The latter were met with grape shot from all the batteries of field artillery and the battle which ensued is still in progress. The revolutionists and mutinied artillerymen command the entire post.

Helsingfors, Aug. 4 .- The crew of the Russian cruiser Bogatyr mutinied this morning and that vessel has joined the revolution. There are no details of the transaction.

St. Petersburg Aug. 5 .- Grand Duke Nicholas yesterday assumed his duties as dictator. His orders from the czar are to show no mercy.

M. Stolypin, the premier, was in conference with the czar all Friday night. He is displeased with the appointment of a dictator. It is fully expected that the premier will resign because of the assumption of complete power by Grand Duke Nicholas.

If the troops that are now assigned as unfaithful by the revolution ists prove to be as predicted, St. Petersburg will be in their hands within a few days.

They returned to town in-line afternoon and left for Dawson about 6 p.m. The Guggenheims will have invested several millions in the north before all their Atlin and Yukon properties will be at work up to their fullest capacities. In addition to their northern placer holdings they are heavily interested in copper mines in the Copper river district of northern British Columbia,

A NY available Dominion Lands within the Railway Belt in British Columbia. thay be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any nale over 13 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section of 160 acres more or less.

Entry must be made personally at the local try must be made personally at the local office for the district in which the land

is situate.

The homesteader is required to perform the conditions connected therewith under one of the following plans: (1) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three

(2) If the father (or mother, if the father is eccased) of the homesteader resides upon a irm in the vicinity of the land entered for he requirements as to residence may be

decased) of the honesteader resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the hand entered for, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by such person residing with the father or mother.

(3) If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of his homestead, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the said land.

Six months' notice in writing should be given to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawn of intention to apply for patent.

Coal lands may be purchased at \$10 per acre for soft coal and \$20 for anthracite. Not more than 320 acres can be acquired by one individual or company. Royalty at the rate of ten cents per ton of 2,000 pounds shall be collected on the gross output.
