In the case of a deposit of uniform width and continuity and evenly distributed values such as is often found in the regular sulphide ores, an interval of ten feet will generally suffice: if irregular in width, with lenses, and pockets of strictly high grade values, lesser intervals would be advisable. In this latter case extreme care is necessary in sampling at close intervals, in order to obtain accuracy in arriving at an average value of the whole of the lode
