

## SOLDIERS' VOTE OVERSEAS BEING TAKEN WITH CARE

### Very Heavy Shipments Of Fish Received In Port Again

### Two British Cruisers Were Sunk By German Submarine

#### Thirteen Cars Of Fish Left Here For The East Yesterday Morning

#### RUSSIA RUSHING INTO HUNGARY

ADVANCES ARE BEING MADE ALL  
ALONG THE LINE BY  
CZAR'S FORCES

Valuable Munitions Are Being Cap-  
tured By The In-  
vaders.

Petrograd, Aug. 21.—The Rus-  
sians, after breaking through the  
Stokhod line in Volhynia, have ad-  
vanced for a considerable distance  
and have captured important heights  
on the road of Kovel.

In the vicinity of Korosmezo,  
where the Russians have penetrated  
into Hungary, the Austrians were re-  
pulsed and advantageous hill posi-  
tions were secured.

In the Lake Nobel district the en-  
emy suffered severe losses in trying  
to gain ground. The attempt failed  
and the enemy was driven back.

Reports from all the Russian thea-  
tres of war state that large quanti-  
ties of valuable munitions and acces-  
sories as well as many prisoners have  
been captured.

#### BRITISH CRUISERS SUNK IN NORTH SEA BY SUBMARINES

London, Aug. 21.—The British  
cruiser Nottingham and Falmouth,  
while searching for the German fleet  
in the North Sea, have been sunk, ac-  
cording to a statement issued by the  
Admiralty.

The crews were saved with the ex-  
ception of thirty-eight men who are  
missing and one sailor who died from  
injuries.

One German submarine was de-  
stroyed and another was rammed and  
probably sunk. The enemy ships were  
out learning the strength of the Brit-  
ish North Sea fleet and returned to  
port, having avoided an engagement.

Something over a quarter of a mil-  
lion pounds of fresh halibut left here  
yesterday morning for the east over  
the line of the G. T. P. A special  
train of express refrigerator cars  
containing twelve cars pulled out a  
few hours ahead of the regular train,  
while the latter took a carload of  
smaller orders for intermediate  
points.

The shipment was distributed  
among all the companies that are do-  
ing business here. The Canadian Fish  
& Cold Storage Company was well  
represented, while the Booth Com-  
pany had some of its own special  
cars included among the number.  
These latter cars are becoming quite  
a prominent feature of the trains of  
fish that leave here, now that the  
company has got installed in its new  
quarters. The San Juan Company had  
a share of the cars that went out yester-  
day and the National Independent  
Company had also a part in the train  
load.

All this fish practically came in  
during Saturday and Sunday. The  
price that it was bought at was in  
nearly every case 7 1-4 cents a  
pound.

#### FRENCH ARMY IS DRIVING THE ENEMY BACK WITH LOSSES

Paris, Aug. 21.—The French have  
carried a strongly organized German  
position in a wood between Guille-  
mont and Maurepas, taking large  
quantities of war material and driv-  
ing the Germans out of a portion of  
their trench.

The enemy made violent attempts  
to recapture Fleury, which they lost  
the other day, but failed on each  
occasion.

#### MORE INTENSE FIGHTING ON SALONIKI FRONT

Paris, Aug. 21.—The Allied offen-  
sive at Saloniki is developing and  
there is intense fighting along a hun-  
dred and fifty-mile front. The Allies  
have captured five villages.

The Bulgarians are advancing in  
the direction of the Greek seaport of  
Kavala.

#### CAPT. HULL AND PARTY FOR FRONT

LARGE CROWD GATHERED AT  
STATION AND CHEERED  
FORESTERS OFF

Mrs. Hull Will Proceed To England  
To Enter Hospital  
Service.

Yesterday morning Prince Rupert  
bid farewell to another contingent  
that has left to do its part at the  
front. This was composed of Capt.  
George Hull, who for several years  
has been engineer in charge of the  
Public Works Department here, and  
the final draft that he is to take to  
join the Foresters Battalion at Hall-  
fax on the way to England. The party  
that he took with him was made up  
of seven men who had come from  
Telegraph Creek. It was composed of  
Frank Cullin, formerly of this city,  
John Wrathall, also a former resi-  
dent of this place, O. B. Condit, R.  
McDonald, P. Hamlin, J. Pilkington  
and B. Albertson. There was an im-  
mense crowd at the station yester-  
day morning to give the contingent a  
send off. It was to the accompani-  
ment of rousing cheers that they left  
on the G. T. P. train. The Telegraph  
Creek contingent had come in by the  
G. T. P. steamer from the north and  
they were kept busy renewing old  
acquaintances here before the train  
left.

The northern men that went out  
with Capt. Hull were a splendid body.  
They are as fit looking as any that  
have gone from here, which is saying  
a lot. In Capt. Hull they have a first-  
class officer who will always look  
well to their interests and will prove  
a good soldier.

Accompanying him was Mrs. Hull,  
whose training as a nurse is now go-  
ing to be put to service for her coun-  
try, just as her husband is using his  
ability in that direction. She is going  
to England and has practically ar-  
ranged for entering the hospital ser-  
vice for the wounded soldiers. Miss  
Hull also went east and will enter  
school in Toronto.

#### YESTERDAY SAW A LOT OF FISH IN

ABOUT ONE HUNDRED AND  
FIFTY THOUSAND POUNDS AR-  
RIVED IN FROM BANKS

Good Start Made Towards Big  
Special On Wednesday  
Again.

Yesterday there was a very con-  
siderable amount of halibut arrived  
in port, considering the fact that it  
was one of the days that is not re-  
garded as the best for delivering fish  
at Prince Rupert. Well on for 150-  
000 pounds arrived before midnight  
and is being held for today's market.  
Among the boats in were the Con-  
stitution with 30,000 pounds; the  
Seymour with 35,000; Treo with 6-  
000; Uranus 10,000; Agnes B. 15-  
000; Royal 3,000; Pharaon 5,000;  
Aurora 13,000; Selma 12,000; and  
the Trio 18,000.

#### BRITISH FORCES HAVE MADE ADVANCES ALONG THE FRONT

London, Aug. 21.—The British  
have advanced on an eleven-mile  
front, capturing the ridge overlook-  
ing the German positions at Thiepval  
and have also gained high ground  
north of Pozieres, taking a half mile  
of German trenches at Highwood  
along with 796 prisoners.

#### WOMAN TRIED TO COMMIT SUICIDE

Mrs. Davis, Of Victoria, Stopped In  
Attempting To Jump From  
Window In Chicago.

Chicago, Aug. 21.—Mrs. Mortz  
Davis, whose husband died from  
poison here a few days ago, and who  
was found suffering from the effects  
of poison at the same time, tried to  
commit suicide by jumping from the  
window of her hotel, but was pre-  
vented and has been removed to the  
hospital.

Mr. and Mrs. Davis formerly resid-  
ed in Victoria, B. C.

#### Government Has Taken Means To Safeguard Soldiers' Vote At Front

(Special To The Journal.)

Victoria, Aug. 21.—In their at-  
tempt to cast discredit upon the ad-  
ministration, the Liberal workers in  
Victoria and elsewhere throughout  
the Province are at present making  
every effort to mislead the electors  
with respect to the working of the  
Military Forces Voting Act, the meas-  
ure which the Government at the  
last session of the Legislature passed  
for the purpose of permitting those  
British Columbians serving with the  
colors to exercise their franchise.  
Possibilities of manipulation of this  
vote are pointed to by the Liberals,  
and from that they jump to the con-  
clusion, or at least the suggestion,  
that such manipulation is taking  
place. It is, to the Liberal heels, a  
grand opportunity to cast discredit  
upon the Government, and the line  
of campaign thus being followed is  
quite of a piece with the whole cam-  
paign of misrepresentation and false-  
hood which is being pursued in every  
riding of the Province by the Liberal  
press and workers.

The latest effusion by the local  
Liberal workers is the assertion that  
the Government plans to prevent the  
soldier from voting upon the probi-  
tution and woman suffrage referen-  
da. To do this, the soldier when ap-  
plying for a ballot with which to  
cast his vote for a candidate, will  
not be given the referenda ballots  
unless he specifically asks for them.  
The presiding officer, who, by the  
way, will be chiefly commissioner  
officers, etc., the Liberals allege are  
instructed to withhold the referenda  
ballots, and if these are not asked  
for, not to produce them.

As an indication of the lengths to  
which the Liberal tactics are going  
this latest is instructive, but it is  
also absolutely false. The regulations  
which were recently passed by the  
Executive Council relating to con-  
duct of the voting by the soldiers are  
most clear, and, in respect to the  
referenda ballots, could not be more  
specific. In addition to these regu-  
lations all parties will have their re-  
presentatives present at the voting,  
due notice of which must be given to  
them by the presiding officer. Hence,  
every care has been taken to safe-  
guard the rights of the soldiers, who  
are given the fullest possible oppor-  
tunity of expressing themselves upon  
the choice of candidates as

that he expects an early termination  
of hostilities.

SYNOPSIS OF COAL MINING  
REGULATIONS.

Coal mining right of the Dominion  
in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and  
Alberta, the Yukon Territory, the  
Northwest Territories and a portion  
of the Province of British Columbia,  
may be leased for a term of twenty-  
one years at an annual rental of  
\$1 per acre. Not more than 2,560  
acres will be leased to one applicant.  
Applications for a lease must be  
made by the applicant in person to  
the Agent or Sub-Agent of the dis-  
trict in which the rights applied for  
are situated.

In surveyed territory the land  
must be described by sections, or  
legal subdivisions of sections, and  
in unsurveyed territory the tract ap-  
plied for shall be staked out by the  
applicant himself.

Each application must be accom-  
panied by a fee of \$5, which will be  
refunded if the tract applied for are  
not available, but not otherwise. A  
royalty shall be paid on the mer-  
chantable output of the mine at the  
rate of five cents per ton.

The person operating the mine  
shall furnish the Agent with sworn  
returns accounting for the full  
quantity of merchantable coal mined  
and pay the royalty thereon. If the  
coal mining rights are not being op-  
erated, such returns shall be fur-  
nished at least once a year.

The lease will include the coal  
mining rights only; but the lessee  
may be permitted to purchase what-  
ever available surface rights may be  
considered necessary for the work-  
ing of the mine at the rate of \$10  
per acre.


