SHARED CATALOGUING PROGRAMME:


At a meeting on Shared Cataloguing on June 18th the group was extended to ten institutions. Participants and their assignments are:

LIBRARY TOUR FOR CLA VISITORS:

On Thursday, June 24th, at 3:00 p.m. some 29 librarians attending the CLA Conference visited the UBC Library system. The Information and Orientation Division had prepared a varied programme for the guests. Librarians from Humanities, Social Sciences, Science, and Government Publications took many of the visitors on a fast-paced general tour of the Main Library. Volunteers from Circulation and Reading Rooms escorted guests to individual library divisions and branches, where they were treated to more specialized tours. Following the tours the visiting librarians were entertained at a hospitality hour arranged by Walter Harrington at the Faculty Club.

In conjunction with the tours I. & O. arranged a meeting of those academic librarians at CLA who were interested in library instruction. Fifteen guests met with Elsie de Bruijn for an informal discussion of orientation problems and techniques. Later Mrs. de Bruijn showed the guests some of the instructional methods used by UBC Library.
