LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY

Met on Thursday With the Usual Pomp.

Richard McBride Chosen Leader of the Opposition—In a Division the Government is Sustained by a Slender Majority.

VICTORIA, Feb. 20th.—The B. C. Legislative Assembly was opened this afternoon by Lieut. Governor Sir Henri Joly de Lotbiniere with the usual pomp and ceremony. In the absence of Speaker Booth, Hon. G. E. Pooley was elected to the chair.

At a caucus of the Opposition Richard McBride was chosen leader with Green, Kaslo, Patow, Vancouver, Neill, Munro, Chilliwack, Murphy, Ashcroft, and Helmcken of Victoria as Advisory Committee.

Immediately after the reading of the Speech from the Throne the Opposition commenced to fight against the Government and a division was forced on by a motion of the Opposition to bring on the by-elections for Victoria City forthwith. Houston of Nelson moved the adjournment of the debate and, on a division, the Government was sustained by a majority of two.

The Speech briefly intimates the steps which have been taken to secure the construction of the Canada Northern through this Province and the Coast-Kootenay railways; of the negotiations now proceeding in connection with the establishment of pulp mills, and generally outlining the legislation stated by the Premier in his policy recently published throughout the Province.

A member of the Opposition has stated to the Press that active and aggressive tactics will be pursued when the House re-assembles on Monday afternoon.

It is unofficially stated that an offer has been made to the Opposition to let them have two Cabinet positions and the Speakership, but the offer has been declined. The Government expresses itself as being confident of carrying on the business of the session in spite of Opposition threats.

BRITISH ARMS.

The Scots Greys Lose Many Men.

Governor Ross Explains the Government's Action in Granting Concessions in Dawson—An Active Volcano.

LONDON, Feb. 21th.—General Kitchener reports that in a recent engagement a detachment of the Scots Greys became separated from General Hamilton's command and were cut off by the Boers. Forty-six were taken prisoners and several were killed and wounded. The prisoners were afterwards liberated.

DAWSON, Feb. 21st.—Governor Ross talks freely to the Press representatives regarding the concessions made by the Dominion Government to A. N. C. Treagold and others and has apparently satisfied the public that when viewed in the right light the Government has acted wisely in granting a concession that will aid miners in getting an ample water supply at the minimum of cost.

LONDON, Feb. 21st.—At Baku, Trans-Caucasia, by the eruption of a volcano, 2000 people perished and 4000 houses have been destroyed.

OTTAWA, Feb. 21st.—At the Lisgar bye-election Stewart, Liberal, has been elected. The vote stands, Stewart, 3068; Richardson, Ind., 2117; Toombs, Cons., 1483.

NEW YORK, Feb. 21st.—The strike at Barcelona still continues, and the acts of rapacity and bloodshed are becoming worse and worse. Workmen who attempted to go to work were killed by the strikers and the city is practically at the mercy of the mob.

Their forwards made many brilliant rushes, but owing to the lack of combination, were generally checked.

The White Horse team played a splendid combination game and their defense was perfect. Referee Constable Powell had to warn the home team for playing off-side, but proved competent and satisfactory to both teams.

VICTORIA, Feb. 6th.—Application was made today to Judge MacLennan by the White Pass & Yukon Railway Company for a dismissal of the motion made by the Clearing House & Co. for damages against the railroad company, owing to excessive freight charges. The application of the railway company was dismissed with costs to the railway.

Upon the substantiation of one of the charges, many other actions depend, hence the fight of the railway people.

So far as we know, the merchants of the district have not yet taken any concerted action, but we see signs of brick blocks in town as a result of the final issue.

From all reports Atlin has reason to feel proud of the hockey team which was sent to White Horse and instead of the home team simply playing with the local team, was first reported by the Atlinites put up as hard a fight as either of the White Horse teams have had this season.

The first game played on Friday last, was with a combination team consisting of three of the Police and four of the citizens of White Horse, and the second game, reported on page four, was with a Police team. As to the defeat of the Atlin team, the following extract from a personal letter almost marks the defeat as a victory in as much as the goal scored by Atlin is the first one recorded against the Police team.

The work of the Atlin team, their nerve and the place they tackled what is conceded to be one of the strongest teams in the North (the N. W. M. P.) was fully appreciated by the people here. Our earnest wish is to give you a return match in Atlin. Arrangements, it is understood, are being made to have these games, with a citizens and a Police team, about the middle of next month.

The citizens of White Horse gave their visitors a princely welcome, and left nothing undone for their comfort and entertainment.

Its Aims and Objects

General Good of the

Community

Extracts From the Book of Constitution

For Landable Purposes

To the courtesy of the Corresponding Secretary of the District Miners Association we are indebted for a copy of the Constitution of the Association. As the aims and objects of the Association are generally for the promotion of fellowship among the miners and the miners of the district as well as the general good of the community we quote a few extracts from the Constitution

1st. To provide a suitable place or places of meeting where Members may come together from time to time, as may hereafter be agreed upon, for the purpose of considering and acting upon matters affecting the interest of said members

2nd. To take up and act upon in conjunction with any other organized body, such as Boards of Trade, etc., any and all matters affecting the best interest of the camp as a whole

3rd. To provide a means for the free and open discussion of all mining and mercantile matters, thus promoting a better feeling in the community

4th. To provide a medium through which our Legislatures, both Dominion and Provincial, may be brought into a means, urged to deal out even handed justice to all men in the district, and to every man in it be he high or low, rich or poor

5th. To provide a means for mutual help and sociability that can never be attained in a disorganized community

The following Committee shall be appointed, and along with the Officers elected, hold office for a period of six months

1. Petitions and Protests, 2. Information, 3. Social, 4. Relief, 5. Committees are thus specified

It shall be the duty of this Committee to collect and hand into the Corresponding Secretary all reliable information regarding the Camp, such as its wealth producing possibilities in ordinary placer mining, in hydraulic mining and in quartz mining, ideas for its fullest and best development and causes of hinderance to the same and any other matters that will be of interest and mutual benefit to the Members and to the District Relief Committee

It shall be the duty of this Committee to report to the Association persons requiring assistance from ill health or other causes

THE N.W.M.P. vs. ATLIN.

A Hard Game, But Atlin Loses.

Atlin's Lack of Combination Gives Their Opponents the Game.

Owing to the failure of our correspondent's report on the hockey game, played by the Atlin team against the Police team at White Horse last Saturday, to arrive before we go to press, we are compelled to fall back on the report of the game, which appeared in the White Horse Star of the 15th inst.

In the game, which took place this afternoon, between the Atlin and N. W. M. P. teams, the score stood 4 to 1, in favour of the Police. This result was apparently owing more to a lack of combination on the part of the Atlin players than from the greater skill of their opponents, although the Police boys are known to be a wild and woolly gang to hold down in a hockey game.
