## TELEGRAMS.

### Dr. Young Has Not Forfeited His Seat.

Victoria, B. C., March 31st:—Dr. Young has forfeited his seat. He drew \$125 as aid to physician at Atlin from July 1st to September 30th, 1903. On September 19th, 1903, Dr. Young was nominated candidate, and under the Constitution Act he has forfeited his seat and is liable to a fine. The Constitution says that a man, taking emoluments from the Government, is ineligible as a candidate.

[After the receipt of this telegram, no comment is necessary on our part.]

Tallow has unexpectedly brought down the estimates. Receipts for the fiscal year are expected to reach \$2,559,376. It is said that the introduction of this budget now means "No railway policy."

Gunshu Pass, March 24th:—Kuropatkin, has returned to the front, where he has been appointed by Linevitch to the command of the First Army.

Paris, March 25th:—Enquiry tends to confirm the rumor that approaches toward peace have already begun.

Suez, March 25th:—Nebogatoff's division of the Russian Pacific squadron sailed today towards the south.

St. Petersburg, March 26th:—In consequence of the conditions of unrest, employers of twenty thousand men have decided to close their works.

Warsaw, March 26th:—A bomb, thrown into the police station, wounded six policemen, and a few minutes later, as Baron Von Nolken, chief of police, was being driven to the scene, a bomb was thrown under the carriage, seriously injuring him. The man who threw the first bomb, when trying to escape, shot a policeman, but was finally captured. The second bomb thrower killed a policeman and escaped.

Victoria, B. C., March 27th:—The deal for the sale of the E. & N. Railway to the C. P. R. is off. It is rumored that the Grand Trunk Pacific is offering half a million dollars more.

Yalta, Crimea, March 27th:—Rioters have destroyed nearly all the warehouses, the police station and vodka shops in this city. The police are guarding the post-office

and the treasury. A reinforcement of soldiers is expected shortly.

Gunshu Pass, March 27th:—The Japanese have apparently withdrawn from the region to the south of the Russian front. Linevitch is dispatching scouting parties to the east and west to guard against a possible turning movement.

St. Petersburg, March 28th:—The internal situation is becoming more ominous. The Polish situation is causing anxiety. The Crimea is boiling with discontent and the military have been invoked to crush the revolution at Yalta, near the Emperor's summer residence. The government of Saratoff are closing the schools on account of the peasant disturbances.

St. Petersburg, March 29th:—After the population wrecked the shops at Yalta, warships were sent from Sebastopol and marines landed as if in a hostile country. A renewal of bomb outrages have occurred in Poland and open demonstrations have taken place in Finland against conscription, and are regarded as bad and significant signs.

Gunshu Pass, March 30th:—The Japanese have taken over the Administration of Manchuria and installed Japanese officials in place of Chinese. Fresh Japanese troops are arriving at the front.

Paris, March 31st:—The Associated Press learns in well informed circles that Japan has permitted Russia to learn that peace conditions are to be severely rigorous. Japan's indemnity figure is eight hundred million dollars, which staggers Russian diplomacy.

### What Dr. Young Has Been Doing.

Victoria, March, 20th, 1905.  
Editor Atlin Claim:

Parliament having been at work now for six weeks, I think it an opportune time to give a short account of what I have been able to accomplish up to the present. There have been very important measures introduced and I wish briefly to touch upon those which more particularly affect our District.

The School Bill, by which a redistribution of the cost of education is intended, bore very heavily on Atlin. Under its provisions we would receive \$550; the balance of \$715 would have to be raised by the District. I objected very strongly to what I considered such an unfair measure, and succeeded in having a clause introduced into the Act to meet the condition. As a result, I have succeeded in increasing our grant from \$550 to \$1,000 and have strong hopes of doing even better.

The amendment to the Game Act cut out the privilege of Free Miners shooting, reserving this only

to prospectors. I introduced an amendment by which the right is given to those holding Free Miner's Certificates engaged in placer mining or prospecting. I also introduced an amendment extending the open season for ducks, grouse and ptarmigan to March 30th.

As regards Hydraulic Leases, the Government intends that all statutory requirements shall be carried out and I am happy to say that conditions in the future will be much more equitable than heretofore. The Government has given me every assurance that the cause of complaint shall be removed as fast as possible, and further, the Gold Commissioner has been instructed to give TWO WEEKS PUBLIC NOTICE OF ALL CANCELLATIONS.

There seems to be a wrong impression as to these cancellations, and I have already been severely criticised for taking the action I have. I can only say to this—that in the campaign of 1903 I pledged myself to bring about an equitable administration of the law that people holding leases should be forced to live up to the requirements in the same way that placer miners were compelled to do. At the same time, I wish to say to those who have invested money and made an effort to comply with the law, that it is not the intention of the Government to place any bar in the way of development of the District. But it is the intention of the Government to throw open all land which has been illegally held and to give two weeks' notice of such intention, so that all may have an equal chance of re-staking.

There will be a sub-recording office at Discovery for the convenience of the miners, Mr. Vickers, who has been appointed constable at that point, being in charge.

The District of Atlin has been proclaimed in the British Columbia Gazette as a County and a Judicial District, Mr. John Shirley being continued as sheriff.

The estimates have not been brought down yet, but I am to have an increase and also one or two small special votes.

The trail and bridge from Spruce to Discovery will be put through.

I have also secured an appropriation for the survey of the Juneau Road. Mr. Fraser is receiving instructions from the Lands and Works Department on this point.

Last summer, Mr. Justice Duff gave a decision in the case of Muirhead vs. the Spruce Creek Power Co., allowing the Company, by depositing security for costs, to take the case out of the County Court. This meant that miners would be forced to go to Vancouver with their cases, should their opponents wish it. I talked the matter over with Mr. Justice Duff last summer and again this winter. He admitted the hardship which his de-

cision would work. I am glad to say that I have introduced and passed an amendment to the County Courts Act, whereby all mining cases can be tried in the County Court, and a miner can have a fair show without being frozen out by an opponent with money.

This is, I consider, the most important piece of legislation that I have been able to bring about since my election.

I am afraid that I am transgressing on your limited space, but will be pleased to write you at a later date. I have written the executive committee of the Liberal Conservative Association by this mail, going more fully into these matters, and as they will doubtless call a public meeting, every one will have an opportunity of hearing the letter read.

### Atlin-Juneau Road.

A special meeting of the Atlin District Board of Trade was held at the Court House on Thursday evening last. The object of the meeting was to meet Mr. Chas. Goldstein, of Juneau, who arrived here on Tuesday as a delegate from the Juneau Chamber of Commerce to interview the Atlin District Board of Trade and inform them as to what the people of Juneau were prepared to do towards construct the American end of the Atlin-Juneau Road, and to ascertain what action the people of Atlin had taken in the matter.

Standing room only in the Court House, went far to show the great popularity of the scheme. The president of the Board introduced Mr. Goldstein to the meeting, who then made a few remarks, and asked to be informed as to what steps had been taken in the matter.

The secretary stated that it was our intention to get a survey made at the earliest possible date and that he had been assured that the Provincial Government would make an appropriation for that purpose.

Mr. Goldstein then rose and stated that Congress had passed a new law which provided that all non-incorporated towns could appropriate 70 per cent of the taxes collected by them, for road construction, and that he was authorized to state that the Juneau citizens were ready to build their end of the line as soon as they had the assurance that the Atlin people would build the road.

Mr. Goldstein said that the total distance from Atlin to Juneau was only between 90 and 100 miles, and that there were no formidable obstructions from Juneau to the forks at the junction of the Klatkan and Nakina Rivers.

It would require a very little stretch of imagination to induce the belief that Atlin is in the lead as a mining camp, suitable to the prospector and investor. Everywhere on the coast, from Vancouver to San Francisco, and in the East, one seldom hears aught but good news of Atlin, and much comment is being made throughout mining circles as to the future of our very vast auriferous deposits. Many wealthy mining men are evidently impressed with our past successes, and our diagnosis of the situation is that Atlin may expect an influx of new blood and much capital in the very near future, which will not only enhance the value of property, but open up a much larger territory than that already being worked and under exploration.

We publish in another column of this issue, a letter from our member, Dr. Young, which refers to the amendments made on the County Court Act. The amendment introduced and passed by our member is of the utmost importance to the District, and is especially beneficial to the miner in so far as it will do away with much costly litigation.

So far as we know, the rumor of the importation of Oriental labor, which has been discussed in these columns and in the outside papers, is unfounded, and one might be led to believe, from the correspondence, that Atlin is in the throes of a contested election. Is it necessary to inflict these letters upon the public? and might we not be spared the trouble of perusing the same, or of attempting to decide on which side the trouble lies? It is a difficult task and is, in our minds, of a political nature, the purport being to further mystify the already puzzled elector!

### Death of Mr. Turner.

Mr. Turner, the inspector of customs at Car Cross, died on Wednesday at Whitehorse. Mr. Turner, who was telegraphed for last week at Vancouver, left on the Princess May and arrived at Whitehorse on Monday last in time to take a last farewell.

Many expressions of sympathy are heard on all sides for the bereaved family, to which we extend our heartfelt sympathy at their irreparable loss.

I learn from those who knew Mr. Miller, best, that he was the soul of benevolence and helpful charity; as such, we may be sure, that could he speak to us from the "spirit land," it would be his preference to have a "memorial" that would be a benefit and help to the living, and in that way ever remain fresh in the memory of his friends and fellow pioneers in Atlin.

## On the Chinese Question.

Victoria, March 21st, 1905.  
Editor Atlin Claim,

Dear Sir:—The mail from the North arrived this morning, and brought me your issue of March 17th, in which I saw a letter from Mr. John Kirkland about Chinese labor in our District. The clipping which Mr. Kirkland adds to his letter was one which appeared last summer and one upon which I immediately took action. I wrote to the authorities at the time, calling their attention to the matter, and they reiterated to me the pledges already on record by the Conservative Government on this question.

The time the communications passed between us was before the Dominion elections, and they called my attention to the fact that as the Liberal Government at Ottawa had refused to accept Mr. Earle's (the Conservative member for Victoria) amendment prohibiting the employment of Chinese on construction of Grand Trunk Pacific, the probabilities were that the northern part of British Columbia would be overrun with Chinamen. The Liberal Government at Ottawa is responsible for this to the extent that they defeated the amendment. Since coming here this winter, I have again taken the matter up, and in conjunction with Mr. Murphy, senior member from Cariboo, we approached the Government on the subject.

I have written Mr. Grant, the secretary of the Liberal-Conservative Association, a letter which goes forward with this mail, in which I have dealt fully with this matter. No doubt, he will bring it to the attention of the citizens.

Vancouver, B. C., March 31st.—Judge Henderson has handed down a decision in the case of Sabin vs. the Pine Creek Power Co., in favor of the plaintiff, who recovers \$2,005.88.

Wm. Beavis who has been one of the most successful quartz mining prospectors in the District, is arranging to leave Atlin for a time, having sold out all his holdings here.

O. C. Solt returned from Consolation Creek this week, where he and others have been working all winter. He reports satisfactory results, and contemplates taking in machinery next winter.

Pat Callaghan sold to Martin Conway, this week, the "Mary Lass," "Scottish Lass," "Kitty Dump," "Bryan," "Foxey," "Black Terrier," "Crescent," "Blue Bell," "Dandy," and "Sunflower," all placer claims on Spruce Creek. The price paid was \$5,000.

**Mineral Claims Change Hands**
