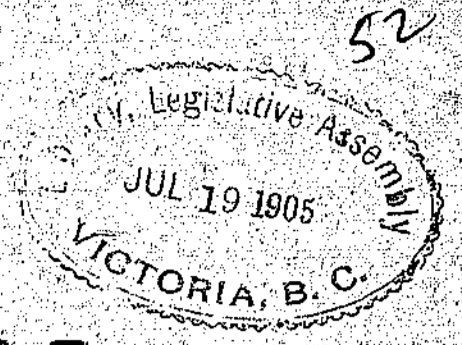

TELEGRAPHIC.

Both Russians and Japanese Claim Small Victories.

MUTINEERS DEMANDED SUPPLIES.

Many Victims of the Glorious 4th—Floods in Mexico—Prize Fight at Dawson—Mining Engineers Met in Victoria.

[SPECIAL TO THE OATH.]

London, July 4.—An Odessa despatch says that the gunboat Kniaz Potemkin, which is commanded by a crew of mutineers, has been sighted 28 miles off that place hotly pursued by several torpedo boats.

St. Petersburg, July 4.—Admiral Kruger wired the war office today as follows: "The crew of the transport Prout mutinied when leaving Budrovo bay and killed several of their officers. I have placed her captain under arrest. The Prout arrived at Sevastopol this morning and her crew are now repenting."

Guanajato, Mexico, July 4.—The number of dead as the result of the recent floods in the immediate vicinity of this place now exceeds over 500. The property loss will amount to over a million and a half dollars.

St. Petersburg, July 4.—General Linevitch has wired the following despatch to the emperor: "On July 1st our forces assumed the offensive near Sawvaise. At seven in the evening, after the artillery had prepared the way for an advance, our troops assailed the Japanese fortified positions and, after a bloody hand-to-hand struggle, dislodged the enemy and pursued them for more than three miles. A Japanese infantry battalion of fully one thousand strong was almost totally destroyed."

Victoria, July 4.—Premier McBride is at present on a stumping tour of the west coast of Vancouver Island. He intends going as far as Cape Scott.

Vancouver, July 5.—The City of Topeka will sail for Skagway on the 8th inst. in place of the City of Seattle, which boat is taking a large excursion party up the coast of Alaska.

Chicago, July 5.—Despatches received here from one hundred and fifty of the principal towns and cities of the United States gives a total of 36 people killed and 1,677 severely injured by the explosion of firecrackers, firearms and gunpowder on the glorious fourth.

Tokio, July 5.—Official despatches received here today from the headquarters of the Japanese army in Manchuria report that a large detachment of Cossacks engaged in reconnoitring have been compelled to retire, and that in one skirmish over 400 Russians and 90 Japanese had been killed.

Dawson, July 5.—Philadelphia

Jack O'Brien and Jack Sullivan, of Boston, fought twenty terrific rounds to a draw before a crowded house in this city last night. It was the fastest, cleverest and hottest bout ever seen in the north.

Ottawa, July 6.—The tariff commission will leave for the Pacific coast shortly after the prorogation of parliament.

Theodosia, July 6.—The Kniaz Potemkin, the warship which was recently captured by her crew of mutineers, has arrived here and threatens to bombard the town if their demands for coal, provisions and medical attendance are not acceded to.

Vancouver, B. C., 7.15 p.m., July 7.—Special to CLAIM—The meeting of the American Institute of Mining Engineers, which has just been concluded at Victoria, was a well attended and an exceedingly successful affair. Matters pertaining to all branches of the mining industry on the continent of America were thoroughly discussed and a general exchange of experiences and opinions on many subjects took place. The Atlin district, besides receiving special mention from Premier McBride in his address, was represented by the presence of Mr. Guillan, late of the Geological Survey, and also by J. H. Brownlee. The itinerary, which had already been arranged, prevents the institute from visiting Atlin. Although ten thousand dollars has been subscribed for the entertainment of the members while in Dawson, the visit there will be of short duration. The general impression of British Columbia as a field for mining investment was most favorable. Everyone says that the Atlin district will get its share of the benefit to be derived by the country at large as a result of the meeting and tour of the institute within the province.

GENERAL WIRES.

Geo. Kuhn, postmaster at West Seattle, has absconded because he was short \$3,000 in his accounts.

Jimmy Britt and Kid Sullivan will fight a twenty-round match at 135 pounds in San Francisco on July 21st.

John F. Wallace, chief engineer of the Panama canal, has resigned owing to disagreements with the canal board.

Lieut.-Gen. Gripenberg has been recalled from Manchuria for having disobeyed the orders of Kuropatkin, who has been appointed inspector-general of infantry.

Advices from Christiania state that war between Norway and Sweden is inevitable. It is even possible that the first blow has already fallen and that a declaration of war has been made. The armies of the two nations are facing each other on the frontier, within striking distance, and awaiting for the word that will cause the carnage to begin. Sweden has already voted a war fund of 25,000,000 crowns.

Mining Notes.

Mr. O. B. Perry left on Thursday for a three weeks trip to Dawson.

As shown by his clean-up last week Mr. F. H. Brackett's plant on the south bank of Pine has been doing good work.

Most of the freight for the dredge at Blue canyon and the steam shovel of the Northern Mines, Ltd., has been delivered to Spruce Creek.

Last week the two mining suits in the County Court, Neved vs. Neidhardt and the Atlin District Prospecting Partnership vs. Canavan, were settled.

Mr. J. J. McLaren, a mining man of Dawson who came in on July 1st, has been inspecting several properties on McKee and other creeks and will leave for the north on Sunday's boat.

As the water on Spruce is dropping considerable the annual crop of water complications are liable to materialize shortly. We trust, however, that the Spruce Creek committee which has this matter in charge will be able to deal with it to the satisfaction of all parties.

Mr. Mead, president of the Engineer Mining Co., who has been in town for some days started for Skagway on Thursday's boat. He left instructions to have the claims held by his company surveyed and crown granted. Mr. McFarlane, C. E., who has the work in hand, will leave for Taku Arm tomorrow night.

Items of News.

The coast town of Metlakatla was burned on July 3rd.

Skagway held big celebrations on both the 1st and 2nd of July.

The Czar has declared a state of war to exist at and in the vicinity of Odessa.

General Czernotucei was assassinated at Kishineff on June 30th and a general strike was inaugurated.

The sailors and dockhands at the Russian navy yards at Kronstadt have killed an officer and gone on strike.

Admiral Kruger has returned to Sevastopol from Odessa. He stated that he did not try to capture the Kniaz Potemkin for the reason that the sailors on his ships are in hearty sympathy with the rebels.

A London despatch states that at Libau, on the Baltic, the Russian sailors both on ships and in the yards have mutinied. They looted the government stores and at last reports were engaged in a fierce fight with the Cossacks.

The mutinous battleship Kniaz Potemkin, accompanied by torpedo-boat No. 267, also with a rebel crew, anchored in the harbor of Kustenji, Romania, on Monday night. The mutineers went ashore and secured food and water.

At Reno, Nevada, on the afternoon of Monday last Melvin Hart, of Louisville, Kentucky, was declared to be the champion heavy-weight pugilist of the world by Jas. J. Jeffries, ex-champion, who refereed the championship battle between Hart and Jack Root, of Chicago. Root was knocked out in the 12th round. There were 24,000 spectators at the contest.

SPORT.

It is an unailing rule in all communities of a healthful standing to find a lot of interest in various kinds of sports.

Atlin used to be no exception to the rule but during the last year or so very little interest has been taken in any particular line of out door sports whatever. A community that encourages all forms of legitimate sport always has a fair return for the money and energy expended, besides which it creates interest in things in general, not to mention the amount of good it does to the moral and physical welfare of both spectator and participant as, in the former it gives the needed diversion to those with business worries while the latter are benefited by both the exercise and the zealousness with which they compete.

Here we have the most favorable climatic conditions, we have the material, why not the spirit?

Our neighbors on Spruce Creek and at Discovery are always willing to meet us in competition in any of the many sports, and it seems a pity that our citizens should overlook the opportunities which exist in this line for much healthy indulgence.

Why not proclaim a civic holiday of some date towards the end of July or in the early part of August and have a day of both water and land sports? The esplanade north of the W. P. & Y. wharf could very easily be put in shape for foot races and athletic competitions, and the aquatic events could take place on the lake immediately in front of this location.

We trust that all Atlinites will make an endeavor to re-establish the fair name of the town among the exponents of athletic competition and out door sport in general.

The Chinese chamber of commerce of the Malay Peninsula has joined the boycott against American goods until the U. S. repeals its exclusion act.

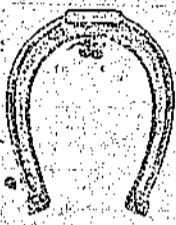
