Lloyd's annual summary of the world's shipbuilding for the year 1914, which has just been received on this side of the Atlantic, shows 1,319 vessels, steam and sail, with a the world during the past year. Warships and vessels of less than 100 tons tonnage are excluded from this total. Sailing vessels numbered 225 with a gross tonnage of 67,368 tons Vessels built in the United Kingdon numbered 656 (621 steam and 35 sail), with a tonnage of 1,683,553 In other countries they numbered 663 (473 steam and 190 sail), with total gross tonnage of 1,169,200 n 1913, the total of the world output of vessels over 100 tons was 1,750, with a total tonnage of 3.


