## PRESERVATION OF HALIBUT SUPPLY IS VITAL BRITISH AIRSHIPS SHOW THEIR SUPERIORITY Bella Coola Soldier Avenged The Death Of Local Officer

### British Aeroplanes Superior To Aircraft Of German Enemy

London, Nov. 25.—Twelve British aeroplanes engaged a fleet of twenty hostile machines over the western front yesterday. The German aviators were dispersed by the gunfire of the British airmen, who displayed superior ability in handling their machines.

One German aeroplane was destroyed and several were driven to the ground in a damaged condition. All of the British planes returned safely to their base.

#### British Superiority.

As showing the superiority of the British aeroplane work, the following letter from Flight Lieutenant Ernest Potter, son of W. H. Potter of Port Arthur, and before enlisting a clerk in Molson's Bank at Winnipeg, tells how he led an aerial squadron in destroying a big munitions factory near Metz is described in a letter home.

"Lately I have been moving all up and down the country. We are attached to the French army and when they want anything battered down we do it for them. Two days ago we blew up some steel works at Habaningen, north of Metz. It was very clear and we could see the effect of our bombs. I was the leader and my first bomb landed square on a factory about 400 feet long by 200 feet wide. It was a delay-fuse bomb, which does not explode until a quarter of a second after it has hit. It went through the iron roof and exploded inside. The whole building just flattened out like a house of

cards and burst into flames. My other bombs all got home, but without such spectacular effect. One of the bombs from one of the other machines fell in between two immense smokestacks and blew their bases clear away. They fell in opposite directions, smashing everything in their path. When we were finished not a thing was left. It was our lucky day. Not a bomb was wasted and not a machine lost.

"The factory employed about 6,000 hands and supplied all the front near here with guns. They were also supplying the Bulgars. When we went through Nancy the people were wildly enthusiastic about it and of course we had a good time."

### CANADA'S WHEAT CROP FOR EXPORT

NEARLY ONE HUNDRED MILLION BUSHELS FREE TO BE SENT ABROAD

This Includes A Part That Was Held Over From Year Before.

Ottawa, Nov. 25.—According to a calculation made by the Census Branch of the Department of Trade and Commerce the surplus of the wheat crop available for export from Canada during the crop year ending August 31, 1917, will be just a little less than one hundred million bushels. This amount includes twenty-seven million bushels of the 1915-16 crop carried over. The calculation provides for the retention in Canada for food of probably fifty million bushels, for seed twenty-one million bushels and for loss in cleaning (Continued on Page Two.)

### FISHING CRAFT HAVE ROUGH TIME

WEATHER ON THE HALIBUT BANKS IS AGAINST THE TAKING OF FISH

Smaller Craft Have Had Little Chance To Get Work Done.

The smaller vessels of the halibut fleet have had small chance of getting good catches lately, owing to the continued rough weather. They have had to seek shelter and remain idle a large part of the time they were out.

The Doreen, Capt. Stoder, which has just returned to port, was able to get only 1,000 pounds, although out for twenty-one days. Of that time the crew were only able to fish three half days.

The Sea Light, Capt. Smith, was out a whole month and was able to (Continued on Page Two.)

### Bella Coola Man Avenged Death Of Capt. Adair Carss

According to letters received from members of the 102nd Battalion it was a Bella Coola soldier who avenged the death of Capt. Adair Carss. It was Pete Marren of that place, a member of the 102nd Battalion. Witnessing the treachery of the German officer in throwing a bomb at Capt. Carss, after the latter had rendered him first aid and made him comfortable, Marren took immediate steps to put the German officer beyond where he could deal as treacherously again.

A letter received by G. A. Woodland of the Imperial Oil Company, from Major J. S. Matthews, who as travelling representative of the same company, throws some interesting sidelights upon the engagement on

October 21, when the 102nd covered themselves with glory.

Major Matthews is an officer of that Battalion. He was wounded by a shot that entered his cheek and came out at the back of his neck. He wrote from a hospital in London.

The charge was made sharp at 12 o'clock noon. So rapidly was the work accomplished, says Major Matthews in his letter, that in 15 minutes the local regiment was in the enemy's trenches. He made reference to Capt. Carss being killed and spoke in high terms of him. At 20 minutes to 12 he said he had lunch with him.

Of the twenty-one officers of the Battalion who took part in the charge, seventeen were either killed or wounded, making terrific loss.

### RUMANIA'S POSITION IS CAUSING SOME CONSIDERABLE ALARM

London, Nov. 25.—The position of Rumania is the subject of considerable alarm as a result of the claims recorded by the Austro-Germans that they have driven the Rumanians out of the Jiu Valley and have captured thousands of kilometres of fertile wheat country.

It is doubtful whether Rumania can withstand a prolonged attack against the invaders, and the silence which is being observed by both Petrograd and Bucharest is creating intense excitement here.

### THERE CAN BE NO TALK OF PEACE AT PRESENT

London, Nov. 25.—Lord Roberts Cecil has notified the Associated Press that all peace talk at the present time is futile.

## THE PRESERVATION OF HALIBUT CONSIDERED BY WM. F. THOMPSON WHO LAST YEAR INVESTIGATED FOR PROVINCIAL DEPARTMENT

The report of the Provincial Fisheries Department for the year 1915 has just been issued by the King's Printer. It is a notable publication, containing many valuable papers, including "The Life of the Sockeye Salmon," by Dr. C. H. Gilbert; "The Halibut Fishery—The Biology of the Species and the Condition of the Banks," by W. F. Thompson; "The Life of Pacific Oysters—Environment," by Dr. Joseph Stafford; and reports from the spawning grounds of the principal salmon streams. The report is complete with statistics, illustrations, charts and tabulations, and throughout maintains the high standards of reports issued by this department.

The value of the fishery products for the Province for the year ending March 31, 1915, totalled \$11,515,085, or .368 per cent. of the total fishery products of the Dominion. British Columbia fishery products exceeded those of any other province by \$3,784,896, and exceeded the combined fishery products of New Brunswick, Ontario, Quebec and Prince Edward Island by \$633,616. This favorable showing is made notwithstanding that British Columbia shows a decrease from that of the previous

year of \$2,376,312, owing to the fact that it was "an off year" on the Fraser.

In reviewing the run of salmon to the principal rivers and inlets, it is brought out that department investigations make it appear altogether probable that a component part of the run of sockeye to the Fraser River district, approaches that river from the north, through Johnston Straits, and that all do not come in from the open sea through Juan de Fuca Strait as has been generally supposed.

Considerable comment is given to the importance of Prince Rupert as a fishing centre. The development of the halibut fishery there is the most gratifying feature of the year. In 1913 Prince Rupert received 7,520,810 pounds of fresh halibut, and in 1915, 16,095,315 pounds. William F. Thompson, in charge of the halibut investigation conducted by the department, contributes to the appendix of this report "A paper on statistics of the halibut fishery of the Pacific—their bearing on the biology of the species and the condition of the banks." Of this paper the report says:

Among the facts presented in the paper, one which stands forth conspicuously is the great effort which the operations of the fishermen have had on the character of the halibut population of the various banks. Not only have they been very extensively depleted, but the proportion of the mature and immature of large and small fish has been radically changed. Extensive fishing has, it is evident, made its influence felt throughout the whole biological appearance of the species, and in doing so it has rendered precarious the future of the banks, particularly the older or longer known. The number of halibut still found on them is so small, and the percentage of mature fish in the population has fallen so low that it

appears that the halibut in the Pacific, like the Atlantic, will drop to a minor position among the food fishes. It is difficult to see wherein more proof of depletion than is here given can be adduced save the final one of commercial extinction of the species.

The rate of decrease on the banks, over 70 per cent. for each decade, is surprisingly large. Yet it must be remembered that the constant shifting to new banks has staved off a portion of the effect of impoverishment. The progress from the banks at Cape Flattery to Hecate Straits, and from there to Yakutat and beyond, has been at a constantly accelerated rate, as the total catch has grown from year to year. When expansion is at an end, as it will inevitably be, the fishing fleet must return to the older known banks, which will then be depleted beyond their present condition unless measures are taken to allow them to recuperate. It is very plain that they cannot support the fishing now existent or anything comparable with it.

Although a prophecy of immediate decline in the total yield would be out of place, the situation which Mr. Thompson makes clear is sufficiently serious to warrant the taking of immediate steps for conservation. The contemplation of experiments on hatching the halibut must lead simply to ill-founded optimism on the part of the fishermen. In the face of the wholesale reduction of the numbers of halibut on the banks, the establishment of hatcheries cannot be regarded as anything but futile, and exceedingly expensive experimental work. The hatching of cod and plaice has been carried on by many governments without any tangible results. In the case of the halibut, nothing could be known as to its results for many years, and unlikely as they are to be of value, those years might incur the ruin of the industry if action

were delayed pending the arrival of a conclusion. It is, therefore, necessary to regard the suggestion of hatchery relief as of purely theoretical (Continued on Page Two.)

## RUSSIA UNCONQUERABLE.

"No power on earth is able to conquer Russia"—The Russian Minister of War in a speech to the Duma Saturday.

On its face the statement may appear somewhat boastful but few greater truths have ever been expressed.

King Charles the XII. of Sweden, Napoleon of France and Wilhelm II. of Germany all attempted to conquer Russia. Each had behind him the greatest military machine of his day. All failed.

The triumphs of Charles of Sweden in Poland were followed by disaster at Pultawa. Napoleon triumphantly crossed the Niemen and forced a passage of the Borodino, victories which ended only in the historic retreat from Moscow. Germany has also won its victories since 1914, but they have been victories which have cost Germany more than they have cost Russia. They have contributed to the defeat to delay which Germany now is desperately struggling.

Russia's history, its millions in population, its enormous productive power, its people's enduring faith in their leaders, the vastness of Russia's territory and the rigor of its climate are cold facts, unshaken by the reverse sustained in the Russo-Japanese war, which remove from the war minister's speech any element of boastfulness.

cal value, and one which may do great harm by misleading those with the interest of the fishery at heart.

Mr. Thompson does not discuss extensively the steps which could be taken to conserve the halibut, but his paper brings out many facts vital to their formulation. The exhausted conditions of the banks off the coast is clearly shown, and established the vital need of their protection during that portion of the year when they are yielding the largest proportion of small and immature fish. Since the main fishing has shifted farther north, there should be no great obstacle to the application of protective measures to the southern banks. Protection to a small area or the establishment of closed zones of comparative limited extent can have no effect on the whole. Effects of close season in various months may be judged from the comparative yields given in Mr. Thompson's tabulations, the value of such closures being in direct proportion to the activity of the fishery at the time they are in force.

SYNOPSIS OF COAL MINING  
REGULATIONS.

Coal mining right of the Dominion in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, the Yukon Territory, the Northwest Territories and a portion of the Province of British Columbia, may be leased for a term of twenty-one years at an annual rental of \$1 per acre. Not more than 2,560 acres will be leased to one applicant.

Applications for a lease must be made by the applicant in person to the Agent or Sub-Agent of the district in which the rights applied for are situated.

In surveyed territory the land must be described by sections, and in unsurveyed territory the tract applied for shall be staked out by the applicant.

Each application must be accompanied by a fee of \$5, which will be refunded if the rights applied for are not available but not otherwise. A royalty shall be paid on the merchantable output of the mine at the rate of five cents per ton.

The person operating the mine shall furnish the Agent with sworn returns accounting for the full quantity of merchantable coal mined and pay the royalty thereon. If the coal mining rights are not being operated, such returns should be furnished at least once a year.

The lease will include the coal mining rights only; but the lessee may be permitted to purchase whatever available surface rights may be considered necessary for the working of the mine at the rate of \$10 per acre.

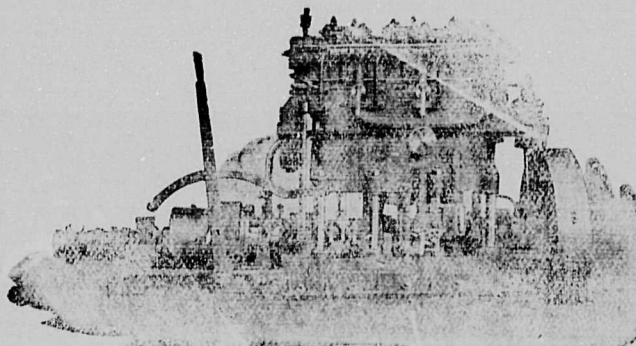
