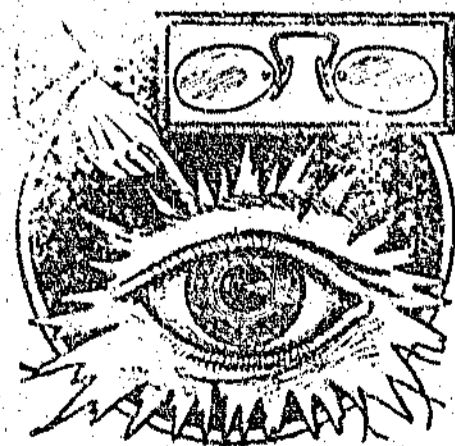

## ENEMY RECEIVES SMASHING BLOW

London, Aug. 25. (Ulfelal)—On Saturday, in the Gulf of Riga, a German superdreadnought, the Von Moltke, 4 cruisers and 7 torpedo boats were destroyed by land batteries and mines. The Germans tried to land near Herminov. Also four transports were taken with troops. The landing was repulsed and the Germans exterminated. The German fleet has withdrawn from the Gulf of Riga. A British submarine torpedoed a German cruiser, name unknown, in the Baltic. Italy has declared war on Turkey. The Baltic and Lapland, reported missing have both arrived in port. It is unofficially reported in London, but generally credited, that in a surprise attack by the British troops on the Turks near Sulva Bay, Dardanelles the Allies gained a great victory, 27,000 Turks being killed.

## FOREST FIRES ARE NUMEROUS

Locally several fires have been engaging the attention of the various fire wardens, but so far appear to have been kept well within bounds by the attention which they have received. Down the canal two or more fires have been reported but all appear to have been put under control. At Central Lake at least one fire is under way, and out of hand, but what damage has been done has not been reported. Other fires are reported from east of the range on Vancouver Island.

As to the Mainland, the following is taken from the Vancouver press:

Four of the biggest forest fires in the history of British Columbia are now raging in the lower Fraser Valley. Fire destroyed some two hundred yards of B.C.E.R. Chilliwack line track near Newton, Saturday.

Fire burnt out telephone poles for a quarter of a mile near Newton.

Large blaze creeping toward White Rock; seven homes destroyed.

King Lumber Company's mill east of Timberland, B. C., destroyed.

Estimated that over twenty farm houses through the lower Delta have been destroyed.

Sawmill and school at Newton burnt.

Brush sawmill destroyed.

Heboka shingle mill at Craig's reported burnt.

Lynn Valley fire being fanned by breeze in direction of North Vancouver.

Fire sweeping down east side of the Squamish valley, four shacks destroyed.

Brush fires on the Coast stretch from Alert Bay to Boundary, distance of 250 miles.

Vancouver City enveloped in dense smoke bank all Sunday.

Government Timber Agent in New Westminster getting all men possible to fight fires.

**THE ARABIC**

IT is scarcely necessary to deal with the details of the Arabic incident from any standpoint of argument or protest. Too fully has the German Empire demonstrated that no deed is too bloody no infraction of every rule that governs civilized man, will for a moment stay them in the mad career that is even now heading toward utter destitution on the part of mankind.

Gathering up the accounts, it appears that while all the newspapers join in bitterly condemning the German tactics which led to the sinking of the Arabic, many of them see in the act a political significance which it is generally believed will have a far reaching effect in the United States.

"The Americans have wondered why no answer has been received yet to the note sent Germany on July 23," the Daily Mail says. "They know now that the reply was given yesterday. With the sinking of the Arabic without warning and with the complete indifference as to whether or not there were any American citizens on board, Germany's determination to persevere in her piratical course cannot longer be concealed. She has thrown off the mask completely. She is out simply and solely for murder."

"It is not the fault of the gallant German sailors, on whose chivalry and humanity the late Baron Marschall bade the world rely, that the sinking of the Arabic has not been so murderous as the sinking of the Lusitania," the Times says. "This great ship was destroyed with the same ruthlessness and the same reckless contempt for law and human life as the Camarder."

According to all the advices available the Arabic was torpedoed without warning and sank in 11 minutes. The escape of the passengers must be attributed to the skill of the captain, the discipline of the crew and the cool courage of the passengers.

"It is to be noted particularly that the Arabic was outbound. That wipes away the whole web of falsehood and sophistry with which Wilhelmstrasse sought to darken the council in its mendacious and impudent reply to the American protest against the sinking of the Lusitania. The

gist of the excuse elaborated for that unmanly crime was that the Lusitania was carrying ammunition to England and that it was the explosion of the ammunition which sank her."

"It remains to be seen," says the Morning Telegraph, "what the civilized world will do, particularly the people of the United States, if it be proved that an American citizen has been killed."

"The American government already has stated its standpoint in the plainest language. Germany has treated the American statements with contempt. If the policy which is being followed by the Germans is permitted to crystallize into precedents, then there is no seaboard interest of the United States which will not be imperilled if at some future time the people become involved in a war at sea."

A few extracts from the leading American papers tend to show that the spirit of protest is just. Grim waiting for the next act of President Wilson has taken the place of much of the exclamation that marked the Lusitania outrage. The Morning Oregonian says:

"The attack on the Arabic is a challenge, definite and defiant to President Wilson to follow his words with deeds. It is, or will be, incumbent upon the United States to stand by its own interpretation of neutral rights, whatever the cost, or to back out, whatever the cost."

The Philadelphia Press remarks:

"Nothing can excuse the deliberately unfriendly act of imperilling the lives of peaceful American passengers traveling to their own country on legitimate business. The Arabic, on her westward trip, could not be suspected of carrying munitions of war or troops. It looks as if a submarine commander simply saw a fair target for a torpedo, and with brutal lack of humanity took the risk of repeating the Lusitania horror near the same place."

"In that case this act was a crime of such cynical audacity as to arouse the belief that the submarine commander was fully aware that his act was 'deliberately unfriendly' to this nation, which he intended to float and outrage."

"In the face of the critical condition, thus brought to a sharp focus, a cool judgment should prevail among the American people. The government at Washington may be trusted with the utmost confidence to deal vigorously with the grave situation."

**TIDE TURNING**

THE recent news from the various battle fronts indicates that there has been quite a turn in the tide so far as the Russian affairs are concerned. In the Baltic a smashing blow has been struck at the naval strength of the Germans, and a considerable section of their fleet put out of business. There appears to have been an error in the first announcement of the number of German transports sunk, but even four, the corrected number is a big thing, and indicates that the Russian flank will not be easy to turn from this direction. 10. Local option for the control of the liquor traffic.
11. Equal suffrage for men and women.
12. The fair and impartial enforcement of the law.
