RESUME WORK AT THE LORN

After being shut down a short time work at the Lorn mine on Cadwallader Creek, is to be resumed, and preparations are being made to operate this property on a larger scale than ever before attempted. Dave Coughlan and Billy Elliott left Monday for this mine to get things in readiness for the season, and as soon as supplies can be taken in a large force of men will be put to work getting out ore for the season's mill run.

Dan Hurley, manager of this property, announces the company is only awaiting the completion of the Bridge River road before they commence taking in machinery to enlarge their present five, stamp mill, installing concentrators, and putting in compressor and drills. The Lorn is one of the most promising properties in the Bridge River section, and with the improvements planned will turn into a heavy producer.

NEW WAREHOUSE

Artie Phair announces that he will start the construction of a new warehouse for the C. A. Phair store the first of next week. It will be 20x40 feet in size and two storey, being built as an extension of the present warehouse on the east side of the store. The work will be rushed to completion as at present he is crowded for room and with his new stock is in great need of the additional floor space. Alex Phair, Dick Clarke and Joe DeShields will have the work in charge.

GREAT INTEREST IN LILLOOET

Mr. Arthur F. Noel came in by auto last Wednesday and will remain for several days transacting business, when he will return to the coast for a two weeks' stay when he and Mrs. Noel will return to spend the summer in Lillooet. In the course of a conversation with a representative of the Prospector Mr. Noel stated that we here in Lillooet cannot begin to realize the interest that is being shown this district in the coast cities. Everywhere one goes he hears Lillooet talked of and is besieged with inquiries regarding the possibilities here. There is no doubt but that there will be many mining men, prospectors, land-seekers and others coming in this season to seize up the situation.

Interest in Lillooet ranch lands is keen and the demand on the increase. During Mr. Noel's brief visit here he succeeded in closing up several deals of importance and also obtained options on several other properties. He expects to see many important transactions take place within the next few weeks.

TRIP TO PEMBERTON

They report considerable activity in real estate in that section and that there are several places changing hands at a good figure. WORK AT CORONATION

Mr. Arthur F. Noel is showing some fine looking specimens that have recently been taken out of the Coronation mine. Work on this property is going steadily ahead under the management of Mr. Charles Copp. There are at present about twenty men employed, but it is expected that this force will be increased in the near future. As soon as it is deemed advisable the mill on this property will be started and will be run during the season. It is the intention of this company to put extensive improvements on the stamp mill, and to install a concentrating plant just as soon as the new wagon road is completed to the mine, which will be some time this season. Other improvements are also being planned which will make this one of the best equipped mines in the country.

BUSINESS TRIP

Saturday's auto brought in Stuart Henderson, accompanied by C. H. Fitzberbert, J. D. Mather and C. E. Mellor. Mr. Henderson has considerable land on the opposite side of the river from town and it was to look over these holdings that he made the trip into Lillooet. MACHINERY FOR THE PIONEER

Another Bridge River mining property that is rapidly coming to the front is the Pioneer on Cadwallader Creek. Development work on this property has been going on all winter, and from reports that have come down from time to time it has disclosed some very promising ore. The plans of the Pioneer are also awaiting the completion of the wagon road to transport machinery in to their holdings. They contemplate installing a ten-stamp mill at the earliest possible date after the road reaches the mine. There will be active operations at this mine the coming season.

WORK AT CHURN CREEK

Large Force of Men Employed on Construction of Suspension Bridge

Work on the new suspension bridge, across the Fraser river at Churn Creek, is progressing rapidly and it is expected that it will be ready for traffic by next October. Robert Haney and Paul McMasters, who constructed the Lillooet suspension bridge, are in charge of the work on the new bridge. It is a tower suspension, practically the same as the one at Lillooet, and the bridge itself is nearly the same dimensions, but with longer approaches. A crew of sixteen men are working at the sawmill which was taken in for the express purpose of sawing the lumber needed in construction. The mill is situated about four miles down the Fraser on the Canoe Creek road and has been in operation all winter cutting the lumber used in building the offices, store, cook and bunk house, ice-house, stables, etc., that are needed for the accommodation of the men and horses employed. The camp is at the old Churn Creek ferry while the bridge site is about one quarter of a mile above this point.

It will be necessary to do considerable excavating on the east side of the river. This work will be accomplished with the aid of the steam shovel which was part of the plant taken in. The power is furnished by a 20-horsepower donkey engine. Besides the shovel there is a concrete mixer which will be a great aid in pushing the work to completion. There have been nine government teams employed at camp all winter, and an equal number on the road bringing in supplies from Ashcroft.

A new grade will be made to the approach of the bridge above the present ferry building which will be an added improvement in that it will do away with a very steep hill. When the bridge is opened for traffic it will be of great convenience to all having reason to travel in or out of the Chilicotin country.

On the construction work are several boys well known to Lillooet who worked on the bridge here. Amongst these are Stanley Marshall, and Howard Reed, while Russell Badgett, also well known here, is employed as the watchman at the Chimney Creek bridge. Archie Jarvis is chef for the camp. Taken all and all it is one of the best equipped and most systematic camps that can be found anywhere.
