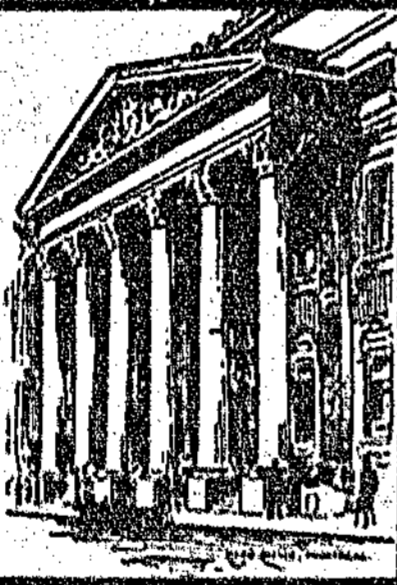

## NO REDUCTION

### THIS TERM

There will no reduction of the amount required from the local hotels for licenses during this term at least. At the last regular session of the Council Mr. McNiff appeared on behalf of the two local hotels and asked for a reduction of fees. During these hard times he thought that a reduction should be made. In fact it was likely that the hotels would have to go out of business in case this was not done.

Mayor Huff pointed out that it was not in the power of the Council to grant such a reduction as the term was already under way, and in any event only a small reduction would be possible under the terms of the act. By-Laws could not be amended by resolution. The matter would have to take its regular course.

Mayor Huff was requested to take a trip outside to attend to some municipal matters and promised to go sometime during the week.

Sundry accounts were ordered paid, and certain routine matters attended to. A number of bond buying firms had written for particulars regarding city securities, and the blanks which they submitted will be filled out by the City Clerk.

### A Stranger.

The fish captured last week by Messrs. Butterfield & Mackie off Port Alberni, and presented by them to the Provincial Museum, has been identified as the White Sea Bass of California, (*Oynoscion Nobilis*).

It is very abundant about Santa Catalina but ranges north to San Francisco, and an occasional specimen has been taken near Victoria. The first specimen on record from those waters was taken at Sooke Harbor about 1892. It is an important food and game fish and is known in its native waters as Santa Catalina Salmon, being considered its equal in every way.

This fish is no doubt attracted to our coast by the warm Japan Current which strikes off California running north.

### Pleasant Meeting.

From all accounts the mass meeting at the Port this week must have been a pleasant little affair. The meeting was called by the Port Board of Trade for the purpose of arranging some method of securing work for the men of the Port during the winter season. The various avenues along which this might be accomplished were discussed, and some resolutions passed. These will be put through the ordinary channels in due course of time, and an effort made to "start" something right away.

## ALBERNI HERO COMING HOME

Today Keith Gill, native son of Alberni, and hero of three of the fiercest fights the world has ever known, is expected home. When Keith gets his medal, as get it he will, on it will be bars carrying such names as Neuve Chappelle, Festubert, and Ypres; names never to be forgotten while the hearts of men vibrate to the tales of heroic deeds.

Keith Gill left us a young giant in health and strength. He will return a broken man. At his country's need he gave up much that makes life worth living to the young and strong. His honorable discharge from further service, for which he is physically unfit, closes this incident of his life, but in the hearts of those who have known him from childhood he will always remain our own brave Alberni boy, and we honor ourselves in honoring him.

## WAR PROGRESS

### IN PARAGRAPHS

London, Oct. 5.—The news of mobilization in Greece caused great excitement in Constantinople. The government was obliged to call on the people to remain calm, declaring Bulgaria was Turkey's ally. The people were also told that the Entente Powers had sued for peace but that the Kaiser had rejected the plea.

Petrograd, Oct. 5.—At noon today, (2 a.m. Victoria time) the foreign office stated that no answer had been received from Bulgaria; this was four and a half hours after the time ultimatum had expired. The foreign office does not expect Russia's allies will send an ultimatum.

Russia has recalled her minister at Sofia.

London, Oct. 6.—The King of Greece has accepted the resignation of the Venizelos cabinet according to official despatches to London.

Eighteen thousand French soldiers have landed at Salonika, and the remainder of 70,000 are disembarking rapidly.

German gunners have taken over the entire Bulgarian artillery.

Petrograd, Oct. 6.—Up to noon today no reply to the ultimatum had been received from Bulgaria.
