### THE DIVORCE LAWS

IN THE STATES ARE BEING CONSIDERED BY THE REFORMERS.

And a great organization is endeavoring to have the Legislatures of the various States to bring about such needed social changes.

PHILADELPHIA, October 20th.—Under the leadership of the national reform association a public meeting to discuss a needed reformation of the divorce laws of the United States was called together this afternoon in the association hall. The call for the meeting was signed by Felix B. Beattie of Pittsburg, president of the national reform association. This body has been organized to promote the influence of Christianity in the government of this country. Among its vice-presidents, whose names are attached to the call for today's meeting, are many clergymen of note, the president of several large institutions of learning in this state, and a number of supreme court justices, and the national reform association urges all citizens to impart moral instruction from the pulpit regarding the moral laws underlying family relationships. Steps are also urged to secure, in the meanwhile, more and less legal laws by the state legislatures to improve the social atmosphere in their respective states, to prevent lawless in a better standard of morality and to endeavor to attain greater uniformity in them.

MINNEAPOLIS, October 20th.—Judge Emery gave the so-called "social" clubs of this city a vigorous reprimand this morning. His decision in the matter has been looked forward to with much interest. This morning when the usual routine of municipal court business was disposed of the judge called on C. H. Sullivan, secretary and treasurer of the Manhattan club, and issued a subpoena upon him for a fine of \$100 or thirty days in the workhouse.

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### A YOUNG LOTHARIO

FINDS UPON A BAND OF MEN DISGUISED AS WHITE CAPS.

And blows the face of the leader in atoms—It was his Youngest Brother, Who Had Come With Others to Challenge the Opponent for His Late Wife.

NORTHVILLE, New York, October 20th.—A terrible tragedy was enacted here on Saturday night at the house of Saul Carrington, about half a mile from this village. A young man named that Barclay had made himself notorious by his relations with two women and his visits to Carrington's household. Barclay was warned by his father and three brothers, but he paid no attention to them. They decided to teach him a lesson and, for this purpose, about a dozen young men joined the father and brother, and having disguised themselves as white caps, proceeded to the Carrington house, dragged Carrington out, and fastened him, placed him against a wall and carried him a short distance where he was left to shift for himself. The white caps returned to the house for young Barclay, but having witnessed the treatment of Carrington, he had determined to resist them, and as they came to the door, he ran upstairs, and seizing a musket, levelled it at the leader and warned them to desist. The threat was unheeded and, as the white caps pressed forward, he took careful aim and fired. A shriek of agony followed the report, and the leader of the white caps fell dead, his right side of his head and face having been blown in atoms. The victim proved to be the youngest brother of Barclay. The body remained in the spot where it fell until Sunday afternoon, when the corpse arrived at the scene and was taken to the morgue. The murderer made no effort to escape. Fear of the gang has been captured and the rest will be brought in today.

### CREAM OF THE THEATRE

NEW YORK, October 20th.—Harvey Berwitz, a well-known diamond broker, forty-three years old, shot and killed himself shortly before 1 o'clock today in his office, No. 17 Madison street. The cause is unknown.

LOUISVILLE, October 20th.—The Times says that the fruits of the maritime conference now in session at Washington will be seen when the next conference assembles at Hagar.

LOUISVILLE, October 20th.—The Chronicle of St. Petersburg correspondent says that the czar has invited Kaiser Wilhelm to attend the Russian review next summer.

TORONTO, Ontario, October 20th.—Honorable Alexander Morris, ex-justice minister of Manitoba, died at his residence here this morning.

TORONTO, Ontario, October 20th.—There was some fogging this morning at the central prison for a criminal assault on a little girl at Oshawa.

OTTAWA, October 20th.—The Ottawa college football club held the championship of Ontario against Toronto today. They have held it for five years.

BOSTON, October 20th.—Harry Winsor, president of the Boston & Philadelphia Steamship Company, died today, aged eighty-six.

PALM, October 20th.—President Grant has informed his cabinet that he will decline to accept any minister's resignation.

NEW YORK, October 20th.—John Jacob Astor today subscribed \$25,000 to the world's fair generation fund.

### VICTORIA NEWS

Thomas Davis Elected Captain of the Dominion Parliament—Another Member Arrives.

VICTORIA, October 20th.—(Special to Truth.)—Thomas Davis was elected by acclamation to the Dominion Parliament today to fill the vacancy which had been caused by the resignation of E. C. Baker. There was little interest manifested in the proceedings, but twenty-five electors being present. After Mr. Davis had been declared elected by the returning officer he made a brief speech, acknowledging the trust reposed in him by the electors by thanking him accordingly.

The American sailing steamer Mollie Adams arrived here this morning. She is reported to have made a successful catch of the season, although no sign of whales is heard.

Well Remembered the Howards.—LOUISVILLE, October 20th.—News from Halifax county was today received that Howard and his party are in flight on Martin's Fork, about twelve miles from Halifax county seat, and that a party of the law and order men are in hot pursuit. It is reported that Howard is being sought and it is only a matter of a short time when he will be killed, captured, and his gang broken up. The law and order party are progressing strongly and the Howards are determined to resist them. It is thought that Howard will leave the country if he can get an opportunity, but it is the general belief that he will be killed before any such chance.

The Death of Post Editor.—BOSTON, October 20th.—W. W. Wilson, a noted editor of the Northern Pacific office in this city, took a dose of chloroform yesterday and died shortly thereafter. He had been ill for some time, but he had not been in bed for some time. He was thirty-three years of age and was married. He came here three years ago from Woodstock, Canada, where his people reside, and whether he will be buried in this city is not known.

Warning for Criminals.—VANCOUVER, October 20th.—The proclamation of the president, admitting the four new states into the union, will not be issued from the white house until the official results of the vote on the constitution have been certified to the president. No certificate has as yet been received and consequently it is not known at the white house when the proclamation will be proclaimed. Senator Ferguson of North Dakota, who had had just seen the president and that he had talked with him about the proclamation. He said he expected it to be issued very soon. The extent of the delay, he said, was that the returns were not all in.

The Chicago Board of Trade Protection.—VANCOUVER, October 20th.—The hearing in the case of the board of trade in Chicago against the various railroad companies and port carriers was continued before the inter-state commerce commissioners today. A. B. Cameron presented an agreement for Iowa carriers and S. B. Ladd represented the carriers of Kansas. At the conclusion of the arguments the case was closed and given to the commissioners for their consideration and decision. The railroad companies included in the complaint have filed their answers.

Charged with Mischief in a Street.—OTTAWA, Ontario, October 20th.—Detective Green of Montreal arrived in the city today in charge of a hoodlum named Beuchamp, whom he arrested on a charge of mischief in a street on the Canadian Pacific railway, whereby an additional train was thrown from the track and the engineer and fireman left a narrow escape from death, on Monday night last. Beuchamp was a discharged employee of the Canadian Atlantic, and it is alleged that he had threatened to be seen with the company.

Put His Head Clean Up.—GREENSBORO, New York, October 20th.—A man set down on the West Shore railway track at Campbell's at 5 o'clock this afternoon as the express train came through along the whole track the man's head of hair, without uttering a word, fell into the water. The head fell sixty feet away. There were papers in the man's pockets which showed that he was Anna F. Brown of East Windsor, Massachusetts.

A Strange Order.—LOUISVILLE, October 20th.—The College District society that the car has ordered that the amount of money which will be needed to meet the requirements of the current budget should be increased five fold, thus outstripping the budget for the next five years. The reason for this extraordinary action was not stated.

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
