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## WAR NEWS

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## PROGRESS OF THE WAR

### THE WORLD WIDE STORY TOLD HOURLY IN BULLETINS

Along a battle line 180 miles in extent the German forces were flung against the Allies in a fearful engagement which began on Tuesday. The news is so closely censored that only fragments are coming through. Four thousand heavy guns were engaged, and already the hospitals, and other means of caring for the wounded, are overflowing. The German losses are estimated at ten thousand. No other losses are stated, but it can be taken for granted that they will be great. German troops in Belgium are cut off and starving in many places, even the horses of the Uhlans are found dead from starvation. The British wounded are arriving at Southampton from Belgium, but Lord Kitchener has the clamps on and threatens to suspend any paper that publishes news other than that given out by the Official Bureau.

August 10.

9:20 a.m.

Liege is still in the hands of the Belgians although the city is more or less held by the Germans. The forts are in possession of the Belgians, and there has been no serious occupation of the Belgian territory either in or around Liege. A junction of the British, French, and Belgian troops has been effected on Belgian territory, and a clash between the allies and the Germans is expected at any moment in the neighborhood of Namur. It will be the biggest battle of the campaign, so far.

Later it is reported that the fighting at Namur is now over.

The British Admiralty has reported an engagement between a British cruiser squadron and a fleet of German submarines. The British squadron escaped without damage, but one of the German submarines was destroyed.

The Germans are making no progress with their Belgian campaign, and they are now said to be short of food with little hope for new supplies owing to the state of the river Meuse.

Two Japanese squadrons have sailed from Tokyo to take part in the war demanded by their compact. They will join the British in a forward movement against the German fleet in Asiatic waters.

The British fleet now commands the North Sea and all approaches to German ports are closed, according to an official report from London.

It is reported that a big battle is now on between the German and French forces, but the exact position is not given, and the War Office has not given out any statement.

August 10.

11: A. M.

Spain has refused to entertain the German proposals for co-operation with Germany.

The submarine sunk by the British was the German vessel "U 15" built in 1912. She was 300 tons and carried a crew of 12.

Forty-eight trainloads of Austrian troops are on the way to Alsace to assist the Germans.

The German patrols are surrendering in order to obtain food.

The C. P. R. have employed special police to guard their property at North Bay and Sudbury, where 90 Austrian and German laborers have been discharged and are making threats.

August 10.

1:45 P. M.

The German Kaiser hopes to succeed where Napoleon failed, and is now planning to land a German army on British soil. The German fleet is to co-operate in the gigantic undertaking. Another 2,000,000 German troops have been ordered to mobilize. A big naval battle is expected at once in the North Sea but no details can be obtained.

The French have cut off the German retreat at Liege, and thousands of the Germans have been killed and wounded.

The North Sea has again been declared open.

The German steamer "Kronprinz Wilhelm," fitted out as a war vessel, has been captured by the "Essex," a British cruiser.

War planes have been laid before the Mikado of Japan.

Several Australian war ships have joined the British squadron in East Asiatic waters.

A French cruiser has passed Shangha with two German merchant vessels in tow as prizes.

The British have captured \$5,000,000 in a prize taken off Oporto, Portugal, on Sunday night. The vessel carried bullion from South America, consigned to a German port.

August 12.

9:12 a. m.

The cruiser "Rainbow" is declared safe but there is a big German cruiser reported off the California coast near San Francisco.

2:30 p. m.

The German army is leaving its position before Liege and is advancing toward the heart of Belgium. The main body of the German cavalry is engaged in a forward movement all along the line in front of the allied armies.

3:00 p. m.

The French troops have been victorious in some of the high passes leading to Alsace.

Some anxiety is felt as to the fate of

August 13.

9:10 a.m.

War has been officially declared against Austria by Great Britain.

A German war ship is reported sunk off the coast of New Haven, U.S.A.

The powerful British ship "Dreadnought" is now in the North Atlantic waters, and this makes six British cruisers that are in a position to protect the shipping in this part of the world.

The Russians are mining the harbor of Vladivostock.

Big guns were hauled through the streets of Vancouver yesterday, and will be placed in positions to guard the Burrard Inlet.

August 13.

Noon.

The Germans have again approached Belgium with a request that the German army be allowed free passage through Belgium, but have been refused. It is reported that the Kaiser will take personal command of the army in Belgium.

The two German cruisers which took refuge in the Dardanelles have been seized by the Turkish Government and will be dismantled.

The German reservists who were attempting to leave for Seattle last night were arrested by the military authorities at Vancouver.

An encounter has taken place between the Belgian left wing and a combined force of German infantry, cavalry and artillery, and the latter completely routed.

The Germans are concentrating for a line of battle north of Liege.

August 13.

2:30 p. m.

The big battle has begun and the entire French First Line is flung on Belgium. The Germans are pushing the advance with relentless gusto in order to smash the allies before Russia can act. A bridge built over the River Meuse near Maastricht, has enabled the Germans to bring to bear an enormous siege train of heavy artillery.

The German cruiser "Lepisg" is now at San Francisco.

The "Rainbow" and the "Shearwater" have just arrived at Victoria.

The first direct dispatch from Berlin, uncensored, states that during the fight at Machinian 1,000 French were killed, and another 1,000 captured.

The report adds that the German soil is clear of French troops.

Developments in the war are very vague as the censorship is very strict.

Mr. Ed. Grandy, an old timer in the District, has been missing since yesterday morning, and the search party that was out all night failed to find any trace of him.

## ALBERNI BOYS

### ANSWER CALL

"Good-bye Boys. God be with you until we meet again!"

Such was the sentiment of the vast crowd that gathered at the Alberni depot on Tuesday morning to give the last greeting to the little band of young men who have been called to the front in answer to their Nation's need.

It was the largest crowd that has ever gathered at the station, and many a wet eye testified to the fact that there were those present to whom the grim demands of war had come very near home.

A storm of cheers greeted the train as it pulled in from the Port, and K. Gill, K. Dixon, T. Freeman and P. Hills stopped to the front as the first from Alberni. With them were named G. Blandy, H. Bryant, A. R. Parpharson, D. Doctson, Louis Howe, J. B. Watson, A. E. Gordon, G. F. Orrible, S. Frye, E. L. Thompson, F. Street, H. A. Kent, T. Weatherup, T. Wasdo, A. Abraham and E. W. Abraham who signed up from the Port, though some of them belong to the Alberni section.

Capt. A. G. Cunningham was on the train with the boys and will attend to their wants until they reach Victoria. From this point they may scatter to various regiments, so that for a few days we will not know just where the boys will be stationed.

No passes into history the fact that the Alberni District is ready to answer any demands that may be put on her in this time of stress. No man can say when the next call will come. The call bringing out the class "B" men, but when it comes it will find everyone ready.

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Not all of those who offered will pass the inspection and we may see them back until the medical examinations are a little less searching.

Not all of the boys named were in the train on Tuesday. Some of them went down to Victoria a few days ago. Mr. A. L. Withers is now with the naval department at Esquimalt. Mr. Atfield, of Alberni and E. L. Thompson of the Port were outside, and so were the Abraham boys of Clayoquot.

A. R. Parpharson, of Alberni went out last Thursday. Some names may have been overlooked in the hurry of departure, and if so they will be acknowledged later as the information comes in.

Tuesday, August 14th, will go down in the history of Alberni as a day never to be forgotten.

Gentlemen. Hats off to the boys who answered the first call.

## DO WHAT YOU CAN.

This is the last. The world's  
greatest war is on. The  
long roll of the battle drums  
calls men to quarters the wide  
world round. As the sun never  
sets on Britain's wide domains,  
so the call has hurried from one  
to another of Her sons across  
all the seven seas, until the eye  
has girdled the globe. Humanity,  
the highest and best in Man,  
individual freedom of those who  
will escape from under the  
maddened fist, all, all, trembled in  
the balance. A War Lord  
drunken with power, has like  
the madman that he might be  
buried his gauntlet into the  
faces of those who cried for  
peace. He has snatched the  
sword of destruction. Let him  
perish by it, hurled from his  
high place by the hands of those  
whom he has long affronted by  
insult upon insult, and injury upon injury. It would  
have come before long from  
within his own hand, where  
those who have groaned under  
the heavy taxes imposed by a  
spirit of mad militarism, would  
soon have turned in a nation-wide protest. It may have been  
a knowledge of this fact which  
impelled the German Kaiser to  
the rash step which he has  
taken. A knowledge that, in  
war and war only could be found  
his excuse for the further con-  
summation of a programme which  
appears to have become as the  
breath of life to his nostrils.

However this may be, Britain  
stood aside until those whom  
she had pledged to defend were  
trampled on. Further she could  
not do, and remains Britain.

While we hope for the best,  
and an early end of the present  
war, there are many evidences  
that it may be prolonged in a  
manner which will try the very  
souls of every person now living.  
Modern methods of communica-  
tion are such that the world is  
indeed small. We only find how  
small in a time like this. No  
matter what country gave us  
birth there will be few who find  
themselves without some per-  
sonal interest in such a struggle  
as that now going on. An inter-  
est often rendered more keen by  
ties of blood, if not of nationality,  
and more painful by reason of  
the utter lack of ability to help  
or aid those so tied to us.

It is in such a time that we find  
the need for a wider spirit of  
humanity, and the determination  
to extend to mankind in general  
that which we are, for the mo-  
ment prevented from giving to  
those more nearly related.

There will be much that all of  
us can do. The thousand and  
one little things that will help to  
bring nearer the brighter future  
which we all hope will spring  
from the present sad conditions.

Already Alberni has shown the  
way in one of the very things  
which the writer has in mind.  
The Daughters of the Empire  
called a meeting at Victoria. A

hospital ship is to be equipped  
and handed over to the nation.  
The very first of all the offers of  
assistance came from Alberni.  
It was Mr. J. G. C. Wood who  
first put the idea into practical  
shape and after consultation with  
a number of citizens, approached  
Mayor Huff, who gave the move-  
ment his hearty endorsement. A  
list was opened, and the required  
amount secured by popular sub-  
scription in a few hours. That  
is the kind of work that counts.  
He gives twice who gives quickly  
in times like these, and let us  
hope that the example of Alberni  
in this case will be followed by  
many other places, and that  
within the required week the  
hospital ship may be outfitted  
and sent on her errand of mercy.

This will be hard for some  
while and money difficult to obtain  
but each in his or her little  
way can do something for the  
great cause for which the nation  
is battling. Little or big, let  
that something be done with a  
willing heart, and that doubles  
the gift.

## GOOD LUCK, BOYS.

WHEN the citizens of Alberni  
and the Port gathered at  
the depots to bid God speed to  
the young men who have now  
left for the front, they honored  
themselves far more than the  
men who went. It is a fitting  
thing that every man, woman  
and child left behind should take  
a moment of solemn thought over  
the inner meaning of this movement  
to join the line of battle.

Canada has been no laggard.  
When the war broke out she  
promptly made an offer of troops  
to aid the Mother Country. The  
offer was accepted, and the call  
sent out. There was no one of  
the many towns and cities  
throughout the length of the  
land that failed to respond. In  
the two towns of Alberni and  
the Port over one hundred names

were set down on the list of those  
who were ready and willing to  
take up arms. Of these there  
were two classes. Class "A"  
to be ready at a moments notice  
to go to the front. Class "B"  
to be called upon later. The  
call for class "A" came in a few  
days and now the boys are away.

The boys have offered all that  
they have, all that any man can  
have. Their lives at their country's  
need. No assembly of citizens,  
no cheering of friends, no  
acclaim can add to this. The  
honour is in the act.

Another call may come, and  
others may be asked to form  
another factor on the line which  
fronts the foe, but these were  
first. Let the fact not be forgotten.

And now we bid them farewell  
and, with the good-bye, join in  
the heartfelt hope that every one  
of them may return in due time,  
each having done his duty in a  
manner that will reflect credit on  
himself and the country that  
called him.

## HOSPITAL SHIP FUND SECURED

Wood, M.P.P., who took the matter up with several citizens.






## WAR BULLETINS

August 8.

2:20 p.m.  
The Canadian Cruiser "Rainbow" has proceeded south of the "Golden Gate."

The French and German troops are gathering for a great engagement that will overshadow anything which is going on around Liege. This will take place east of Liege. The Belgian government has seized today 31 German steamers and two sailing vessels which were in port at Antwerp.

A German cruiser off the North Atlantic coast is running short of fuel and a call on British, French or Belgian merchant ships will call is expected.

The bombardment of Dolomiti by the Austrians, which has been going on since the 29th of July, is still in progress, and many large buildings have been destroyed. The Servians are no longer satisfied with defending herself against Austria but is now turning to aggressive plans.

Italy is in sympathy with England and France, and Portugal will act in connection with British interests.

The German cruiser "Angusburg" which has been shelling the Russian forts at Libau, was sunk by a Russian torpedo boat.

The trenches around Liege were filled four and five deep with German dead.
