The list of those who passed consists of Messrs. A. Fleming, H. G. Rogers, D. Kershaw, N. A. R. Spencer, G. C. Hoff, W. J. Wear, J. Manuel, J. Forsythe, and A. E. D. Jones.

One of the pleasing incidents of this batch of recruits was the fact that young Spencer, who was born in Alberni, was away down in California, where he was engaged in his business of surveying. At the call for more men he threw up his position and came away from the southern portion of California to join the colors, thus showing a spirit that is worthy of all praise.

The total to date who have joined the various regiments from Alberni, the Port and other places in the western part of the Alberni District, amounts to 100 men, a fact that reflects the greatest credit on all concerned, and forms an average to the population that will be found hard to beat.

SIR W. VAN HORNE PASSES AWAY

Montreal, Sept. 11.—Sir William Van Horne, who, from the position of a laborer in the railroad yards at Joliet, Ill., came to be a master of finance and a leading figure in transcontinental railroad development in Canada, died today in the Royal Victoria Hospital here after a serious illness of more than two week's duration.

Sir William had been in failing health for a number of years and on August 22, upon the urgent recommendation of attending doctors he was removed to the hospital, where an operation for abdominal abscess was immediately performed. He rallied and bulletins reported that his condition was satisfactory. Continued improvement was recorded until last Wednesday when his temperature suddenly began to rise and his appetite failed.

Today it was announced that all hope for his recovery had been abandoned and that his death was a matter of hours. He died at 2:10 p.m.

Arbitration.

Washington, Sept. 13.—The United States agreed to arbitration in the case of the Arbitration with Germany.

It is reported that Bonastroll is willing to send von Papen, his military attaché, back to Germany if Lansing desists. This appears to be his plan to prevent further disclosures about the measures to cripple the munition plants. Von Papen would join the army if the Allies would let him through.

Bulgaria Preparing.

Rome, Sept. 13.—Bulgaria today ordered home all her reservists from Italy, and to avoid delay, all travelling expenses will be paid by the government. The men are to join the colors at once. It is expected that Bulgaria will enter the war shortly. The Bulgarian Premier will issue a statement that Turkey has ceded 200 square miles to Bulgaria but declaring that Bulgaria is still unbound by any defensive agreement.

Russian Gains.

Latest Russian reports claim great gains all along the Eastern front. New supplies of ammunition are enabling the Russians to take the offensive.

In St. Paul's Church, Vancouver, on September 3, 1915 by the Rev. H. G. King, William Nicholas Strick to Maud Nichols. Both are well known in Alberni where they propose to reside, and many old friends are extending congratulations.

Dairy Stock.

Mr. J. Bland, of Beaver Creek, received a car load of mixed dairy stock this week. The animals consist of Holstein, Grade Jersey and Ayrshire breeds, and the consignment is from Collingwood, in the Fraser Valley. The new addition to the dairy stock of the valley indicates the upward movement of this class of production, and is a valuable production in more ways than one. Mr. Bland is to be congratulated on his business enterprise.

GERMAN LOSSES VERY GREAT

Russian Official, Sept. 14.—The German and Austrian armies invading Russia have lost 400,000 men in two months. Prisoners state that entire regiments were lost in storming Russian positions, and that the difficulties under which the Germans are advancing are without parallel in military history. Within the past three weeks over 70,000 prisoners have fallen into Russian hands. With each succeeding day the enemy's advance is becoming more and more difficult and the situation of Russia more favorable. The enemy's artillery, his best card, is rapidly becoming ineffective on account of the mud.

Dental Inspection.

It was observed that the recruiting officers have been very particular as to the soundness of the teeth of the men who have offered for enlistment from Alberni. The fact that so many passed the doctors successfully proves that their teeth have not been subjected to any undue strain, and Mr. Rochester, the family butcher is pointing out the fact that his tender and juicy products not only nourish the system but put no undue strain on the most delicate dental work. Even those whose faulty dental work failed to pass the doctor will have no difficulty in absorbing such tender morsels.

City Council.

At the regular session of the City Council the delayed By-Law No. 44 passed. This deals with the storage of gasoline, and provides that those who retain this material will have to have a buried tank and a pump. Users can have ten gallons on the place where used, but other supplies must be kept in a building at least fifty feet from any other building. There are a lot of details that those who use gasoline would do well to read up. It is understood that the authorities will not enforce the by-law until after the first of October, and this will give time to clean up local stocks. The resignation of Constable Forsyth was received and accepted, as he has joined the First Canadian Pioneers, and leaves in a few days. His place will not be filled for a short time as an effort will be made to arrange for a joint service in this line with the Government.

Business accounts were attended to and some routine business disposed of and the Council adjourned.

A CREAMERY

As will be observed by an advertisement which appears elsewhere in this issue, there is an effort being made to resume the creamery business which was once carried on at Alberni. The coming of the speculative period, and the selling of much of the cleared land to those who were more interested in the "33 foot lot" proposition than they were in the real development of the country, caused the closing down of the creamery. It was a bad thing for the place when this was done, and it will be a very good thing if it is found that the business can be resumed.

It is not just the thing that we should be importing butter into British Columbia, but the fact remains that tons of butter are coming in all the time. We can produce much of this at home, and keep the money here where it will do the most good. If we can get the creamery going on a good basis again it will mean that there will be a return to the time when the farmers of the district can look forward to the receipt of a nice little sum of ready cash every month. This is certainly worth working for and the attempt should receive all the support that can be given to it. We hope that all who can attend will turn out to the meeting and give the proposition their support. It deserves it.

PRACTICAL POINTERS ABOUT ALBERNI

Alberni is reached by train from Victoria. Connections are made with Victoria, running through to Alberni on every other day. Passengers from Vancouver City can connect with this train at Nanaimo.

Alberni is also reached by steamer from Victoria and in the summer months there is no more delightful trip than this up the west coast of Vancouver Island and along the picturesque Alberni canal.

The Island trunk line of the C.N.R. is now building from Victoria to Alberni.

It has been found that mixed farming pays best. On plots of from ten to twenty acres fruit growing, dairying, poultry raising, hogs and cattle will all pay well.


