

GERMANY AIMS AT RENEWAL OF VERDUN ATTACKS SERIOUS TASK THAT CONFRONTS STATES IN MEXICO The Canadians Met Their Fate With Determined Fight

Great Task Before United States In Settling Mexican Question

G. Douglas Hamilton has had a long experience in Mexico, where he went on his retirement from the British army after the South African war. He has large land and mining interests in the country and stayed there long after trouble had broken out. He was taken prisoner by Villa and held for ransom, but was later liberated on account of being a British subject. His home was in Zatecas, in the state where General Carranza was Governor for eight years, and he is well acquainted with the President of the Republic. Mr. Hamilton has come to Canada to offer his services and military experience to this country. Speaking of the situation, he says the Mexican situation has assumed a serious aspect within the last few months, and today the state of affairs is such that war seems to be inevitable between Mexico and the United States. The plan of intervention by the United States to assist the Mexican Government to preserve peace, to put down banditism in the north, and if possible place the country under the protection of the United States, like Cuba, in order to protect the Monroe Doctrine, has failed. The United States appears to be facing a long and terrible war.

The idea that the American soldiers can march straight through to Mexico City with very little opposition, as in 1848, is a mistaken one. Almost every able-bodied man in Mexico has been fighting for the past six years. The Mexicans are well trained to the use of modern arms. Thousands of rifles have been shipped to them from the States, and thousands more have been received from Germany. The Mexican soldier of today is also an adept at guerilla warfare. Even several American generals admit that it would be dangerous for American troops to enter Mexico less than 1,000,000 strong. The Mexicans have not been hasty

in rushing into this war. They are a cunning and crafty race. They have provoked the United States since the European war began. They have raided towns and villages far over the American border. They have lured American troops into Mexico under the pretense of hunting Villa, when, it is reported, they knew themselves that Villa was not in the country. They have encouraged the raids under the cloak of banditism in the name of Villa. Their only object apparently has been to get the American troops over the border. This would enable Mexico to demand their withdrawal, or declare war. With the backing of the Latin American Republics, and with the aid of Germany, the Mexicans would be able to carry on a war that would be extremely costly.

During the last twelve months, the Germans have been most active in Mexico. Munition plants have sprung up in various parts of the country, and many Germans have crossed the border into Mexico from the United States, where they have been welcomed by the Mexicans. A considerable number of German officers are at present attached to Mexican regiments, and are training the men in modern warfare.

Many men who have first-hand knowledge of the Mexican situation believe that the present crisis is the result of German intrigue to force the hand of the United States, and that a secret understanding may exist between Germany and Mexico.

Villa, it is rumored, is having much amusement at the expense of the United States troops, because he has not been in Mexico for the past seven or eight months. It is said that at the time of the Columbus raid in New Mexico, he was in Los Angeles, California, the raid being made by Carranza officers and men, under the name of Villa, in order to lure the American troops into Mexico as a pretext to order them out of the country or declare war.

There is little doubt that Mexico intends to fight the United States, and that during a long war Mexico would be able to enrol not less than 5,000,000 men in the field. Every man who can handle a rifle, no matter whether he is a bandit or government soldier, will make common cause to fight the "Gringo." In almost every town and city in Mexico

SOCKEYE RUN HAS HARDLY COMMENCED

T. P. LAKE, OF CARLISLE CANNERY, SAYS THE CATCHES IN SKEENA ARE SMALL

Season Seems To Be A Little Later Than Usual This Year.

The run of sockeye salmon in the Skeena River has not yet commenced in anything like earnest. According to T. P. Lake, the manager of the Carlisle Cannery, who is in the city, the results, as far as the fishing is concerned so far, are disappointing. This is not any indication that the season will not develop in good shape and the pack in the end become as good as usual.

The season is a little late all round. In the Naas River the sockeye has been late, and it may be expected to be the same in the Skeena. So far there are but few of the sockeye appearing.

CANADIANS SOLD THEIR LINES DEARLY AT YPRES FIGHT

London, June 29.—The German newspapers comment upon the gallantry of the Canadian troops in the fighting around Ypres on the third of June. They state that one general and several other officers preferred death to surrender. The general, presumably General Mercer, bravely drew his sword and cut an enemy sergeant through the face when surrender was demanded, whereupon he was bayoneted by the German infantry. Many of the Canadians resisted so desperately that they were refused all mercy and were cleared out with bombs.

Though the sky is not always blue, every cloud has a silver lining in Prince Rupert, July 1st.

Today mobs are going around the streets calling on men to fight for Mexico, and large banners and flags are being carried bearing the inscription, "Muerta Los Gringos" (Death to the Americans). And German flags are almost as prominent as the Mexican, while British, French and American flags are shot to pieces on the consulates or wherever they may be hoisted for protection.

The United States waited too long and allowed the Mexicans to prepare for conflict. Arms and ammunition have been bought in the United States and now may be used against the American soldiers.

It would be hazardous for the United States to undertake to conquer Mexico with less than 1,000,000 men, and another million would be required to keep open the lines of communication.

LIGHTER RECEIPTS BUT HIGHER PRICE

YESTERDAY'S FISH ARRIVALS SMALLER THAN BEFORE, BUT BROUGHT BETTER RETURNS

Thirty Thousand Pounds Of Spring Salmon Came In From North Island.

Lighter receipts of halibut yesterday resulted in a marked increase in the price. The sales aggregated only 30,000 pounds, but the price was nearly a cent a pound higher than it was on the previous day. The Jim Ham with 8,000 pounds and the Director with 10,000 sold to the Atlin Fisheries at 7 5-8 cents, while the Daisy with 5,000 and the Gjoa with 8,000 went to the Cold Storage Company at 7 1-2 cents a pound.

Later in the day the Sea Gull arrived with 10,000 pounds of halibut, and the local power boat Gifford came in from North Island with 30,000 pounds of spring salmon.

ELASTIC FINANCE.

To the Editor:—Re city estimates and tax reduction.

It is not my desire to unjustly criticize, yet an idea suggests itself to me that a more elastic system of finance would aid our struggling citizens to tide over the war period. The curtailing of exorbitant salaries during this period of distress is commendable, providing the saving effect could be employed in providing labor for the more dependant classes, equivalent to the reduction in salary extravagance. Many of our worthy citizens are obliged to seek labor in other fields, absent from their families and awaiting opportunities to secure residences to move their families to when they can earn a livelihood for them. It is a regrettable circumstance for the citizens of Prince Rupert that each and every industry that helped furnish payroll (upon which our city depends for sustenance) should be cut off at about the same time. The railway, federal government, provincial government and city government, each in their respective ways, were the chief sources for giving fresh impetus to the upbuilding of our town. Each and everyone seems to have become bankrupt at the same time, and citizens and business people dependent upon a payroll from these sources will be obliged to go bankrupt likewise, unless some steps be taken to provide a sufficient amount of labor to maintain our population at its present standard. It is perhaps one of the most agreeable conditions in civic life when conditions are normal, to know that a legitimate reduction in taxes has been effected, but in times such as we are now experiencing, if a reduction of taxes should work a hardship upon our residents, then the principle is unwise.

The reduction of millage from 14 to 8 3-4 is beyond doubt a praiseworthy showing, if it is justifiable. The beneficiaries from such a reduction at this time should be considered.

HEAD OF INDIAN AFFAIRS COMING

DUNCAN CAMPBELL SCOTT WILL
ARRIVE HERE THIS
MORNING

The Official Is One Of Canada's
Best Known
Poets.

Duncan Campbell Scott, Deputy Commissioner of Indian Affairs at Ottawa, will be here today, arriving from the south. He is accompanied by Mrs. Scott.

The active head of the department is one of the best known poets of Canada. He has long been identified with the civil service in Ottawa, and during his life there, has found time to write considerably.

At an earlier date it has been published that 75 per cent. of our total taxes is paid by non-resident owners, people who hope to grow wealthy from unearned increment, and in no manner are aiding in maintaining our city other than through the tax roll. Now the saving of \$47,000 in next year's taxes means that 75 per cent. of \$47,000 will be kept out of our city—this in round figures will amount to \$35,000. This amount withdrawn from circulation among our people, together with the depleted payrolls before mentioned, shows a staggering condition compared with when each respective resident decided to make this town his future home. Making our taxation limit 10 mills and add to that \$35,000 derived from reduction of salaries, quite a nest egg would be formed in starting a sewerage system. The sum would go far in paying the first instalment on a 30 year serial sewer bond. I may be pardoned in suggesting to the City Council that a sewer bylaw be introduced. A bond issue made to provide necessary employment for deserving residents during the coming cheerless winter, as all the evidences strongly point at the present time.

CITY AFFAIRS.

Our old friend ex-Alderman Morrissey has come forward with a letter dealing with the state of affairs in the city and advocating, as far as can be learned from his letter, that there should immediately be some such work as the sewer proposition undertaken so as to provide work here and thus make the city prosperous. Probably there is nothing more agreeable to the average member of a council than to vote money to be expended and to thus provide for a pay roll in the city. We believe we voice the desire of the individual members of the council of this year when we say that there is nothing that would afford us greater pleasure than to put a great army of workmen at work in the city and carry along all kinds of undertakings. Certain it is, there is abundance of work that requires to be done before the place is in a proper shape to be ranked as one of the most perfect cities in the country. But, while this may be the wish, it is impossible of attainment. This council has been called upon to put the city out of danger of falling into the hands of a receiver. Permanent financing was done, but to do it the faith of the investors outside had to be established. That was established only by the evidence that was produced by the Mayor and Council that the city was to be managed sanely, and that no attempt was to be made on the part of the city of trying to lift itself into affluence by tugging at its boot legs. The credit of the city had to be re-established and this was done. In addition to this the Council will, if it is allowed to carry out its financial policy, put the affairs in such position that, even if times in the city became less prosperous than they are at the present time, the danger of a default in any year will be precluded. When this city obtained the money it did in a foreign market, it was only by careful negotiation and by giving evidence that the affairs would be conducted with regard to economy. For this city to plunge into big capital expenditures now, immediately it is out of the danger of default, would certainly not be a strong recommendation for financing in the future. The city is bound to show that it is not buncing the bond buyers, but is prepared to live up to the needs of the hour.

SYNOPSIS OF COAL MINING REGULATIONS.

Coal mining right of the Dominion in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, the Yukon Territory, the Northwest Territories and a portion of the Province of British Columbia, may be leased for a term of twenty-one years at an annual rental of \$1 per acre. Not more than 2,560 acres will be leased to one applicant. Applications for a lease must be made by the applicant in person to the Agent or Sub-Agent of the district in which the rights applied for are situated.

In surveyed territory the land must be described by sections, or legal subdivisions of sections, and in unsurveyed territory the tract applied for shall be staked out by the applicant himself.

Each application must be accompanied by a fee of \$5, which will be refunded if the right applied for are not available, but not otherwise. A royalty shall be paid on the merchantable output of the mine at the rate of five cents per ton.

The person operating the mine shall furnish the Agent with sworn returns accounting for the full quantity of merchantable coal mined and pay the royalty thereon. If the coal mining rights are not being operated, such returns should be furnished at least once a year.

The lease will include the coal mining rights only; but the lessee may be permitted to purchase whatever available surface rights may be considered necessary for the working of the mine at the rate of \$10 per acre.

For full information application should be made to the Secretary of the Department of the Interior, Ottawa, or to any Agent or Sub-Agent of Dominion Lands.


