CANCELLATION

Of Delinquent Leaseholds Is Asked by Miners.

Enthusiastic Mass Meeting Passes Important Resolutions — Want Judicial Powers.

At a mass meeting of miners, which was held in McDonald's Hall on Wednesday evening last, a petition was presented for signature, of which the following is the text: George Pollay occupied the chair and Harry Brown acted as secretary. There was a very good attendance of miners from all parts of the district.

To His Honour Sir Henri G. Joly de Lotbiniere, K. C. M. G., Lieut.-Governor of the Province of British Columbia;

And
The Members of the Legislative Assembly of the said Province, now in Session Assembled:

The prayer of your Petitioners, Free Miners of Atlin district, in mass assembled, herewith humbly sheweth, that

Whereas certain Hydraulic Leases in the Atlin Mining Division of Cassiar district in the Province of British Columbia, are at present being held without the necessary yearly assessment work being done thereon or the necessary payment being made in lieu thereof and

Whereas, great confusion has arisen in the office of the Mining Recorder at Atlin, B. C., through the present system of accepting applications and granting and issuing Records of placer and other claims (in many cases for the same ground) and

Whereas great delay, inconvenience and loss have been occasioned to the miners through the lack of power to settle disputes on mining property being vested in the Gold Commissioner, and the fact that a competent Court to settle said disputes sits only for a short session during the summer season,

The necessary steps be taken in the Legislature so that the aforementioned Hydraulic Leases should revert to the Crown and not be open for re-location as leases, but be open for location by individual miners, as we know that much of the ground at present so held is capable of being worked in a remunerative manner for years to come by the individual miner; and

That an improved system of recording be inaugurated whereby not more than one application be taken or more than one record be granted for the same ground, and that the Officials in the Recording

Office be held responsible for the proper carrying out of the said system, and that Gold Commissioners be empowered and instructed to promptly settle all disputes in respect of all kinds of mining property; and

Your Petitioners will ever pray:

The petition has been extensively signed and will in due season be forwarded a copy each to the Lieut. Governor and to the Government at Victoria.

Anti-Oriental Resolutions.

Skagway has followed in Atlin's wake and has, in mass meeting, passed anti-Mongolian resolutions. From advice, it seems that two Chinamen were being employed by Mr. Broemser for help in his hotel, the Astor House, and a committee of citizens waited upon the business men of Skagway to ascertain their feelings in the matter, with the result that at a largely attended public meeting, held last week, the following resolutions were unanimously passed:

Resolved, that it is the sense of this meeting that Chinese are not wanted and that every method not averse to law and order, should be used to expel the Chinese and keep them out of Skagway. And be it further

Resolved, That we, the citizens of Skagway, in mass meeting assembled, ask the committee to further act for us, granting it full power."

May Visit Atlin.

According to a despatch from Victoria, it seems that Mr. W. M. Brewer, the B. C. representative of the ENGINEERING & MINING JOURNAL, of New York, is endeavouring to make arrangements with the Institute of American Mining Engineers that on their excursions next year the Association include British Columbia in its itinerary, in which case Atlin will be included.

Freight Rates.

The merchants are anxiously awaiting the Classification Lists of the new freight tariff of the W. P. & Y. Co. The general rate from the Summit, which is noted below, is to hand, but without the Classification it is impossible to arrive at a correct estimate of the charges which may be imposed on goods during the ensuing season:

Class 1, \$1.90 per 100 lbs; class 2, \$1.66; class 3, \$1.42; class 4, \$1.19; class 5, 95 c.; class 6, 90 c.; class 7, 75 c.; class 8, 73 c.; class 9, 73 c.; and class 10, 70 cents.

WITH the publication of the correspondence between the Dominion and Provincial Governments on the subject of the County Court Judge for Atlin district, and, together with information of a later date from Mr. G. R. Maxwell, M. P., we are now assured that a County Court Judge will be appointed for Atlin, to be resident here.

With all due deference to contrary opinion, we cannot but attribute the greatest amount of success for the probable issue to the Board of Trade of Atlin, with, of course, the endorsement of the Vancouver and Victoria Boards of Trade. It is matter of congratulation, according to the Deputy Minister of Justice, that the Provincial Acts have a provision which permits of the appointment of more than one County Court Judge for any judicial district. It will, in consequence, be unnecessary to inflict upon us a "Deputy," who could come and go as he pleased, in all probability, and in the end leave us worse off than we now are, to say nothing about the reprehensible fact that a "Deputy" is permitted to practice his profession even though he be a "Judge."

At a mass meeting held in Discovery on Wednesday last a petition was presented and numerously signed, petitioning the Government to endeavor to enforce certain suggested changes in the office of the Gold Commissioner with regard to hydraulic leases. With the enforcement of these suggestions our opinion is, that so long as the leasehold clauses of the Placer Act remain in force, there is no reason why a leaseholder should be exempt from the same laws by which the individual miner is governed in the matter of assessment, lay-over and such like. Again, should any leases be forfeited for non-compliance with the regulations governing the same, the individual miner has the first preference to the ground when it can be shown to be ground capable of profitable exploitation by individual miners. The petitioners, however, ask that judicial powers be given to Gold Commissioners, not aware that the Provincial Government has not that power to give. The older heads of the district should remember that the judicial powers with which Gold Commissioners were previously endowed by the Mining Acts was declared "ultra vires" by the Supreme Court. Were it possible to grant that power, as far as Atlin is concerned, it would now be unnecessary as the appointment of a judicial official is assured.

JUDICIAL AFFAIRS

The Appointment of a County Court Judge.

Some Interesting Correspondence Which Has Passed Between the two Governments.

The following copies of correspondence with the Dominion Government and the Provincial authorities in the matter of a Resident County Court Judge for Atlin has just been handed down by the Attorney-General:

Ottawa, 28th Jan., 1902.

To the Hon. the Attorney-General of B. C., Victoria, B. C.

SIR:—Referring to previous correspondence with regard to the appointment of a resident County Court Judge for the Atlin district, I enclose herewith copy of a letter which the Minister has received from the Secretary of the Atlin District Board of Trade. Will you be good enough to consider what he states in connection with the representations of the B. C. Board of Trade recently referred to you, and report for the information of the Minister your views with respect to the necessity or propriety of acceding to the request of these Boards of Trade. I understand that by reason of an amendment to your County Court Act more than one County Court Judge may be appointed for any County Court within the Province, so that it may be possible to appoint a Judge for the Atlin district without further Provincial legislation, although, of course, it will be necessary to make provision for the salary here before any appointment could be made.

SIR:—I have the honour to acknowledge receipt of your communication of the 23rd ultimo respecting the necessity for the appointment of a resident County Court Judge for the district of Atlin. I must apologise for the seeming neglect of a previous communication from you on this subject. On the receipt of your letter I asked the late Chief Justice when reporting to the Government of British Columbia upon his work as Commissioner at Atlin, to deal with the advisability of appointing a County Court Judge. Owing to illness for some time before his death the Chief Justice was unable to make this report. From inquiries which I have recently made I am convinced that the representations made to the Honorable the Minister of Justice in the memorial bearing date of the 8th of January, 1902, submitted to him by the Atlin District Board of Trade, are well founded. time a Judge of the Supreme Court goes to Atlin once a year for a short time. It is impossible for one of the Supreme Court Judges to be in that part of the Province for any extended period owing to term engagements, and consequently the administration of Justice, both civil and criminal, is in a highly unsatisfactory state. I will give you an example: If a man be committed for trial upon a charge which he may be quite willing to have dealt with under the Speedy Trials Act by a County Court Judge, he is unable to avail himself of that mode of disposing of his case. The prisoner cannot be taken to Vancouver for election as it is unsafe to attempt to convey him through the American territory which shuts off the Atlin country from the sea. Important litigation respecting mining rights could be brought before a County Court Judge that now has to be delayed pending the arrival of a Supreme Court Judge. I consider the duties that would fall to be discharged by a County Court Judge at Atlin so important that I take the liberty of suggesting that only an able and experienced lawyer should receive the appointment. The Government of this Province will supplement the regular salary paid by the Dominion to the extent of \$500 a year.—I have, etc.

WIRELETS.

NEW YORK, April 16th.—Harris Gates & Co., representing the Millionaire Gates' interests in this city have announced that they have bought a large amount of stock of the Louisville and Nashville Railway, and assert that they have purchased the stock purely for investment and not for speculative purposes.

LONDON, April 16th.—The bondsmen for Princess Radziwell, who is accused of having forged the name of Cecil Rhodes, have withdrawn today, and the Princess has had to go to jail. The case will come up for trial on Monday next.

LONDON, April 16th.—Queen Wilhelmina is very seriously ill and her condition causes the greatest alarm in Holland. The festivities which had been arranged for the celebration of the birthday of Prince Consort on Saturday has been abandoned.

ST. PETERSBURG, April 16th.—M. Sipiaguine, Minister of the Interior, was fatally wounded by an assassin's bullet in the lobby of the Ministerial Offices this morning and died this afternoon. The assassin has been arrested.

TORONTO, Ont., April 16th.—Police Magistrate Craig of Arnprior is dead. He was the father of Justice and George Craig of the Yukon.

DUEL WITH KNIVES.

Fatal Gun Practice — Accident on H.M.S. Mars.

British Budget Shows a Deficit of Forty-five Million Pounds — Income Tax Increased.

CHICAGO, April 16th.—A savage duel with 18-inch butcher knives, which will probably be followed by two deaths, took place last night in the kitchen of the Union League Club. The participants were Emil Colton, butcher, and Joel Kuntz, chef. They cut and slashed one another furiously for several minutes till they both fell covered with wounds. The combat is supposed to have originated through Colton's discharge from the club and he attributed his dismissal to Kuntz. There is very small hope entertained for the recovery of either of the men.

LONDON, April 16th.—The Budget, which has just been put before the Imperial Parliament has caused much bitter feeling among the British people. The deficit is shown to be £45,000,000; and, in consequence, the income tax has been advanced one penny per £. An import duty of three pence has been added upon grain and five pence upon flour and meal. The borrowing of £32,000,000 has been made necessary in consequence of the continued hostilities in South Africa, but should the peace negotiations be brought to a successful issue the contemplated loan may be obviated.


BERLIN, April 16th.—In consequence of the anarchist disturbances in Brussels the schools have been transferred into barracks, while in Morlanwelz, Valere and Mabilie all the factories and mines have been closed. In socialistic disturbances at Namur last night, the mob stoned the police, but the gendarmes finally scattered the rioters by charging the mob with drawn swords. Many arrests have been made, but it is feared the trouble is not yet ended.

LONDON, April 16th.—Cunnery Lieutenant James S. Bourne, Lient. Miller and nine Blue jackets of His Majesty's first class battleship, Mars, were instantly killed yesterday by the bursting of a 12-inch gun, while engaged in gun practice off Berhaven, besides those killed several others on board were more or less severely injured.

TORONTO, April 16th.—The General Elections for the Province of Ontario will take place on May 29th next.
