BOARD OF TRADE.

Second Annual Report Submitted.

The Praise-worthy Efforts of a Most Commendable Organization.

GENTLEMEN:—In keeping with the custom among organizations such as ours, it devolves upon me as President to address you in Annual General Meeting assembled, and the more is this incumbent on me at this time, as notwithstanding my absence and consequent inability to present a report at your last Annual Meeting—which lack was, however, ably supplied by your worthy Vice-President, who presented a very commendable report—you were good enough to honour me with a second term of office.

As this meeting closes the second year of our organized existence it will be in order for me to give a short resume of the work done or undertaken by your Board, which has at all times aimed at forwarding and promoting the best interests of the community and district in a broad and comprehensive sense, and, although not always successful in accomplishing all that was desired, has much cause for gratification at the results attained.

Meetings:—The Board of Trade held eight Regular meetings and one Special during 1900 and nine Regular meetings this year, while the Council held thirty Regular and five Special meetings in 1900 and thirty-six Regular and one Special meeting this year, or for 1901.

Among the many matters dealt with by your Council I will mention a few, and in order of importance perhaps, comes first:

FREIGHT & TRANSPORTATION CHARGES. The exorbitant charges imposed by the W. P. & Y. route for all classes of merchandise has been one of the greatest hinderances to the development of this district and your Council have repeatedly endeavored to obtain redress by appeal to the W. P. & Y. management by letter and by interviews with their Managers and representatives, by soliciting the co-operation of sister bodies in the Coast Cities; by appeal to the Provincial Government and to the Premier in person, and, last, but perhaps not least, by appeal to the Minister of Railways and Canals at Ottawa. It is gratifying to learn that action has been taken by the Dominion Government and that the W. P. & Y. Co. have been peremptorily required to make a substantial reduction in their rates, and, further, that the charges hitherto imposed by them are practically declared illegal by no less an authority than the Min-

ister of Railways and Canals, and the illegal excess recoverable in a court of law.

PLACER MINING ACT AND APPOINTMENT OF COUNTY COURT JUDGE.—Of perhaps equal importance was the necessity for Amendment of the Placer Mining Act and the appointment of a County Court Judge competent to deal with all local matters, who should be resident in the district.

The facility with which all sorts of dishonest and vexatious interference with prior rights could be practiced under the Placer Mining Act was a most prolific source of trouble and detriment to the development and best interests of the district.

The fact that the same plot of ground could be located and recorded over and over and record fees therefor accepted by the Government, through their officials, was a standing disgrace to the Legislature and a humiliation to every honest Canadian.

Recognising these facts, your Council early applied themselves to suggest a remedy and after much careful study and information gleaned from almost every available source, your Board suggested to the Government a series of Amendments to the Placer Mining Act—some of which were adopted, which, if adopted in their entirety, I confidently believe would have practically precluded any recurrence of the above-mentioned reprehensible acts.

The appointment of a County Court Judge, who should be resident in the district, has been repeatedly urged upon the proper authorities and should be unremittingly pursued until obtained. Indeed, I think the absence of serious crime, under the circumstances, is an evidence of the wholesome respect that obtains for Canadian and British law and justice generally, and also pays a high tribute to the integrity and law abiding instincts of the community.

While on this subject, I may say that one of the most serious drawbacks to the development of this district is the distrust with which capitalists (particularly American) regard the enactments of the Provincial Legislature and the difficulties attendant on obtaining indisputable title to mining property, and it should be the aim of every citizen to do his utmost to remove such embargos from the development of a Province where Nature has been so prolific in furnishing material and opportunity for investment in tempting profusion.

The rapid and successful development of the district will never be undertaken as its importance warrants until the cost of living for man and beast is materially reduced and title to mining property is fixed upon a more stable basis than at present.

THE Second Annual Report of the Atlin District Board of Trade is a very creditable one, and the efforts put forth by the Board show conclusively that as a public body the Board has unquestionably proved its value. It is an undeniable fact that without such an organization many of the privileges and concessions which we now enjoy could not possibly have been obtained, while it is equally true that individual action could never have obtained them for us. As a public body, dealing with all matters appertaining to our common weal, it is but right to look for a larger representation of the community on the membership roll than the Board now has.

THE reference made in the annual report of the Atlin District Board of Trade to the unstable condition of British Columbia politics, is very plainly dealt with in the following extract, taken from a London financial journal, of an interview with Mr. Robert Ward, one of the Province's most prominent merchants. On his recent arrival in London he was asked as to why British Columbia was not so well spoken of in England today as it was aforetime, said: "Well, I would rather not say much about that, for to tell the truth, British Columbia is not so well spoken of in England as it was. Mischievous mining legislation and political unrest have had a serious effect on the standing of B. C. in England, particularly in quarters where mining interests are discussed and considered. It is thought that too much legislation of this kind has not only brought about the high cost of labour, but considerable taxation, which, in its present shape, is iniquitous. The investor feels that if he puts money into ventures out here, it is difficult to see satisfactory returns. Under these conditions, it is difficult to interest people in British Columbia, and it is humiliating to a British Columbian to hear his country disparagingly spoken of. The sooner there is less mischievous legislation and fairer dealing with those who invest money in the big concerns of the country, the better it will be the interests of the Province abroad.

"It is the eight-hour law and the subsequent legislation which imposed unfair taxation on mining companies that is most complained of, and when matters are remedied, British Columbia will no doubt regain its position, for the natural resources of the country fully warrant every attention; in fact, it is regarded that, as far as the country is concerned, it possesses unbounded natural wealth, and every possible facility should be given for its development."

BOARD OF TRADE.

MEDICAL ACT—Amendments: Another matter undertaken by your Board through your Council was the amendment of the Medical Act so that in outlying districts, such as ours, all graduates of the Colleges of the United Kingdom and Canada be allowed to practice their profession without going through the formality of passing an examination in this Province.

This matter was laid before the Legislature through our Representatives but at such a late date that through the determined opposition of those who benefit by the existing arrangements nothing was accomplished, but the request is so manifestly reasonable and important that I trust your Board will again take up the matter and press it to a successful issue. While the Government was good enough to appoint a salaried Medical Health Officer for the district as requested by your Board, it does not follow, nor is it fair or right, that the whole community should be restricted to, or compelled, in case of need, to employ such practitioner when perhaps there are other equally capable, though unlicensed, medical men in the community who would act when occasion requires, but for the embargo at present imposed by the necessity for a license.

BOARD OF HEALTH:—Your Board has each year appointed a Health committee, who have looked after the sanitary condition of the camp and have been ready to co-operate with or make suggestions to the Government Agent as to what was requisite or desirable in the best interests of the community—the suppression or prevention of contagious diseases, etc.

EDUCATIONAL MATTERS:—Your Board through the Council have repeatedly urged upon the Provincial Government the needs and rights of the district in the matter of School facilities for Atlin and Discovery, and by continued effort secured, for Discovery, a school while they had any reasonable number of pupils to attend same, and for Atlin, a fairly liberal allowance, which has made possible the employment of a high grade teacher, with very excellent results, and with the further promise of such a subsidy as will provide for the erection of a suitable and commodious building adequate to our requirements, during the coming summer.

MAIL MATTERS:—Your Board through the Council have from time to time memorialized the Dominion Government with reference to mail facilities, with the result, that notwithstanding the annoyances and hindrances that have occasionally transpired, this community is in the enjoyment of better mail service and facilities than perhaps any community of like age, size and location in the Dominion of Canada or for that matter on the American Continent.

Upon your representation the salary of the Postmaster at Discovery was increased as requested, and again, at your request the petition

of Dr. H. B. Cameron and others for a branch post-office at Spruce Junction, was granted, and Mr. Muirhead appointed Postmaster, but owing to his suspension of business and the transitory movements of the petitioners the branch office was not opened. Through the efforts of your Council the rental of postoffice boxes was reduced fifty per cent, thus placing those faci-

lities within the reach of everybody and this community practically on an equal footing in this respect with the inhabitants of towns and cities outside.

Customs:—Your Council have also had considerable correspondence with reference to Customs charges and regulations and have made repeated efforts to have Atlin constituted a Port of Entry

and all dutiable goods brought forward in bond and cleared here. Their efforts would undoubtedly have been crowned with success but that transshipment at Taku would necessitate the placing of a Customs Officer there, and the business of the district does not warrant the maintenance of two officers so near each other.

DIAMOND DRILL.—Your Board also endeavored to induce the Government to supply a Diamond Drill for use in the district, as is done by the Government of the Province of Ontario. The request thus far has not been granted, but the matter is of sufficient importance to warrant your further efforts for its procurement.

ADVERTISING.—Another matter of considerable importance to the district, undertaken by your Board, was the publishing and dissemination of correct and reliable information about the district, its location, formation, resources, etc. Their first and most elaborate move in this direction was the publication and distribution of a small pamphlet or folder, which was very carefully and creditably prepared and widely distributed. Further efforts were in the form of newspaper correspondence, and latest in the form of bulletins which are prepared under the censorship of a committee of your Board and are transmitted telegraphically. These efforts should procure far reaching and satisfactory results and are, in my opinion, worthy of your continued support. In this connection I would also mention our local newspaper, "The Atlin Claim," which has ever been energetic and aggressive in proclaiming the needs and wrongs of the district and demanding redress for the same. I think the editorial staff deserve strong commendation for the care exercised in publishing only reliable news and information about the district and for the absence from its columns of sectional or personally abusive articles and communications.

Other matters taken up by the Board through the Council, of more or less local importance were:—

The erection of suitable Government buildings;

Additional grants for roads and trails.

A lock-up, etc., at Pine City.

Flagging of winter trails.

Insurance matters.

Peddlers, etc., trading without license.

Fire protection, purchase of engine, etc.

Administration of the Liquor License Act.

Arbitration, which resulted in procuring the erection of a stamp-mill in the district, when litigation and other annoying causes were likely to prevent same.

The reception of the Hon. the Premier of the Province upon his visit here last Fall, etc., etc.

All of which received at the hands of your Council the attention

that their importance deserved.

In addition to the above, I would remind you that at a Citizen's Meeting, formally convened by public notice and held in the Court House on October 25th, 1900, your Council was constituted the Fire Committee for the town, which placed the fire engine and appurtenances, fire halls, night watchman and all that pertained to the prevention and suppression of fires in the town under their supervision and control, all of which entailed considerable additional work and responsibility, and all of which was faithfully and efficiently administered by them, carrying malcontents to the contrary notwithstanding.

It is but right and fitting to acknowledge here the courtesy and consideration with which the Government Agent, Mr. J. D. Graham and his representative, Mr. Thain, have at all times received and treated any requests and representations which your Board or Council have been pleased to make, and among these many courtesies is the privilege of using this room as a meeting place since Sept. 13th, 1900.

While much has been accomplished, much still remains to be done to secure that measure of prosperity which the resources of the district warrant us in expecting, and in the absence of municipal or other organization, it devolves upon your Board to continue to be ever ready to deal with all matters affecting the interests and welfare of the town and district as they may transpire or be anticipated.

While the number of people in the district during the season just passed was not as great as in the two previous seasons the results have been relatively more satisfactory. For this, at least two reasons may be assigned, one, is that as time progresses more systematic prospecting of the various creeks is being done, with the result that rich deposits are being continually discovered where they were not even suspected. This applies to quartz as well, and taken in conjunction with the known developments in placer, hydraulic and quartz properties in the district, justifies the belief that this is a district of immense resources which it will take years to exploit. The other reason is that a better and more desirable class of men comprises the inhabitants of the district now than formerly, again demonstrating that quality rather than quantity is most desirable.

We cannot but admire the pluck and energy that characterizes the majority of the men who are drifting this winter on Spruce, Pine, Willow, Boulder, Otter and McKee creeks, and the very satisfactory results in most cases obtained or in prospective, are eminently gratifying to the principals themselves, to the merchants who supply them and thus contribute to the development of the district, and to the community at large.

While the signs of the times outside of Canada indicate the approach of another of those cycles of depression which inevitably follow overproduction it is pleasing to note that our own country seems to be still riding on the tidal wave of prosperity. Our banker friends, who keep a close finger on the commercial pulse of the country, will, I think, bear me out when I say that bank deposits and volume of exports over imports have been steadily increasing, until today, they stand at an altitude never before attained in Canada. But when the period of depression does come, as it inevitably will, with resources such as ours, which cannot suffer from overproduction, we should be in a position to weather the storm if proper and energetic attention is paid to our requirements in this our formative period.

SECRETARY.—I must congratulate the Board upon its fortunate selection in the matter of Secretary since organization. Your first Secretary was capable and painstaking while he continued actively to perform the duties of the office, and in the present incumbent of that most important office you have a gentleman who lends grace and dignity to the position and whose integrity, ability and attention to the duties of the office are unexceptionable. I trust you may see fit to retain his services while you may.

COUNCIL.—While there have been many changes in the personnel of the Council since organization, it is but fair to state that those who, from time to time, have constituted that important committee have almost invariably given close and intelligent attention to their duties and the matters in hand, whether relating to the Board or the Fire Department and deserve your best thanks for their services. The frequency with which changes in the personnel of the Council have occurred is simply an evidence of the tentative and ever-changing conditions of our environment and which require constant alertness on the part of those who would make the most of them.

And now, Gentlemen, I desire to express my grateful acknowledgment of the honour you conferred upon me by making me your first President and, again, by re-electing me for a second term and my appreciation of the unvarying courtesy with which I have been treated by both Council and Board.

The marked absence of friction and unpleasantness of all kinds which has characterized our meetings and deliberations and which has rendered it a pleasure as well as an easy matter to preside, is very largely attributable to the intelligence and fairmindedness of the gentlemen constituting the Board and particularly the Council.

It will be your duty tonight to select a new Council, from the President down. I bespeak for my successor the same courtesy and

fair treatment which has ever been accorded me, the rendering of which will leave him no cause for complaint. Again thanking you, Gentlemen, I am, respectfully yours,

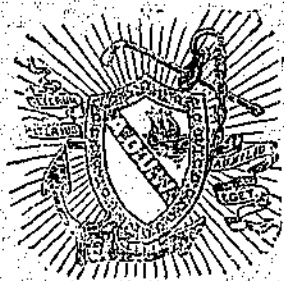
