## ROCHER DE BOULE MINE STRIKES NEW VEIN

## The United States Still Waiting To Enter World War

## Col. Taylor Says Men Are Now Prepared For Big Drive

### Rocher de Boule Has Cut Another Vein In Its Tunnel Work

The Rocher de Boule mine at Hazelton is meeting with continued success in its exploratory work. The great tunnel that is being driven into the mountain side in the hope of tapping the main body is still being continued. It is not anticipated that the main vein will be reached before March.

But while this is the case the tunnel that is being driven has cut into new veins. Only recently a new vein was encountered which gives promise to being a good producer.

#### BELIEVE GERMANS DESIRED RUPTURE

War Declaration Likely To Do More Harm Than Good By Depriving Entente Allies Of Needed Munitions.

Washington, Feb. 9.—Entente diplomats here frankly express their hopes that the United States will not actually enter the war.

Several of the Allies' representatives let it be known that they entertained a growing fear that Germany deliberately precipitated a break with this country in hope

American munitions and supplies would be held, thus cutting off imports to the Entente.

The diplomats have been surprised at the energy which the American Government has shown in laying out its plans for eventualities and do not conceal their fear that military precaution may force the United States to keep at home at least a considerable part of supplies now going abroad. Such an outcome, they said, would more than compensate for a mere break in relations from the German viewpoint. Even if the United States, in the event of war following the break, should undertake to arm and equip an army for operations in Europe, it would require nearly a year of training. It is declared, before it would be wise to send the force to the front. In the meantime, the Entente spokesmen point out, all the effort and energy that this country might be putting forth towards the military defeat of Germany would go into channels that could not lead to that end, unless the war were prolonged beyond all belief.

The greatest military aid hoped for from this country in Entente circles in case of actual war is the safeguarding of American trade channels including the American end of the route to Europe and the section down through the Caribbean, especially toward the Tampico oil fields. A great and unrestricted submarine campaign would make this a matter of first importance and provide a heavy task for the American naval forces.

#### PERU CLAIMS DAMAGES FROM GERMAN EMPIRE

Lima, Feb. 9.—The Peruvian Government has instructed its minister at Berlin to demand compensation for the sailing vessel Lorton, which was sunk by a German submarine.

J. F. Strang, of the Goss-Miller Canning Company accompanied by Mrs. Strang left last evening for the Sunside Cannery where they will reside.

### TURKEY REPORTED SENDING ENVOY

FORMER MINISTER OF FINANCE ON WAY TO PARIS SAYS DESPATCH

Will Discuss Peace With Allies It Is Thought To Be His Mission.

Paris, Feb. 9.—David Bey, former Turkish Minister of Finance, has arrived at Geneva, according to the Matin, as a delegate from the Turkish ministry commissioned to get in touch with the Entente powers.

Djavid Bey was selected, the Matin says, because he was the only Ottoman minister who refused to sign the trade proclaiming the opening of hostilities.

Another Turkish politician, Noury Bey, is at St. Moritz and is said to have declared openly that the partisans of Talaat Bey, one of the triumvirate in charge at Constantinople. (Continued on Page Four.)

### SUBMARINES ARE STILL VERY ACTIVE

A NUMBER OF STEAMERS WERE SUNK BY UNDERSEA CRAFT YESTERDAY

A Number Of Lives Were Lost When Ship Went Down.

London, Feb. 9.—The British ships Dauntless, Hollinside, Turino and Boyne Castle have been sunk, while a French steamer, the Macarena, a Spanish ship, and the Norwegian steamer Varing are amongst the latest submarine victims. The crew of the Hollinside left in the ship's boats and the captain's boat has landed. The crew of the Turino have landed and report that an American negro freeman named George Washington, had been killed when the vessel was submerged. Out of a crew of twenty-three on the Dauntless, six have made land and two of these have died since being brought ashore.

### Holding Men For The Great Drive Of The British Army

There are millions of men in England and France who are not working every day. They are being kept for the big drive. This important statement, was made in the Commons last evening by Col. J. D. Taylor of New Westminster, who has just arrived from England where he took the battalion which he recruited and which was broken up to form drafts for other British Columbia Battalions, which had been badly cut up at the Somme.

Colonel Taylor made a most impressive speech which was listened to with rapt interest. He bitterly resented the attack which was made by the Liberals on the "idle" officers, and as one of them himself, vigorously defended them. He then proceeded in quiet and very simple language to tell the story of his own experiences. He had arrived in England with 14,000 troops just after the big Somme drive. Nineteen thousand men were being called for to replace casualties; within two weeks 400 of his own men had been drafted and were in the trenches. He himself had offered to revert to the rank of Lieutenant but had not been permitted to go to the front.

Colonel Taylor told an inspiring story of the manner in which Canadian senior officers had endeavored to go to the front with lower rank. No fewer than 80 majors went to France as supernumerary Lieutenants. "They went over the parapets of the Somme," said Colonel Taylor, "with the privates and only 20 came back. Are we to cheer because at one stroke we wiped out 60 superfluous majors?"

He denied the stories which he had found current in Canada that the London hotels were crowded with idle class. Senior military officers, he said, were not immediately sent home from England because, as a rule, they were highly trained and their services might be required at any time. Those men should not be put in the pillory; they went over in good faith and it was only the fortunes of war that they were unable to serve as they would have liked.

The small souled, mean-spirited criticism of the opposition was directed towards these men, who could not serve at once as they desired.

#### SOCIAL EVENING TO DEPARTING MEMBERS

Mr. And Mrs. Carmichael Expect To Leave For East On Sunday.

Mr. and Mrs. J. M. Carmichael expect to leave the city for Hamilton, Ont., on Sunday evening's boat.

Last evening the Eastern Star Order of which Mrs. Carmichael was a leading member, being one of the head officers, tendered them a farewell party and dance. The gathering was held in the K. of P. Hall, at which about twenty-five couples were present. A very enjoyable time was spent and was only marred by the thoughts of having to lose at so early a date the genial companionship of the honored members.

The early part of the evening was given over to the playing of cards. The latter part being taken up with dancing. Before the company dispersed "Auld Lang Syne" was sung. Mr. and Mrs. Carmichael will be greatly missed by the Society.

#### UNITED STATES UNABLE TO RESCUE SWITZERLAND

Geneva, Switzerland, Feb. 9.—The Swiss newspapers, in their editorial comment, approve of the refusal of the Swiss federal council to take the same action toward Germany as has been adopted by the United States. The "Journal De Genete" says:

"Having common frontiers with Germany and Austria and being already close to the battlefronts the dangers to which we would be exposed would be enormous and the United States would not be in a position to come to our rescue."

### Only Time Until United States Is Into Hostilities

Washington, Feb. 9.—It is considered here to be only a matter of time when the signal for war on Germany will come. The breach is growing wider every hour since the sinking of the Anchor liner California, with United States citizens aboard. It is generally conceded that the sinking of this liner in nine minutes, with the loss of forty-one lives, clearly violates the rights of the United States.

President Wilson is determined not to plunge the country into war on a technicality and is awaiting the receipt of the complete evidence regarding the outrage before acting.

Germany requires guarantees that Von Bernstorff and the men on German vessels in the United States be permitted to leave before Ambassador Gerard and other American citizens shall be permitted to leave Germany.

On account of Germany detaining Ambassador Gerard and other American representatives, Washington has notified Berlin that German sailors

on ships in the harbors of the United States have not been seized, but that German sailors on the United States coast guard ships have been dismissed.

Great Britain and France have formally granted Washington safe passage through the Allied blockade for Count Von Bernstorff and his suite.

#### ST. ANDREW'S SOCIETY BOBS MEMBER FAREWELL

Presented J. M. Carmichael With A Pipe On The Eve Of His Departure For The East.

Last evening the St. Andrew's Society bade farewell to J. M. Carmichael, one of their members who is leaving on Sunday for eastern Canada.

During the evening, which was given over to the rendering of a varied programme of songs, recitations and addresses, Mr. Carmichael was presented with a pipe by the President, S. D. Macdonald, on behalf of the members. The departing guest made a short reply, expressing regret at having to leave Prince Rupert and the members of the Society.

#### SPECIAL TREATMENT IS OFFERED HOLLAND

Germany Would Allow Passenger And Mail Boats.

The Hague, Feb. 9.—The German minister to the Netherlands, it was officially announced, has notified the Dutch Government that Germany stands ready to make special arrangements to respect passenger and mail traffic between Holland and England. No mines will be laid on the Flushing-Southwold route, it is said.

REGULATIONS.**

Coal mining right of the Domin-  
ion in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and  
Alberta, the Yukon Territory, the  
Northwest Territories and a portion  
of the Province of British Columbia,  
may be leased for a term of twenty-  
one years at an annual rental of  
\$1 per acre. Not more than 2,560  
acres will be leased to one applicant.

Applications for a lease must be  
made by the applicant in person to  
the Agent or Sub-Agent of the dis-  
trict in which the rights applied for  
are situated.

In surveyed territory the land  
must be described by sections, and  
in unsurveyed territory the tract ap-  
plied for shall be staked out by the  
applicant.

Each application must be accom-  
panied by a fee of \$5, which will be  
refunded if the rights applied for are  
not available but not otherwise. A  
royalty shall be paid on the mer-  
chantable output of the mine at the


