## P. M. A. of B. C.

Provincial Mining Association  
Will Form Branch in Atlin.

Everyone Interested In The Wel-  
fare Of The District Should  
Join And Aid The Association  
In Its Good Work.

It is intended to form a branch  
of the P. M. A. in Atlin, in addi-  
tion to the branch in Discovery, to  
enable all those who are interested  
in the mining industry to assist in  
promoting the objects of the Associa-  
tion.

The P. M. A. undoubtedly de-  
serves the support of this commu-  
nity. Its constitution says:—"The  
objects of this Association shall be  
to protect, develop and foster the  
mining industry of British Colum-  
bia in all its branches." Such  
worthy objects exactly coincide  
with the requirements of Atlin,  
and we must not fail to continue  
the work commenced by us so vig-  
orously last winter, when a large  
number of our delegates conducted  
to the success of the convention,  
and to bring Atlin very prominent-  
ly before the mining world. It  
would indeed be ungrateful to ig-  
nore the efforts that are being  
made by the P. M. A. which rep-  
resents 10,000 members, and which  
has already succeeded in greatly  
improving the condition of mining  
affairs throughout the province.

But it is evident that without a  
small subscription from the branch-  
es, the work of the Association  
cannot be adequately conducted.

The Atlin branch will not con-  
flict with the Atlin District branch,  
which has its headquarters in Dis-  
covery; but the distance is too great  
for Atlin members to attend meet-  
ings in Discovery during the win-  
ter, and a little friendly emulation  
will be good for both branches.

## 600 PERSONS KILLED

Fire at Chicago Theater Cre-  
ates Terrible Panic.

Asbestos Curtain Falls to Let Ap-  
parent Culpable Negligence  
Of The Management.

Chicago.—A fire broke out on the  
stage of the Iroquois Theatre and  
the asbestos fireproof curtain failed  
to act, the flames, fanned by the  
draught, spread to the auditorium  
the result being that a terrible pan-  
ic ensued in which six hundred  
people lost their lives, the majority  
of whom were trampled to death.

The building was entirely des-  
troyed, and the employee who was  
operating the fireproof curtain vol-  
unteered the statement that he had  
warned the management 3 weeks  
previously that the curtain was out  
of order and could not be depended  
upon in case of emergency.

## BULLION CREEK.

Continued Good Reports from  
the New Placer Fields Near  
Whitehorse.

On 47 below on Bullion, a man  
named Johnson is averaging nine  
ounces per day, from the rim along  
the bench. Quite a number of  
prospectors are working; and all  
along the line good reports are  
current.

The Whitehorse people have  
raised quite a large sum to be used  
in advertising the new placer fields,  
a very commendable action and  
likely to derive large benefits for  
the merchants and others of that  
city, if judiciously done.

From Mr. Brewer's report, on  
the Copper belt at Whitehorse, it  
would appear that Whitehorse  
needs no "booming", and that its  
Quartz alone is sufficient to make  
it quite a mining center.

## WAR

Russia-Japanese Crisis Feared  
at Lloyd's

War risks at Lloyd's rose to 35  
guineas per cent. to the end of  
January and 45 to the end of Feb-  
ruary. Cargo insurance jumped  
from 5 to 20 shillings. The own-  
ers of two cargoes already half way  
to Japan found difficulty in effecting  
insurance even at the latter rates.

## Death Of Mr. Caplice.

One of Montana's Pioneers  
and a Prominent Citizen of  
Butte Laid to Rest.

Many will remember Mr. John  
Caplice who visited this camp in  
1901 and 1902 and regret the death  
of one of the best friends a prospec-  
tor ever had.

His funeral, which took place in  
Butte, was the occasion of a solemn  
convale of Montana pioneers, who  
paid homage to their departed  
friend John Caplice.

Requiem solemn mass was said  
and all the resident and visiting  
clergy in the Sanctuary assisted by  
Bishop Brondel on his throne par-  
ticipated in the impressingly sol-  
emn service.

The death of Mr. John Caplice  
removes the President of the Mont-  
ana Society of Pioneers and leaves  
a blank in the mining world of the  
Western States.

Monro Mountain Mine Again  
Bonded.

Ten Stamp Mill Will be Brought In  
Over the Ice If Purchaser Is  
Satisfied With The Property.

The well known Monro Mount-  
ain Mine has again been bonded

cate gave up their option, and from

The citizens of both places should wake up to the fact that the election of Fire Wardens is a very serious matter, especially when one considers the legal rights and powers they are permitted to exercise, and it is their bounden duty to nominate and elect men capable and willing to take office, which office is a gratuitous one in the interests of the general public and a thankless one at best.

### Great Faith In Atlin.

Mr. J. M. Ruffner Says Hydraulic Mining Will Uncover Riches.

"Atlin is going to be the greatest hydraulic mining district on the coast, and the returns from this form of mining next season will astonish even the most sanguine," said Mr. J. M. Ruffner of Atlin to The Province.

Mr. Ruffner stated that the past season had been a very successful one in spite of the general shortage of water experienced throughout the Yukon and Atlin districts.

Although many of the hydraulic mining companies throughout Atlin were as yet only engaged on development, there was no doubt of the ultimate success of the operations. The British-American Company had been making preparations all summer for operations on a large scale, and rich returns were promised next season. For many miles along Pine and Spruce Creeks development was being done on a large scale with every assurance of success. Few of the companies had reached the stage where a rich clean-up could be expected, but the returns so far had been quite satisfactory.

In the case of the Pine Creek Power Company alone some \$35,000 had been spent in development work last summer, in addition to the initial outlay during the previous year. The returns from last season's operations had paid for these improvements, and for next summer still further improvements, and development work, which is to cost in the neighborhood of \$25,000, are planned. These improvements, Mr. Ruffner said, would be largely in the way of ensuring an additional supply of water to enable operations to be continued later in the season.

### A Suggestion.

It would not be a bad idea to have waterproof mail sacks at this time of the year.

Quite a number of valuable parcels were badly damaged by water on last Saturday's mail.
