Spotlight on UBC Hospital Libraries

Visited a UBC hospital library lately? Few of us have, so we thought you'd like to hear about these off-campus branches and your colleagues who work there. The three UBC off-campus hospital libraries, along with the Woodward Biomedical Library, make up the UBC Life Sciences Libraries.

The Biomedical Branch Library opened in 1952 and became the first UBC library to be located off the main campus. The BMB staff include Dean Giustini, Rose Chang, Kim Leong, Caroline Linney and Darko Separovic. Renovated in 1998/99, the BMB got an updated look, including new carpet, reference shelving, upgraded wiring and computer connections and 8 more public terminals. The BMB library has a collection that specializes in ophthalmology, dermatology, trauma and neurology among other clinical topics. The new renovations have made the library a bright and pleasant place to be, and feedback from students, faculty and other users has been very positive.

The Eric Hamber Memorial Library opened in 1982 and serves the students, medical faculty and hospital staff of the BC Children's Hospital and related facilities. The Hamber staff include Cathy Rayment, Patrick Balena, Deborah Newstead and Mercedita Almodovar. The branch's namesake, Eric Hamber, was a former Toronto Argonaut who became Lieutenant Governor of BC, and later Chancellor of UBC. The Eric Hamber Foundation gave funds to help set up the library. Hamber's collection is focused fairly specifically on paediatrics, obstetrics and gynaecology, medical genetics, and increasingly, molecular biology. "We're probably the only UBC library whose patrons come in wearing stethoscopes dangling with toy monkeys or plastic clip-on toys!" says Cathy Rayment.

Barbara Saint, Darlene Bailey, Angela Doyle and Anita Stabrawa of the St. Paul's Hospital Library serve the information needs of hospital staff, faculty and students at this busy downtown hospital. The collection at St. Paul's, enhanced by the Sutherland Foundation's Rodger Stanton Endowment in 1978, encompasses a variety of specialized areas including cardiac, renal, HIV/AIDS and mental health care. Barbara has also developed a strong collection around the area of nursing.

All of the UBC Life Sciences Libraries share resources and provide document delivery service among the branches. At the next Staff Development Open House, consider visiting one of the off-campus UBC hospital libraries.

UBC Library goes downtown!

Two recent UBC projects will increase the Library's presence downtown. The Library is providing access to its resources and services to the downtown eastside Learning Exchange. Staff and patrons of the Learning Exchange are able to make use of library resources, including full text online indexes and journals, as well as request materials using the Library's document delivery service. Staff of the Learning Exchange have had a series of training sessions on using the Library's many resources and services, and are excited about working with the Library. Oscar Wilde Exhibition

One of a number of interesting exhibitions currently on display at the UBC Library, **Oscar Wilde: The Apostle of Beauty** runs until the end of April in the Special Collections & University Archives Division. Curated by Dr. Sarika Bose of the UBC Department of English, this exhibition displays rare editions of Wilde's works, including a signed first edition of *The Picture of Dorian Gray*. The exhibition primarily draws upon the wide range of materials collected by bookseller and bibliophile Norman Colbeck, who donated his vast collection of nineteenth century and Edwardian works to the University in 1967.
