

CANADIAN MASTERS TO REPORT SUSPICIOUS CRAFT LOCAL SERBIANS AND MONTENEGRINS OFF TO FIGHT

FOUR WOMEN WERE GIVEN SENTENCES

APPEAL TAKEN TO JUDGE YOUNG
WHO WILL HEAR EVIDENCE
IN SEPTEMBER

In The Meantime The Convicted Ones
Are Out On
Bail.

After proceeding with the case of Georgie Petite and Alva O'Neil, and a conviction being secured in each case in the police court, it was decided by A. M. Manson and L. W. Patmore consul for the women, not to put in the evidence in the other two cases, but to take convictions and appeal from the judgment.

They argued that the weight of evidence was against a conviction, and pressed strongly for a dismissal. Leave has been granted by Judge Young for an appeal. The matter of bail was settled and the appeal will be heard in September, after the legal holidays are past.

TRAVEL ACROSS ATLANTIC IN WAR TIME DESCRIBED

Mrs. Ernest A. Woods Tells Of Her
Trip By The Adriatic A Few
Weeks Ago.

The following is an extract from a letter received by her husband, from Mrs. Ernest A. Woods, who left New York for Liverpool on the s.s. "Adriatic" on the 27th of May, 1915:

"There wasn't anything very exciting happened on the way. The second day out the captain ordered everyone to be moved into the staterooms on the upper decks, so there was no one on a level with the dining-room. Having an outside room is of no benefit now, for all the port holes are covered with black paper like building paper, and at night are covered with a dark blanket; we are not allowed to have them open at all. There were no lights in the corridors at night, excepting red dim lights to enable you to find your way about, and the decks were all screened off so that the lights from the library and smoke-rooms could not be seen, or lights from men smoking. The stewards had to instruct everyone how to put on their lifebelts, and they brought a small one for Doreen. They were all laid out ready. It was really surprising to see everyone so calm, and no one seemed the least worried. I could never have believed I could have felt so easy in my mind as I did once I was on the boat, and everyone said the same thing.

"Everyone was a little anxious, of course, when we neared the Irish Coast. All the lifeboats were lowered to the lower deck, and we had orders to assemble in the library if anything happened to the boat. We got in the Channel about 7 p.m. There was a concert on board that night, but Mrs. Hardy and I went to bed at 9 p.m. and slept till 12 p.m. We didn't take off our clothes or Doreen's. After that we never slept a wink, for everyone was running about all night. The crew weren't allowed to go to bed.

"McLean told me that a destroyer met the boat at 12 p.m. and signalled to her to change her course, and that they got word from the Admiralty that there were six submarines waiting for us, so the captain changed his course 60 miles further south,

SUSPECTED CRAFT TO BE REPORTED

MASTERS OF VESSELS TO KEEP
LOOKOUT FOR EVERYTHING
SUSPICIOUS

All Classes Of Vessels Are Asked To
Keep On The
Watch.

From the department at Ottawa has come an order to all masters of vessels navigating the coasts of Canada, to keep a look out for suspicious craft. The order reads as follows:

"The Master of all vessels navigating Canadian waters are warned as to the necessity of keeping a sharp look out and reporting any suspicious craft they may sight.

"Small fishing and coasting vessels are particularly urged to at once report any such craft to the nearest Customs Officer for transmission, by telegraph on the East Coast, to the Captain in Charge, Halifax Dockyard, and on the West Coast to the Superintendent, Esquimalt Dockyard.

"It is not desired that any hearsay evidence should be forwarded, but only definite facts."

HUGE CANNERY DEAL CLOSED AT SEATTLE

Gorman & Co. Dispose Of Holdings
To Booth Fisheries For Price
Of \$1,000,000.

In one of the largest deals ever consummated in the fishing industry of the Northwest, control of the cannery properties of T. J. Gorman & Company passed into the hands of the Anacortes Fisheries Company, a subsidiary of the Booth Fisheries Company, of Chicago.

The reported purchase price is approximately \$1,000,000.

and talk about travelling, we did go. In the morning the decks were about one-quarter inch thick with soot and grit. It was very foggy also, so I think that was a help to us, as submarines are of no use in fog.

"We all felt relieved when we got to the Mersey and the pilot came on board. We had beautiful weather all the way and not the least bit rough, excepting when we were off the Welsh Coast, when it was so bitterly cold no one could stay on deck. We docked at Liverpool at 4 p.m. but didn't get off until 6:30 p.m. We were in the dining-room all that time passing the Inspector. It was so tiring, he was so strict. Everyone with cameras had to unload them and hand over the films, etc., which will be returned to the owners after being developed, if they are all right. The "Adriatic" brought a record cargo; she was loaded down; they wouldn't allow a bit more on in New York, and it was all war material. We had 250 transport waggons alone. Her cargo was valued at four million pounds (\$20,000,000), so no wonder the Germans wanted to get her."

SERBS AND MONTENEGRINS ARE LEAVING ON THURSDAY

Local Citizens Contributed To Fund Raised On Their
Behalf—Magnanimous Action On The Part Of Those
Volunteering Who Voted It To Red Cross Work

On Thursday morning there will be a very considerable number of Serbians and Montenegrins who have been resident in this city and nearby leave for the front. They are in common with the subjects of the other nations that are at war against Germany and Austria, anxious to go to the front and serve with the colors.

This move is being made in a concerted way, in reply to a call from the governments of these countries. There has been a very general answer to the call from these people living in this section of the country. They will take the train here and proceed to eastern Canada, where they will be taken in charge of by the representatives of the countries concerned, who will have the men sent on to join their own armies.

In Prince Rupert there are now about 75 of these people ready to leave. This is in addition to a large number that has already left. In Montreal it is said that there are about 25,000 of these people answering the call of the government, and leaving for their own land to serve with the army in the war against Germany and Austria and their allies.

Yesterday afternoon W. E. Williams and J. G. Scott made a tour of the citizens, for the purpose of getting some small fund to mark the appreciation which was felt by the people of this city, at the ready response that was being made by the Serbians and the Montenegrins in the common cause. The sum of about

\$140 was readily raised, and when it came to handing it over, those leaving for the front were asked to consider the question and decide how they would like to see the money spent on their behalf. By an unanimous decision they asked that the money be given over to the Red Cross Societies of their own countries, Serbia and Montenegro. This course will be followed therefore.

The action on the part of the volunteers for the front, is all the more worthy of praise, in view of the fact that there are a number of those who are leaving on Thursday morning, who are anything but well provided for in the way of getting meals on their way east. They, however, decided that they would rather see the money sent to the relief of the wounded than have it expended on themselves in any way.

The body that is prepared to leave is a splendid collection of men. They are men who for the most part have been accustomed to hard work, and are in shape for any kind of training that may be put upon them. They are enthusiastic about taking part in the war, and will leave with the greatest willingness. There will be a number at the station on Thursday to see them off.

NEW TEACHERS FOR CITY SCHOOLS

AN ASSISTANT FOR THE HIGH
SCHOOL HAS BEEN
SELECTED

Another Added To The Staff Of
The Public
School.

At a meeting of the School Board held yesterday afternoon, it was decided to appoint Mrs. Klower, of this city on the teaching staff of the school. Mrs. Klower, formerly taught in Toronto schools, and brings high testimonials for efficiency from that city. She has since coming to Prince Rupert, three years ago, qualified under the British Columbia regulations as a teacher in this province.

An appointment was also made of an assistant teacher for the High School. The choice made was that of Miss McLenaghan, B. A., who has been teaching for a few years in Vancouver. She is a graduate of Manitoba University, and has had a thorough training as a teacher, as well as having considerable experience in the practical work of teaching.

GREAT NEED TO KEEP MONEY IN PROVINCE

Deputy Minister Of Agriculture Says
Permanent Prosperity Can Only
Come By Support Of B. C.
Farmers.

At a meeting of the Consumers' League held in Vancouver, W. E. Scott, Deputy Minister of Agriculture, pointed out the very great need for producers and consumers to get together in order that some \$22,000,000 now being sent out of this province for agricultural products may be kept here.

"There is imported into this province agricultural products to the value of \$25,199,125, or about 83 per cent. of the amount produced here, which is slightly over \$29,000,000. Of this amount imported fully 88 per cent. can be grown here, or \$22,144,000.

"In the consumption of dairy products there is a total of \$7,501,000, of which \$4,489,051 worth are imported. This is 66 per cent. of the total which comes from places outside the province.

"Of fruits the province sold to the neighboring provinces of Alberta and Saskatchewan a little over \$1,000,000. On the other hand there was imported into this province \$440,000 worth in these commodities from the United States. Some of the fruits of the United States are from 10 to 14 days earlier than those grown in this province. But there is no reason why the consumer in this province should pay more if by waiting they can get as good or better fruit. I ask you to hold back in the purchase of your fruit for canning purposes until our own fruit comes in.

"In vegetables we are importing \$27,721 worth, of those we can grow in this province. In poultry we imported \$1,400,000 net in the various products. Last year Vancouver consumed 500,000 dozen Chinese eggs. If the consumers were to read the report of the California commission as to the conditions under which Chinese eggs are grown, I am sure they would never use another Chinese egg.

Austria offers part of Bukovina in return for a friendly neutrality.

Trade Licences

NOTICE

Pursuant to Bylaw 255 governing above, also resolution of Council dated July 12th.

All licences are due and payable on July 15, 1915, and must be paid forthwith.

Section 33 of this Bylaw provides the following:

"Any person guilty of a breach of this bylaw, or who carries on any profession, trade, occupation or calling for which a licence or tax is provided for in this bylaw, without having first taken out such licence and having paid the licence fee or tax herein provided, shall be liable on summary conviction to a penalty of twenty-five dollars (\$25) together with the licence fee or tax which should have been paid, and in default of payment, to imprisonment for sixty (60) days.

The Bylaw also declares:

"It shall be the duty of every person or company holding a licence under this bylaw, to exhibit such licence at all times in a conspicuous place in his office or place of business, so that the same may be seen by the officials of the City and any person doing business with them.

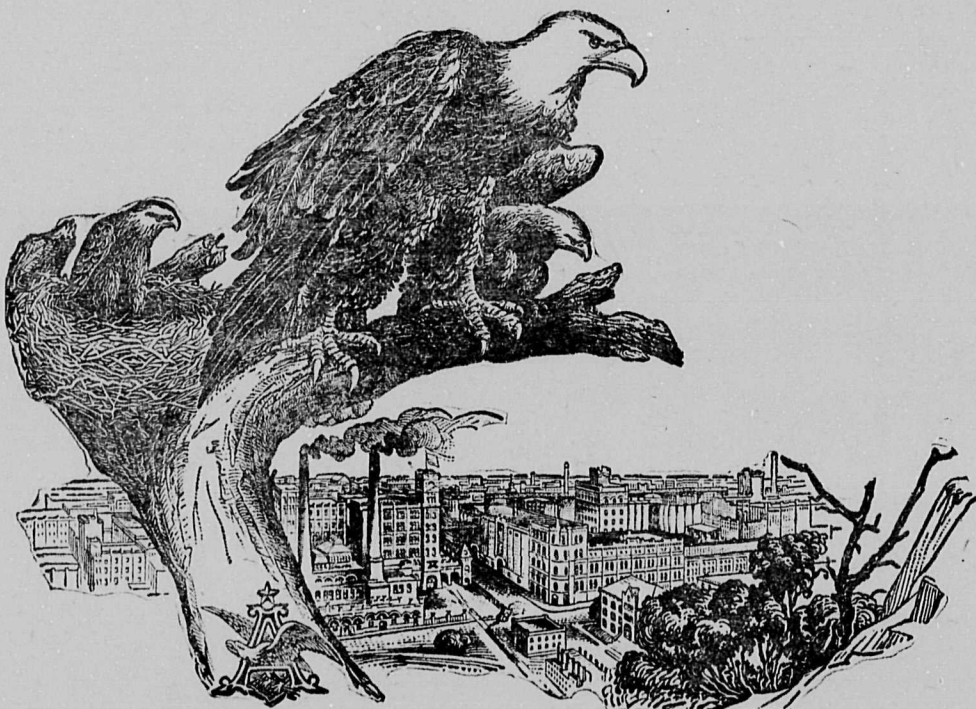

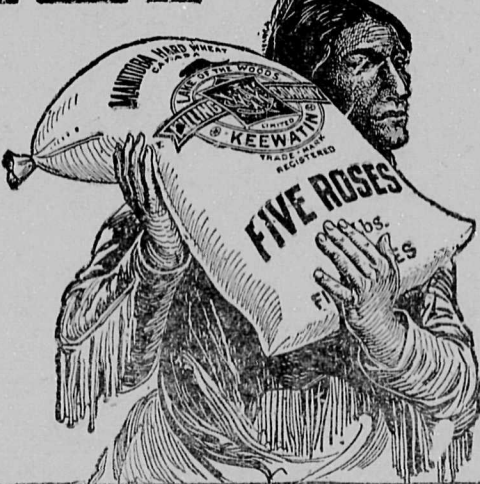

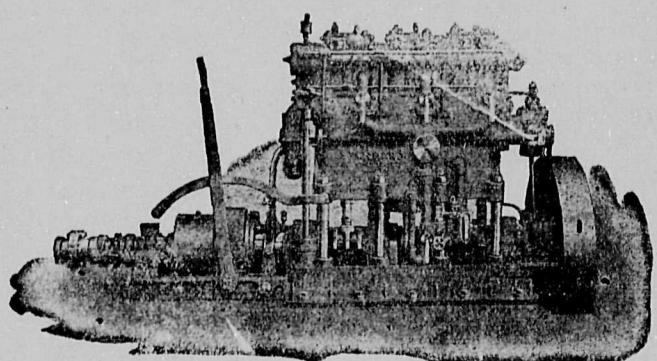

SYNOPSIS OF COAL MINING REGULATIONS.

Coal mining rights of the Domini-
on in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and
Alberta, the Yukon Territory, the
Northwest Territories and a portion
of the Province of British Columbia,
may be leased for a term of twenty-
one years at an annual rental of
\$1 per acre. Not more than 2,560
acres will be leased to one applicant.
Applications for a lease must be
made by the applicant in person to
the Agent or Sub-Agent of the dis-
trict in which the rights applied for
are situated.

In surveyed territory the land
must be described by sections, or
legal subdivisions of sections, and
in unsurveyed territory the tract ap-
plied for shall be staked out by the
applicant himself.

Each application must be accom-
panied by a fee of \$5, which will be
refunded if the rights applied for are
not available, but not otherwise. A
royalty shall be paid on the mer-
chantable output of the mine at the
rate of five cents per ton.

The person operating the mine
shall furnish the Agent with sworn
returns accounting for the full
quantity of merchantable coal mined
and pay the royalty thereon. If the
coal mining rights are not being op-
erated, such returns should be fur-
nished at least once a year.

The lease will include the coal
mining rights only; but the lessee
may be permitted to purchase what-
ever available surface rights may be
considered necessary for the work-
ing of the mine at the rate of \$10
per acre.

perity if it neglects agriculture. Urban
development cannot precede
rural development and be built on a
sound basis. Of the remedies there
are two. A policy of education is very
essential. We must educate the farm-
er to produce the greatest quantity at
the least expense. It is very neces-
sary that the farmers get together
in some co-operative system. In the
second place we must eliminate and
do away with little district rivalries
and personal animosities.

"I shall never be satisfied until
I see the farmers organized and the
consumers as well. It is only by
that means that we can keep this
great amount of money in the prov-
ince."
