ENGINEER GROUP AT ATLIN SHIPPING ORE TO TACOMA

E. A. C. Studd Went South On Steamer Princess Sophia Yesterday.

SCHOONER ALBERT MEYER IS REPORTED AS SOLD

Vessel That Was Engaged By Cold Storage In Cod Fishing Changes Hands.

The schooner Albert Meyer, formerly owned in British Columbia by the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Company, now eighteen days out from Melbourne, Australia, for Paeste, is reported to have been purchased by J. E. Shields, of Seattle.

The vessel was formerly operated as a fishing schooner, and at one time was owned by the Alaska Cod-fish Company. She is a three-masted schooner, 156 feet long, 36 feet beam and 11.9 feet depth of hold. She was built at Eureka, Cal., in 1896.

DEMANDS MADE UPON THE MEXICAN

PRESIDENT WILSON WILL DEMAND THAT CARRANZA REPUDIATE ATTACK

United States Said To Have Asked Britain To Act For Citizens.

Washington, June 24.—The Mexican situation is still clouded, and it is believed that President Wilson will demand that Carranza repudiate the acts of the persons responsible for the attack upon the American blue-jackets at Mazatlán and also of those who instigated the recent fight with United States cavalry at Carrizal; and that the offenders be punished.

It is reported that the United States has asked Great Britain to look after American interests in Mexico, through her diplomats, in the event of hostilities breaking out.

ACTIVITY IN MINING AT NORTHERN PROPERTIES

Conrad Mines Are Being Taken Up Again—White Horse Shipping.

From the north comes the news that the various mining properties are showing up well, and there is marked activity in connection with them. At Carcross, the Conrad mines that attracted so much attention a few years ago are likely to be the scene of renewed activity. A party of eight have gone to work on the property and have taken in a very heavy supply of provisions and equipment. It is reported that the properties have been bonded, but no details are available.

The Pabelo mines at White Horse are making steady shipments to the Tacoma smelter. There are 1,000 tons weekly going out. This is to be increased very materially in the near future, it is said.

ADVERTISE PRODUCT FROM CANADA

ADVICE GIVEN IN WAR BOOK ISSUED AT OTTAWA

Recognition Of Production From This Country Can Be Secured.

In "Production and Thrift," the new agricultural war book, issued by Hon. Martin Burrell, Mr. H. S. Arkell, Assistant Live Stock Commissioner, says: "As has already been intimated, the Dominion is now in a particularly favorable position in all her dealings with the Mother Country to trade upon the term 'Canadian.' If, however, Canada and Canadian shippers are content to have the product of the Dominion exported without such supervision or organization as shall secure uniformity and high quality in the material forwarded, we may expect to find the trade hampered and restricted in every direction, not only by dishonorable dealing but, as well, by the inability of the British consuming public to depend upon the quality or grade of Canadian goods. Danish bacon, Irish eggs, New Zealand butter, and Canadian cheese have been able to set a standard on the British market, because of the organization established in these different countries to direct the manufacture, regulate the grade, improve the quality and control the export of these different commodities. An inspection of the display advertisements in the windows of wholesale and retail produce houses in Great Britain very clearly demonstrates the methods used to catch the attention of the British consuming public. They very definitely suggest, also, the enterprise and efficient organization in these countries, in that they have been able to secure for themselves such a distinct national recognition for their product on the British market. 'Finest Irish,' 'Best Danish,' 'Prime New Zealand,' these are illustrations of the phrases that confront one on the display placards used by English grocers in selling their wares. It was not difficult or surprising to ascertain that such advertising was backed up by an organization in the respective countries which made trade under such a basis possible.

"If Canada sets herself to the task we can secure the same national recognition for Canadian eggs, Canadian bacon, Canadian canned goods, and Canadian meats. Canadian produce should always be advertised by having trade brands, trade advertisements and display placards appear under the term 'Canadian.' This term should precede any firm brand, and should be made to secure for itself a clearly defined recognition amongst the British public. So far as I was able to learn, the export produce business to Great Britain has never amounted to anything for any country nor for any product unless the article exported has been made to conform to a practically standard grade, both as regards uniformity and quality. The distinctive national designation under which such products can be sold, when this position is reached, very rapidly becomes a commercial asset which itself definitely tends to extend business and develop trade. How much more of an asset such a distinction

MANITOBA FARMERS ARE ON VISIT TO THE CITY

Interested Company Of Tourists Are Looking Into Conditions Here.

A very interested company of tourists are in the city for a day or two. They are Manitoba farmers, who, after getting their crops in, have come west to Prince Rupert over the G. T. P. to see the country through which the line runs, and to look into conditions here. TWO HUNDRED MEN BLIND BY INJURY

Eleven Are Canadians And Seven Are Still In Hospital.

There are 201 British officers and men who have been rendered blind by injuries at the front. Eleven of these are Canadians, four of whom have returned to Canada and seven are still in the hospital for blinded soldiers at St. Dunstons, Regent Park, London. There are 140 non-commissioned officers and men in this hospital now, including five Australians, two New Zealanders and the seven Canadians; there are also ten blinded officers who come there for the special training given.

Fifty men have passed out of St. Dunstons having learned some useful occupation such as typewriting, boot repairing, basket making, poultry farming, market gardening, etc. One officer has qualified as a masseur.

The military hospitals commission here is looking after blinded soldiers who return to Canada, and it announces that the efforts for blinded Canadian soldiers are unauthorized and unnecessary. Nor is it considered necessary to erect a special institution for such cases. Of the four blinded Canadians, who returned home, one was trained at St. Dunstons and is now earning his living as an insurance agent in his home town; his typewritten letters are a model for many sighted typists. Another lives on a farm with his friends, who are well to do. A third is suffering from shock. He returned from Liverpool on the Hesperian, and when thrown into the water after the ship was torpedoed, he regained his sight temporarily but has since had a relapse. He will probably recover as there is no ascertainable organic trouble.

HALIBUT AND SALMON LOWER

PRICES PAID YESTERDAY WERE A LITTLE BELOW THE DAY BEFORE

Quite A Lot Of Spring Salmon Was Received From North Island.

About 50,000 pounds of halibut went up for sale on the local exchange yesterday and sold at a half a cent below the price prevailing on the previous day. The Maud with 7,000 and the Morengen with 16,000 pounds sold to the Cold Storage Company at 7 1-8 cents. H. C. Nunan, of the Atlin Fisheries, took the Treo, 8,000; Dip, 8,000 and Lillian S., 12,000 pounds at 7 1-4 cents a pound.

Spring salmon also declined in price yesterday. The Cold Storage picked up 23,000 pounds at 6 1-4 cents, and H. O. Roberts, of the Pacific Fisheries, paid 6 3-8 cents for 8,000 pounds, brought from North Island by the power boat Duchess.

APEX OF PRODUCTION IN CANADA REACHED

Industries Operating As Fully As Supply Of Labor Will Permit.

In its monthly commercial letter, the Canadian Bank of Commerce says:

"At no time has a larger proportion of the industrial plant of the country been actively employed than today, and an increasing quantity of domestic raw materials is being utilized. Textile, iron and steel, boot and shoe, packing and other industries are operating as fully as the supply of labor will permit.

"In some industries, a diminution in the amount of night work appears to show that the apex of production has been reached, but excepting in some unimportant districts, the industrial plant of the entire country is operating under the pressure of accumulating orders."

LOCATION FOR SMELTER.

With the tremendous development of the mining industry in Northern British Columbia and in Alaska and the Yukon there is a growing demand for a smelter here. Thousands of tons of ore are being shipped past this city every week to Tacoma. In the natural order of things Prince Rupert should have a smelter to take care of this. The Granby Company's smelter at Anyox is now well taxed, it is fair to suppose, with the output from the mines of the company. There is a movement on foot to have the Ladysmith smelter reopened to take care of the increased tonnage requiring treatment on this coast.

Mining is destined to be one of the most important industries in this part of the Province. With the shipping facilities by rail and water from here, and the fact that this is to become a commercial centre, there is every reason for locating a smelter within easy reach of the city. It should be on the railway and also on the waterfront, so that materials and supplies could be handled easily and so that connection could be given with mining properties by the railway or the water routes.

No effort should be spared to secure such an accessory to the city's development. Mayor McCaffery has been actively engaged in this work during his visits to the south as well as in the east and there are not wanting indications that this will be accomplished. The development of mining among the Islands of South

Eastern Alaska is being carried out on a tremendous scale. Those who have made the trip to the various centres there have returned astonished at what is being done. A smelter here would materially serve that part of the continent as well as the British Columbia districts, comprised within the northern sections contiguous to here.

In other ways a smelter would aid the city. It would afford a connection between this city and the mining centres that supplied the smelter. With the bringing in of ores there would be a tendency to build up trade in other lines. Moreover, anything that will tend to centralize the mining business in this city will be to the development of the place along important lines.



SYNOPSIS OF COAL MINING REGULATIONS.

Coal mining right of the Dominion in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, the Yukon Territory, the Northwest Territories and a portion of the Province of British Columbia, may be leased for a term of twenty-one years at an annual rental of \$1 per acre. Not more than 2,560 acres will be leased to one applicant. Applications for a lease must be made by the applicant in person to the Agent or Sub-Agent of the district in which the rights applied for are situated.

In surveyed territory the land must be described by sections, or legal subdivisions of sections, and in unsurveyed territory the tract applied for shall be staked out by the applicant himself.

Each application must be accompanied by a fee of \$5, which will be refunded if the right applied for is not available, but not otherwise. A royalty shall be paid on the merchantable output of the mine at the rate of five cents per ton.

The person operating the mine shall furnish the Agent with sworn returns accounting for the full quantity of merchantable coal mined and pay the royalty thereon. If the coal mining rights are not being operated, such returns should be furnished at least once a year. The lease will include the coal mining rights only; but the lessee may be permitted to purchase whatever available surface rights may be considered necessary for the working of the mine at the rate of \$10 per acre.

For full information application should be made to the Secretary of the Department of the Interior, Ottawa, or to any Agent or Sub-Agent of Dominion Lands.

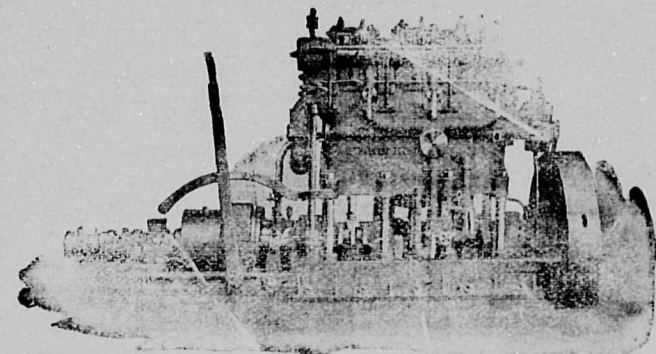

PETROLEUM PRODUCTION OF THE WORLD TODAY

Figures Dealing With The Output In Important Line.

The increasing demand for petroleum and its products, both in the United States and the world at large, lends interest to a compilation by the Foreign Trade Department of the National City Bank, of New York, showing world production of petroleum and the share thereof contributed by the United States from the earliest date of that industry down to the present time. This compilation shows that the United States produced in 1915 66 3-10 per cent. of the world's output of crude petroleum in 1915 is stated at 440 million barrels of 42 gallons each, against 328 million barrels in 1910, 149 millions in 1900, 77 millions in 1890, 30 millions in 1880, 6 millions in 1870 and about a half-million barrels in 1860.

Of this world production, that of the United States was in 1915 292 million barrels, against 210 millions in 1910, 64 millions in 1900, 46 millions in 1890, 26 millions in 1880, 5 million sin 1870, and a half-million in 1860, when they produced practically all the petroleum output of the world.

The world's principal mineral oil producers and their output in 1914 were: United States, with a product of 266,000,000 barrels, Russia, 66,000,000 barrels; Mexico, 21,000,000 barrels; Rumania, 13,000,000 barrels; Dutch East Indies, 13,000,000 barrels; India, 8,000,000 barrels.
