## NEW MINING ACT TO AID DEVELOPMENT

Victoria March 20.—Under the new mining act, brought down today, the province is to be divided into six districts. In each district the lieutenant-governor-in-council may appoint a qualified engineer and may also employ such additional men as required. Each engineer shall devote his whole time to his district, shall hold office at the pleasure of the government and be under direction and control of the minister of mines. The lieutenant-governor-in-council will fix the salaries.

The duties of these engineers shall be to make a mineral survey of his district, keep comprehensive records, make regular reports to the mining department. He shall have a seal of office.

Provisions in aid of prospectors and miners declare the district engineer shall assist them, so far as practicable by giving them information as to ground open for location, by examination of samples and advising as to the best method of analysis. Sampling, assay, etc., reporting to the department location of roads and trails and their cost, and generally, by advising the prospector to the best of his ability.

No engineer during his office nor for three years afterwards may locate directly or indirectly any mineral claim or mine or directly or indirectly acquire an interest in any mining property in his district.

The measure gives the minister of mines power to employ drills for ascertaining the location and extent of ore bodies. This shall be done upon the application of a free miner, company or mining partnership, upon the recommendation of the district engineer, upon the terms that the cost of all drilling or boring shall be first charge upon the property. Any such debts, whether arising out of work done at the request of the owner or the recommendation of the engineer, shall be payable by taking ten per cent of the value of any ore or mineral got from the property, by charging and recovering on sale, by foreclosure or sale after three years.

The protection of wage earners is provided for by a provision in every bond by a clause that during such bond or option the employees shall be paid semi-monthly and the person acquiring bond or option shall furnish the gold commissioner, recorder or government agent with adequate security from time to time for wages.

H. Graham, Indian Agent, spent a few days here recently, collecting data concerning the public road blocked by the P.G.E.

W. W. Jones of Fairhaven ranch, arrived in town this week with five head of horses from the Half-way, Lytton road. He is on his way home and intends to make things fly this summer.

Canada now has its own hospital ship to take back its discharged and wounded. Colonel Foster who is now in charge of the medical services in England, has arranged with the admiralty for a liner which will be continuously in the service.

Ten thousand dollars worth of beaver skins have been confiscated by Deputy Game Warden Lafournier of Gracefield, Que. The skins were being shipped from the Hudson's Bay to Bruno Wyers New York, and were confiscated on their arrival at Gracefield.

The naval air service department is looking for more men for the Royal Naval Air Service, and the list has been re-opened after having been closed on December last. Applicants must be between the ages of 19 and 23 inclusive, of good eyesight, perfect nerve. There will be no preliminary training in Canada, all the training being carried out in England. Canada has already contributed upwards of 350 men to the naval flying service.

An order-in-council has been passed at Ottawa which prohibits the granting of homesteads or rights of any kind to any person "who was not at the commencement of the present war, and who has not since continued to be, a British subject or a subject of a country which is an ally of His Majesty in the present war, or the subject of a neutral country, and who establishes the same to the satisfaction of the Minister of the Interior."

## GERMANS IN RETREAT

Sweeping advances against the Germans over all of about a hundred miles by the British and French armies and additional gains by the Russians and British over the Turks in Turkish Armenia, Persia and Mesopotamia are the outstanding features in the war news.

The important towns of Perrone, Chaulnes and Nesle on more than sixty villages have been taken by the British troops on a front of some forty-five miles and King George's men are continuing the pursuit of the retreating Germans. At some points Sunday incursions into German positions were to a depth of over ten miles. Operations were carried out on a front running from Arras to Chaulnes.

A new map has been issued by the Railway Lands Branch, Department of the Interior, Ottawa, which will no doubt be hailed with pleasure by the merchantile and professional community; it is entitled the Judicial District Map. The merchant, farmer or other citizen of the West, as well as the wholesaler of the East, has oftentimes noted the paucity of information with regard to the exact location of the points at which sittings of the courts are held, or at which title deeds or other important documents of a similar nature may be registered. This data is of obvious benefit and importance to all those having matters of a litigious nature in hand. The new publication shows, by an elaborate, but not complicated, colour scheme, the location of both land registration and judicial districts, in the Provinces of Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta. Certain towns containing both Court House and Registry Office are indicated on the map by a circle of one colour, while those containing one, but not both of these conveniences, are shown by a circle of a distinctive nature. Where the county court, as distinguished from the Supreme, or Court of King's Bench - sits, this too is indicated. These places which are the centres of land titles or land registration districts, are shown on the map by boundary lines of different colours.

Application to the Superintendent of Railway Lands Branch, Department of the Interior, Ottawa, will secure a copy of this useful map, gratis.

The British line in France is now 30 miles longer than it was last summer. This releases some 250,000 French troops for service elsewhere.

More than 18,000 vessels arrived and departed from British ports during February. Out of this number sixty-one ships of more than 1,000 tons and thirty-three under that size were sunk. This is less than one in every hundred. Two million tons of new ships are nearing completion now in British yards, while large contracts have been placed abroad.

Raymond Leighton, a returned soldier, disabled from service by a wound in the shoulder, obtained during one of the early battles in Belgium, and is a native son of Cariboo riding, is touring the constituency conferring with prominent Liberals with a view to having his name placed before the Liberal convention to be held in May as Liberal candidate.

## Chief of Police is Killed in Gunfight With Negro

In one of the most sensational and horrible triple tragedies Vancouver has ever experienced, Police Chief M. B. MacLennan was shot dead, George Robb, a lad of eight, who resides at 548 Georgia Street east, was fatally shot by a stray bullet, and Detective John Cameron was seriously wounded, all by firearms in the hands of Robert Tate, a giant negro and notorious character known to all the police of every city on the coast. Tate afterwards died by his own hand, blowing the top of his head off, after the apartments he occupied at 522 Georgia Street east had been the scene of a spectacular siege for over two hours and scores of shots were fired. Frankie E. Russell, white, a woman of the underworld who shared the apartments with Tate, surrendered to the police and is now in custody. The Russell woman was also known under the aliases of Edith Rice and Annie Harris.

The whole trouble started when Tate held a gun up to the face of his landlord, Frank King, who had called to collect rent after 6 o'clock. Mr. King, at 7.30 p.m., reported the matter to the police.

Tate who is well-known to the police of Vancouver as a confirmed "hophead," shut himself up in his room with the woman, when Detective demanded entrance about 7.30 p.m. He is believed to have been full of the drug at the time and told Detective Russell that he "would go under" before he would come out at the commands of the force. A few minutes later he started firing at the detectives bringing down Cameron and another shot grazing the right side of Russell's face and hitting the Robb boy who walking on the street below.

**ANOTHER MISTAKE**

The German authorities seem to have once more mistaken their ability to do things in the way of the proposed conquest of the world. It seems probable that upwards of sixty submarines were put out of business in the month succeeding their proclamation of piracy. The "sink at sight" policy has not answered. That project of subduing the nations has failed. It must be relegated to the limbo in which the costly gas-bags named Zeppelins have evidently gone. And by the way Count Zeppelin has permanently gone to limbo himself.

All the same the Germans have committed a number of cruel murders with their submarines as they also did with their zeppelins. Helpless women and children were drowned by the sink at sight policy. During the time that zeppelin raids were in vogue many innocent persons in England suffered death or mutilation, and homes were destroyed. There are families in various countries that will never be quite the same again because of the atrocious activities of the U-boats and the deadly though ineffectual airships.

High angle guns and watchful aeroplanes have about settled the zeplins. The American shoot-at-sight method—adopted after much talk about it—and the arming of merchant ships, together with the operations of the British and French navies will no doubt deal with the U-boats effectively.

But that is not enough. Complete justice can scarcely be looked for, because so many murderers have been abroad. But the world would feel a certain relief if the Kaiser and his chief myrmidons were brought to the scaffold. Their execution would be a good beginning when negotiations for peace begin.

**A SENSIBLE REPORT**

A very instructive report has been issued by a Commission appointed by the Ontario Government to consider unemployment in that province and to recommend permanent measures of reform. One of the results of their investigations is that the Commissioners have much to say about immigration. And they recognize that after the war there will be a great influx of immigrants

into Canada.

They point out that very often the wrong kind of people have been induced to come to Canada by the emigration agents. Sometimes, when the new comers have been of the right sort, many of them have been allowed to drift into a position of helplessness—for sheer lack of alert and well-informed leadership. The cities in which many experienced yet farmless farmers stagnated were only a few hours removed from good unbroken land. Means must be employed to prepare the land for them.

It is the judgment of the Ontario Commission that after the conclusion of peace this country will owe a lasting debt to those who have fought the awful battle for human freedom and democratic principles. It should be possible to unite the Imperial and Dominion Governments in a policy which will keep the movement of population more and more within the Empire.

Before the war the annual emigration from the British Isles amounted to 500,000 people. This is reckoning those who sought their fortunes in all the countries open to them. There are several recommendations in the Ontario report that appear to be based upon common sense. The incoming of large numbers must be better directed than in the past. Among the recommendations made we notice the following.

1. The present system of subsidizing booking and shipping agencies should be completely revised.

2. The regulation requiring immigrants to possess, on landing, a minimum sum of money should be relaxed if in other respects the im-


