"Excessive Tension" at Peace Conference.

SOME POINTS HAVE BEEN SETTLED.

Russia Resisting the Four Principle Claims of Japan--Arbitration Proposed--Minto for Viceroy--Poles Strike--Collision, Killed, Murder and Suicide.

[SPECIAL TO THE CLAIM.]

London, Aug. 23.—Lord Curzon, who for some years has been Viceroy of India, has resigned his appointment. Lord Minto, late Governor-General of the Dominion of Canada, has been appointed to succeed him. Lord Curzon's retirement was caused by his continued ill-health and also as a result of his recent bitter dispute with Lord Kitchener in regards to the military administration of India.

Portsmouth, N. H., Aug. 24.—Sensational conditions continue to exist in connection with the Russian-Japanese peace conference in this city. On Saturday last President Roosevelt sent a request to M. Witte, Russian envoy, stating that he would like to be informed as to the progress being made by the conference. M. Witte immediately sent Baron de Rosen to the president's residence at Oyster Bay for that purpose. It is thought that the chances of an early peace will somewhat be improved as a result of this visit. A telegram received here today from St. Petersburg stated that the Emperor had approved of the position taken by the Russian plenipotentiaries in its interim.

The peace envoys have agreed as follows: Japan is to have a protectorate over Korea, which country will however remain independent. Each country is to evacuate Manchuria and recognize the integrity of China. Chinese eastern railroad north to Harbin to be ceded to Japan. Japanese to have fishing rights on the Siberian coast.

The following Japanese demands, and which Russia is stubbornly resisting, are the real bones of contention: Remunerating Japan for the cost of the war, the surrender of Sakhalin island, the surrender of interned Russian warships and that Russia's sea-power in the east be limited.

President Roosevelt has proposed to the conference that all disputed points be settled by arbitration. This has been rejected by the Russian envoys once, but they have submitted it to the czar.

Warsaw, Aug. 24.—A general strike of all workmen has been proclaimed throughout Poland as a protest against the authorities having utterly disregarded the rights of the Poles in the scheme which has been adopted governing the representation in the national assembly.

Already wholesale arrests have been made including among others many leading Polish Socialists.

Butte, Mont., Aug. 24.—One of the worst railway crossing accidents that has ever occurred in the history of this city took place today when a loaded street car collided with a freight train at a street crossing. Nine people were instantly killed and thirteen others were seriously injured, many of whom may die. At present it is not known with whom the fault lies.

Portsmouth, N. H., Aug. 24.—A high Russian official who is at present stopping in the city today summed up the peace conference situation with the words "there is still hope."

Victoria, B. C., Aug. 24.—Word was received here today from Mount Sicker to the effect that on Monday a man named Beach had shot and killed one Joseph Bebeau. The murderer made good his escape. On Wednesday while all the inhabitants were attending Bebeau's funeral Beach returned to the town and fired two shots into the Mount Sicker hotel and then committed suicide.

Tokio, Aug. 24.—The news has been received here stating that a mob of 1,000 Buddha Lawas have attacked the French Roman Catholic settlements on the coast of Sawko, China. Ten churches have been totally wrecked and many of the priests have been killed.

Ottawa, Aug. 24.—Word has reached here that Senator Wark, the oldest member of Canada's upper house, had died yesterday at Fredericton, N. B., at the age of 102 years.

Portsmouth, N. H., Aug. 25.—"Excessive tension" describes the situation at the peace conference. Great excitement prevails in both camps. Large crowds of agitated people gather at the conference headquarters to witness the arrival and departure of the chiefs and attaches.

St. Petersburg, Aug. 24.—Governor Sveibieff, of Gourland, has been removed from his appointment because of his inability to check and prevent numerous recent disorders in the district over which he was governor. The government buildings in 26 different communities were totally demolished.

Toronto, Aug. 24.—Today Eddie Duran, of this city, defeated Tom Sullivan, of New Zealand, for the single scull championship of America by fifteen lengths. The stake included a side bet of \$1,000.

Odessa, Aug. 25.—Fresh agrarian disorders have broken out in many districts and the peasants are destroying the property of many of the land-owners.

St. Petersburg, Aug. 25.—Count Lamsdorf, the Russian foreign minister, today authorized the statement that Russia will pay Japan no con-

tribution, directly or indirectly, nor will she make any cession of territory whatever.

Berlin, Aug. 25.—The house was active today in speculative buying on the chance of the Portsmouth conference resulting in peace.

Ottawa, Aug. 25.—The Hon. Mr. Forget has been appointed governor of Saskatchewan and Hon. Mr. Bulyea governor of Alberta.

Paris, Aug. 25.—As a result of a special meeting of the cabinet which was held today it was announced that a military demonstration will be made against Morocco unless the Sultan of that country promptly yields to the French demands for the release of a French Algerian citizen who was recently unjustifiably arrested at Gharb, on the Algerian frontier. Instructions have been sent to the French minister at Fez to make a final demand on the Sultan. The minister was also informed that if the demand was refused the entire French legation was to depart from Morocco immediately and that a military movement would begin along the entire Algerian frontier.

Portsmouth, N. H., Aug. 25.—Cablegrams received up to eleven o'clock last night from Count Lamsdorf at St. Petersburg oppose the Japanese compromise proposition which was presented at yesterday's meeting.

Portsmouth, N. H., Aug. 25.—Later—The prospects for peace are extremely desperate, but they are not hopeless despite the prevailing pessimism. The forces which are working for peace are continuing their labors.

GENERAL NEWS.

A \$6,000,000 drug trust has been formed in eastern Canada.

Last week lightning killed two farmers in Carlton county, Ontario.

The 74th National Guards of New York will visit Toronto under arms on September 4th.

Nels Nelson was instantly killed by a cave-in on Gold Run, near Dawson, last week.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier is spending his vacation in hunting and fishing on the St. Maurice river.

Part of the business section of Bakersfield, Cal., was destroyed by fire on Aug. 16th, loss \$100,000.

Frank Oliver, the new minister of the interior, arrived at Dawson Thursday on departmental business.

Fifteen Indians were killed by a land slide and flood near Spences bridge on the Thompson river last week.

The telegraphers of the N. P. and G. N. railroads have abandoned their late strike and are asking to be re-instated.

Many head of high grade Canadian cattle have been purchased in Montreal for shipment to Japan for stock improving.

Lately the U. S. revenue cutter Perry caught four Japanese fishing

schooners poaching at Alta Island, Alaska. The boats, camp and 30,000 salted salmon were confiscated.

The English channel squadron, consisting of eleven battleships and eight cruisers, is at present cruising in the Baltic sea.

A contract has been let at New York for a new bridge to parallel the famous Brooklyn bridge. The cost will be \$7,284,000.

Claims for \$40,000,000 held by the government of France against Venezuela have been settled by the former accepting \$650,000.

A new ukase has been issued at St. Petersburg authorizing the issuance of a new international loan of \$100,000,000 at 5 per cent.

The yellow fever conditions at New Orleans continue to grow worse. To date there have been 2,500 cases, ten per cent of whom have died.

A report comes from Teintsin, China, that an attempt was made on August 18th to assassinate the empress of China. Guards bayoneted the assailant.

American burglars have lately been operating extensively in Vancouver. Last week one of them seriously shot a householder whose house he was burglarizing.

There was a bad storm on lake Ontario last week. At Toronto and Hamilton all shipping was suspended. The wind caused much damage to fruit and other crops.

The E. K. Wood lumber company of Bellingham, Wash., and who have mills at Nanaimo, B. C., has a contract to ship 14,000,000 feet of lumber to the Panama.

Charles King will be hanged at Edmonton on August 31st for having last year murdered his mining partner, an Englishman named Howard, at Lesser Slave lake.

Forty persons were drowned and scores of others injured by an excursion train plunging through an open drawbridge near Norfolk, Va., on Aug. 18th. The engineer of the train has been held on a charge of manslaughter.

A despatch from Seville, Spain, says that thousands of workmen armed with rifles are marching through that country. All the jails are filled with people who have surrendered to the police on the pretense of having committed crime, thus procuring food and shelter. Famine conditions grow more appalling every day and the country is being devastated by starving people.

Two Men Blown Up.

On Monday last two men named Mead and McDonald, in the employ of the Pine Creek Power Co., Ltd., had a close call for their lives. They were in the act of setting off a number of blasts when their torch went out and, in trying to re-light the torch so as to fire the remaining holes, the previously lighted charges exploded and gave them a serious shaking up. McDonald was severely bruised about the legs and hips. Mead fared worse and had his head and one eye seriously injured, and although it was thought he would lose the eye that danger has been averted. Both men are on the mend.

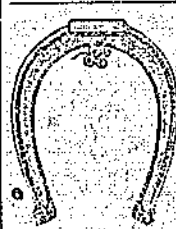

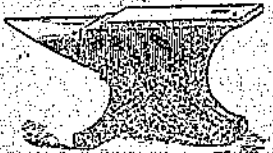

PART IV. "WATER CLAUSES CONSOLIDATION ACT, 1897."

WHEREAS "The British American Pleading Company, Limited," a company incorporated under the "Companies Act, 1897," and which had complied with the provisions of the "Power Companies' Relief Act, 1902," and was in the same position as if it had been specially incorporated as required by Part IV. of the "Water Clauses Consolidation Act, 1897," was granted a certificate dated the 23rd day of June, 1902, approving the proposal undertaken by the Company and which was therein stated as follows:—
"The acquisition by purchase or under powers conferred by the 'Water Clauses Consolidation Act, 1897,' of two acres, more or less, of ground situated on the south side of Pine Creek at the foot of Pine Creek Falls, in the Atlin Lake Mining Division of the Cassiar District, which forms part of the mining ground leased to the Pine Creek Power Company, Limited, for the purpose of hydraulic workings. This piece of land is intended to be acquired as a site for the erection thereon of a power-house and the necessary buildings in connection therewith for the generation and distribution by electrical methods, for the operation of a bucket dredge capable of treating three thousand cubic yards daily, for lighting and any other purposes for which such power may be used under the provisions of Part IV. of the 'Water Clauses Consolidation Act, 1897.' The generality of any words in this clause are not to be limited by any words in the same clause or any other part of this certificate.
"For the purpose of the proposed works the Company has acquired from H. W. E. Canavan a record bearing date the 7th day of April, 1900, of one thousand inches of water, to be diverted from Pine Creek above Pine Creek Falls, and which is to be returned to the stream at the Falls."
And in such certificate it was stated that the Company proposed to begin their undertaking by acquiring title to the said site in manner aforesaid, and by commencing the erection thereon of the said power-house; and that the amount of the capital which would be duly subscribed before the Company commenced the construction of its undertaking and works, or exercised any of the powers of the "Water Clauses Consolidation Act, 1897," Part IV., in that behalf was thereby fixed at the sum of \$25,000, being the whole of the capital stock of the Company, and that the difference between the said sum and the amount required to complete the undertaking and works should be raised by the issue and sale of debentures of the Company, such difference being estimated at the sum of \$75,000; and finally, that the time within which the said undertaking and works were to be commenced was fixed at sixty days from the date thereof, and the time within which all the proposed undertaking should be in operation was fixed at six months from the date thereof;
And whereas the Company subsequently found it inadvisable, by reason of the fact that in the judgment of hydraulic expert engineers the location was not a suitable one for the erection of a power-house, to acquire the site for its power-house referred to in and contemplated by the aforesaid certificate, and on advice that such was within its power determined to and did erect the power-house on ground occupied by it under lease for mining purposes, and known as the "Flora Hydraulic Bench Lease," and situate on the north side of Pine Creek and at the foot of Pine Creek Falls, and has applied for the purchase from the Crown of a certain piece of ground comprising 20 acres or thereabouts, including therein the site of the said power-house, which application has been allowed subject to survey, and said power-house and other the works authorized by the aforesaid certificate are now in operation and have been since a date prior to the date fixed for completion by such certificate;
And whereas the Company has applied to the Lieutenant-Governor in Council for an amendment of its certificate so as to show the correct situation of its power-house, and also the district within which the operations of the Company are to be exercised, and also enlarging its powers, and has filed with the Clerk of the Executive Council the documents required by section 55 of the said Act, and a plan of the said locality;
THIS IS TO CERTIFY that the undertaking of the Company as submitted has been approved and that the same is as follows:—
(a) The acquisition by purchase of 20 acres, more or less, of land described as commencing at a post marked "B. A. D. Co.'s" south-west corner," about 500 feet north-easterly from the south-west corner of the "Flora Hydraulic Bench Lease," on the north side of Pine Creek, in the Atlin Lake Mining Division, Cassiar District; thence east 25 chains; thence north 10 chains; thence west 25 chains; and thence south 10 chains to the point of commencement, and which land is now occupied by the Company, and upon part of which, as shown by a plan filed with the Clerk of the Executive Council, the Company has erected a power-house, with plant con-

sisting of two horizontal Stillwell Bierco Turbine wheels and two Westinghouse type of dynamos, with transformers rating to 22,500 volts.

(b) The acquisition in addition to a record, No. 33 already held by the Company for 1,000 inches of water, which is diverted from Pine Creek above Pine Creek Falls, and is returned to the stream below the Falls, of 5,000 additional inches of water to be taken from Pine Creek at a point about 300 feet below what is known as the Old Junction Bridge across the said Creek, and to be diverted and conducted to the works of the Company by ditch, flume and pipe, and returned to Pine Creek at a point about one-half mile below Pine Creek Falls, and for a record of which the Company has made application;

(c) The construction at or near the point of diversion of the aforesaid 5,000 inches of water of a reservoir for the purpose of settling the water before its entry into the raceway, and the enlargement of the Company's ditch and flume line;

(d) The enlargement forthwith of the capacity of the power-house of the Company to utilize the water-power from Pine Creek and convert the same by means of water-wheels and generators into electricity, and such further enlargement from time to time of the said power-house or of the plant thereof as may be deemed necessary to increase the facilities of the Company in furnishing electrical power;

(e) The operation of the Company's undertaking and works for the generation and distribution of power by electrical methods for mining, lighting and any other purposes whatsoever for which such power may be used under the provisions of Part IV. of the "Water Clauses Consolidation Act, 1897," within the district described as follows:—
