## OBJECTIONS FILED TO DEBENTURES.

At the regular meeting of the Alberni City Council held on Tuesday evening, the Mayor reported having attended a meeting of the Directors of the Roger Creek Water Works Company, and the Liquidators appointed by the Shareholders for the purpose of winding up the affairs of the company previous to the turning over the assets and liabilities of the company to the Corporation of the City of Alberni. Everything appeared to be running along without a hitch, except the fact that Messrs. G. A. Huff, A. Hochstetler, and E. Goodall had lodged protests against accepting debentures for their shares in the company. This would probably have to be handled by arbitration. The liquidators had the matter in hand, and it was hoped that these protests would not delay the deal going through.

The Alberni Shingle Mill Co. was informed that they could go ahead with the erection of their plant, and that there would be no taxes on personal property, or improvements in the city.

The plans for the subdivision of Lot 13 were submitted, and accepted with some minor amendments with regard to alleyways.

The Finance Committee reported that they had borrowed the sum of \$3,000 from Mr. W. Nicholas, for the purpose of carrying on the waterworks business.

Report approved and adopted. The City Clerk was instructed to write to various engineers with regard to the taking of street levels where most needed. The clerk then entered the assessment roll, and the meeting adjourned.

## REWARD FOR FIFTY YEARS.

Expression of intense indignation over the assassination of King George, of Greece, and deep sympathy for the royal family and people of Greece is given freely by all the London morning newspapers today, and all in a similar strain.

"He gave himself heart and soul to the cause of Greece in good days and evil, for fifty arduous, eventful years," says the Times in tribute to the King, "and he has gone where he is reaping the harvest he has sown."

"King George left Greece far richer in fame, honor and power than he found her, and he has bequeathed to her service sons who have already proved their worth and an heir who will fill his place in inherited courage and tenacity," says the Daily Express.

"Within a few weeks," adds the Daily Graphic, "the whole of the Hellenic world would have acclaimed King George as the creator of the Greater Greece which for centuries has been the golden dream of Eastern Christendom."

The Morning Post expresses confidence that "the qualities of bravery and patience which have been displayed during the war by Greece will be further revealed during the critical moments occasioned by the assassin's crime."

"King George's long reign was a slow climb uphill, checked with many reverses," says the Daily Chronicle, adding: "If it be fortunate to die at the height of success, he died fortunately."

The other newspapers similarly point out that the king has been struck down at a moment when Greece stands high in the estimation of Europe than for many years.

## ISLAND FORMS NEW DISTRICT.

Word has just been received that the public works department in Ottawa has decided to make Vancouver Island a separate district for the carrying on of public works. Hitherto the Island has constituted a part of the New Westminster district, which is under the charge of Mr. C. G. Worfold, the district engineer. This district, while not the largest geographically in the province, is the largest from the point of work done, and the increasing amount of work in the district led to the decision to constitute the Island a separate district.

Mr. E. G. McLachlan has been appointed district engineer, with headquarters in Victoria. He has been assistant to Mr. Worfold, and for some time has been in charge of the preliminary work at the new Victoria breakwater.

There are now five districts in British Columbia as divided by the public works department. The largest is Prince Rupert, but that district is more sparsely settled than some of the other districts. The change is in harmony with the policy of the department, the number of districts in Ontario and other Eastern provinces being largely increased of late years owing to the increasing amount of work to be done by the government engineers.

EXECUTIVE MEETING FARMERS INSTITUTE

At the meeting of the Executive of the Alberni Farmers Institute, held in Mr. Motlan's office on Saturday afternoon, it was decided to endorse the following resolutions as submitted by the Executive Farmers Institute.

(1) Resolved, That as farmers and fruit growers of B. C. are too heavily burdened by present exorbitant export rates charged upon both outgoing and incoming commodities, and realize further that unless some substantial relief or reduction in rates are forthcoming that our future position and welfare as such stands seriously involved, and further be it resolved that a copy of this resolution be sent to W. S. Stout, General Manager, Dominion Express Co., Toronto.

(2) Resolved, That we go on record as strongly in favor of a Canadian Pacific Post System, its early introduction and operation, and that a copy of this resolution be sent to our Federal Representative at Ottawa, enjoining his active support, in favor of this resolution.

A communication was received from the Secretary of the Royal Agricultural Commission, stating that they would hold sittings in Alberni, on April 15th and 16th, and asking that this matter be given the widest publicity possible both through the press and otherwise, so as to ensure as good an attendance as possible, to enable the commission to gather all the data possible.

Delegates to represent the Farmers Institute were appointed as follows: to attend the sittings on behalf of the Institute: Messrs J. Heat, H. Woodward and T. M. Greive Jr.

The Department of Agriculture are to be asked to provide Lecturers for the following subjects, at the short course lectures that are to be conducted during May and June by the Department all over the province. For Alberni the following are the subjects that will in all likelihood be treated.

"Feed crops," "Poultry raising," and "Soil cultivation."

The date for these lectures will be set by the department, due notice of which will be given to all those interested.

A communication was also received from Mrs. A. T. Watt, Secretary of the Advisory Board of Women's Institutes of B. C., asking if it would not be possible to start a Branch of the Women's Institute here in Alberni.

This matter was left in the President's hands to deal with.

Just So. The New York Journal of Commerce remarks:—

"Continued drift of American capital to Canada, for investment in the paper industry shows how that country profits from better trade relations with the United States. The placing of capital in this branch of business had begun before the reciprocity arrangement went into effect, but has been much more rapid since that time."

Many other industries would undoubtedly have installed plants in Canada in order to be nearer their sources of raw material or closer to markets, had the reciprocity proposal gone into full operation. This was understood at the time by Canadian manufacturers, and was the basis of their opposition to the changes in duties. Canadian consumers are only beginning to comprehend how they were misled by ill-founded appeals to national prejudice made by those who simply sought to capitalize themselves.

A FIRST-CLASS water supply system is under construction in the city with a head of some three hundred feet, giving an ample supply for at least 20,000 people. This is a great addition to the attractions both from a business and residential standpoint.

Incorporation granted to the City of Alberni.

The Canadian Northern Railway have commenced clearing their right-of-way from Cowichan Lake to Alberni and they anticipate reaching Alberni in the near future.

Opening of a steam laundry in Alberni.

Erection of a number of houses, etc., and the enlargement of both of the hotels to cope with the increased business.

Opening of an up to date hospital, capable of accommodating a large number of patients.

Planting of the farthest west point of the Canadian National Highway at the foot of Johnston street, in the City of Alberni.

The survey of a new road from Alberni via Sproat Lake through to Long Beach, Clayoquot, is nearly completed. This is an extension of the Canadian National Highway.

The setting aside of a large tract of land for a National Park, known as Strathcona Park, at Buttle Lake, only twenty-five miles from Alberni.

Electric light is installed in one of the hotels and several of the main business blocks. Municipal system expected shortly.

Large investments made by influential outside firms in inside property and acreage.

The Municipal Council is now contemplating the erection of a city hall and first-class sewerage system, the laying of sidewalks, and an efficient fire-fighting apparatus has been purchased.

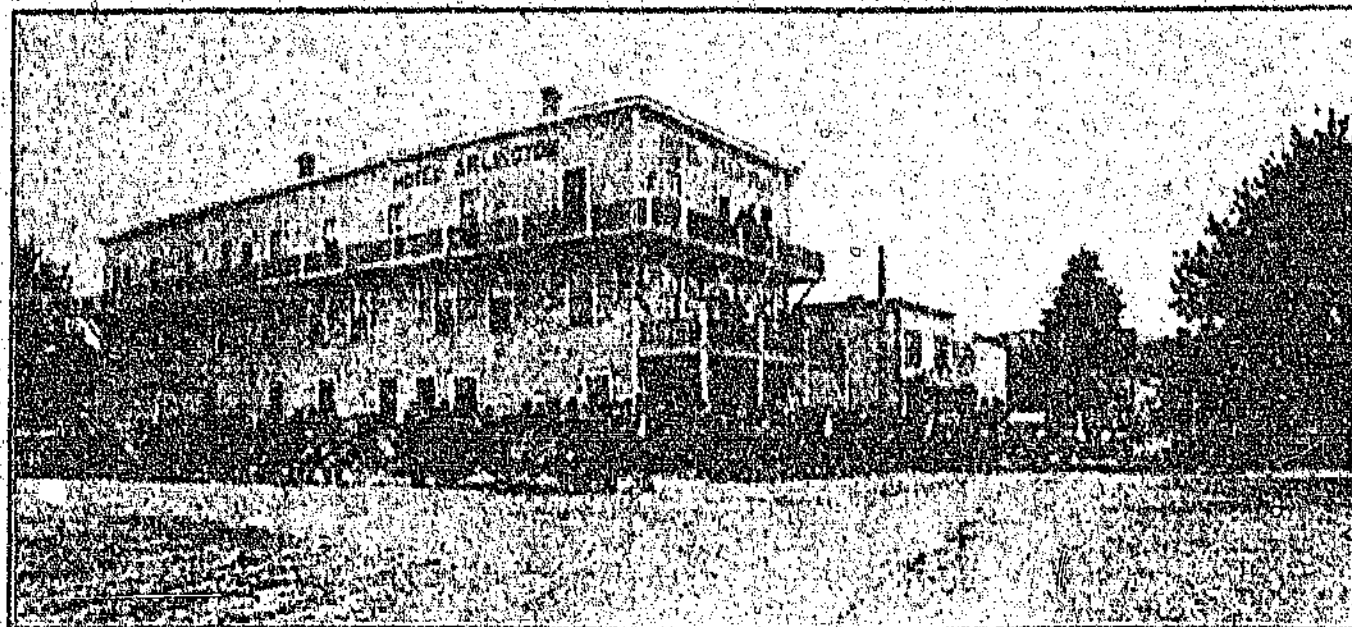

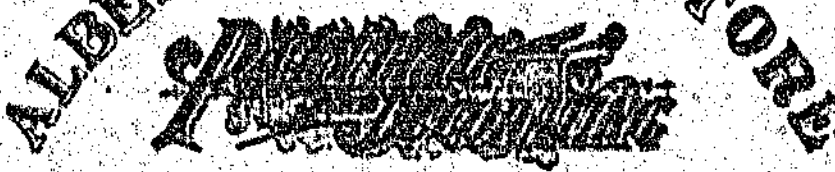
