BAIT DECISION IS ONE OF IMPORTANCE

AMERICAN FISHERMEN HAVE DECIDED ADVANTAGE OW- ING TO CHANGE

The Leave To Buy Bait In Canadian Ports Was Sought By Them.

A decision of considerable interest to the halibut and herring fishing industry in Northern British Columbia waters has been made by the United States Bureau of Fisheries at Washington, which announced that it was deemed inadvisable for the bureau to ask Canada that the right of buying herring bait in British Columbia ports be given to American fishing vessels. The reason given for the refusal is that Prince Rupert is fast capturing the halibut fishing industry of Seattle, and that to allow American vessels to buy their bait in Canadian waters would be to finally cut them adrift from Seattle and the Sound altogether.

The case of the fishermen is that bait can only be caught in Puget Sound for four months out of the year, and that the supplies from Alaska waters are not sufficient to supply all the boats. Another grievance is that if bait were plentiful in Alaska the vessel owners could not afford to sail their ships to Ketchikan, a voyage of some 1,200 miles, and then back to Cape Flattery to fish.

GERMANY MAY MAKE PEACE MOVE

GERMAN CHANCELLOR IN INTER- VIEW INDICATES THAT IN- ITIATIVE MAY COME

Denial At Washington That United States Asked To Intervene.

Washington, March 22.—A despatch from Ambassador Gerard states that an interview given by the German Chancellor indicates that German officials are considering the advisability of taking the initiative in proposing the ending of hostilities. There is no warrant for the statement made that the United States Government has been asked by Germany to use its good offices in the direction of bringing about peace in Europe.

Mo Infantry Attacks On Verdun Front Made By Germans

Paris, March 22.—No infantry attacks have been made today on the Verdun front. Last night the Germans bombarded Malancourt heavily.

There have been artillery exchanges east of the Meuse and also west of the Meuse. In the latter section the artillery duel was very lively. East of the Meuse the bombardment was very intense in the region of Vaux and Dambloup. There were no infantry actions. All is quiet along the rest of the front.

The Parliament at Ottawa was treated to a genuine sensation a few days ago, for which E. M. Macdonald, of Picton, was primarily responsible. Mr. Macdonald precipitated a debate on the naval question. Why he did so no one can understand. For the first time it was made public that the famous Admiralty memorandum laid on the table of Parliament during the naval debate was not the only justification the Government had for its emergency naval policy of (Continued on Page Three.)

Debate On Speech In Legislature Has Closed--Praise For Local Representative For Efforts Along Line Of Public Ownership

(Special to Journal.)

Victoria, March 22.—Today's speeches in the House brought the debate on the Address from the Throne to a conclusion. Those who spoke were F. Carter-Cotton, ex-President of Provincial Council; Hon. Thomas Taylor, Minister of Works and Provincial Secretary; and Parker Williams, the Socialist-Liberal member for Newcastle.

Probably Last Speech.

Mr. Carter-Cotton made what will probably be his last speech in the Legislature, as he is not a candidate for re-election. He has been in the

House practically continuously since 1890.

He made a well prepared and able speech, in which he defended the Government's policy and record, and scored the Opposition for lack of policy and destructive criticism and its efforts to set back the business of the country by obstructing necessary legislation and demanding immediate dissolution.

Minister's Speech.

Hon. Mr. Taylor gave figures showing expenditures of the Government in the last six years, in that time over \$32,000,000 has been expended on roads, bridges, schools, public buildings, wharves and trails. This money had to come from the natural resources of the Province, as the sparsely settled population could not be expected to carry the burden of direct taxation for such improvements.

In all contracts made by the Government, the awards had been made to the lowest British Columbia tenderers. The contract system could not be put into effect on road maintenance, however, as that would mean that local labor in many cases would not be employed.

The Debt Question.

The Minister gave figures to show that the debt of the Province is now only fifty per cent. greater than it was twelve years ago, despite the fact that, whereas less than a million a year was spent on public works then, over eight million was spent in the year 1914.

He commented on the value to the

country which the Kettle Valley Railroad, the C. N. R., and P. G. E. would prove to be, making particular reference to the Kettle Valley line.

Socialist-Liberal.

Parker Williams criticized the Government's land policy, claiming that speculators held all the good land on the Grand Trunk Pacific, within fifteen miles on each side of the line from Terrace to Prince George.

Praise For Mr. Manson.

He praised Hon. Wm. Manson when he remarked that the efforts of this gentleman resulted in Prince Rupert owning its own public utilities.

Blue Ruin Cry.

Speaking in the House yesterday, Hon. Lorne Campbell declared that the Blue Ruin policy of Liberals might have the effect of driving capital away from British Columbia mining investments, with the result that it would be well nigh impossible to enlarge the smelter and the refinery facilities and increase the production of lead, copper and zinc, now greatly needed for war munitions.

PRAIRIE FIRES SWEEP OVER PARTS OF KANSAS

Topeka, March 22.—Prairie fires are burning in a dozen western Kansas counties. Although there has been no loss of life, many houses caught from the fast moving flames. The pasture lands have been reduced to vast reaches of black stubble.

VANCOUVER LABOR MEN MEN ARE OUT OF POLITICS

Decision Reached To Have No Part In The Forthcoming Election Reached.

Vancouver Trades and Labor Council decided that it would take no further part in provincial politics at present, and Delegate Hardy tried hard to tie the central body down to keeping out of the politics forever and ever, but failed.

Some of the delegates appeared to think that notwithstanding the poor showing made by labor in the political arena up to the present in the city, there was still hope of a resurrection, and that one day the labor movement would come into its own, although it was freely admitted that to date it had given little promise.

Delegate Trotter was of the opinion that the council lacked unanimity and that it would be better to cut adrift from politics and allow the central body to get down to the business for which it was organized.

business of the country. No obstacles would be put in the way of ample discussions on the part of the Opposition, but if they would block supply, and thus bring civil salaries and public works to an end, that would be a matter between the Opposition and the voters. After supply was passed, the House would if necessary, sit until June 1 in order to give the Opposition ample time for investigation. So that Mr. Macdonald, of Vancouver, could prove his loud assertion that this is the most corrupt Government in Canada. Premier Bowser promised that if corruption could be shown by the Opposition against any member of the Government or any official, he himself would be the first person to use the strong hand to remove that one from office. Using an interview which recently appeared in the Vancouver Province, in which Mr. Macdonald was quoted, the Premier showed the House the apparently close relationship existing between the Liberals and the liquor men. Mr. Macdonald, according to all appearances, using his legal knowledge to suggest to the liquor people how they might upset Prohibition legislation on the alleged ground that the Government went out of business at midnight March 14.

The Premier reminded the Liberals that in their demand for immediate dissolution that day, they had virtually declared their willingness to see the Prohibition vote delayed indefinitely.

Discussing railways legislation, the Premier pointed out that the Province would never be called upon to pay the principal interests of its Canadian Northern guarantees, because the Dominion Government had loaned the railway \$45,000,000, and thus became a subsequent endorser

of the Provincial guarantee. In the matter of the P. G. E., the Province had the personal covenant of the powerful firm of Foley, Welsh & Stewart for the guarantee given the road. In any event the line was one of the very best portions of British Columbia. The Premier stated that the returned soldiers aid was receiving the attention of the Government, and that the views of other Provincial Governments, as well as the authorities at Ottawa were being sought, so that action might be taken along some common basis.

Closing, he said, "in this stage of our provincial history, we desire optimism not pessimism, our assets are of such a nature that we should not fear for the people, this is not time for postmortems. The pessimist sheep of the Opposition do no good whatever to the country. Let us have courage to face the future and all will be well."

INTERCOLONIAL FINANCES.

The Canadian Minister of Railways reports a surplus for last year of a million dollars on the Intercolonial system. This is the largest excess of earnings over working expenses reported in the history of the government railway, though it is less than one per cent. on the cost of the line and equipment. General Manager Gutellus came out even in 1914 with a business of between \$11,000,000 and \$12,000,000. The traffic was greater in 1915. There is reason to fear that the improved showing brings with it some increased local disfavor. Intercolonial freight rates, especially on short hauls have been kept low. That is one reason why the government line has never much more than paid its running expenses, and more often than not reported a deficit. The people of the Lower Provinces regard this line as one of the terms of Confederation and not as an ordinary business investment. If the manager has been able to make a surplus while the low freight rates have been maintained, he has vindicated his appointment.

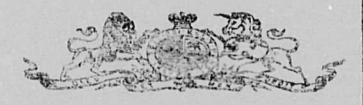

SYNOPSIS OF COAL MINING REGULATIONS.

Coal mining right, of the Dominion in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, the Yukon Territory, the Northwest Territories and a portion of the Province of British Columbia, may be leased for a term of twenty-one years at an annual rental of \$1 per acre. Not more than 2,500 acres will be leased to one applicant. Applications for a lease must be made by the applicant in person to the Agent or Sub-Agent of the district in which the rights applied for are situated.

In surveyed territory the land must be described by sections, or legal subdivisions of sections, and in unsurveyed territory the tract applied for shall be staked out by the applicant himself.

Each application must be accompanied by a fee of .5, which will be refunded if the right applied for are not available, but not otherwise. A royalty shall be paid on the merchantable output of the mine at the rate of five cents per ton.

The person operating the mine shall furnish the Agent with sworn returns, accounting for the full quantity of merchantable coal mined and pay the royalty thereon. If the coal mining rights are not being operated, such returns shall be furnished at least once a year.

The lease will include the coal mining rights only; but the lessee may be permitted to purchase whatever available surface rights may be considered necessary for the working of the mine at the rate of \$10 per acre.

three dreadnoughts for the British navy. Sir Robert Borden stated that a secret memorandum from the British Government on the conditions in Europe was sent to him and he showed this to Sir Wilfrid Laurier. Sir Wilfrid had permission to make its contents known to all the former members of his Cabinet then in Parliament. It is not known what was in this memorandum, but it is understood that the British Government in the frank manner placed before Canadian statesmen the great danger of the Empire being embroiled in a European war. In face of this solemn warning Sir Wilfrid Laurier and his followers deliberately blocked the Naval Aid Bill and ridiculed the idea that any war was imminent or the Empire in danger. Sir Wilfrid Laurier was not present, but Messrs. Pugsley, Graham and Lemieux, who had been made familiar with this secret document in 1913, were there and made no attempt to refute the Premier's statement or to minimize the warning which they disregarded.

Sir Robert Borden made another almost equally important announcement. The Naval Aid Bill of 1912, he said, was an emergency measure to in some way prepare to meet the danger of which they had been warned. The Government had always intended to submit their permanent policy to the people. In 1914 arrangements had been made with the British Government whereby Sir John Jellicoe, now Admiral of the Grand Fleet, was to visit Canada in August, 1914, and assist the Canadian Government in formulating a permanent naval policy. The outbreak of war on August 4 prevented Sir John coming to Canada. The Premier also stated that at the outbreak of the war he had asked the British Government in what direction Canada could best assist the Empire in this struggle, and if they wished any assistance from us in naval defense. The reply was that it would be of greater assistance by devoting all our energies to military organization and this advice has been adopted.

ELIMINATING THE GERMAN NAMES

Australians Determined All Teutonic Cognomens Shall Disappear.

Amongst those engaged with much fervour in the current campaign for the elimination of everything German from our everyday life are people who demand the abolition of such German names as "Liedertafel," "Kindergarten," and "Lager" in regard to well known institutions that have gained important places in our social affairs, especially lager beer, says a Sydney, N. S. W., despatch. Most of the musical societies with the name of Liedertafel have borne it for years and have gained much honor under it, consequently they are somewhat loth to enter upon a change which may mean some loss of identity. Apparently, however, it must be done. So the Sydney Liedertafel has just decided to change its name to Sydney Apollo Society. Patriotic brains are hard at work trying to bring forward acceptable substitutes for "kindergarten" and "lager." That is regards the names only and not the things for which they stand, and which can hardly be abolished no matter how much of the German element there may have been in their origin. Some persons have even gone to the length of suggesting that all words of German origin should be taken out of the English language as now spoken. Probably they do not realize the amount of work that would be required to find substitutes, and one cannot help thinking how changed the English language would be if on account of some future war all words of French origin were also dropped out.

DRESS EXTRAVAGANCE SHOULD BE STOPPED

British War Savings Committee Makes Appeal To Women.

The national organizing committee for war savings in London has issued an appeal against "extravagance in women's dress," which says that while many women have recognized that elaboration and variety in dress is bad form in the present crisis, there still are a large number, both among the rich and those not so well to do, with whom war appears to have made little difference with respect to their apparel.

"New clothes," the appeal concludes, "should be bought only when absolutely necessary. These should be durable and desirable for all occasions. Luxurious forms of hats, boots, shoes, stockings, gloves and vells should be avoided. It is essential not only that money should be saved, but that labor employed in the clothing trades should be set free."

B. C. OFFICER HAS BEEN KILLED AT SULVA

Lieut. Bray, Son Of Old Resident Of Nanaimo, Lost His Life.

In a report received from London it was stated that Lieut. G. Bray, Royal West Surrey Regiment, previously reported wounded and missing, is now believed to have been killed at Sulva Bay. Lieut. Bray was the son of the late Mr. Marshall Bray, one of the pioneers of the Nanaimo district, and for several years government agent there.

Lieut. Bray had the distinction of being one of the first Rhodes Scholars to leave British Columbia. Upon his return to Vancouver he entered the law firm of Henderson, Tulk & Bray. He enlisted in Vancouver when war broke out, subsequently receiving a commission in the West Surreys.

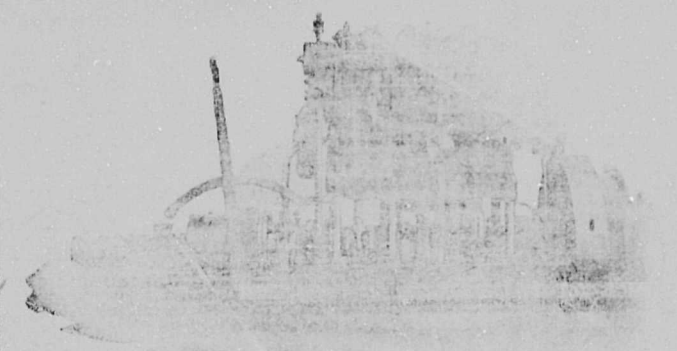

less than a month or so ago the much desired permission was given by the Department of Marine and Fisheries at Ottawa, and now American vessels can buy their bait at Prince Rupert. The only condition attached to the purchase of bait is that the owners of the vessels must give a written undertaking that their catches will be delivered at Canadian ports. The purpose behind the permission given by the department was a double one. When fishing boats buy bait they also in many cases buy fishing gear and supplies, and when they return to Vancouver or Prince Rupert with their catches as stipulated in the agreement both cities benefit as fisheries centres.

It would seem that geography was against the Sound ports in their efforts to hold the halibut fishing business they have so far enjoyed. There is more halibut near Prince Rupert than farther south; and that port with its transcontinental railway to carry the fish east appears to be the natural point for the vessels to discharge.
