### Passed Away at Prince Rupert Hospital Last Sunday.

James Hunter, who for some time resided at Sandspit and was well known locally, died at the Prince Rupert Hospital last Sunday. Not being in the best of health, Mr. Hunter decided to return to Rockwood, Ont., where he has a daughter living, and left here a fortnight ago on the Prince John. Taking a bad turn while in Prince Rupert, he was removed to the general hospital, where his condition became worse and a few days later passed away. Deceased was 64 years of age.

### A Former Citizen Lecturing in Scotland.

The Buchan Observer of Peterhead, Scotland, says: Mr. J. F. Macdonald, Canadian delegate, addressed a meeting at New Deer on "Opportunities afforded to emigrants to Canada." There was a large audience and great interest was manifested in the lecture. Mr. Macdonald is now in Peterhead, and is to deliver his lecture there at an early date.

Mr. Macdonald says that the farm servants in Aberdeenshire are manifesting a deep interest in his lectures and there will be large number of them make their way to Canada.

Mr. Macdonald was formerly Indian Constable at Massett.

### Langara Light Operating By June.

By the beginning of June the big new first order light at Langara Island, of the Queen Charlotte group, will be in operation, according to Captain Frank Saunders, head of the Digby Island Marine Depot. Captain Saunders inspected the construction work recently, and says that the huge lantern will soon be installed, and the first beam of light will be flashed from the tower about the beginning of June. The light will be one of the most powerful on the Pacific coast, and in clear weather mariners will be able to pick it up 15 miles off.

Lights will be placed on Rose Spit and at the entrance to Massett Inlet during the summer.

### Important Amendment to Game Act.

Important changes to the Game Protection Act of British Columbia was passed recently in the Legislature. The measure provides, among other things, that it shall be unlawful for any resident of the province to hunt animals or birds or to carry firearms of any description, or air guns, or any device for the purpose of capturing any animal or bird without first taking out a license. In addition to taking out a license, hunters will be required to wear a badge showing the number of their licence. These licences will not be transferable. Any breach of the act involves cancellation of a hunter's licence. Licences will not be issued to boys under sixteen except at the written request of parents or guardians, who shall undertake that such boys, when carrying firearms, will always be under their supervision or that of some responsible licence holder. There are three classes of licences: an ordinary, to carry firearms and hunt birds and deer, other than moose, wapiti and cariboo, costing \$2.50; a general, to hunt game, birds and animals, \$5; a special, to carry firearms and trap, \$10. Holders of general or special licence must, within fourteen days of date of expiration, return the licence to the provincial game warden with a sworn statement of the number of each species of big game or animal trapped. Prospectors having a free miner's certificate may obtain ordinary licences during the open season, while actually engaged in prospecting; so may farmers and their sons hunting on the land on which they permanently reside. Any firearm found in the possession of any person not having a licence may be seized and confiscated.

**The Land Act.**

There are many salient features in the Amendments to the Land Act which appeal to pre-emptors and others. In any part of this Province, where open land can be taken up by a pre-emptor, it will be quite easy to carry out the amendments to Section 28, which includes "permanent improvements to the value of five dollars per acre, including the clearing and bringing under cultivation of five acres." Without in any way desiring to throw obstacles in the way of the government or prospective settler, it must be apparent that few can take advantage of the provisions of the amendments without assistance from the government or monied institutions, in the way of loans. It is well known that our sea coast and inlets are covered with timber—some of it merchantable, and other sections open for pre-emption—which will cost a large sum to clear. Our pre-emptors are poor men and we trust that every inducement will be placed in their way to people the islands. Is it worth while settling on some of the land that will, eventually prove valuable? There are many quarter sections where it is possible to carry out the provisions of the amended act. It is nothing but right that the pre-emptor should improve his holding, and there is no doubt that some have done their duty. The honest pre-emptor, and we have a large number of first class settlers on the islands, is anxious to carry out any and all of the conditions. It is to be hoped the free grants will bring in many seeking homes. In speaking of the development of the country, in introducing the amendments, the Hon. Mr. Ross remarked: "In certain sections of the province, particularly on Graham Island, the activities of those seeking to develop the coal resources have run counter to the intending settler in the closing of other areas. Such antagonism, however, as has presented itself, is more fancied than real, and will be confined to the initial efforts of the lumberman and the miner in the direction of the development of the national resources they have selected for their attention, as in the end their success will spell greater success for the farmer,

and the toll which the province will take for the utilization of its timber and its minerals will be available for the construction of roads and schools, if indeed it does not have the effect, as some optimistic persons think, of putting the tax collector out of business entirely."

**Letter From W. A. Robertson.**

To the Editor of The Islander.

Dear Sir,—There is one important part of Graham Island which seems so far to be overlooked and hardly ever mentioned, and that is Rennels Sound, which, so far as known (not having been surveyed), has all the appearance of being a magnificent harbor. It is the only harbor on Graham Island where large colliers and large steamships can come in and load coal. In 1885, when the late James Shields and myself discovered coal, at what is now known as Camp Wilson, we continued up the Yakoun River to Yakoun Lake, and after prospecting around the lake we climbed the mountain in the direction of Skidegate Inlet. When we got to the summit we camped, and noticing a high peak to the east of us, we climbed to the top to have a view of the country. As it happened to be clear weather we obtained a fine view in every direction, but what interested us most was an arm of the sea that appeared to be but a short distance west of Yakoun Lake, which I believed to be Rennels Sound. If it was a good harbor and easy of entrance it was what would be wanted, so that the largest colliers and steamers could enter and load coal, as there was no other harbor on Graham Island where this could be done. A short time afterwards, when we were at Gold Harbor, James Shields and an Indian went to Rennels Sound and examined it and took some soundings, and finding it all that we wished he put up our location notices. He noticed there were fine streams of fresh water, good sites for coal bunkers, and a perfectly protected harbor inside of what is now known as Shields Island. The island is named after him and is a good name otherwise, as it is a fine shield from the waves of the Pacific. Since that time I have learned more about Rennels Sound, both inside and outside. There is a large wide bay set in towards the entrance to the sound, and there is a high peak called Emmons Peak, at the south side of the entrance, which can be seen from the sea for many miles and a splendid guide to the entrance to the harbor of Rennels Sound. I hope the harbor will soon be surveyed and charted, so that if there are any obstructions it will be known where they are. Coaling stations was an important question some few years ago, and I suppose is yet, and if a coaling station

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is ever required that can easily be fortified, Rennels Sound is the place. There is a high mountain at the head of the harbor, called, I believe, after myself, as I was the first white man to climb it. That mountain can be made a Gibraltar. Neither dreadnaughts, airships, submarine, or any other devilish invention could capture it as long as provisions and ammunition lasted. I called the attention of the late Sir John McDonald to it when he was in Victoria, and asked him if he would call the attention of the Admiralty to it, and he said he would; and he did, as I seen notice of it afterwards. I also called the attention of an Admiral of the Fleet on this station to it, and he returned me an answer that it was not, as yet, a strategic position, which I suppose is correct, but it might suddenly become one. The scenery around Rennels Sound is very fine and some time it will be a summer resort. There are some strong mineral springs near there and other interests that will yet be of value.

# History Of Queen Charlotte Islands.

## Haidas and Their Legends.

By Mr. Charles Harrison.

### Article XXXI.V---The Ga-geet

When Indians get capsized and their canoes wrecked at sea they sometimes reach the shore and sink down exhausted. Presently they arise again and run along the beach and finally run off into the woods and there they become like animals. They sustain themselves by living on roots and berries until they gradually become distraught and frightful to behold. Their hair, finger nails, toe nails and teeth grow long, and their bodies become covered with long black hair, and finally when they have reached this stage they are deemed to live for a period like the wild beasts themselves. After this wild beast period is over a change gradually comes over them and they are said to become possessed with a mysterious spirit or devil which gives them the power to fly about the country, but only during the night-time, for as soon as daylight appears they vanish away to their accustomed haunts. When they had this power within them they were very terrible to behold, and woe to the man, woman or child that was seen by them, for when in this flying condition their one and only desire was that others should share their misery, consequently whenever they were able they breathed upon those they came into contact with, and by so doing cast upon them their dire enchantment and sad existence. Ga-geets were credited with having very great strength and were able in the olden days of carrying large canoes, rooting up trees and of shaking houses. When I first arrived at Massett one of the old chiefs told me that a Ga-geet had formerly been caught near Skidegate by a hunting party in a trap. The hunters instead of killing him took him with them back to their village and kept him chained up for several years with an iron chain. Under this gentle treatment he recovered his senses, and once more became a rational being. Another Ga-geet was reported to have been caught on the sharp splinter of a stump where a tree had been blown down. The splinter ran right through his body and killed him. Many years ago at Massett an Indian shot at a Ga-geet and for this insult the Ga-geet ran after him and compelled him to swim a considerable wide stream to his great discomfort before he could regain his friends. I have had only one experience amongst the Haidas when they thought that a Ga-geet was prowling around one of their villages. This occurred many years ago, and the principal actors in this Ga-geet scare are now mostly dead. This famous Ga-geet had the power to fly over their houses and was even reported to be seen on the back of a white horse that I owned. Both the horse and the rider seemed, according to the Haidas, to have had the supernatural power of floating or gliding over their village after sunset, yet at the same time that my horse was seen playing these tricks at Massett I had him with me at my camp near Cape Ball, eighty miles away. During this dreadful and trying time the whites and all the Haida women and children were ordered to remain indoors from sunset to sunrise, until this Ga-geet had been killed. The men armed themselves with rifles and shot-guns and sat night after night on the roofs of the old-fashioned houses ready to shoot this annoying visitor whenever he made his appearance. Whilst they watched for his appearance he entertained himself in another manner by carrying up from the beach a large canoe to a hill about five hundred yards away, and there he placed it on end, leaning it against a house owned by a middle-aged Haida. When he had successfully completed his task he struck the house several sledge hammer blows that awoke all the inmates that were then sound asleep. This occurred night after night for a week or more. The owner of the house appeared to be in a great state of fright, as from his statements he believed that he and his family were doomed. Several of the chiefs and the strong men of the village then kept him company and all were fully armed so as not to allow the Ga-geet to get near enough to breathe on them. Just as all were sound asleep thud, thud, came these dreadful blows against the side of the house night after night, but always at a different hour of the long winter's night. This battering at the house never occurred until the Gageet undoubtedly knew that all the inmates were asleep. The Gageet, however, came once too often. This night when he struck the house one old chief was awake sufficiently to see the owner of the house reappearing through a trap door which he had secretly made in the floor and which he always kept covered with a cedar mat. By this time all were awake and upon investigations being made the trickery of this Haida was fully exposed. It was discovered that

## Synopsis of Coal Mining Regulations

COAL mining rights of the Dominion, in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, the Yukon Territory, the North-west Territories and in a portion of the Province of British Columbia, may be leased for a term of twenty-one years at an annual rental of \$1 an acre. Not more than 2,560 acres will be leased to one applicant.

Application for a lease must be made by the applicant in person to the Agent or Sub-Agent of the district in which the rights applied for are situated.

In surveyed territory the land must be described by sections, or legal subdivisions of sections, and in unsurveyed territory the tract applied for shall be staked out by the applicant himself.

Each application must be accompanied by a fee of \$5 which will be refunded if the rights applied for are not available, but not otherwise. A royalty shall be paid on the merchantable output of the mine at the rate of five cents per ton.

The person operating the mine shall furnish the Agent with sworn returns accounting for the full quantity of merchantable coal mined and pay the royalty thereon. If the coal mining rights are not being operated, such returns should be furnished at least once a year.

The lease will include the coal mining rights only, but the lessee may be permitted to purchase whatever available surface rights may be considered necessary for the working of the mine at the rate of \$10.00 an acre.

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## HAIDAS AND THEIR LEGENDS

(Continued from page 3)

the owner of the house had secretly and unknown even to his own wife made a trap door in the floor which he kept covered during daylight with a Haida made cedar mat upon which every night he spread his blankets, and when all were asleep and the house in darkness he would steal through this trap door then travel quickly under the nouse, the floor of which was high enough from the ground to allow of him accomplishing this feat easily. With a sledge hammer in his hand he would give the house two or three terrific blows which sounded dreadfully during the silent night watches to those within, and before they could get their lamps lighted he would return to his blankets and pretend to be as surprised as the rest. However, as I have said he tried the Gageet trick once too often. The chiefs and the men in the house were so angry with him that they immediately carried him down to the beach and threw him into the salt water, and there for a time he had to remain until the men were willing to allow him to go home. This man was secretly referred to as the Gageet until the day of his death. During the time of this excitement the men would go armed as an escort to the women during the day-light hours to get in their wood, water, and all others necessities. Even after this man was detected in the act of imitating the supposed actions of a Ga-geet some of the old Haidas firmly believed that the malevolent spirit of one of these creatures had really entered into his body, and that he had partly the bad influence accredited to the Ga-geets in his possession. One day the grandchild of an old chief died shortly after these episodes, and the old man firmly believed that this mock Ga-geet had cast a spell over his god-son and had caused his death. The old man thinking over these things got out his rifle and fired two shots into the Ga-geet's house with the evident intention of killing him, but fortunately for all concerned the Ga-geet, his wife and family were absent at the time, and so murder was providentially not committed. As Ga-geets were credited with the miraculous power of flying generally about a man's height from the ground the only safe way to avoid them and take no risk was for the person so encountered to plunge at once into the sea or any water whatsoever rather than court an interview. These old ideas were firmly believed in by the ancient Haidas, but the present generation have been educated into the white man's ways and habits and pay very little attention to the stories and legends as narrated by their ancestors.
