

RUMORS OF SERIOUS SITUATION OVER PROHIBITION Lieut. Governor It Is Reported Refuses To Sign The Bill Conscription For Ireland Was Voted Down By Lords Terrific Fighting Is Again Reported From Verdun Front

Features Of The Bowser Prohibition Bill Which Is Very Stringent

(Special to The Journal.)
Victoria, May 22.—Premier Bowser has been credited with framing the best liquor license law in the Dominion, and those who have seen the new prohibition measure claim that it belongs in the same category. "The bill is better than the Hugh John Macdonald Act, upon which it was framed," declared Mr. Jonathan Rogers. "For my part, I consider that it is the best bill of the kind in Canada. I am particularly pleased with the provisions which have been made for the enforcement of the Act. It seems to me that the Government has made it clear that the enforcement of this bill, in the event of it becoming law with the passage of the referendum will certainly not be a dead letter."

A feature of this Bowser Prohibition Bill which sets it apart from the other prohibition measures of the Dominion is that there are strict penalties for infractions. Anyone keeping liquor for sale, contrary to the provisions of the bill will receive from six to twelve months imprisonment. It is said that there is no option of a fine. In the case of a corporation the fine is set at one thousand dollars. In cases where the Provincial Police take action and obtain convictions, the fines for all infractions will go to the Province. But municipal police are also vested with authority under the act, and where they successfully prosecute the fines go to the municipalities or cities concerned. Thus the municipal districts and cities share with the Province the responsibility of enforcing the legislation.

The bill allows private persons to have liquor on their premises for their own consumption. No limit is set as to quantity, but the liquor, of course, must be imported.

The vending of liquor will be brought under the Attorney-General's Department. Venders may be

appointed in some places, but generally speaking the Provincial Police will attend to the work.

The police will sell to the druggists and the latter may in turn fill doctors prescriptions. Sale by the official venders is allowed for mechanical or scientific purposes, not exceeding ten gallons at one time, sale to druggists not exceeding five gallons, to physicians up to two quarts, to dentists for stimulants to one pint, to veterinary surgeons to one gallon, to hospitals in such amounts as may be deemed proper by the Superintendent of Provincial Police. Sale will be allowed to ministers for sacramental wine and to other persons on physicians prescriptions.

There will be no profits for the Provincial Department. All sales except these on prescriptions will be at cost.

Clergy and others buying from the official vendor must have sworn affidavits that the liquor will be used for the purpose it is being purchased. (Continued on Page Two.)

HALIBUT RECEIPTS NOT VERY HEAVY

THE ARRIVALS DURING THE
PAST DAYS HAVE BEEN
LIGHT

The Price Has Remained Over Five
Cents For All
Landed.

Halibut receipts for the past two days have been somewhat light, aggregating only 140,000 pounds. On Sunday the Daisy, 4,000; Guilford, 6,000; Haldan, 7,000; and Hecate, 7,000, arrived and sold to the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Company at 5 1-4 cents; while the company's own steamer James Carruthers arrived on Sunday afternoon with 70,000 pounds.

The Alameda, 9,000 and Tuladi, 12,000, were taken by the Atlin Fisheries at 5 1-4.

At a late hour last night the Morgen arrived with 25,000.

London, May 22.—The House of Lords voted down the amendment introduced in the conscription measure to include Ireland.

IMPERIAL UNION PLAN OUTLINED

LIONEL CURTIS DEALS WITH
WEAKNESS OF BRITISH
EMPIRE

Disorganization Must Cease And
Give Place To
Union.

The most able contribution yet made on the consideration of the Imperial problem is published in London under the title, "The Problem of the Commonwealth," written by Lionel Curtis, who was prominently associated with the movement for the South African union. The vital contention of the author is that constitutional Imperial consolidation is essential if the British Empire is to survive.

He places prime responsibility for the present war on the internal disorganization of the British commonwealth and contends that Imperial existence is essential to the best conduct of human affairs and argues that without a cut and dried plan the Empire must dissolve in independent units. The present war has proven that the Dominions have had no real responsibility in sovereign affairs. Exhaustive enquiries into Imperial relationship leads him to the conclusion that there must be drastic constitutional changes.

Fierce Fighting Is Still Going On About The Verdun Front

Paris, May 22.—French grenadiers occupied several block houses in Avocourt Wood on the Verdun front during the course of severe fighting. The struggle west of Deadman's Hill was terrific. The war office reports that the attacks of the German infantry were repulsed. Block houses at Avocourt Wood were abandoned by the Germans.

He contends that an Imperial Parliament must be created, composed of representatives elected by the different partners of the commonwealth, answerable directly to such an Imperial electorate and exercising sovereign control in vital affairs. Such a Parliament must possess all the powers now exercised by the Foreign Office, Admiralty, War Office, India Office and the Crown colony side of the Colonial Office. It must also, through an Imperial electorate, raise funds necessary for discharging Imperial functions. This Imperial Cabinet must have the final right to determine the necessary quantity of taxation, though power determining its quality may be left with the Dominion Parliaments. These new conditions, he contends, would involve no change in the Dominion constitutions, but drastic changes would be necessary in the constitution of the British Isles. Lieutenant-Governor Reported To Have Taken Hand In Prohibition Movement By Refusing To Sign Bill Before Introduction

WILL REPEAL CLAUDE STREET LOCAL IMPROVEMENT BYLAW

City Council Had Bylaw Up For First
Reading.

A bylaw to repeal the Claude Street Local Improvement Bylaw was presented at council last evening and read a first time. It will be put through slowly in order to give any who have any objections to raise a chance to do so.

The bylaw was to provide for a four foot walk on that street. Several on the street petitioned for it and agreed to do the work themselves. They, however, have since shown no disposition to press for it or to want it built.

It has been decided, in view of the lethargy respecting the work, to repeal the bylaw.

Victoria, May 22.—There has developed intense excitement here today in connection with the prohibition measure which has been agitating the Province for several months. According to reports that spread like wildfire over Victoria today, there has arisen a deadlock over the Prohibition Bill.

It was understood that the Premier intended to introduce the bill into the Legislature this evening, when it would be given its first reading. It looks at time of sending this despatch, however, as though there might be some delay in its introduction.

His Honor the Lieutenant-Governor, it is said, feels very strongly that

there should be some adequate provision for compensation in the bill. So far reports say he has refused to sign the draft bill, which must come down to the House as a message from His Honor. It is understood His Honor refuses to sign the measure unless the subject of compensation is favorably dealt with.

Premier Bowser is said to be equally determined. He takes the position that he will stand by the promises he made to the prohibitionists.

A possible development of the present situation is the dismissal of the present Government, if the Lieutenant-Governor declines to take the advice of the Premier. He will then have to call in a new adviser.

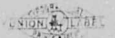

Every official vendor, druggist and physician must keep records showing the disposition of the liquor. These will be for the inspection of the department.

Except for the provisions regarding sales already outlined and for sales of liquor under judiciary process, and the export sales of breweries, etc., licensed by the Dominion, all for the purpose it is being purchased, are prohibited. With like exceptions, all giving or having of liquor is prohibited. This does not apply to the liquor in private houses for private use.

The consumption of liquor purchased from any person other than the official vendor or by prescription, etc., is prohibited.

The manufacture and sale of vinegar, sweet cider, unfermented fruit juice and denatured alcohol is not interfered with.

The owner of any premises permitting drinking within the premises or allowing disorderly conduct is deemed guilty of an offence against the act.

The officers of any club are deemed guilty of an offence if liquor is consumed on the premises.

The duty of enforcing the act will lie upon both Provincial and Municipal Police.

Provisions are made to facilitate

the proving of offences. The burden of proving the right to keep or to sell will lie upon the defendant. The proof in the case of prescriptions will lie upon the physician.

The giving of colourable prescriptions is deemed an offence.

Police constables are given full authority to search all premises under suspicion.

Liquor improperly kept may be seized and forfeited. No appeals in such cases will be allowed to the courts.

Reference has already been made to the principal penalties.

The new bill if carried at the referendum vote is to come into effect on July 1, 1917.

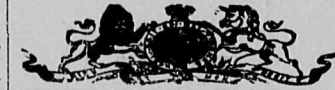

SYNOPSIS OF COAL MINING REGULATIONS.

Coal mining right of the Dominion in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, the Yukon Territory, the Northwest Territories and a portion of the Province of British Columbia, may be leased for a term of twenty-one years at an annual rental of \$1 per acre. Not more than 2,560 acres will be leased to one applicant. Applications for a lease must be made by the applicant in person to the Agent or Sub-Agent of the district in which the rights applied for are situated.

In surveyed territory the land must be described by sections, or legal subdivisions of sections, and in unsurveyed territory the tract applied for shall be staked out by the applicant himself.

Each application must be accompanied by a fee of \$5, which will be refunded if the right applied for is not available, but not otherwise. A royalty shall be paid on the merchantable output of the mine at the rate of five cents per ton.

The person operating the mine shall furnish the Agent with sworn returns accounting for the full quantity of merchantable coal mined and pay the royalty thereon. If the coal mining rights are not being operated, such returns should be furnished at least once a year.

The lease will include the coal mining rights only; but the lessee may be permitted to purchase whatever available surface rights may be considered necessary for the working of the mine at the rate of \$10 per acre.

IMPERIAL UNION. (Continued from Page One.)

ment would have to regulate the government of the British Isles to the new Parliament occupying the same constitutional position as that now held by the Dominion Governments.

In order to realize such an actual Imperial existence, the writer contends, a definite scheme of consolidation must be formulated and placed before the public. The time for unconscious growth has passed. The Imperial union must be achieved as the United States, the Canadian Provinces and the Australian and South African colonies achieved their respective unions by the presentation to the electorates and Parliaments of partner nations in the Empire of a cut and dried scheme. Peoples who will have to accept or reject this Imperial consolidation must appoint delegates to meet in convention to frame instructions for the constitutional draughtsmen to settle terms for an actual Imperial organization. The bill as finally presented to be accepted by such Imperial convention must then be submitted for public approval to communities concerned.

Such is the writer's project for a practical solution of the Imperial question. His book is of extreme importance, for while the author expressly assumes individual responsibility for his conclusions on broad lines, his arguments are based upon study conducted by hundreds of people, brought together, irrespective of party, in responsible parts of the Empire to consider the Imperial problem.

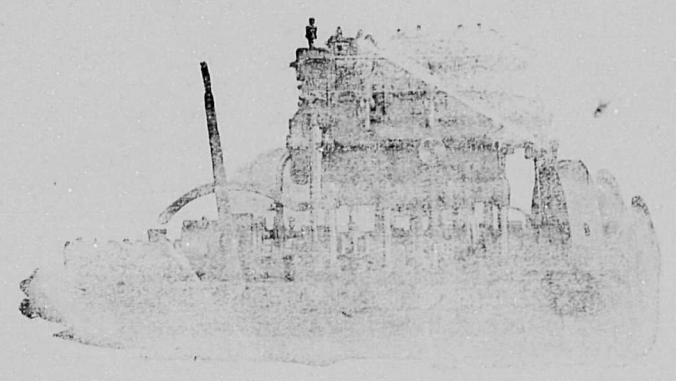
