A HARD HIT.

Rates Hitherto Charged By W. P. & Y. Ry. Illegal.

Chance to Get Back Hard Earned Money—Big Mining Deal of White Horse Property.

The best piece of news received in camp for many days is contained in the following delayed despatches, comment is unnecessary:

OTTAWA, Nov. 20th.—The Government announces that it will permit no more extortionate freight charges by the White Pass route; and

OTTAWA, Nov. 23rd.—The Minister of Railways and Canals has addressed a communication to the officials of the W. P. & Y. Ry. stating that they must at once submit a new tariff for next year, and notifying them that the old rates were turned down. The communication is reported to contain a clause to the effect that the rates must be reduced FIFTY per cent.

The Minister of Railways gave out an opinion today setting forth that all rates heretofore charged illegally may be collected by due process of law.

Another plum for the Atlin Board of Trade!

VANCOUVER, Dec. 6th.—We have been experiencing some exceedingly stormy weather for the last few days. Casualties are feared in shipping circles. The lumber barge, Wheeler, turned turtle in the Sound and four men were drowned. The steamer, Discovery, of Juneau, is a week overdue and it is feared she has met with disaster.

McKenzie and Mann have made a claim upon the Dominion Government for \$300,000, for breach of contract in the construction of the Stickeen-Teslin railway. The Senate has thrown out the bill. It will be referred to the Exchequer Court.

J. W. McFarlane, Deputy-Census Commissioner from Atlin, reports that the figures of the last census are 600 short from last count, owing to the winter exodus.

Reports have reached us from White Horse, announcing the consummation of two big deals in mining property to the Moore Investment Co. of Seattle. The properties sold are the Graftor Group, for \$30,000, and the Lowe coal mines, for \$300,000.

Still Another Steamship Line.

SEATTLE, Dec. 5th.—West Virginia capitalists are organizing another steamship line between this city and Skagway. Two steamers.

FAILED FOR HALF A MILLION.

Thomas Earle Fails—Banks Lose Heavily.

Corbett-KeGovern Fight—E. G. Prior Loses His Seat in the Dominion House—Fatal Collision in San Francisco Harbour.

VICTORIA, B. C., Dec. 5th.—The large provision house of Thomas Earle closed its doors today. The firm has failed for the enormous sum of \$158,000. The failure is ascribed to recent heavy losses in a railroad building contract, in the construction of 100 miles of the Seattle-International railroad. Amongst the heaviest creditors of the firm are The Bank of B. N. A., \$280,000; Bank of Montreal, \$30,000; Molson's Bank, \$40,000; the Bank of Commerce, \$30,000. The firm of Thomas Earle is one of the oldest in the Province. The Pioneer Coffee & Spice Mills, of which Mr. Earle is the senior partner, will likely suffer by the failure.

Deadly Fog.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Dec. 5.—A disastrous collision happened today, during a dense fog, by which twenty persons were drowned. The ferry steamer, San Rafael, from Oakland, collided with the ferry steamer, Sausalito, from Sausalito, inside San Francisco harbour.

The Rebels Repulsed.

COLON, Colombia, Dec. 5th.—The rebel army has been completely defeated by the Government forces while on the march to attack Panama. The victorious forces have re-taken Colon and peace has been declared.

E. G. Prior, M. P., Offered Liberal Support for Premier.

VICTORIA, Dec. 5th.—In the suit before the Supreme Court to unseat E. G. Prior in the Dominion House, Prior pleaded guilty to contravention of the Election Act. He was declared unseated, but was considered personally innocent of corruption. A similar suit against Thomas Earle was not sustained.

It is stated that Mr. Prior has been promised the Liberal support if he will run for Premier. He was the Conservative member for Victoria in the last Dominion election.

The "B. C. Exchange" is supporting Senator Templeman for the House of Commons, in the seat made vacant by Mr. Prior's retirement. George Riley is to be made a Senator.

We desire to take the present opportunity to thank those friends who have come forward and made it possible to begin the extra service, but its regular continuance requires the unqualified support of the citizens of the district.

ALL residents of the district will hail with delight the action of the Dominion Government in its policy of endeavoring to protect the people of this northern country from the rapacity of railroad monopoly. The announcement is made that the W. P. & Y. Ry. is required to reduce its rates fifty per cent, but if even only 25 per cent, it would make a saving to our pockets of thousands of dollars each year. Let us hope the news is not too good to be true.

It is pleasing to note from the late despatches that the Victoria Board of Trade is taking up our cudgels in inciting upon the Governments of the Dominion and the Province the imperative necessity of at once appointing a County Court Judge. We will never get what we want unless we kick for it. The Atlin Board of Trade is father of this kick.

THE Lake Bennett Railway Co., of which Mike King of Cariboo is one of the promoters, is applying to the Dominion Parliament for a charter. Great good is promised for this section on its completion.

Prohibition.

LONDON, Dec. 4th.—The Privy Council has decided that a Province can enforce a Prohibition law.

FENIAN CONSPIRACY.

New Process To Recover Gold.

Conspiracy in Johannesburg -- Lord Strathcona Seriously Ill New Trans-Continental Railway--B. C. Politics.

OTTAWA, Dec. 4th.—The Government authorities acknowledge to correspondent the alleged conspiracy of Fenians to capture the Klondike. One man has been arrested and valuable papers of the order have been seized. James Seeley, of the Yukon Secret Service, and Collector of Customs Busby, of Skagway, claim to have known of it for several weeks. Other good authorities say the plot was only a bunco scheme to extort money from the haters of the British.

Fred Clark, Secy. of the Fenian Order publishes causes and statements under oath to show justification for the conspiracy, and together with his denunciation of Yukon officials he mentions in clause 19, one of corruption against Atlin officials.

De Lamar in Paris.

PARIS, Dec. 4th.—In an interview with M. J. de Lamare, who has just arrived from the gold-fields of Atlin, B. C., he expresses himself as being delighted with the hydraulic prospects of that country. He would not be surprised if his company took out \$40,000 a month next season, as long as the water lasted. He will return to Atlin early next spring.

Makes Gold.

DENVER, Dec. 4th.—Professor Wynne, a scientist, of this city, claims to have discovered a process by which he can recover all the gold from tailings. In a public demonstration of his discovery he recovered an ounce of gold to the ton from tailings, which had, from previous assays, shown but \$7 per ton. Mining men are greatly elated.

Submerged 15 Hours.

VANCOUVER, Dec. 4th.—Holland's new submarine torpedo boat, Fulton, in a trial test, remained under water for fifteen hours.

No More Wires Needed.

NEW YORK, Dec. 4th.—A discovery is claimed by a Swede whereby neither wires, earth or water contacts are necessary, for telephone or telegraphic communication. Successful tests are said to have been made.

McKenzie, Mann Railroad.

VICTORIA, B. C., Dec. 4th.—The "Colonist" is authority for the statement that the Dominion and Provincial Governments have decided to give McKenzie & Mann a bonus for building another trans-continental railroad. The terminus

LONDON, Dec. 1st.—Dr. Krausse, ex-Governor of Johannesburg has been arrested for high treason.

W. T. Stead, pro-Boer, has gone bail for Krausse. The magistrate has informed him that if Krausse escapes he will prosecute him for conspiracy.

LETTER TO THE EDITOR.

SIR:—I must apologize for troubling you again so soon, but it has occurred to me, that as in my communication re mail matters, in your issue of 23rd inst, I omitted to say anything about the couriers, it might be assumed that they were considered remiss in the performance of their duty.

In justice to them, therefore, I wish to say that in my opinion they are courteous, hard-working, energetic men, who conscientiously endeavor to perform their duty, and who do not stick at trifles in the performance thereof. That was their record last winter, and they have given evidence of the same qualities so far this winter, but I suppose they are acting according to their instructions from their employers, the C. D. Co., so that blame, if any there be, should attach to the company and not to the couriers. I am the more impelled to this opinion by the fact that I have not had any Official advice of any restrictions in either class or quantity of "mail" matter intended for Atlin district, but, on the contrary, the Hon. the Postmaster-General, in response to the representations of the "Atlin District Board of Trade," supported by the recommendation of the worthy Inspector of the district, Mr. E. H. Fletcher, of Victoria, has authorized the Postmasters of Victoria, Vancouver, etc., to receive and forward ALL mail matter offering for Atlin on the assumption that the maximum weight contracted for will not be exceeded.

The Board of Trade (who, by the way, have never done anything, according to some people), moved in this matter months ago, and the community are enjoying the benefits accruing from their efforts in this as in other matters.

The couriers are working hard

and contending with difficulties and dangers, in their efforts to keep up communication. They cannot perform impossibilities, but what two men cannot do perhaps four or more could, and the community are justified in expecting the service contracted for. Thanking you in anticipation, I am, etc.—
