## CANADA'S TRADE DEVELOPING VERY FAST IMPERIAL CONFERENCE NOW ANNOUNCED Western Provinces Are Uniting To Settle School Matters

### Premiers Of Overseas Dominions To Consult With War Cabinet

#### BELGIAN SLAVERY A SHOCKING CRIME

LORD BRYCE DEALS WITH THE  
SUBJECT, DESCRIBING IT  
AS MOST ATROCIOUS

It Is One Of The Worst Examples  
In History Says  
Writer.

The carrying into slavery of Belgians by the German Government has been dealt with by Lord Bryce, the well known writer and statesman. He says:

"Nothing could be more shocking than this wholesale carrying away of men from Belgium. I know of no case in European history to surpass it. Not even in the Thirty Years' War were there such things as the German Government has done, first and last, in Belgium. This last case is virtual slavery. The act is like that of those Arab slave raiders in Africa who carried off negroes to the coast to sell. And the severity is enhanced because these Belgians and the work forcibly extracted from them are going to be used against their own people. Having invaded Belgium, and murdered many hundreds, indeed, even thousands, among them women and children, who could not be accused of 'sniping,' the German military government dislocated the industrial system of the community. They carried off all the raw materials of industry and most of the

London, Dec. 27.—It is officially announced that the British Government intends to invite the Premiers of the Overseas Dominions to attend a series of special continuous sittings of the War Cabinet, appointing the visiting Premiers temporary members. They will discuss means for the prosecution of the conflict and the possible conditions of an agreement by which the British Empire and her Allies could assent to a termination of hostilities.

#### NAVAL ENGAGEMENT WAS FOUGHT IN THE MEDITERRANEAN

Rome, Dec. 27.—A naval engagement between French and Italian and Austrian warships in the Straits of Otranto, at the entrance to the Adriatic, is announced.

Several enemy ships attacked an Italian patrol vessel and French and Italian warships went to the rescue. The Austrian vessels fled under cover of darkness after a sharp engagement. The extent of the damage inflicted on the enemy is not known. Two French destroyers and one patrol boat were hit and slightly damaged.

#### ENEMY SEEMS TO BE PROGRESSING IN RUMANIA

London, Dec. 27.—On the northern Wallachia and southern Moldavian border on the Dobruja front the Teutons continue to advance against the Russians and Rumanians. According to a German report the enemy has captured Filipechti, taking 5,500 prisoners. The British, French and Italian fronts are comparatively quiet.

### TOURIST TRADE IN NORTH PROMISING

WHITE PASS RAILWAY IS BUILDING TWO NEW STEAMERS FOR COMING SEASON

Twin Screw Vessel To Be Put On  
Atlin Lake This  
Year.

The White Pass & Yukon Railway has announced that a contract has been placed with the Cameron Lumber Company in Victoria to supply prepared material for the construction of two steamers which the northern transportation concern propose to build to take care of its increasing tourist traffic between Caribou and Taku and on Lake Atlin.

Plans have already been completed for the two steamers, which, according to Herbert Wheeler, General Manager, will be assembled at Caribou and turned out in time to participate in the summer tourist business season.

One of the vessels will be of the sternwheeler type, 165 feet in length and 35 feet beam, with accommodation to berth 80 passengers. She will be christened the Atlinite, after Lake Atlin, and will be operated between Caribou and Taku, an 80-mile run and one of the finest scenic waterways in the world.

The other craft, for which a name has yet to be selected, will be of a gasoline twin-screw type, 87 feet long and 18 feet beam, with accommodations for 100 passengers. This vessel will be built for daylight travel on Lake Atlin.

It is estimated that between 300,000 and 400,000 feet of prepared lumber will be required for the construction of the two vessels.

The funeral of the late Milton Christian took place yesterday afternoon from the B. C. Undertakers. Rev. Father McGrath conducted the services. The funeral was to the Fairview Cemetery.

### NATIONAL SERVICE WEEK IN CANADA

EVERY MAN WILL HAVE A CARD TO FILL IN NEXT WEEK

What The Movement Means In Connection With The War.

National Service Week is drawing very near and the fact that the first week of the New Year bears that title is something in which everyone in Canada has an interest. The men are interested because it is obligatory upon each of them, between the ages of 16 and 65 years, to fill out one of the cards which the Government is sending to them through the post office authorities. The women are interested because their co-operation is being invited, in seeing that their men-folk attend to this important duty. The children are interested because their school teachers have explained to them the meaning of National Service and the way in which father and the big brothers at home have to reply to the various questions.

To write in the answers and return the card promptly is a good New Year's resolution for every man throughout the Dominion, and it has the advantage of being easy of fulfillment. It only means a few minutes' careful thought. The postman in the cities gets the hard work, for he has not only to deliver the cards; he is responsible also for their proper return. Prompt mailing of the answers will make the postman's work very much easier.

#### SUCCESSFUL SALLIES MADE BY ALLIES ON WEST FRONT

Paris, Dec. 27.—On the Aisne the enemy attempted a surprise attack on one of our outposts northwest of Canney, but were repulsed with hand grenades.

In the region of Roye one of our detachments penetrated an enemy trench north of Amlens Wood. The occupants fled after sustaining some losses. The rest of the front is quiet.

#### RUMORS AS TO BRITISH PROTECTORS OF STRANGE TYPE

New York, Dec. 27.—Reliable information from marine captains arriving here indicates that the strange appearing craft in the Atlantic, which are steering vagrant courses and neglecting to answer all signals, are British commerce protectors of a heavily armed new type. The vessels are powerful and very fast.

#### GREEK STEAMER HELD UP BY BRITISH AT GIBRALTAR

New York, Dec. 27.—The British authorities at Gibraltar have detained the Greek steamer Patras with six hundred passengers, bound for Piraeus from New York, in accordance with the official Entente blockade against all Greek shipping.

### Canada's Trade Is Growing By Leaps And Bounds Monthly

Ottawa, Dec. 27.—Canada's trade keeps on growing by unprecedented leaps and bounds. All records are monthly being smashed and the November trade figures, issued by Hon. Dr. Reid, created a further new record. The aggregate trade for the month of November was \$182,249,741 as against \$138,149,475 for the same month of 1915. For the eight months of the fiscal year the total trade was \$1,766,444,975, as against \$717,595,248 for the same period of last year, or a gain for the eight months of over \$5,000,000, or as much as the total Canadian trade only about a decade ago.

By the end of the fiscal year the total trade will reach nearly the \$2,000,000,000 figure. There were enormous increases in both exports and imports, although the balance of trade for the eight months is nearly \$200,000,000 in favor of Canada.

The exports for the month were \$109,558,950, as against \$97,931,916 in 1915 and the imports were \$72,690,791 against \$45,217,559 in November 1915. For the eight months the total exports were \$731,592,639 against \$419,362,616 in 1915 and the imports were \$534,852,286 against \$298,232,602 in the same period of 1915.

#### GENERAL JOFFRE IS TO HAVE HIS RANK DULY CONFIRMED

Paris, Dec. 27.—The Government has decided to submit its decree, nominating General Joffre as Marshal of France, to the Chamber for ratification.

#### MEN ARRESTED FOR STEALING FROM QUEBEC ARSENAL

Quebec, Dec. 27.—Seven men have been arrested for stealing scrap cart-ridge material from the arsenal here.

#### CONCERTED ACTION IN SCHOOL MATTERS

PROPOSITION HAS BEEN UP BEFORE REPRESENTATIVES OF FOUR WESTERN PROVINCES

British Columbia Joined With Prairies In Devising Cheaper Text Books.

Better and cheaper text books for use in the public schools will be the outcome of a conference of representatives of the four Western Provinces which was held in Edmonton. The Western Provinces are getting together in the matter of school book publishing, and a general policy of uniformity in text is being sought with a view to improving the quality and producing more economically. A committee has been appointed to consider the whole question, deciding what books are not suitable and in what cases special texts should be prepared. This committee, consisting of the Deputy Ministers of Education or other representatives of their departments, will hold a further meeting next spring. The publication of some reference books, of a kind heretofore not available in Western Canada, will also be considered.

The conference was attended by Dr. Thornton, Minister of Education for Manitoba; D. P. McColl, Superintendent of Education for Saskatchewan, and Dr. Alex. Robinson, Superintendent for British Columbia, in addition to the Alberta representative. (Continued on Page Three.)

### THE PRESIDENT'S NOTES.

President Wilson has been most unfortunate in his peace writings. Not only has he had the misfortune to have blundered himself, but he has had added to that the most stupid of explanations offered by Secretary of State Lansing. The latter, in effect gave as an explanation, that as long as the United States was not in danger of being dragged into the war that the matter had been allowed to take its course, but with the danger that hostilities might be forced upon the United States it was high time to call a halt.

When President Wilson asks the warring nations what they are fighting for he does not add anything to the diplomatic history of the war. He is not entitled to an answer to that question.

### CANADA'S TRADE.

The wonderful growth of the trade of Canada is an indication that the purchase of war material is being diverted this way to a much greater extent than was the case in the earlier stages of the war. To Canada and to the other parts of the countries that are at war should fall the lion's share of all supplies that are necessary. In the natural order of things a good share went to certain neutral nations at the start. A change has taken place since then, and now the Allied belligerents are coming into their own.

which will cause us to think of the needs of the country, to realize that the interests of the state have a greater claim on us than our self-interest. This applies to everyone, from the highest in the land to the lowest. The Prince of Wales' motto, "I serve" may well be the motto of every citizen of the British Empire at this time.

There are many ways of serving the nation besides going to the front. The man on the farm and the mechanic in a workshop may be serving the nation as usefully as the man in the trenches. Every man should be doing the work which represents his most efficient service to his country.

The war is teaching us, or should be teaching us, great lessons. Terrible as are its effects, those who have faith in Canadian manhood hope and believe that the nation will emerge from this experience a stronger and a better people. If the meaning of National Service is thoroughly grasped and properly understood, if the Government's call for information is responded to in the right spirit, the coming year will be the banner year in Canada's history.

machinery in factories, and then, having thus deprived the inhabitants of work, the invaders used this unemployment as the pretext for deporting them in very large numbers to places where nothing will be known of their fate, and they were not even allowed to take leave of their wives and children. Many of them may never be heard of again.

"And von Bissing calls this 'a humanitarian measure.' Actually, it is all a part of the invasion policy. They defend it as being 'war' as they justify everything, however inhumane, done because the military needs of Germany are alleged to call for it. It shows how hard pressed the military power is beginning to find itself at this latest stage of the war.

"It is said that Attila, when he was bringing his host of Huns out of Asia for his great assault on Western Europe, forced the conquered tribes into his army and made them a part of his invasion. I can hardly think of a like case since then. In principle it resembles the Turkish plan when they formed the Janissaries. The Turks used their Christian subjects, taken quite young and made Moslems, and enrolled them as soldiers (to fight against Christians) to fill their armies, of which they were the most efficient part. These Belgians are not indeed actually made to fight, but they are being forced to do the labor of war, some of them probably digging trenches, or making shells, or working in quarries to extract chalk to make cement for war purposes.

"The carrying off of young girls from Lille was terrible enough, and it seemed to us at the time that nothing could be worse. But the taking away of many thousands of the Belgian population from their homes to work against their own countrymen, with all the mental torture that separation from one's family brings—this is the most shocking thing we have yet heard of. I have been shown in confidence the reports received from Belgium of what happened there. The details given and the sources they come from satisfied me of their substantial truth. The very excuses the German authorities are putting forward admit the facts. In Belgian Luxemburg I hear that they have been trying to stop the existing employment in order to have an excuse for taking off the men."

## SYNOPSIS OF COAL MINING REGULATIONS.

Coal mining right of the Dominion in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, the Yukon Territory, the Northwest Territories and a portion of the Province of British Columbia, may be leased for a term of twenty-one years at an annual rental of \$1 per acre. Not more than 2,560 acres will be leased to one applicant.

Applications for a lease must be made by the applicant in person to the Agent or Sub-Agent of the district in which the rights applied for are situated.

In surveyed territory the land must be described by sections, and in unsurveyed territory the tract applied for shall be staked out by the applicant.

Each application must be accompanied by a fee of \$5, which will be refunded if the rights applied for are not available but not otherwise. A royalty shall be paid on the merchantable output of the mine at the rate of five cents per ton.

The person operating the mine shall furnish the Agent with sworn returns accounting for the full quantity of merchantable coal mined and pay the royalty thereon. If the coal mining rights are not being operated, such returns should be furnished at least once a year.

The lease will include the coal mining rights only; but the lessee may be permitted to purchase whatever available surface rights may be considered necessary for the working of the mine at the rate of \$10 per acre.

## SOMME BATTLE WAS DECISIVE ONE

## FREDERICK PALMER GIVES HIS IMPRESSIONS OF THAT OFFENSIVE

British And French Soldiers Will Make Strong Demands When Peace Is Being Decided.

"If Germany is ready to make concessions for peace, the Somme battle is responsible," said Frederick Palmer, war correspondent, after he read the Teutonic overture for peace discussion.

"Though only from six to ten miles depth in ground was gained, the world has a small idea, as yet, of the part this unparalleled struggle has played. Germany knows that she must spend all next summer buffeting a repetition of the same kind of blows, only more of them for a longer period.

## Allies Will Force Fight.

"The appointment of Nivelle at the head of the French army is significant of the intention of the Allies to force the fighting on the western offensive harder than ever. He is a soldier who believes in attack. With immensely increased munitions, the Allies will force the struggle every day that the weather permits.

"Any one who has watched that battle, who contemplates the enormous losses of next summer, is for peace if it means a conclusive peace. No one wants to see the war prolonged unnecessarily, least of all those who realize its horrors by actually living at the front. Germany has no more to gain, why should she fight on if she can gain no more? Why should the Allies, if they think they cannot gain more? But they do.

## Influence On Soldiers.

"Any peace move is a good move for military morale in Germany. The average German soldier thinks the war has been forced upon him. It is important to the German staff that he be kept firmly in this belief. It makes him fight more stubbornly, because he thinks he is fighting to save Germany from spoilation. German soldiers who were taken last spring on the western front, said that their officers had assured them that the war would be over by the first

of June. Those taken in the July offensive said they were assured that it would be over by the first of September. The German is always fighting in the hope that one more blow will bring peace.

"Opinions in every capital, whether Paris, London or Berlin, si finally er Paris, London or Berlin, are finally regulated from the trenches. The men who are risking their lives and enduring the storms of bullets and shell fire are the final arbiters. They pay the price. If the French and English soldier say through their generals that it is time for peace, there will be peace. My own opinion is that both the French and English armies, to a man, will answer the German proposals with a demand for concessions much greater than any Germany has suggested; otherwise they will fight on."

tives, who were Hon. J. R. Boyle, Minister; D. S. McKenzie, Deputy Minister, and John Ross, Chief Inspector of Schools.

In addition to the discussion of the text book question, the conferring educationalists went into the matter of the several special schools in the four provinces, as agreed upon in previous conferences. Under this working plan, which is now being put into effect, Alberta undertakes the education of the mentally defective; Saskatchewan, the blind, and Manitoba, the deaf. In connection with the latter school, Dr. Thornton made a number of suggestions for desirable changes in its conduct and equipment, and these were accepted. When they have been made, the school will be one of the best of its kind, it is stated, in America.

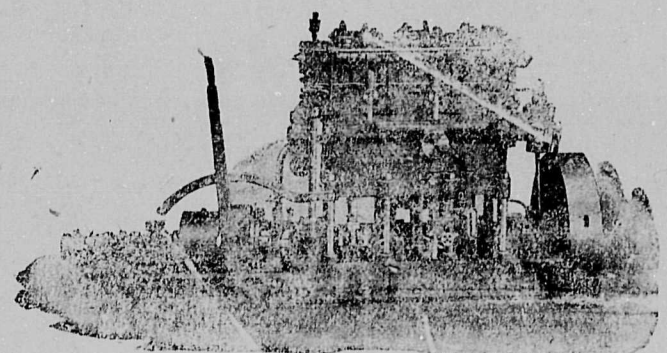

struction of the two ships.

It is expected that the vessels will  
be "framed" inside two months, as  
the lumber is on hand at the mills
