### German Attempts To Recapture Ground At Notre Dame Has Failed

Paris, March 24.—An official report says:  
"In North Arras the Germans attempted two attacks on a large spur of Notre Dame during the night of March 23-4. Their defeat was complete.  
"In Champagne an attack was attempted against a fortified position at Deusejour which was also repulsed."  
Italy May Come In.  
Geneva, March 24.—Austrian engineers have blown up all the buildings between Sugana Pass, in the Alps, and the fortified Austrian city of Trent, and the Lake Guards have been placed on the Italian frontier. Part of the town of Raveretto was razed to the ground. The intention is, apparently, to prevent an Italian attack in this quarter. All pro-Italians have been interned in the interior.

### Vancouver Wins Another Match

Vancouver, March 24.—In the hockey series of matches for the world's championship which is being played here Vancouver again won from Ottawa. In the match today the score was: Vancouver, 8; Ottawa, 3.

### Fish Day For Canada

At the Board of Trade luncheon held yesterday on board the steamer Prince George, the president, D. G. Stewart, called attention to the fact that Victoria was agitating to have a "Salmon Day" for Canada similar to what prevailed in the United States. Mr. Stewart thought it would be well for the local Board of Trade to consider this matter and discuss the question of whether there should be a "Fish Day" instead of limiting it to salmon. The subject, he thought, was one that should be looked into by Prince Rupert at once.

### British Airships Damage Submarines

London, March 24.—The Admiralty announces that a British air raid has been successfully carried out on the German submarines at Hoboken and at Antwerp. Considerable damage was done to the works there and to two of the submarines.

### COPPER OUTPUT IN THE PROVINCE

BRITISH COLUMBIA IS LOOKED  
TO AS SOURCE OF SUPPLY  
FOR FUTURE.

R. C. Campbell-Johnston Gives Interesting Figures Relative to Subject.

Premier McBride in speaking before the B. C. Mining Institute at Victoria recently commented on the copper output of the Coast region being more than fifty per cent. larger than any previous year's production. This is particularly gratifying at this time when Great Britain is searching the Empire for this metal so necessary for the forging of artillery ordnance and ammunition cases. The Coast district, the Premier pointed out, had been gradually increasing the copper production during recent years. The lower Coast district produced last year 13,070,245 pounds of copper out of a total of 57,020,627 pounds for the past five years. For the whole Coast district 24,199,621 pounds were taken out last year from a total of 68,260,731 for the past five years. This amount was chiefly mined at the Britannia Mines and in Hidden Creek, 36 per cent. of the total for the five years was thus mined in 1914. The total copper production in 1914 is given by the provincial mineralogist as 44,968,541 pounds, worth \$5,845,910.

"The Manufacture of Copper in British Columbia," is the title of an informing article by R. C. Campbell Johnston, mining engineer, in the Industrial Progress for March. He points out that the United States has control of the copper production at present. Great Britain is seeking new fields for raw material and this is British Columbia's opportunity. The minimum amount of copper production in the province required to establish a refinery, Mr. Johnston places at 100,000,000 pounds a year. Granby Company's smelters at Grand Forks and Granby Bay and the Trail smelter will provide an annual output of 50,000,000 pounds of copper. When the new plant at Britannia is running this will double the amount, bringing the total production up to sufficient to warrant the establishment of a refinery at the Coast.

Such being the possibilities of the copper mining industry in British Columbia, there is here another justification for the government's railway policy in pushing to completion new railway lines, to make more profitable the working of old mineral areas and to ensure the opening of new mines.

### BOWSER UNANIMOUS CHOICE OF DELEGATES

The Attorney-General Was Tendered A Complimentary Nomination--Not A Dissenting Voice Was Heard In Vancouver Convention--Marked Honor Shown Minister

Hon. W. J. Bowser, the Attorney-General of the province, whose nomination, together with the other Conservative standard bearers for Vancouver, was announced in these columns last Sunday, was given a most flattering reception in his home constituency. The exchanges to hand from the south with details show that Mr. Bowser was tendered a complimentary nomination. He was the unanimous choice of the nominating convention.

As soon as the chairman called for nominations, Mr. R. R. Maitland said he thought the convention would do itself great honor by acceding a unanimous nomination to Mr. Bowser, independently and separately from the other five candidates chosen by the convention. He therefore proposed that this should be done. Continuing, he said: "This convention in passing the resolution will fittingly answer the multitudinous charges, all of them false, made against the Attorney-General in regard to certain alleged miscarriages of justice. Mr. Bowser has always been ready to meet and answer fair charges. He has wiped away charge after charge. He is the best Attorney-General in Canada today. (Cheers.) I say this advisedly. I say it discreetly. One of the most brilliant lawyers in the city, and he is on the other side of politics, told me there was no Attorney-General in Canada to compare in ability with Mr. Bowser and he knew them."

### Russian Victories Reported From Points Of Attack On The Eastern Front

Petrograd, March 24.—An official announcement says:  
"On the right bank of the Narow River on the Skwa-Orzyo front engagements for the possession of isolated points of vantage are assuming a more general and at the same time an extremely desperate character. Our troops are making slow but sure progress, capturing trenches and heights.  
"Near Vakh-Karask our troops went to the attack with self-sacrificing valor. They gained the day, taking 300 prisoners, eight machine guns, and two trench mortars.  
"On the left bank of the Vistula six army corps at the final attack, the Germans were forced to evacuate Domanowitz. Firm counter-attacks were repulsed.  
"In the Carpathians our troops are advancing. They have seized several fortified heights. Everywhere the counter-attacks of the enemy have been unsuccessful."  
Many Surrendered.  
Commander Kusmanek of the Przemysl forces when he capitulated surrendered nine generals, 2,593 officers, 117,000 men, and 2,400 guns, of which 1,000 were heavy cannon. An imperial edict changes the name to Pernysl. The Russians had taken six army corps at the final attack.

## DISORGANIZED PARTY.

The postponement of the provincial election is having the effect of showing the utter weakness of the Liberal opposition. Goaded forward by the fact that they believed the campaign was to be a short one, that party made heroic efforts to conceal the fact that it was a party divided into all kinds of factions and bound together only by one great desire to get into power. When it was announced that the date had been altered from what was originally intended that party began to show its disorganized condition.

Only in the north has the disintegration of the party been concealed and that by the most heroic of methods. A triumvirate of candidates in this city boldly went in and, dividing the territory among them, announced themselves conquerors, usurping the positions of representatives of the party. When election day comes these will meet their punishment, not only at the hands of the Conservatives but also at the hands of the independent Liberals who still believe in the rights of all in the party being protected.

In Vancouver the split has become so pronounced that the nominating convention of the Liberals had to be adjourned without any nominations, pending some kind of healing being effected. Joe Martin, who claims to have come from Sir Wilfrid Laurier with extraordinary powers to act as his ambassador in British Columbia, is being most bitterly attacked by the Sun and F. Wade, although the Sun in its articles of incorporation takes the duty upon itself to promulgate for time and for eternity only doctrines that will advance the interests of the Liberal party as represented by Sir Wilfrid Laurier, his political heirs and assigns in perpetuity.

Vancouver will, in common with the other seats in the south, return the solid Conservative ticket duly selected from a convention of regularly elected delegates.

Mr. Nunn, representing Borden's Creams, is in the city.

## FISH LUNCHEON OF BOARD OF TRADE

(Continued from Page One.)

"Your Board is unfortunate in having for its president this year one not gifted in the fine art of oratory. On an occasion such as this it would be my privilege and pleasure, were I so gifted, to say a great many nice things about our fisheries com-

mittee in general, and Mr. G. W. Nickerson, the chairman of that committee, in particular.

"Mr. Nickerson, as you are all aware, has been indefatigable in his efforts in connection with the fisheries concessions. For the past three years he has labored morning, noon and night thinking fish, and no doubt eating fish once in a while in order to spur himself to further effort. To his efforts more than any other individual the honor must be given, and it is now my great pleasure and privilege as president of the Prince Rupert Board of Trade to officially congratulate him and tender him the thanks of the Board for having, through thick and thin, fought a good and successful fight for the concessions recently granted, which undoubtedly will result in a great increase of business to the merchants of Prince Rupert.

"We shall now have the pleasure of hearing from Mr. Nickerson and afterwards the commissioner will give you some interesting facts in connection with the fish business."

G. W. Nickerson, speaking on behalf of the fisheries committee of the Board of Trade, said they felt the honor done them but he felt that what they had done did not warrant such. He said they owed a great deal to Mr. Clements, the Member. He had done a great deal for this city. He had no doubt impressed upon the Minister at Ottawa the advantages that would come from this concession. If something were not done here his efforts would be belittled. The disadvantage here was the fact that there were not enough buyers of fish here. It was necessary, he felt, to have a common fish wharf here. If the city fell down in its efforts the citizens would have to step in. The cost would not be great. About \$15,000 would do it. It would not matter whether the individual got returns for the money invested so long as the general advantages were attained.

F. S. Wright, the commissioner was called upon to address the gathering. He said:

"Mr. President and members of the Board of Trade, the following figures gathered from data on file at the Bureau of Information may be of use in showing not only the future, but also the present prospects of the fishing industry of Prince Rupert.

"The general line of argument taken as to this industry is usually based on the future value of it to Prince Rupert. While the future since the granting of the concessions has assumed a very rosy aspect, it will be apparent from the figures I quote that not only are the fishing trade future prospects of Prince Rupert very promising, but that in addition the city of Prince Rupert as an active competitor for the trade of the Northern Pacific fisheries has already arrived.

"As you all know, her strategic position with the new direct rail connection with the eastern market gives the port of Prince Rupert the key to the situation. With the concessions already obtained added—and united determination to make the most of them—Prince Rupert will in 1915 and future years begin to assume the place she is entitled to in this industry.

"The figures given show that the fishing trade is even now coming to the port in fast increasing volume. Month after month shows a steady increase in receipts. Out of a total

of about 16 million pounds of halibut landed at British Columbia ports in 1914 our share was over 9 million pounds, valued at \$460,000. That of Southern British Columbia was roughly 6 millions or 8 millions, including about 2 million of American fish landed at Vancouver.

"Up to August, 1914, Prince Rupert shipped nothing as far as this industry was concerned to the eastern markets by direct route. In September the railway service was started. Now note these figures: From September to December, 1914, the monthly average of fish products shipped to eastern markets direct over the transcontinental was 948,668 pounds per month. In January 1915, a total of 1,497,000 pounds. In February, 1915, 978,656. The total value of these shipments was approximately \$356,295.

"In addition 900,000 pounds of herring was received and 125,000 pounds of cod, besides a considerable quantity of shell fish, etc.

"The total value of fish received in 1914 at the port of Prince Rupert being nearly \$500,000. Not so bad for a young industry, is it?

"Seattle's receipts were roughly as to the halibut trade 48 million pounds, valued at 2 1/2 million dollars. Her total halibut fishing fleet number 97 deep sea fishing vessels, with a total crew of 1,209 men. The average earnings of these men are

around \$1,400 per annum, on the percentage basis. They, in addition to others engaged in the handling and distribution of this product, are worth going after, are they not? Well, you can get them. But in order to do so you must be able to supply their wants on a cheaper basis. At the present time the city of Prince Rupert can furnish bulk goods such as flour, canned goods, etc., at Vancouver prices, but coffee, teas, sugar, etc., are all too high. Ice is costing \$3 per ton at Ketchikan and \$5 at Prince Rupert. Bait is costing \$20 per ton at Ketchikan and \$25 at Prince Rupert, and distillate is almost double. Of course, we expect and have been urging reduction; in some cases a reduction has been promised, but it is altogether too slow in coming. We have to render an account of our stewardship at Ottawa next December in regard to the concessions, recently obtained if we want them renewed. Therefore, we have to make a showing in 1915 to justify our asking for that renewal. This means that action—immediate action—is necessary if Prince Rupert is to get the full benefits she is entitled to.

"In addition, we are apt in the struggle for the deep sea fishing trade, to forget that part of the fishing trade, which is already fully established in the northern part of British Columbia. I refer to the salmon industry.

"This industry was here before the city of Prince Rupert was on the map, and at present practically the whole of the benefit derived therefrom goes to Vancouver and the south. In addition most of the supplies used come from the south. It has a capital investment of approximately 4 1/2 million dollars, and its revenue for 1914 was approximately \$2,297,870. It employs about 4,000 men during the season, yet what percentage of this trade has Prince Rupert received? True, it became firmly established in the south before we were in a position to compete, but the coming of the railway to Prince Rupert has changed all this. We are now the rightful centre for this trade. It is ours by right of position and production. We have advantages innumerable over other points, but there are also obstacles in the path, which only united effort on the part of all citizens of Prince Rupert, irrespective of everything, can remove.

"Gentlemen, Prince Rupert's population in 1915 is around 6,000. It is for ourselves and ourselves alone to say what it shall be in 1925. We have it in our own hands."

## SYNOPSIS OF COAL MINING REGULATIONS.

Coal mining rights of the Dominion in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, the Yukon Territory, the Northwest Territories and a portion of the Province of British Columbia, may be leased for a term of twenty-one years at an annual rental of \$1 per acre. Not more than 2,560 acres will be leased to one applicant. Applications for a lease must be made by the applicant in person to the Agent or Sub-Agent of the district in which the rights apply for a lease.

In surveyed territory the land must be described by sections, or legal subdivisions of sections, and in unsurveyed territory the tract applied for shall be staked out by the applicant himself.

Each application must be accompanied by a fee of \$5, which will be refunded if the rights applied for are not available, but not otherwise. A royalty shall be paid on the merchantable output of the mine at the rate of five cents per ton.

The person operating the mine shall furnish the Agent with sworn returns accounting for the full quantity of merchantable coal mined and pay the royalty thereon. If the coal mining rights are not being operated, such returns should be furnished at least once a year.

The lease will include the coal mining rights only; but the lessee may be permitted to purchase whatever available surface rights may be considered necessary for the working of the mine at the rate of \$10 per acre.
