OUR CHIEF TO VISIT THE ORIENT

Doug McInnes will visit China in October as part of an official Canadian delegation invited by the Chinese government. Other members of the group are Guy Sylvestre, National Librarian, Hope Clement, Associate National Librarian, and Brian Land, Director, Legislative Library of Ontario and member of the National Library's Advisory Board.

The group will leave Vancouver on October 2 and meet officials of the National Diet Library of Japan in Tokyo before proceeding to China for visits to Peking, Nanking, Suzhou, and Shanghai. During the 12 day visit to China, the National Library of China will host the delegation and arrange visits to several major Chinese libraries. Doug will be back at UBC on October 20. During his absence, Bill Watson will be Acting Chief.

RECON WINDUP

At the end of August, the remaining ten Recon LA3's were transferred to other LA3 positions, displacing nine other LA3's with less seniority. (Another LA3 position became vacant at this time.) These transfers followed the procedures established in the Letter of Agreement between the University and AUCE Local 1.

At this time, four of the laid-off LA3's have been placed in other positions - Suzanne Garnett and Yvonne Chin as Clerk 2's in the Registrar's Office, Pat Lew as LA2 in Biomedical Branch, and Elizabeth Whittam as LA2 in Woodward. A fifth, Ted Byrne, is working full-time for AUCE Local 1. The others, Jacquie Chang, Louise Archibald, Barbara Wilson, and Roslyn Moran, are either awaiting recall or looking for other positions.

Bill Pelletier, Recon Librarian, is working temporarily in Systems on the BCLN project.

UBC HIRING FREEZE

The hiring freeze which President George Pederson imposed on September 9 caught some divisions and branches with vacancies. LA1 positions in Catalogue Products (2), Curriculum Laboratory, Catalogue Records, Sedgewick, Circulation and a sessional LA2 in Woodward will all remain vacant for the moment. The university-wide freeze is to be reviewed October 5, but Pederson has said the freeze could be extended.

We expect to have more news about this year's budget and its effect on the Library for the next Bulletin.

LIBRARY ACQUIRES FUMIGATION TANK

George Brandak, Special Collections Archivist, headed a project this summer which had an interesting spinoff in the shape of a fumigation tank.

The tank was constructed to treat papers and documents for mold and insect infestation, and consists of two metal chambers each containing 2 generating units of a 15 watt lightbulb and a pudding dish, suspended upright above the bulb. Thymol is used to treat infested material, which is placed on adjustable shelves in the chamber for 72 hours, and the heat from the bulbs causes the thymol to vapourize.

The papers treated came from the O.H. Solibakke collection, a large and detailed set of papers relating to gold mining in the Cariboo, 1927-1967, which Special Collections purchased in 1982.

SEDGEWICK COURSE FILE ON-LINE

The Sedgewick Course File, a list of reserve and recommended readings, both books and xeroxed articles, for general Arts undergraduates and the first 2 years of Science courses is now on-line.

Call it up as "SHARE SEDGEWICK.COURSE" and you can search by title, name, or call number, in the same way as SERINDEX or DRS is searchable.

This development is part of a reorganization of the reserve system at Sedgewick. Other changes included making all reserves either 2 hours or 3 days, and increasing the frequency of the Course List to once a week in busy times.

These changes should improve a reserve system which serves a large number of undergraduates, for many their first, perhaps only, contact with the library. The more trouble-free it is, the better their attitude to the Library.

UBC ARCHIVES PROJECT

Laurenda Daniels, UBC Archivist in Special Collections, directed a summer project to survey records held in university offices. A team of students, headed by Louise May, a doctoral candidate in history, visited various offices on campus to find out the kinds and extent of records kept.

UBC Archives collects historical materials of value and this project was undertaken with a view to developing a programme to preserve valuable records and help offices dispose of useless records. Laurenda is hoping that more funding to complete the survey will be available from the Public Archives of Canada next year.

In the meantime, Laurenda added substantially to the records in her keeping with the deposit this summer of the UBC Alma Mater Society records for 1933-1976 (67 feet of records) and the Faculty Club records from about 1948 when it began till 1978.

COMPUTER TERMINALS INSTALLED IN SEDGEWICK

Sedgewick may have found the answer to the diminishing book budget. Install computer terminals instead.

Sedgewick made space available on the lower level to permit the Arts faculty to install 15 computer terminals (with space for another 15 later) available for use by anyone with a UBC Computing Centre ID at times when the room is not scheduled for an Arts class.

A long term project to link records for hard copy and microform sets of the same periodical title was completed this summer. On the Serial List and Serial Supp, holdings of titles of which the Library has both paper and microform copy have been consolidated under one entry.
