Lillooet, learn to luxuriate in leisure now. Get all the good you can out of it because the railroad is coming when no man can rest. Then no more long walks or silent smokes. The merchant will have no time to devote to birds, bees, dogs or trees; or run up the hill and stick a stick of powder in a quartz vein. The printer will be unable to sit with his feet in the oven making up news. Instead of two days to a mail it will be two mails to a day. The policeman will have to handle hoboes hidden in every train. The barber, butcher, baker, and blacksmith all busy as bees and perhaps advertising. The attorney will desert his garden, and the telegrapher find no time to set the sun dial. In a year after we will be sighing for the old times, and be considered antediluvians.

Mr. Archie McDonald in a Lillooet letter says the Estimates will be brought down this coming week; and should the Government decide to bring down a railway policy this session, it will be on the lines of contracts which mean actual and immediate construction.

The "man in the gallery" says that the up country members are actively engaged in assisting the deliberations of the Government in caucus meetings on railway matters, with a view of facilitating early action.

The appropriation for rural schools is to be \$490 instead of 450. Comin' up.

GAME QUESTION.

Lillooet, Mar. 28.

Sir,

I am afraid, from reading Mr. Martley's letter in the Prospector, that I did not make myself sufficiently explicit, relative to the tax on hunters and guides, and he, in common with the rest of us, objects to any increase to his probably already excessive taxes, and kicks.

My idea is as follows.—

A tax of \$100 a year for chief guides and \$50 for second guides with a clause to the effect that guides convicted of hunting out of season should be suspended for a year or two for the first offence, and entirely debarred on the second.

This would limit the number of professional guides, and help to keep up rates, and institute a body of men in different parts of the Province, interested in the preservation of game, and in the nature of experts able to help in drawing up laws pertaining to sport.

On the subject of game wardens I must respectfully disagree with Mr. M. as I think if efficient men were appointed and did their duty, that the shooting of does and possibly ewes in early spring would cease. If there had been a game warden on the North Fork two weeks ago, the treasury would have been somewhat richer, and certain Siwash some-

what poorer, or else residing for a period at Kamloops; or there would have been more does and possibly ewes, to keep up stock on the range. It is to be hoped that wardens will be appointed for their competency, and not on account of their political or other pull; and will not consider themselves assessors, of which the Province has enough.

I quite think that steps should be taken to protect both sheep and deer from the ravages of cougar, coyotes, etc. But will Mr. Martley kindly specify what steps he proposes to take, and which of the already heavily taxed industries he would hand over to be further shorn; as apparently he thinks that the imposition of any taxes on men who travel thousands of miles at vast expense, and must therefore be well fixed financially—to be the height of wickedness: and since the protection of the game must cost something, how will the money be raised.

EMPIRE VALLEY

Mr. J. N. J. Brown, writing in the year book of B. C. says:—

This country is chiefly a grazing section with prairie land, well watered and timbered. Large numbers of cattle are annually raised. Grain is also grown, the ruling price 2c. Apples are successfully grown at McEwen's, and Leaser Dog Creek, Alkali Lake, Big Bar and Dog Creek. Plums and cherries are grown in places. Small fruits do well. Oats, a ton to the acre. There is a great quantity of potatoes grown for table use and hogs. The horse industry has been quite profitable. This is the best country in B. C. for sheep. Ruling prices, \$8 for sheep, \$5 for lambs. Many pigs are raised, and nearly all bought by Chinese Miners, who pay 5 to 6 cents on foot; the balance make bacon for home use.

Irrigation is required for crops, and plenty of water available; ditching costs 75c a yard. The land is mostly taken up in the heart of the settlement. Improved farms can be bought, but fetch good prices.

Labour, whitemen, 1.50 a day or 30.00 a month. Chinese 20.00 as cooks: and Indians 1.50 a day. White labor scarce.

Fir Seeds wanted,

For export, seeds of Douglas Fir and cedar
I will pay for clean seed \$1.50 for fir and \$2
for cedar per pound.

The seed can be secured by gathering the
cones from the trees, and spreading them on
a tight floor, or on sheets; or on paper in a
dry room. In a few days the cones will open
and the seeds drop out by stirring them occa-
sionally.

Then clean the seed by using a sieve, or by
pouring from one dish into another, in a light
breeze, to separate light seed and dirt.

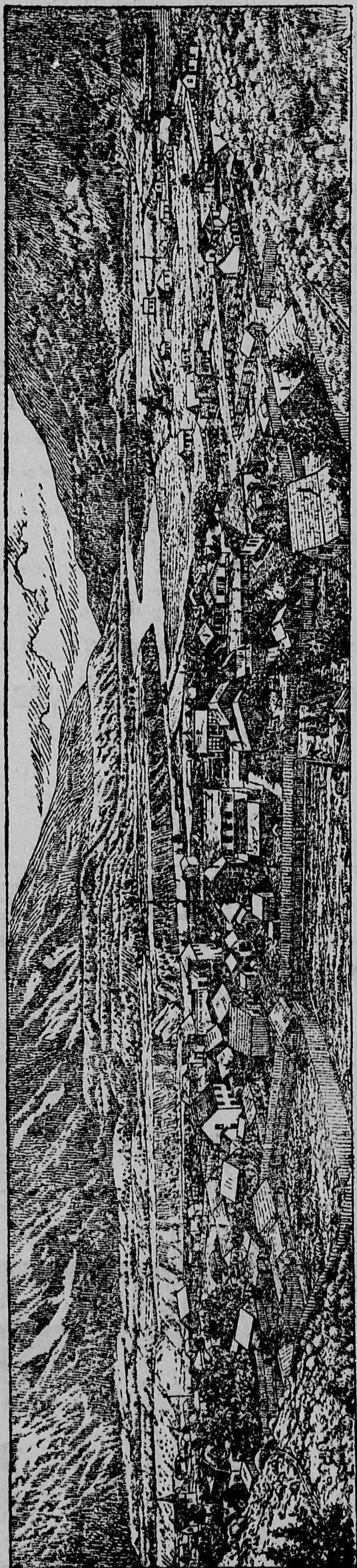
