NAVAL BATTLE EXPECTED SOON

Somewhere off the South American coast between the Argentine and Brazil a British fleet and a German fleet are expected to clash at any hour.

The Portuguese Government will co-operate with the Allies when desired.

Thursday, Nov. 26. It is announced in London that the rout of the German and Austrian armies is complete.

It is officially announced in London that the British battleship "Hulwark" has been blown up at Sheerness. The "Hulwark" was fifteen thousand tons displacement and was twelve years old; she carried a complement of 750 men, of whom only twelve were saved. The explosion is believed to have originated in the magazine.

Petrograd. The correspondent of the London Daily Express telegraphs that the Germans are retreating along the entire eastern front, abandoning artillery, machine and transport, and losing thousands of men taken prisoners.

Nothing of importance from the western front, except that the Allies have again taken Dinard, and that snow is falling on the contending armies.

Good Work.

London, Nov. 25. The German attempt to establish a naval base on the Channel was frustrated by the bombardment of Zeebrugge by a British fleet. The iron works were blown up, and sections of six submarines, Zeppelins, military stores, munitions and supplies destroyed.

A Panic.

London, Nov. 25. Writing of the fighting in Poland a Petrograd correspondent says that the German army is in a disordered flight which is bound to cause a panic in the whole German Empire.

Cracow Invested.

London, Nov. 25. The German advance in the Warta and Vistula country has been checked, and the Germans in East Prussia have been checked at Langeburg. Cracow is believed to be invested on three sides.

Austrians Captured.

Petrograd, Nov. 22. The German efforts are directed toward an attempt to break our lines between the Vistula and the Warta. Our offensive was particularly successful and captured at this north-west of Lodz a battery of heavy artillery and ten machine guns. There was a stubborn resistance at Czesochowa, fifty miles north of Cracow, operations at which place are developing normally. On Thursday last we captured 3,000 Austrians, and occupied Wisniew, Gollce and Dukla in Galicia.

Nothing Doing.

Nov. 25. The Paris Daily Bulletin states that a request for the suspension of hostilities by the enemy has been refused.

Programme Changed.

London, Nov. 24. General von Hindenburg's army of 400,000 men, making a second advance on Warsaw, has been badly cut up and thousands of prisoners taken. The remainder of the army is in retreat from the frontier.

On the western front all German attempts to break through the lines of the Allies have been repulsed. The date of the taking of Calais has now been postponed by the Germans to December 10.

MAMOOK KOPET CULTUS POTLATCH

When is a "Potlatch" not a potlatch and how "authentic" does it need to be before it will meet with the approval of the Indian Department?

All of these and some more questions were asked at the trial this week of a few of our Indian neighbors who were accused of antipatching the Holiday Season with a few pre-dated Christmas gifts. It all came over the recent revival of this ancient tribal tradition on the local reservation, and simmered down to a solemn warning from the court to "Kopet mamook moechlo delate alia."

Mr. Gallo wanted to know if "alia" could be translated as meaning "tomorrow something" but was warned that "delate alia" was accepted by experts as meaning "right away" and had better be so taken.

Later signs were posted warning the "White M'stogs" that the fun was "all off," and that any further proceedings were "delate hysoot."

Wedding.

The marriage of Miss Clara Nicholas, daughter of Mrs. Peter Nicholas, and Mr. Richard Dresden Marshall, formerly of Brandon, Manitoba but now resident of Courtenay, was quietly solemnized at nine o'clock yesterday morning at the residence of the bride's mother, "Chavardale". The ceremony was performed by the Rev. Jas. Caruthers, of St. Andrew's Church. The bride wore a traveling dress and was assisted by her sisters, the Misses Hilma and Lillian Nicholas, while the groom was supported by Mr. H. W. Armstrong, of Victoria. The happy couple took the morning train for their new home. The Advocate joins the many friends of the young people in wishing for them all the happiness which they so richly deserve.

Slightly Mixed.

The Secretary of the Alberni Board of Trade is in receipt of a communication from the Board of Railway Commissioners which contains the following notice of sittings:

"The Board of Railway Commissioners for Canada, will hold a sitting at the City Hall, Victoria, B. C., on Wednesday, the second day of December, 1914, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to hear the following application in which you are interested:

Application of the Board of Trade of Alberni, B. C., for an order directing the Esquimalt and Nanaimo Railway Company (C.P.R.) to install a permanent station agent at Port Alberni, B. C."

Did you get that? "A permanent station agent at Port Alberni, B. C." While we are sorry to learn that our old friend Mr. A. T. Trenouth is evidently not a "permanent station agent" at the Port, still this action of the Alberni Board of Trade may be a help to him in holding his job.

After which friendly action on the part of the Alberni Board of Trade we hope that our Port neighbors will in turn assist us along similar lines.

Hameloi Wreck.

San Francisco, Nov. 24. Nineteen of the sixty persons on board the vessel Hameloi, wrecked on the coast of California, have been rescued.

Broken Up.

London, Nov. 23. De Wet's command has been defeated and broken up in the Orange Free State.

TEAMSTERS MUST CARRY ANCHORS

At the last meeting of the City Council it was resolved to have the City Police call the attention of teamsters to the fact that rigs should not be left unattended when halted about town. It is a matter of wonder that accidents of a more serious nature have not occurred owing to this neglect, and the Council has come to the conclusion that it is better to prevent than to cure. They have the power to act under existing by-laws, and this power will be used unless greater care is taken by the drivers of rigs.

The routine business of the session was broken in a very pleasant manner by a visit from Reeve Lawson of West Vancouver, who was introduced to the members of the City Council by Mayor Hall.

The matter of an application for a station agent at Alberni was brought up on receipt of a notice from the Railway Commission forwarded by the Board of Trade. It was concluded that in view of the present state of traffic it would be as well to withdraw the application for the present.

Musical Recital.

Tickets are now being sold for a musical recital, to be given by the pupils of Miss Wright assisted by the best talent of both cities.

Miss Wright has during the past year or two done a great deal to advance the musical education of our young people. That work has been quietly and efficiently done.

In every city it has been the custom for musicians to give the public an idea of the musical talent to be found among themselves. Up to the present Miss Wright has abstained from this, but now at the request of many she has consented, and on Tuesday, December 8, she, with her pupils and friends, will give a recital well worth hearing. The Muscular will be held in the hall of St. Andrew's Church and the proceeds devoted to the Belgian Fund.

St. Andrew's Guild.

The second illustrated lecture under the auspices of the Guild was delivered last Thursday evening. It is worthy of notice these lectures are increasing in their popularity. This last one had "Standing Room Only" before the time arrived to begin the lecture.

The subject was "The land we came from". Views to the number of eighty-seven were thrown on the sheet, and the audience got a clear idea of the wonderful architectural beauty to be found in the British Isles.

Literary Society.

The society held its bi-monthly meeting last Friday evening at the home of Mr. Prescott, River Road. Although the road and weather were anything but propitious yet there were a goodly number of members present.

Mr. Blandy read a most excellent paper on Kipling. Mr. Blandy always gives the society excellent work but in this instance he excelled himself.

Wristlets.

The following directions have been handed in for the making of military wristlets, now so much in demand. It will be observed that they act as a combination wristlet and shooting mitten. They are to be:

Nine inches long. Cast on 50 stitches. If made on four needles leave a hole for the thumb and join again farther up. Knit plain and pull up for the top of a stocking.

If made on two needles, join up leaving a hole for the thumb, and then join again farther up.

If made in this way they will protect the hands without interfering with the shooting etc., though they can be worn as ordinary wristlets if preferred.

CATALOGUE HABIT

WITH the approach of the holiday season it is now in order to again point out a few things with regard to the "Catalogue Habit" and the harm which such methods work in a little place like Alberni. In the first place the "bargains" set out in big type in these catalogues are very seldom real bargains, as those houses have a class of goods that are made especially for these "bargains." Cheap, showy stuffs that have neither wear nor satisfaction in them. When it comes to standard goods you will find very little difference in the prices at these "Bargain Houses" and those asked by the ordinary merchant.

The just complaint which the local merchant has is in the fact that all this "Catalogue" buying is strictly cash. When credit is needed the local man can carry the customer, but the cash goes outside. The entire business is shortsighted to a degree. Every dollar spent with these catalogue houses hurts the local trade, and kills just that much of the credit of the town. A good live store, doing a fair trade, has a value that is high in the fact that it adds so much more to the value of every property in the place. It helps just that much to build up values in real estate, and to create that volume of business which attracts others to the place, and makes for good standing in financial circles. Upon this standing depends our chance to place debentures, get ahead with needed improvements and shake off the reproach of failure to keep abreast of the times.

Every dollar taken from legitimate local business kills a certain proportion of this ability to advance. How selfish then is the person who, for the saving of a few cents here and there, will pass up their home town, work against the best interests of themselves and neighbors and make a practice of sending away for everything that can be had in this way. What a pity it is that there is not just one more class of bargain houses. Places where a community could send and get "marked down" specimens of humanity to take the places of some of those who are so fond of sending their money so far in search of "bargains."

Hardly a week passes without the Advocate receiving one or

more advertising contracts from these "money getters." We could fill a page of the paper with them in a short time, but from the beginning we have made it a rule to refuse all such business. This from the fact that, in order to live, a little local paper has to depend on local business, and it is not fair to assist in bringing in this competition from a distance. The growth of a catalogue house in the East to however great a business would not help Alberni to the extent of a dime, but the addition of a live business to the place would help materially.

The money sent out of this place would bring in not only one or more places of business but would enable those already in business to materially increase their volume of trade. The whole thing goes far deeper than the first few cents saved in the catalogue trade.

Think it over and cut out the habit.

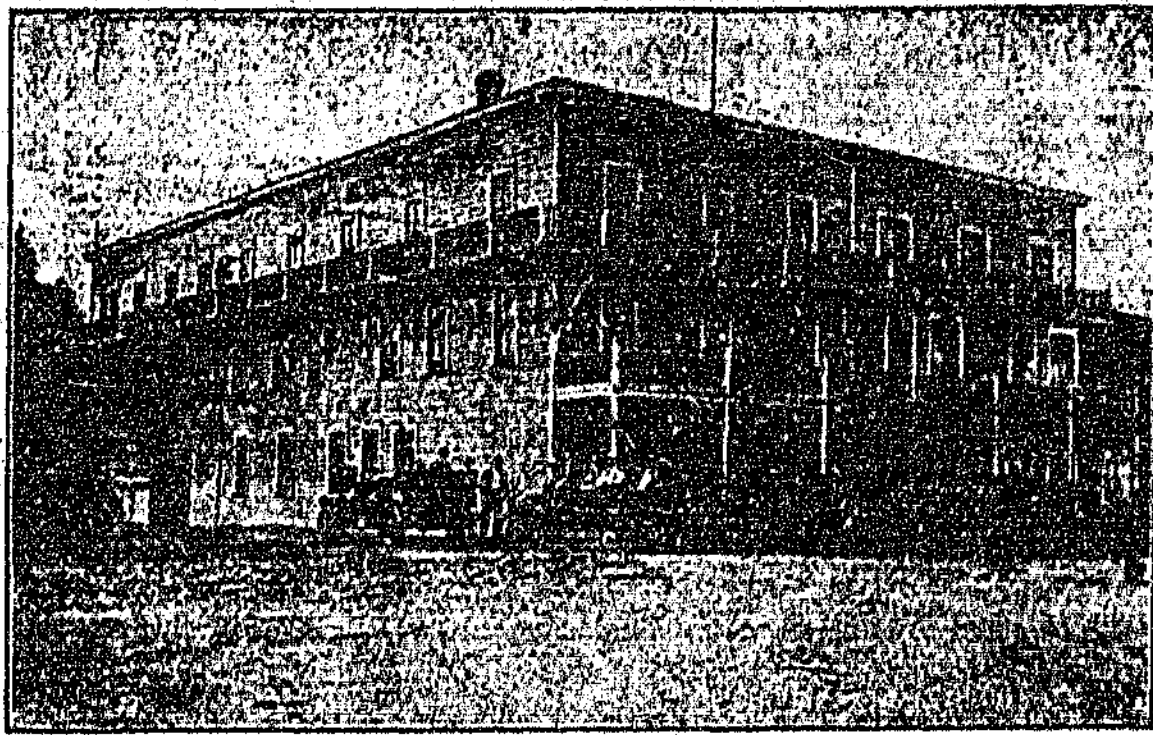

Australian Trade.

The Canada Trade Commissioners at
Melbourne report that with the contin-
uance of the war the great opportunity
for increased trade between Canada
and Australia is becoming more and
more apparent. There is, even now, a
big market for corn in Australia
with the German supply cut off and
Canadian manufactures favourably sit-
uated for shipping can market large
quantities. The same applies to
canned ware and to tube casing, iron
and steel wire and netting.

Although the exportation of wheat
flour and sugar from Australia is pro-
hibited there will be no difficulty in
getting permission to export frozen
mutton and meats to British Columbia
as heretofore provided the shipments
are guaranteed to be used only for home
consumption in Canada. In connection
with the efforts to develop closer trade
relations between Britain and Russia
and the prospective large increase in
the trade between Canada and Russia
across the Pacific it is learned here
that special study is being given in
London and Petrograd to the question
of trade routes, transport and special
branches of trade. It is expected that
this trade will result from the cutting
off of the trade between Russia and
Germany and Austria will become
permanent and continue after the war.

Australian Fleet.

Melbourne, Nov. 15.—The minister
of Defence, Senator Pearce, speaking
in regard to the annexation of Samoa
and New Guinea, said that Australia
hoped to get something more if the
war continues but he refused to be
specific.

Interruptions to escort the Austral-
ian and New Zealand expeditions to
New Guinea and Samoa are blamed
for the failure of the Australian fleet
to capture the German vessels in the
Pacific. The Australian fleet are the
only vessels on the Pacific able to com-
pare with the Germans on a point of
speed.

Prince Henry of Prussia visited Emden on Saturday and inspected the torpedo and submarine craft.

It All Helps.

Monday, Nov. 23. A British aircraft dropped bombs on a Zeppelin shed at Friedrichshaven, killing some people and doing considerable damage. The Germans claim one of the aircraft was brought down and captured after a fight.

An Austrian steamer struck a mine in the harbor of Salonica. Most of the passengers and crew were killed.

Mounted Regiment.

The mounted regiment to be raised in British Columbia will be mobilized at Victoria and the men who have been mobilized in Vernon since August last will be transferred there. Lieut.-Col. C. L. Boyd of Vernon has been appointed to command the regiment.

Some Shorts.

Berlin, Nov. 22. Her Kohler, professor of Jurisprudence, lecturing in Berlin said, "Germany can only make peace with England when the latter has been brought to her knees, and reduced to a second rate state. When the bombs rain upon London we shall all shout 'Glorie!'"
