QUARTZ MINING IN ATLIN

Geology and Minerology.

Extract from report by Mr. J. C. Gwillim of the Canadian Geological Survey, 1899: "The Atlin district in general appearance somewhat resembles Kootenay, by its north and south lake system, but the mountain ranges are less rugged, appearing as low, rounded groups with wide valleys or low slopes between them. The greater portion is readily accessible, either by boat or pack animal. Larch-grass is abundant along the upper valleys. The geological conditions of the District appear favorable to the production of ore bodies, the chief rocks being sandstones, quartzites and magnesian rocks. Areas of granite occur throughout, and other intrusions of a more basic character are common among the more apparently mineralized localities. Pine Creek, with its tributaries: Spruce, Boulder, Wright, Birch and Otter Creeks, together with McKee Creek, are at present the productive gold-bearing creeks. They lie in rocks which appear to be a distinct series. Rocks of a slaty or schistose character are not common, excepting about Wright, Otter and the upper part of Spruce Creeks. The prevailing rocks are of a rather massive, fine-grained appearance, often similar to greenstone. There are discoveries of well-defined fissure veins in the hills east of Atlin. They usually carry the common sulphides of iron and lead, together with a small amount of copper. The vein-filling is usually quartz, sometimes showing native gold and crystals of argentites. These veins are often strong and well mineralized with the base sulphides. In several places to the south of Atlin Lake discoveries of native copper have been located. The mineral is found along seams and disseminated in a serpentine rock. Another mineral district lies south and south-west of Golden Gate, on Taku Arm, the chief mineral being galena, iron and copper pyrites, grey copper and native gold, usually in veins of quartz."

Since the publication of the foregoing report, several important discoveries have been made; and the result of development work in quartz mining has proved very satisfactory. It is a conservative statement, that, at least a dozen mineral properties could be mentioned, on which sufficient development work has been done to warrant inspection by mine operators—with a view to the flotation of developing syndicates or mining companies. During the past year, assessment work has been recorded on 78 mineral claims. The more rapid progress of quartz mining is now depending upon the advent of

machinery, which, with improved means of transport, will soon expose the wealth of gold, silver, copper, lead and other minerals deposited about this District.

Quartz Mines.

Lavardiere Group, consisting of five claims, situate on the north bank of Glacier Creek, Tory Inlet, and distant about 31 miles south-west from Atlin. The ledge matter is 180 feet wide, and extends the length of the property, 2,500 yards. The strike of the ledge is northerly, and dips 70 deg. westerly. Work: tunnel, 88 ft. long, 4 ft. 6 in. wide, 6 ft. high. Values: gold, silver and copper. Average assays: \$32.00 per ton.

Lavardiere Two Claims: situate on south end of Copper Island. Work: Various open cuttings, showing native copper. A specimen from this property, weighing 160 lbs. of native copper, was exhibited in the Paris Exposition of 1900.

Big Canyon Group, consisting of seven claims, situate on Fourth July Creek, distant about 16 miles N. N. E. of Atlin. The ledge is 10 to 12 ft. wide of galena ore. There is an easy grade from the mine to Atlin Lake, by which loaded trucks could be run down and empty trucks drawn up. Work: various surface cuttings exposing the ledge throughout the property, and a tunnel 150 ft. long. Assays: \$125.00 and upwards per ton. Ore on the dump, about 300 tons.

Lake View Group of three claims; the Star Mountain Claim; the High Ore Claim; the White Star Group of three claims; the Isabella Claim; and the Barbara Claim, are situate on the eastern slope of Boulder Mountain, between Birch Creek and Boulder Creek. They are adjoining properties, covering an area of about 500 acres. A good wagon road passes within a mile of the properties and good pack trails lead to the camps.

On the Lake View, there are two parallel veins traversing the property, about 400 ft. apart. The lower vein is from 3 to 4 ft. wide and the upper vein is 2 ft. 6 in. wide. Most of the ore is free milling. On the lower vein there are two shafts, about 500 ft. apart; one is 35 ft. in depth and the other 27 ft. in depth. A tunnel 151 ft. long, 4 ft. 6 in. wide and 6 ft. 6 in. high, has been driven on the lower vein. The strike of the vein is north-easterly and the dip 45 deg. north-westerly. The dump from the tunnel contains about 140 tons of ore. The upper vein has been exposed by several surface cuttings. High values have been obtained from both veins. A small stream, crossing the property, furnishes enough water to run a twenty-stamp mill,

and there is sufficient wood on the claims for fuel and mining purposes.

Star Mountain and High Ore Claims: Work: various shafts and cuttings, showing extension of veins from the Lake View Group.

White Star Group of three claims: The ledge is 5 feet wide; strike, N. 53 deg. W.; dip, 75 deg. S. W. Altitude, 1,300 feet above Surprise Lake; nearly 5,000 above sea level. Work: an open drive through country rock, 52 ft. long and 5 ft. wide, to tap the ledge. Tunnelling on vein: 58 ft. long, 5 ft. wide and 6 1/2 ft. high. Mining: 2,800 cubic ft. Assays: from traces of gold to high values in gold and silver. The country rock is composed of talcose slates, mineralised slates, argillites and clay slates.

Isabel and Barbara Claims: No. 1 ledge is 100 ft. wide. A surface cross-cut exposes the ledge. A tunnel to tap the ledge at 60 ft. level is in course of construction. Mining: 1,140 cubic ft. No. 2 ledge is 39 ft. wide. Surface cuttings expose the ledge. Mining: 2,000 cubic ft. Nos. 1 and 2 ledges are large bodies of free-milling, low-grade ore, with a tendency to increase in value with depth.

The mineral claims, named: The Gold, Gold No. 2, Sydney Fraction, Bay View, Homestead, Joe Irving, Gold No. 1, Gold Fraction, and Lake Shore Fraction, are situate near the Lake, on the north side of Atlin townsite. All these claims have ledge matter running through them. On four of the claims, visible gold is found in the surface rock, and increases in richness with depth. One ledge is from 6 to 8 ft. wide; the strike is easterly and dip northerly. Work: about 300 ft. of tunneling and shafting. Assays: high values in gold.

The Big Horn Claims, named Flying Eagle and Flying Eagle Extension, are situate about 30 miles west of Atlin. The owners have built 8 1/2 miles of wagon road to the property. Work: 40 ft. of tunneling on vein 2 ft. wide, and 30 ft. of tunneling on vein 10 ft. wide; also various open drives and cuttings to expose the lodes. An arrastra has been constructed and good values obtained in gold and silver. A dwelling-house stands on the property. Assessment work valued at \$2,500.

Rock of ages: located on Pine Creek. Work: shaft 60 ft. deep, from the bottom of which a cross-cut is driven 7 ft., striking the hanging wall of ledge; a drift, 60 ft. long, running down stream on this level, and a drift, 30 ft. long, running up stream on the 30 ft. level. The ledge is 14 ft. wide. It is low-grade ore with extremely rich patches. A sample shipment of 3 1/2 tons yielded \$49.97 per ton of ore.

Yellow Jacket: property of the North Columbia C. M. Co., Ltd., is situate on Pine Creek. A considerable amount of prospecting and developing work has been done, including a shaft of about 100 feet in depth. The ore is milled at the mine, by a 5-stamp battery, and very high values in gold have been realized.

White Moose Group: consisting of the following claims: The Seattle, Sunrise, Sunset, Tremple, Evening Star, White Moose, and Morning Star. The property is situate on Taku Arm. Work: the mine has been developed by about 250 ft. of shafting and tunneling. The ledge is 4 ft. wide. Test shipments of ore have given very satisfactory results.

Imperial mine: consisting of four claims, known as Lucky Liverpool, Paris Exhibition, Nanaimo, and The Unknown. The location is on the south side of Monro Mountain and lying near the road leading from Atlin City to Pine City. The property is crown-granted to the owners. Nearly all developing operations have been confined to the main lode, which appears to traverse the whole extent of the property; its general direction, as indicated by numerous surface outcrops, is north-east and south-west. There are other lodes known to exist on the property, which give good prospects. The main vein averages 4 ft. in thickness; it is composed of white crystalline quartz, and is matrixed in dioritic and basaltic country rock; the walls are well defined, indicating a true fissure vein. Work: considerable development has been done on the property and the vein effectually opened up by a series of cross-cut tunnels and exploration levels, thereby fully testing the value of the ore, which has also been amply demonstrated by numerous assays and exhaustive mill tests. No. 1 tunnel has been run about 20 ft., intersecting the vein about 20 ft. deep. The reef here is rich in gold and gives values of \$100.00 and upwards per ton. From this cross-cut a level has been drifted on the reef about 150 feet, in a south-west direction. About 250 tons of ore have been taken from this level, giving results from \$8.00 to \$20.00 per ton; small specks of gold may be seen in the quartz. No. 2 tunnel has been run under the line of No. 1 tunnel, and about 100 ft. lower down the hillside: it intersects the reef at 113 ft. from the mouth. A level has been run on the reef about 40 feet, in a south-west direction. The value of the ore, where the tunnel cuts the reef, is \$32.00 per ton, and as the level proceeds the values increase to \$100.00 per ton. On the right side of the tunnel, another level has been extended on the reef about 170 ft. north-east. Samples taken from this level assayed \$32.00 per ton. A test shipment of two tons demonstrated the gold values to be \$25.00 per ton of 2,000 lbs. There are from 2,500 to 3,000 tons of similar ore in sight now, ready to be broken down and milled. This mine commands unusual facilities for economical working, and there is ample water power in proximity to the property.

The Board of Trade and Its Work.

The last quarterly general meeting of the Atlin District Board of Trade for the past year was held in the Court House, Thursday, 9th inst.

Reports presented from the Council showed that a considerable amount of work had been taken up during the month of January in the immediate and future interests of the District and brought before both the Provincial and Dominion Governments.

Amongst these may be mentioned: "The matter of a resident County Court Judge," "The depression of the lumber and shingle industry in lower British Columbia," "The construction of a wagon road to the Coast via Taku Inlet, forming another outlet to this District," "The laying of sidewalks in the town itself," "A vault (fire proof) for the Government Building," and "A special grant towards the Fire Department and lighting the streets."

Considerable discussion was held on the question of the "write up" asked for by the White Pass Co. on the District. The article is limited to 1,000 words, which is to be inserted in the White Pass Folder for 1905. It is impossible to do justice to any one of the industries of the Camp, let alone the Camp in general in so short a space, and some opinion was expressed that the White Pass Co., being in possession of the information compiled by the Board on the resources of the District, last September, that they might gather the 1,000 word "write up" from that. Finally, a better course was adopted that if anything was to be put in the White Pass Folder, Atlin had better prepare the article herself.

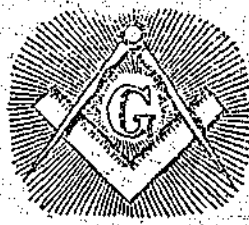
With a view of doing justice to Discovery and the Creeks in the matter of the discussion of the proposed wagon road via Taku Inlet, it was suggested that Discovery should be urged to call a meeting of the miners and residents in the town at an early date for that purpose. The gentlemen who have taken the trouble to collect the information and likely course the road would take, are prepared to attend and lend all help to make the work harmonious and successful.

This is something in which the individual miner and citizen is vitally interested, more so than the store-keepers or the mining companies.

TELEGRAMS.

St. Petersburg, Feb. 5th:—Renewed disorders have occurred at Lodz, resulting in the death of 6 persons and wounding 48. Strikes began today in all coal mining districts.

Colombo, Ceylon, Feb. 5th:—General Stoessel arrived today en route to Odessa. He strongly denies that Port Arthur surrendered prematurely, and says that only \$7.50 remained in the treasury and 400 men were dying daily from wounds and scurvy.

St. Petersburg, Feb. 5th:—Gripenberg has asked to be relieved of the command of the Second Army, because Kuropatkin failed to support him in his recent operations against the Japanese at Sandepas, and left the front for St. Petersburg today. It is rumored that Kuropatkin will also resign.

Vancouver, Feb. 6th:—John McLaren, aged 28, son of an Ottawa millionaire, while crossing the Inlet in a canoe, which capsized, has been drowned. A rescuing party reached the spot as he went down for the third time, and although the body was recovered a moment later, all efforts to revive life were ineffectual. Charles Rogers, formerly of Ottawa and at one time employed on the Yukon Telegraph Line, who was with McLaren, was saved.

Warsaw, Poland, Feb. 6th:—The strike situation at Kalisse has become serious. Continuous conflicts are taking place, 20 strikers have been killed and many wounded.

Ottawa, Feb. 6th:—Wm. Sloan, M. P., brought up the question of American Halibut Fishing Companies encroaching on Canadian waters. The Washington government admits the Canadian's claim to territorial jurisdiction in Hecate Straits.

Oberlin, Ohio, Feb. 6th:—Beckwith, president defunct of the Citizens National Bank, is dead, from heart failure, as the result of worry over troubles in connection with Mrs. Chadwick.

Ottawa, Feb. 7th:—Borden has been elected in Carleton by acclamation and took his seat in the House today.

Warsaw, Feb. 8th:—Several men who attempted to resume work yesterday were killed by strikers. Reports of similar occurrences have been received from other cities. Food is becoming scarce.

Helsingfors, Finland, Feb. 8th:—The Procurator-General of Finland has been assassinated. His son, who rushed to his father's assistance, was wounded. The assassin has been arrested.

Ottawa, Feb. 8th:—The Lumbermen's delegation had an interview with Premier Laurier yesterday and he promised their request to be carefully considered by the Cabinet.

Hockey Match — Discovery versus Atlin.

The first hockey match of the season was played in the Discovery Skating Rink on Sunday afternoon, and resulted in a victory for the visitors of 7 to 3. The match was refereed by H. Cancellor, and was witnessed by a large crowd of interested spectators. The game was good, clean hockey all through, and only twice had the referee to blow his whistle for off-side plays. 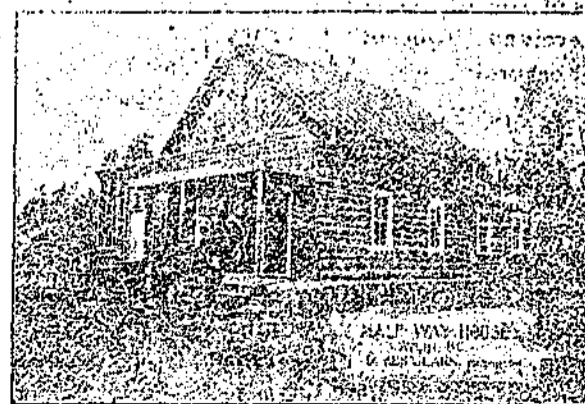
