement in Nome than the finish of the annual dog team race. The people are advised by cable of the departure of the boats from Seattle, and eager watch is kept for their smoke. Sometimes the steamers have a hard battle with the ice and are held for many days only a few miles from Nome, with ice conditions so unsafe that no one ventures to walk ashore. Again, the season may be favorable and the boats will come in sight of Nome without difficulty, and see firm ice between them and the shore. In such a case the passengers, or most of them, will walk to Nome over the ice, and will have a more prosaic landing than if they waited to be hoisted in the basket of the aerial tramway. There is no wharf at Nome and can be none, for there is no harbor. Passengers are taken ashore in the tramway and freight by lighter and tramway.

Both of the boats are now preparing to sail for Nome have every berth reserved, and all the cargo room is spoken for. Much of the cargo will be reading matter, vegetables and fruit, of which the people of Nome stand in great need after eight months of imprisonment. Most of the northbound passengers are men interested in mining in Nome, and their families. They go out in autumn and return the next summer.

(Continued from Page One.) which consists of 31,360 acres. This is sufficient for 196 homesteaders. Germans will, however, be excluded.

Already four cars of settlers' effects have arrived at Prince George, the Salmon River district being just north of that city. Other cars are now on the way, and according to reports received by the railway there is likely to be a considerable rush for homesteads.

The settlement will be officially opened by the Government of British Columbia on June 20, at the Government Land Office at Prince George.

The lands which will then be available for homesteaders are level and more open than any now available in British Columbia. The country is rich in all kinds of grains and grasses, it being possible to harvest three crops of alfalfa yearly.

Settlers who take up homesteads this year will probably devote their time to clearing and possibly some vegetables will be grown. Next year, however, mixed farming is expected to be taken up and developed to a considerable extent.

It is proposed to take up settlers of different nationalities, facilities being provided for them to come from all parts of Canada, but it is possible that a large number will be Mennonites.

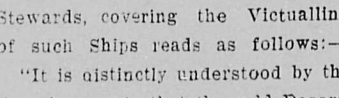

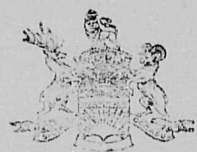

SYNOPSIS OF COAL MINING REGULATIONS.

Coal mining right of the Dominion in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, the Yukon Territory, the Northwest Territories and a portion of the Province of British Columbia, may be leased for a term of twenty-one years at an annual rental of \$1 per acre. Not more than 2,500 acres will be leased to one applicant.

Applications for a lease must be made by the applicant in person to the Agent or Sub-Agent of the district in which the rights applied for are situated.

In surveyed territory the land must be described by sections, or legal subdivisions of sections, and in unsurveyed territory the tract applied for shall be staked out by the applicant himself.

Each application must be accompanied by a fee of \$5, which will be refunded if the rights applied for are not available, but not otherwise. A royalty shall be paid on the merchantable output of the mine at the rate of five cents per ton.

The person operating the mine shall furnish the Agent with sworn returns accounting for the full quantity of merchantable coal mined and pay the royalty thereon. If the coal mining rights are not being operated, such returns should be furnished at least once a year.

The lease will include the coal mining rights only; but the lessee may be permitted to purchase whatever available surface rights may be considered necessary for the working of the mine at the rate of \$10 per acre.

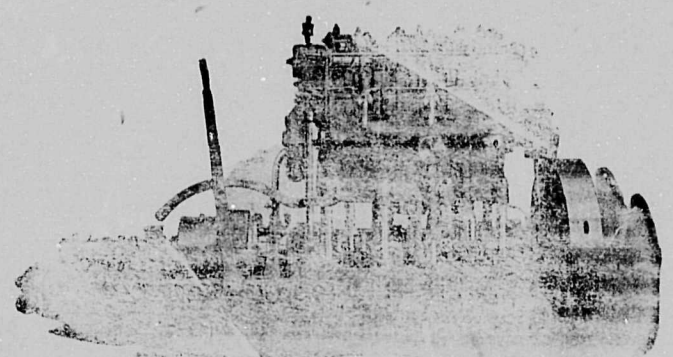

exacting in the world war is found in the exchange of disabled prisoners, which is being conducted through Sweden by Russia and Austria. One train from the Russian camps had eighty cases of consumption among the 230 Austrian prisoners on board. Three of the victims died while the train was passing through this country.

On another train from Russia there were thirty Austrians who had been rendered insane by their sufferings.
