## WE ARE A NATION!

It is high time that Quebec realized that it is not a thing inseparable unto itself. It is high time that it realized that it owes its life and well-being to the whole unit of the Dominion of Canada. It is high time that it realized that it was Canadian and not French.

It is, in effect, time that Quebec "got wise" to the dictator leanings of M. Duplessis and abandoned its tearful emotionality.

Quebec students ask: "What price liberty?"
