City Issued Large Cheque In Favor Of Bank Of Montreal Yesterday

TRAVELLED 300 MILES —ALTHOUGH DAMAGED—

British Submarine Struck An Enemy Mine—Made Her Way Home.

In a certain dockyard in England there is to be found a splendid tribute to the prowess of British submarines and the skill of those who man them. It is one of the finest of the British undersea boats, which, with her bow twisted and bent as the result of a collision with an enemy mine in enemy waters, covered a distance of almost 300 miles under her own power and arrived safely in a home port. Through the courtesy of the British Admiralty the correspondent was permitted to see this submarine and talk with her officers and crew. She is in harbor, with her bow facing torn into strips and two of her bulkheads are broken away at the bow; but in her tubes are two unexploded torpedoes. Their casing is twisted and staved in and the mouth of the aft tube is jammed. But the quality of the high explosive in her torpedoes and the mechanism controlling it prevented an explosion, thus saving her from total destruction.

LIEUT. DOLLING HAS BEEN RATHER SEVERELY WOUNDED

Former Resident Of Prince Rupert Shot In Shoulder And Hurt In Back.

Yesterday at noon, in the Bank of Montreal, the City of Prince Rupert issued what is believed to have been the largest cheque that was ever drawn in the city. This was in connection with the winding up of the deal connected with the bond sale. The cheque was for \$425,600, with a supplementary one for \$1,613.46, representing interest due. The remittance from New York came in two instalments an hour or two apart or the cheque drawn would have been for the full amount of \$427,213.45 in the first instance.

In the City of New York, probably a few hours or a day previous to the transaction here, Mayor McCaffery and the City Treasurer, E. W. Johnson, were taking care of the debt due to liquidate the Treasury Certificates formerly held in London, amounting to the much larger sum of about \$989,000.

The transactions so completed wipes out the city's short-term debts and places it all as bonded indebtedness, payable in annual instalments, and freeing from the worry of finding a market the succeeding councils.

With the paying over of the money to the Bank of Montreal here, the city recovered an interesting collection of paper issued from time to time on its behalf by succeeding councils. There was paper signed by all the mayors and acting mayors that the city has had, with the probable exception of the first one and the occupant of the chair this year.

There has been a general spirit of congratulation among the citizens since the deal was consummated, at the fact that Prince Rupert was placed in a stable situation as far as its financial matters were concerned.

ANYOX BASEBALL PLAYERS ARE COMING TO THE CITY

TUNNEL THROUGH ROCHER DE BOULE

MINING COMPANY HAS IN HAND IMPORTANT WORK ON MOUNTAIN

Reference To Work Going On At Important Mining Centre.

The new cross-cut tunnel has reached the solid rock and as soon as the portal has been timbered three shifts will be at work, and some record time is expected to be made, says the Omineca Miner, referring to the Rocher de Boule mine. The tunnel started at the compressor plant and is being driven toward the shaft, a distance of 2,700 or 2,800 feet. This will give a depth of 1,200 or 1,400 feet on the vein.

The time is not far distant now when the camp will be moved to the north side of the mountain, possibly next spring. When that time comes the company will have a tunnel right through the mountain.

GREAT STRENGTH OF THE BANK OF FRANCE

Gold Reserve Stands At About 5,- 000,000,000 Francs—Cheques Being Used.

The Bank of France has taken in 1,500,000,000 francs in gold in deposits and in exchanges for paper money and government bonds since December 24, 1914, and the receipts continue at the rate of 5,000,000 a week. These receipts have brought its gold reserve up to about the 5,000,000,000 mark and maintained it there notwithstanding shipments abroad in the meantime of 666,000,000, most of which went to Great Britain.

The Bank of France is not a government bank in the strictest meaning of the term, but it is the state's banker—the lender to which the state applies when it needs to borrow money.

The bank has now advanced to the government 7,100,000,000 francs. The money is lent at the special rate of one per cent. interest by the terms of the contract with the government, and is to be repaid within one year after the end of the war or before. Should the loans be renewed after that period, they will bear three per cent. interest.

Besides financing the government, the bank has protected the exporters unable to realize on their foreign credits at the outset of the war by buying up their drafts to the amount of \$89,000,000 francs, and furnished guarantees for a British loan of £5,000,000 to a Parisian bank and for an American loan of \$20,000,000. At the same time it has contributed largely to the revival of trade by facilitating payments in instalments of balances due from merchants at the beginning of the war, involving a stupendous amount of work, since at the beginning of 1915 there were in the main bank alone 509,538 drafts and bills of exchange of more than 200,000 different debtors, amounting to 2,078,982,215 francs. The transactions of the bank during the first full year of war, cash receipts and payments combined, amounted to 214,225,000,000 francs. (Continued on Page Three.)

BARODA EXPECTED TO LEAVE TODAY

ORE CARRIER FOR ROCHER DE BOULE OUTPUT LOADED

The Tug Arctic Is Here To Tow The Barge South.

The Tug Arctic is due to arrive here today to tow the barge Baroda to Tacoma. The Baroda has aboard 1,800 tons of copper ore from the Rocher de Boule mine.

While the original intention was to load only 1,000 tons on the barge, the delay in securing a tug enabled the mining company to increase the shipment, thus relieving a serious congestion at the mine.

HALIBUT RECEIPTS WERE NOT LARGE

ABOUT 50,000 POUNDS CAME INTO PORT YESTERDAY

The Roman Arrived To Take On Ice And Bait And Left Again.

Halibut receipts were rather light again yesterday. The Hecate, 7,000; Lief E., 12,000; and Kodiak, 15,000, arrived early in the day and sold to the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Company at 5 1-4 cents. The Muirneag, with 4,000, was taken by the Atlin Fisheries at the same price, while the Nellie, with 9,000, arrived too late to figure in the day's sales.

The B. C. Packers trawler Roman, with 50,000 pounds of halibut, came in to port yesterday morning to replenish her stock of ice and bait, and returned to the banks in the afternoon. Captain Anderson realized, that to avoid deterioration, his fish should have been put ashore here, but he is under instructions to take his catch to the company's plant at Steveston.

PROCEEDS OF BONDS KEPT IN NEW YORK

Desire To Stabilize Price Of New York Exchange In Canada.

Money realized by the Canadian Government for the sale in March of \$75,000,000 of bonds in the local market has not been drawn against to any extent worth noting. In keeping these funds on deposit here the Canadian authorities are said to have a double purpose in view.

On August 1 next \$25,000,000 of its one-year notes will mature, and though the holders will then have the privilege of accepting, in lieu of cash, 4 1-2 per cent. long-term bonds at par, none will probably avail themselves of it, with the bonds put out in March selling well below par, and bearing 5 per cent. interest. Part of the proceeds of the March issue, therefore, will have to be devoted to paying off the one-year notes.

A further reason for leaving the money in New York, and only withdrawing it gradually as needed in Canada, is the desire of the Dominion Government to stabilize the price of New York exchange in Canada.

Liberals Invited To Put Their Evidence In When They Complained

(Special Correspondence.)

Victoria, May 16.—The Liberals objected vigorously today to the Conservatives calling so many witnesses in the Vancouver by-election investigation, and said that before the Conservatives were done the session would be closed and the committee dead.

The Conservatives invited the Liberals to bring forward their rebuttal testimony at once if they wanted to be sure to get it in, but Mr. Brewster declined, saying it would not be produced till all of the Government evidence was in.

Although a most reluctant witness, Ralph Smith, erstwhile member of the House of Commons for Nanaimo and now a Provincial Liberal candidate in Vancouver, threw a good deal of light today upon the excitement created in Liberal circles two weeks after the Vancouver by-election, when Messrs. Ashworth Anderson and D. E. McTaggart accused J. T. Scott of attempting to use crooked lists for plugging purposes.

Mr. Smith was testifying before the Vancouver Election Frauds Committee. He said that meetings of the candidates were called and a committee was appointed to investigate the story of plugging, both from the Annance end of the affair and also the Gosden lists.

Scott, he said, worked for the Provincial Liberal organization committee, comprising M. A. Macdonald, Farris and Stables, of Vancouver, and the Provincial Treasurer, A. H. Pound. When asked by the executive of the city association to tell how it happened that, whereas the city association workers were volunteers, Scott and his helpers were paid, Mr. Pound replied that the funds for the work of the provincial organization were given by certain business men. Mr. Pound refused to tell the executive who supplied the money for Scott's activities.

New York funds have for some time been selling across the border at a premium of \$3.4375 per \$1,000, and it is the purpose of the Canadian Government to maintain the price in the neighborhood of that level and prevent the disturbing effect of violent fluctuations.

Moreover, it is realized that keeping the exchange rate at that high point will act as an effective check (Continued on Page Three.)

At the first candidates' meeting, at which Scott was present to defend himself, the Annance charges came up. Scott excused himself to "see some friend off on the train" and returned later. But at midnight that night Annance had gone north in a launch, and when the Liberal committee went to look him up the next day he was not in the city. Annance is the man who was recently convicted of bribing voters. The witnesses against him swore that he paid them ten dollars each to vote for Macdonald. He operated at the Calumet Rooms with a gang of twenty men.

Mr. Smith told the committee today that the Liberal candidates had a suspicion that something was wrong about the situation and they had determined to clear it up no matter where the blame might lie.

Aparrow, a clerk at the St. James Hotel, Victoria, corroborated the story given by Gosden with regard to his visit to that hotel in company with Silvine, a lodger. Gosden had said that he telephoned from the hotel to Macdonald at the Empress on the Tuesday night after Easter to make an appointment to meet Macdonald at the post office corner at nine. The hotel clerk remembered the stranger going into the hotel with Silvine and later the telephone message from Silvine's room in a voice that was not Silvine's.

Mat Fraser, a sea-going fireman, working on a boat up the coast, informed the committee that he had been with Gosden the night the latter met Macdonald at the post office. That was nine o'clock on the Tuesday in question. When Macdonald appeared at the appointed place, Fraser stepped out of sight behind one of the post office buttresses. He stood about eight feet from the men when they were talking. Gosden greeted Macdonald as "Mac." Then "Mac" said, "Here's that fifty, I'll fix up the rest when I go back." Later Gosden showed Fraser fifty dollars and lent him five. Earlier that day he had only fifty cents and had tried to borrow money from Fraser, but the latter was also broke.

Macdonald is now suing Gosden for perjury, presumable claiming that he was not at the post office at that time, and never gave him fifty dollars, which Gosden said was in part payment of the amount owing him for his work for Scott.

THE BOND ISSUE.

The sale of the city bonds having been completed there has been a general disposition on the part of citizens to shake hands with themselves. While the City Council undoubtedly deserve credit in connection with the transaction, there is due to the citizens at large no small amount of praise for the aid which they gave. This assistance was not in the form of actual participation in the negotiations which they were precluded of necessity from taking part in, but there was manifested throughout the whole of the negotiations a loyal spirit by citizens towards the city. No carping criticism was raised to interfere with the efforts of the council in what of necessity required very careful handling in a year like this. Now that the deal has been completed, there is being handed out to the council the hearty congratulations of the citizens generally. Prince Rupert will be cautious in future about running into debt, and that will be a good policy to follow. It is fortunate indeed that a sale has been accomplished when the financial situation is considered and all the conditions prevailing are contemplated.

FAITH IN THE CITY.

The taking up of \$1,620,000 of debentures by Spitzer, Rorick & Company shows that well established financial houses have faith in the future of the city. Mr. Easton, who represented his firm in the dealings, carefully studied conditions here before closing the deal. The fact that he recommended a purchase of the bonds, when there are plenty of others offering, indicates that he has a feeling that Prince Rupert is to take its place among the prominent ports of the world. Mr. Easton was not backward, after the deal was completed, in expressing his utmost faith in Prince Rupert. He admonished caution in the handling of affairs until the city comes into its own. Every industry, no matter how small it is, should be encouraged, he said. It was such as these starting in a small way that developed into paying propositions later on.

THE BEET INDUSTRY.

When The Journal, in the course of an interview with Vice-President Donaldson, of the G. T. P., set forth that he had advocated sugar beet culture, with the object of making sugar in the country along the G. T. P., there were many who shook their heads and wondered whether the locality was adapted to that kind of work. We do not pretend to know of it ourselves. Mr. Donaldson, however, was asked by us "for reasons for the faith that was in him" on this point, and he argued that it was well adapted for it. In the section of France where the fighting is now in progress, the Vice-President says, was the centre of the beet sugar district of Europe. He knew the district, and it had no advantage over the country along the G. T. P. in this line of business.

SYNOPSIS OF COAL MINING REGULATIONS.

Coal mining right of the Dominion in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, the Northwest Territories and a portion of the Province of British Columbia, may be leased for a term of twenty-one years at an annual rental of \$1 per acre. Not more than 2,560 acres will be leased to one applicant. Applications for a lease must be made by the applicant in person to the Agent or Sub-Agent of the district in which the rights applied for are situated.

In surveyed territory the land must be described by sections, or legal subdivisions of sections, and in unsurveyed territory the tract applied for shall be staked out by the applicant himself.

Each application must be accompanied by a fee of \$5, which will be refunded if the right applied for are not available, but not otherwise. A royalty shall be paid on the merchantable output of the mine at the rate of five cents per ton.

The person operating the mine shall furnish the Agent with sworn returns accounting for the full quantity of merchantable coal mined and pay the royalty thereon. If the coal mining rights are not being operated, such returns should be furnished at least once a year.

The lease will include the coal mining rights only; but the lessee may be permitted to purchase whatever available surface rights may be considered necessary for the working of the mine at the rate of \$10 per acre.

NEGOTIATING FOR MORE WAR STEEL

Russia And Italy Reported To Want
Fifty Thousand Tons.

The Iron Age, in its weekly review of the iron and steel trade, says:

The placing of new contracts for upwards of 150,000 tons of shell steel in the form of blooms and rounds, and negotiations for as much more war steel, including 50,000 tons for Russia and Italy, are the chief developments of the week. Otherwise the steel trade has slowed down, as it has long needed to do.

Steel companies which some weeks ago were turning away domestic business for this year seem to have reserved space for renewals of contracts with belligerent countries. Foreign and home consumers in some cases have virtually competed for the available steel, the highest price deciding which should get it.

on the movement of imports from the United States into Canada. The Canadian authorities are in this way discouraging the importation of luxuries and other unnecessary articles, not only out of regard for the New York exchange situation, but also with a view to conserving the country's financial resources for its war operations. In this attitude they are following the example of the British Treasury officials, whose announced purpose is to maintain sterling exchange at about \$4.76.

One result of the perturbation in finance resulting from the war was the encouragement given to customers by the bank to make their transfers by cheque instead of currency. It may result in a permanent and general use of the cheque system, thus far looked upon with little favor in France.

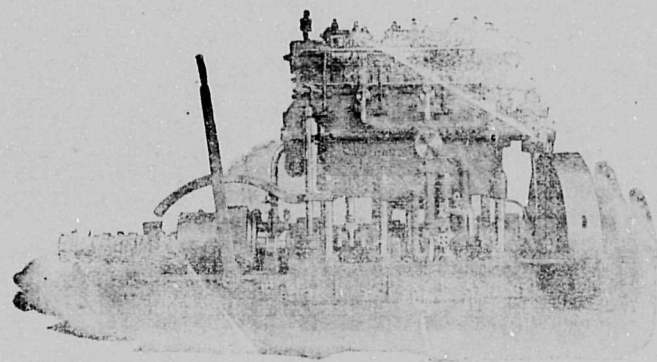
