A Hot Time Among the Grits.

A Split In The Ranks At The Liberal Convention, Held on Thursday.

JOE MARTIN THE LEADER OF THE MAJORITY.

Resolution to Exclude Provincial Executive and Liberal Editors Carried By a Majority of 80—Senator Templeman and His Minority Following Leave the Convention in the Hands Of Joseph Martin & Co.

VANCOUVER, Feb. 7th.—The first session of the Liberal Convention which was held yesterday ended by the Convention dividing into two factions. The dominant faction was headed by J. Martin and the minority has Senator Templeman for a leader.

At the opening Senator Templeman said that the Provincial Executive would act as a Credentials Committee. Objection to this was taken by Mr. Robert Burnett, Chairman of the Vancouver Liberal Association, who appealed from the chair and offered a resolution to form a committee by taking one delegate from each district, which was carried. This showed that Joe Martin had the Convention with him. This committee excluded the Provincial Executive and Liberal Editors from Convention and only allowed

Senator Templeman to sit by courtesy. Their decision precipitated a row. Bedlam reigned for some time in Victoria and Kootenay, recognizing that Martin had packed the Convention, blocked the proceedings until nearly midnight, when a resolution to admit the Executive and Liberal editors was voted down by 70 to 40. The Victoria and Kootenay delegates, headed by Senator Templeman, walked out of the hall. The Convention elected G. R. Maxwell, M.P., Chairman and President of the Provincial Association.

Two sets of delegates were appointed from Cassiar. The delegates appointed from Victoria were obliged to retire in favor of those regularly appointed.

The Labor delegates appointed from Nanaimo were declared ineligible.

MARTINISM!

Synopsis of Yesterday's Meeting of the Liberal Convention.

Cassiar's Four Members Put in Their Vote With the Majority—Party Politics Decided Upon for Provincial Affairs.

VANCOUVER, Feb. 7th, 4.15 p.m.—Numbers of the "bolters" came back today, and there are now but twenty-five delegates missing from the full quota and these are chiefly from Vancouver Island. Today's Convention is fully representative of the Province. Cassiar's four delegates voted solid for the majority. Executive of 17, with officers, elected. The old Executive all turned down and their constitution rescinded. J. Stables, M. L.

A. has been elected on the Executive. Party lines in Provincial politics adopted without dissenting voice. New constitution demands that ten District Associations must decide whether the Convention be called in future, four of these to be from the different Dominion Constituencies.

VICTORIA, Feb. 7th.—In the retrial before the Supreme Court of the case of Nightingale vs. the Union Colliery Company, the widow sued the Company for damages for her husband's death. Mr. Nightingale was killed in the Trent bridge disaster two years ago. She obtained a verdict of \$8,500, being \$1000 more than was awarded her in the previous trial.

VANCOUVER, Feb. 7th, 4.15 p.m.—An Ottawa special despatch says that Senator Templeman will be taken into the Cabinet, without portfolio.

OTTAWA, Feb. 7th.—The Hon. Charles Fitzpatrick is named as the next Minister of Justice.

Jumpers—Beware!

SINCE the inception of this min-
ing camp there has been a con-
tinual complaint regarding the in-
security of titles to mining property.
Unfortunately the complaint is
only too well founded as the Gov-
ernment has persisted in issuing
records over and over again for the
same ground. There has been
some measure of relief granted in
the Amended Placer Act in so far
that an affidavit is now required
with each application for a record.

The indications at present, re-
garding the movement in mining
property for the coming summer,
are good and the Board of Trade,
recognizing this fact and also recog-
nizing that in the past capital has
been driven away from the District
owing to the indiscriminate jump-
ing of property, have decided to do
all in their power to enforce
the law. The Board is of the
opinion that if an example is made
in one or two cases it will have a
salutary effect and it is the inten-
tion to enforce the provisions of the
mining laws with a special refer-
ence to the reprehensible habit of
jumping claims for purely "hold-
up" purposes. There have been
so many flagrant cases in the past
of promising sales or deals having
been entirely wrecked through this
"dog in the manger" habit that
the Board considers the time has
come to make a wholesome example
of the perpetrators of such outrages,
for outrages they are.

It is within the knowledge of
several members of the Board that
a repetition of these offences is con-
templated during the ensuing sea-
son and without wishing to inter-
fere in any way with the special
course of treatment which our Pro-
vincial Government, in its paternal
solicitude for this revenue producing
camp, has shown or imposed upon
us, the Board have decided to prose-
cute any flagrant case of jumping
that may be brought to their notice.

For the information of would-be
jumpers—"thieves" would be
more appropriate—it might be well
to mention that the Amended Act
of '01 has a penalty clause, Sec.
144, which provides for the salutary
treatment of such miscreants by a
fine of not exceeding \$250, or three
months, and as the Board of Trade
has money to prosecute and the
Police have a big stock of wood on
hand, take warning; and don't play
with fire, else you may get burned.

The above penalty is provided
by the Placer Act, but it must be
remembered that the Criminal Code
also provides one, and a severe one,
for PERJURY.

British Columbia's Quota to the Mineral Production

For Last Year—A Substantial In-
crease Over Previous Re-
cords.

Anticipating the annual Official
Report from the Minister of Mines,
which is not liable to be published
till after the Provincial House
meets, Mr. W. F. Robertson, Pro-
vincial Mineralogist, has prepared
a summary of the mining progress
during the past year and the fol-
lowing letter accompanies the re-
port:

SIR:—I have the honour to sub-
mit to you the following as an ap-
propriate estimate of the mineral
production for the year 1901:

This estimate is based upon the
actual returns of a number of the
mines, and for those mines from
which returns have not yet been re-
ceived the estimate is based upon
their approximate known tonnage
for the past year, together with the
assays from the same mines for the
previous year.

You will note that these are not
given as final statistics for the year,
which can only be obtained after
all returns are in and checked very
carefully. These will be included
in the Annual Report of the De-
partment, which cannot be out for
about two months yet.

I think you will find this esti-
mate conservative and very approx-
imate, quite sufficiently so to
show the progress which has been
made in the mining industry during
the past year.

Roughly speaking, the increase
made in 1901 over 1900 is 25 per
cent on gross value of output of the
Province. This will be a very
agreeable surprise to many as the
circulation of reports giving a con-
trary impression has caused a very
despondent view to be taken of the
progress of the mining industry
during 1901, which does not seem
to be warranted by the facts.

There is an appreciable drop in
the placer gold production, owing
to the sudden melting of the snow
last spring, causing freshets and
leaving a shortage of water during
the latter part of the season.

The tonnage of ore mined from
the lode mines in the past year is
about 871,832 tons, equal to an in-
crease of 317,036 over the year
1900, a little more than 57 per
cent.

There has been an increase in
the output of all the metals with
the exception of lead, the low price
obtainable in this Province for lead
ores having discouraged this class
of mining, except where accom-
panied with good silver values.

The gross value of the copper
output has increased 206 per cent
over 1900, while lode gold has in-
creased 36 per cent and silver 14
per cent.

Observations.

Among the arrivals this week is Mr. J. R. Robertson, M. E. of Franklin, Pennsylvania, who came on Monday, accompanied by Mr. John F. Hall, who has formed a syndicate to take up the Lake View mineral claim, between Birch and Boulder. Mr. Robertson is here to thoroughly examine the mine and report upon it. He has kindly furnished us with a few of his observations since his arrival in the district. The Atlin Mining District is certainly well mineralized for lode, hydraulic and placer work and shows high copper values in several parts of the district. The contour of the encircling mountains and the moraine between, on Pine creek, towards Discovery, seems to indicate the existence of richer and larger quantities of gold than have yet been found in this section. To demonstrate this will require elaborate exploitation at heavy expense.

Atlin is unfortunate in being victimized by a transportation company that taxes it ruthlessly by charging unconscionable freight rates that are inequitable and unjustifiably high; and this more than any other ten factors retards the development of the district. The Canadian Government is to be commended for making a strong effort to have this evil corrected, but has been unable to afford relief having no jurisdiction in Alaska.

The matter is one which should be taken up jointly by both Governments. The citizens of this district have an equitable right of action and should relax no effort until they obtain a tremendous reduction in rates. Another urgent need of Atlin is a sampling, smelting, stamping and concentrating mill, to facilitate the prospecting and development of pay propositions and place them beyond the experimental stage.

FALSE REPORTS

Do Not Meet With Favor—
Disastrous Fire.

Woman in Love Releases Two Notorious Criminals and Shoots Herself—B. C.'s Representative.

VANCOUVER, Feb. 3rd.—The Council of the Vancouver Board of Trade has adopted a plan for wiring outside papers contradicting "yellow" stories, wherever and whenever such occur which might be considered in any way prejudicial to the Province at large. Two sets of telegrams have been sent out within the past two weeks.

NEW YORK, Feb. 3rd.—The Biddle brothers were released from Pittsburg jail by Warden Soffell's wife, who fell in love with Edward Biddle, one of the murderers. They were followed up and killed with buckshot. Mrs. Soffell shot herself through remorse, but may live.

VICTORIA, Feb. 3rd.—There is still no word of the long overdue gunboat, Condor, and the theory is advanced that the collier Mattawan and Condor collided and that both ships were lost with all hands.

VICTORIA, Feb. 3rd.—Premier Dunsmuir will leave for England after the close of the forthcoming session of the Legislature, to represent the Province in the coronation ceremonies of Edward VII.

WATERBURY, CONN., Feb. 3rd.—Four acres of the business section of the city have been destroyed by fire. The loss roughly estimated at \$500,000.

VANCOUVER, Feb. 3rd.—J. F. Thompson, Manager of the "Dawson Sun," arrived here today from Dawson and is en route to New York to consult with Marconi's agents regarding wireless telegraphy to Dawson. He will also interview the Canadian Government.

It is understood that Mr. Thompson has been granted permission to study Marconi's method of telegraphy at the observatory in New York. This permission granted to Mr. Thompson is recognized as a most brilliant opportunity for scientific achievement in the far north.

VANCOUVER, Feb. 3rd.—J. J. Palmer has sold the Marble Bay Mine, on Taxeda Island, to Henry Hewett and others, of Tacoma, for \$20,000.

TARIFF CHANGES.

W. P. Rates Expected to
Take a Drop.

VANCOUVER, Feb. 5th.—It is now thought that the rates over the W. P. & V. Ry. will be materially reduced when navigation on the upper Yukon opens. The charges on the railway from Skagway to White Horse will take a drop and there is every reason to believe that the rates on the B. V. N. Co.'s steamers will also be reduced. This will enable transportation companies operating from B. C. ports to quote through tariff rate, placing Dawson merchants upon a fair competitive basis with the Northern Commercial Company. Such is the condensed opinion of men prominent in shipping affairs in this city.

On Friday last the Alaska Steamship Association held a meeting in Seattle to discuss the drafting of a tariff for through freight to Dawson and other upper river points, but owing to the fact that the management of the W. P. road had not yet announced its through rate from Skagway to Dawson, nothing could then be done. As the B. V. N. fleet of river steamers is controlled by the White Pass directorate, the railway company is enabled to fix the rates on the river transportation. Mr. Newell, the Vice-President and General Manager of the White Pass road, at present in the East, is expected on the Coast in about two weeks, another meeting of the Association will be called and a through tariff drafted.

From such information as can be obtained it is not thought there will be a reduction in passenger rates between B. C. points and Dawson during the coming season; fares will likely remain the same.

NEW YORK, Feb. 3rd.—Tremendous storms are occurring on both sides of the Atlantic. The wind has been blowing a gale, and a velocity of 65 miles an hour is reported. The British steamer, Cloverdale, has been wrecked; she carried a cargo valued at \$2,500,000. The steamship Chanarat has been lost in the English Channel and 21 lives lost. Steamer Anlaby lost with 12 men. Many ships, bargues and tugs washed ashore and will become total wrecks. Ontario, Quebec and the Maritime Provinces are said to have suffered severely.
