## In the Good Old Christmas Time.

### A "Grand" Banquet.

This has been a very merry and jolly Christmas-time in Atlin, and at no place has there been so much jollity and fun as at the Grand Hotel, where, under the supervision of Mr. and Mrs. Wrong, assisted by a large and highly obliging staff, things have gone as merrily as the proverbial Marriage-Bell.

**War News.**

Shanghai, Dec. 26th.—A squadron of powerful cruisers, under the command of Admiral Kamimura, has gone south to the China Sea to meet the Russian Second Pacific Squadron.

Mukden.—Apparently, there is little personal animosity toward the Japanese among the European Russians. The Russian reservist goes out to fight simply because the Emperor wills it, and takes little interest in the political events involved in the struggle.

Paris.—The international commission appointed to inquire into North Sea incident, met in the Foreign Office. The Commission unanimously appointed Baron Von Spar of the Austro-Hungarian Navy to be the fifth member, completing the preliminary organization, and then adjourned until 9th January.

**Latest News.**

Manilla, Dec. 26th.—The Patjanes have ambushed and killed, near Dolores, on the island of Sumara, a Lieutenant and 37 men of the Thirty-eighth Company of Native Scouts. Two thousand Patjanes, it is said, threaten the town of Dolores. Lieut. Abbott, who is in command of the Scouts, has requested that aid be sent him.

Worcester, Mass., Dec. 26th.—The Adams Express Company has lost nearly a quarter of a million dollars in a fire which developed at Webster Junction one of its cars on the Boston and Albany Railroad trains. The loss included \$200,000 in bank bonds and coupon bonds, in transit from New York to Boston banks.

San Francisco, Dec. 26th.—Batling Nelson, the pugilist, applied last night for a warrant for the arrest of Ted Murphy, who has been his manager, alleging that Murphy left the city, taking with him \$10,000 belonging to Nelson.
