### WHIRLWIND OF REVOLUTION.

#### The Rebel and Loyal Fleets Met in Battle.

#### SMALL-POX IN EASTERN CANADA.

Dominion and B. C. Parliaments to Meet in January—McCurdy Resigns—B. C. Courts Upheld—The Powers are in Turkey—Russians at Victoria—Great Lakes Were Storm Swept.

[SPECIAL TO THE CLAIM.]

St. Petersburg, Nov. 29.—Russia is now engulfed in a whirlwind of revolution. The entire naval fleet at Sevastopol has joined the mutineers. Government reinforcements are on their way to that place from Odessa. The British consul at Sevastopol has chartered a vessel and taken off all subjects of Great Britain.

Ottawa, Nov. 30.—Premier Laurier last night attended a meeting which was held in this city for the purpose of protesting against the late massacre of Jews in Russia.

It is reported in prominent circles that the Dominion Parliament will meet about the 20th of January.

Toronto, Nov. 30.—There are seventeen cases of small-pox in this city and some uneasiness has been caused as a result of the fact becoming known, but the health authorities are confident of being able to prevent the spread of the dread disease. Stringent quarantine measures have been adopted.

Word was received in the city today that there are several cases of small-pox in the town of Belleville.

New York, Nov. 30.—President McCurdy, of the Mutual Life Assurance company, has resigned his position as a result of the "F. F." crusade of Thos. Lawson.

It is reported in well-informed circles, and by people who ought to know, that the Lawson party at present have possession of sufficient proxies to control both the Mutual and New York Life companies, and it is quite probable that they will utilize this power in the near future.

Ottawa, Nov. 30.—The appeal against the judgment rendered by the British Columbia courts in the celebrated Cube Lode and Joker Fraction mining case has been dismissed by the Canadian Supreme Court.

The report which has just been handed to the government by Mr. Fitzgerald, general superintendent of Canadian insurance, shows that all the home insurance companies are sound, both financially and in their business methods.

Victoria, Nov. 30.—Thirty Russian Poles and Jews, who were captured in Manchuria by the Japanese army and afterwards refused to re-

turn to Russia, have arrived here and are seeking employment.

Constantinople, Nov. 30.—The instructions to the commanders of the international fleet to land detachments and occupy Mytilene were carried out on Sunday with the subsequent occupation of the customs and postal buildings without arousing any demonstration on the part of the Turks.

There has been an alarming increase in the number of murders of Bulgarians by Mussulmen in Velayet and Salonica during the past few days.

St. Petersburg, Nov. 30.—The situation has suddenly grown exceedingly grave and, to make matters worse, the Russian capital is shut off from telegraphic communication with the interior as a result of the strike of telegraph operators.

New York, Nov. 30.—Terry McGovern and Battling Nelson have been matched to box six rounds in this city in January.

Chicago, Nov. 30.—Nineteen vessels were wrecked on Lake Michigan in yesterday's storm and six others are still missing. The entire crew of the steamer Mataafa were lost and many others are known to have been either drowned or frozen to death.

Port Arthur, Ont., Nov. 30.—The worst storm in the history of the Great Lakes took place during the past two days and several steamers and sailing vessels went ashore at different points on Lake Superior. Many accidents are reported to have happened on the other lakes. The gale attained a velocity of 70 miles an hour and was accompanied by a blinding snowstorm.

Warsaw, Nov. 30.—The postal and telegraph services in this city are completely tied up.

London, Nov. 30.—It is understood that Premier Balfour's cabinet will hand in its resignation some time this afternoon.

Warsaw, Nov. 30.—A Sevastopol despatch states that the rebel fleet openly attacked three loyal warships on the evening of the 28th inst. The latter replied briskly and badly damaged one torpedo-boat destroyer and sunk a torpedo boat of the rebel fleet. The coast batteries also joined in the fight and succeeded in setting fire to the cruiser Otchahoff, commanded by the rebel leader, Lieut. Schmidt. The latter and his mutinous followers tried to reach the other rebel ships with the boats of the burning cruiser but they were captured by loyal torpedo boats. At the same time the Reifostok regiment attacked the barracks which was occupied by the infantry mutineers and a desperate fight ensued. Fifteen hundred of these, with 15 Maxim guns, surrendered during that night and the next morning.

The newspaper accounts are conflicting but state that the battle

ended at 5.30 yesterday afternoon, when all the ships of the mutineers surrendered. Over 5,000 men were killed on both sides.

St. Petersburg, Dec. 1.—When the general postoffice closes at 3 o'clock today it is expected that communication with the outside world may cease for an indefinite period.

Victoria, B. C., Dec. 1.—The British Columbia Assembly will meet on the 11th of January.

#### GENERAL NEWS.

The Lake of the Woods Milling Co. will ship 20,000 bags of flour to Japan as an experiment.

Robbers looted a Japanese store at Los Angeles, Cal., last week and secured \$15,000 in cash.

A. E. Carscadden, awaiting trial for arson at Barrie, attempted suicide last week and will probably die.

Croesus, the trotting stallion with a record of 2:02 1/2, was bought last week by a Minneapolis man for \$21,000.

The U. S. drydock Dewey will be towed by three colliers from Chesapeake bay to Manila by way of the Suez canal and Indian ocean.

The four Dominion bye-elections held last week resulted in three Liberals being elected and the fourth being claimed by both parties.

Word comes from Seoul that the Korean cabinet has adopted the proposition of a Japanese protectorate over Korea as suggested by Marquis Ito.

Lord Mount Stephen has contributed \$50,000 to the Queen's donation for the unemployed of London, of whom there are nearly 1,000,000 persons.

A cheap lodging house on Watson street, Glasgow, was burned early in the morning of Nov. 20th and 39 people lost their lives and 32 others were seriously injured.

A Pittsburg, Pa., despatch says the American Federation of Labor has decided to accept union cards of workmen coming to the United States from foreign countries.

A Savannah, Ga., news despatch says that two additional indictments for embezzlement have been returned against both Gaynor and Greene, who were recently extradited from Montreal.

At Chihuahua, Mexico, last week C. T. Richardson, C. S. Harle and Wm. Manson, all Americans, were convicted of having murdered two men for their life insurance money and were sentenced to be shot.

During the month of October over 22,000 new settlers arrived to make their homes in Canada. Of these 5,000 were from England, 3,000 from the United States and 14,000 from continental Europe.

It has been learned from the police department of New York that Prince Louis of Battenberg, who visited there recently in command of a British cruiser squadron, received while in that city numerous anonymous letters threatening his life. The police department has

doubled the detective force in its efforts to trace the origin of the letters which are known to have come from the foreign quarters of the city.

It is stated that a number of important arrests in connection with these letters will be made soon.

Fred Fleck, of Pittsburg, an engineer on the Pennsylvania railroad, has received from Andrew Carnegie a check for \$1,000 in payment for a lunch Carnegie ate in Fleck's engine cab at the time of the Hamstead strike.

A Leipzig, Germany, despatch states that the imperial supreme court has sentenced a Russian girl to one year and three months imprisonment for handing important German documents to a visiting foreign officer.

The government at Havana has received confidential reports to the effect that secret arms are stored in many private houses throughout Cuba. In one place were found 41 rifles, 21 carbines and 30,000 rounds of ammunition.

A London despatch says that the Southeastern Railway Company's channel steamer Hilda foundered off the French coast on Sunday morning, Nov. 19th, and 129 persons were drowned. Only five passengers and one member of the crew were saved.

A St. Petersburg despatch says that a battalion of reservists at Odessa has mutinied and refused to obey orders until better food is supplied. It is said that corruption among the contractors and officers prevents proper supplies from reaching the soldiers.

George Settle, a clerk in the U. S. assay office at Seattle, was arrested on Nov. 24th charged with the theft of gold dust to the value of \$150,000. He admits having stolen \$35,000. He says that he extracted three ounces from each poke and substituted black sand.

At Ottawa recently Earl Grey, Governor General of Canada, unveiled the monument erected to Bert Harper who lost his life while attempting to save that of Miss Blair, daughter of the former minister of railways, when she was drowned about five years ago.

A Copenhagen despatch of the 21st ult. says: The deputation appointed by the Norwegian storting to notify Prince Charles of his election to be king of Norway, arrived on Sunday and was enthusiastically received. Since his elevation to the throne Prince Charles has been the recipient of thousands of congratulations.

A London despatch of Nov. 20th says: Another "poverty parade" took place yesterday on the streets of this city when 5,000 men and a large number of women marched along the Thames embankment to Hyde Park, where many stirring speeches were made. The trend of the addresses was to condemn idleness and demand of parliament to find work for the people who, through enforced idleness, have become poverty stricken.

### NELSON.

The papers which reached us in the last two mails contain a great deal about Mr. John Houston, the member for Nelson, and the questions as to whether he intends to return to the province or not and what effect his non-return would have as regards his seat in the House have been fully gone into.

There is nothing in the law that causes a seat in the Legislature to become vacant by the absence of a member during the session or, for the matter of that, for the whole term of Parliament. There is nothing therefore to compel Mr. Houston to put in an appearance at Victoria at the opening session in order to retain his seat.

Mr. Houston's attendance or non-attendance at the next session can only be a matter of indifference to the Government. Although elected to support it, Mr. Houston during the last two sessions generally voted against the Government. But the loss of his support did not imperil the Government's existence and at the coming session Mr. Houston's vote will count for still less in a division, as Alberni's vote will be cast for the Government instead of for the Opposition as in the past. Conceding Mr. Houston to the Opposition that party will have 17 votes, against 21 supporters of the Government and without the Speaker. The Government still has a clear majority over Liberals, Socialists the Labor representative and Mr. Houston combined.

It is, of course, unfortunate that an important constituency like Nelson should be placed in the position that it finds itself, on account of the erratic conduct of its nominal member. But as long as the electors of Nelson do not call on Mr. Houston, either to give closer attention to his duties in the Legislature or to resign, it is not likely that there will be any change in the present situation.

orphans caused through his unsatiable greed at Hamstead, Pa., about fifteen years ago, he would be thought more of by the public. Carnegie has a past that the distribution of all his millions will never blot out.

An exchange says: "A printing office is usually considered a rather tough place and the newspaper worker is mighty bad. Statistics, however, do not bear out the idea. Of 3,800 persons in the Texas penitentiary there is not a printer or a newspaper man, while there are ministers, lawyers, doctors, bankers, music teachers and members of other professions and callings. The printer gets a bad name because the nature of his business teaches him to detect shams and he is scorned by hypocrites."
