## McKEE CREEK.

Good Work Being Done By  
the Atlin Mining Co.

Quartz Developments on Taku Pro-  
duces Satisfactory Results—  
Rich Ore from Gleanerville.

Our Editor paid a visit to McKee creek this week, and was the guest of the Atlin Mining Co. He secured some excellent photographs of the company's workings and other scenes on the creek. The Atlin Mining Co.'s hydraulic plant is now in full operation. The flume, which is 2400 feet long, is very well and strongly built. It carries 1500 inches of water and a pressure of 350 feet is obtained at the workings; 2500 feet of pipe conveys the water from the pressure box to the monitor, and the pipe is graded from 24 to 13 inches on line No. 4 and to 12 inches on line No. 2. The pipe and plant were supplied by Armstrong and Morrison of Vancouver, and the pipes have been so well laid that there is not a leak in the whole string. The present line of sluice boxes, which is laid on bedrock, is 250 feet long, 4 feet wide and 3 feet deep. The monitor is worked down stream, and the result is, everything is carried off; no handling of stones and boulders, in fact, the pressure is sufficient to move boulders weighing up to a ton. A substantial wingdam is laid on each side of the mouth of the sluice, and closes in the entire creek bed. The company has practically obtained control of all the claims on the creek so that it has not had the trouble and annoyance which hitherto affected other companies operating in the district. It is easy to predict a substantial clean-up for the Atlin Mining Co.

The Ronayne brothers took out \$229 shovelling, in two days last week from their claim, about 18 above, and on Thursday got a nugget weighing over 28 ounces of pure gold.

Big Jack (Perkinson) is working on a lay from Mr. Felthorstonhaugh on about 20 above, and is taking out good pay.

Dave Cochran and Keishaw have taken a lay on 22 to 24 above and left town for the creek yesterday.

Genaca brothers have bonded their claims, 26 to 30 above, to the Atlin Mining Co.

The Engineer Mining Co. is preparing for a season of great activity. It is stated on good authority that the company has recently disposed of a large block of Treasury stock. The officers of the Company seem unwilling to give specific information as to the programme for the season, but it is more than likely a survey of the group, with the view

of obtaining a Crown Grant, will be the first thing done. An exhaustive examination of both surface and underground showings will then be made. The outlook for converting this property into a dividend-paying mine is extremely promising.

Work on the White Moose & Alamo group on Taku Arm will begin in a few days.

Some excellent samples from the Gleanerville mine were recently taken to White Horse by Dr. Schar Schmidt. The quartz is fairly studded with free gold, and one piece is said to be covered with flakes of leaf gold. Application is now being made for a Crown Grant on this group.

A trial shipment of ore is being taken out from the Laverdiere copper property, across the lake and a gang of men, under Mr. Gibb's superintendence, went over this week to work on the property. We are pleased to note that the prospects are very favorable for this property to be taken up by Montana people. Mr. Caprice has returned to Butte to report, and will be back in Atlin in a few weeks.

It is also said that Mr. Hall, of Boundary, who went out on Monday, has taken a bond on Brown and partner's claims, between Birch and Boulder, paying therefor \$2000 cash, and agreeing to work the property for one year, a final payment of \$18,000 then being due.

## Atlin's Fire Engine Arrives

Its Capabilities Tested By a Volunteer Crew.

The new manual Fire Engine, purchased on behalf of the Atlin Fire Department, by Mr. Graham, arrived in Atlin on Thursday morning. There is no question but that it comes up to the representations made of it. On Thursday evening it was taken in hand by a volunteer crew, under Fire Chief Kirkland, and the showing made by the engine should set our minds at rest as to a serious fire getting ahead of us. A meeting was held last night for the purpose of organizing a fire brigade and to settle on a site for an engine house.

## Atlin to Be a Sub-recording Office For Teslin.

Mr. Thain has been appointed a Deputy Mining Recorder for the district known as the Upper Taku (river) and Teslin lake section in the Teslin Lake Mining division, with Sub-recording office in Atlin, consequently, locators in that mining division can make their records either at Atlin or at the other offices of Mr. Jas. Porter, the Gold Commissioner, as may be most convenient for them.

We are justified in expressing a censure on behalf of the public of Atlin upon the carelessness shown by some person or persons who are in the habit of visiting the far island, opposite town, and lighting fires, neglecting to see that these are put out before leaving. The result of this species of vandalism was that on Wednesday last, during a high wind, more than half the island was enveloped in flames. It should be remembered by campers that there is a heavy penalty imposed by the "Bush Fire Act" for such culpable negligence. We cannot live on scenery, but it costs us nothing to protect what we have and we hope a "word to the wise" is sufficient.

It is to be feared that the Customs Department of the Dominion is not well versed upon the geography of our district, and that the Atlin Board of Trade is considered of such little consequence that its overtures and suggestions are of no weight or avail. The Customs Office, with the change in our transportation arrangements, has been removed from Bennett to Caribou, for the better accommodation of our merchants! Oh, wise men of the East! why didn't you push the office back to Summit? 'twould have been just as convenient there. Caribou has neither bank nor post office and yet it is made the Port of Entry for Atlin. It might be well for the Board of Trade to have a large map of the district prepared and appended to a very strong protest, copies of which should be sent to the Minister of Customs and to G. R. Maxwell, M. P., by way of showing our appreciation of the wisdom shown by the Department.

A QUESTION is being repeatedly asked by merchants and well-wishers of the camp why it is that business is so quiet. A number of people have recently come in and yet there is no visible improvement in business. What is the cause? We want to see the town, as a town, grow and prosper, yet, with all our advantages, things are not as they should be. There must be a nigger on the fence, somewhere. The miners do not come to town; the restaurant and hotel men are not getting patronage, the packers have had to turn their stock out to pasture, yet the creeks are all working, but where is the business? All the local merchants have laid in large stocks of everything a man could desire, but trade does not materially improve. We are told that there is a system of peddling going on on the creeks and that miners are buying supplies, delivered to them, at prices cheaper than they can be delivered at, wholesale, in Atlin. It

is said that flour can be bought, delivered, on Boulder for \$4, while we are told it costs \$4.05 wholesale. To the merchants we would say, refuse to support such a ruinous trade, somebody will get bit, and to the miner we would say, you are encouraging swindling, and are yourselves the victims; those who sell you goods at less than cost must cheat you some way or throw up the sponge.

### LETTERS TO THE EDITOR.

DEAR SIR:—I write to draw your attention to the manner in which we are treated—or rather mistreated—with regard to our mail service here.

Mail arrived in Atlin by small boat at noon on Monday, 3rd inst., and was not received here till about 10 o'clock on the following day; while this week the mail, which arrived by steamer in Atlin on Wednesday, at 1 p. m., was not received here till yesterday (Thursday) afternoon.

Surely an arrangement could be made whereby the mail could be brought up here the same day it arrives in Atlin, as the stages, having the mail contract, make at least two trips up here after the arrival of the boat.—Yours truly,

DISCOVERYITE.

Discovery, B. C., June 14, 1901.

DEAR SIR:—Having cast in my lot with Atlin and its destinies I am naturally much interested in the exploitation of the mineral resources, with which I believe kind nature has liberally endowed it. Shallow placer mining never yet made a permanent camp, nor, for the matter of that, hydraulics either. If the district is going to amount to anything in the future, deep leads and quartz must decide for its permanency. As regards quartz, there have been doings here which far outrun the level of my sapience. I may be old fashioned in my ideas and behind the times, but I utterly fail to see the utility, for instance, of running a tunnel into barren country rock, putting up a mill to crush the useless output and trying to delude yourself and other people into the banal idea that you have a mine. It is on a par with "Yankee Doodle," who "Stuck a feather in his cap and called it Macaroni"! In your issue of the 8th inst. appeared a very well written report by Mr. Gilroy on the Imperial mine on Monro mountain. No one who knows Mr. Gilroy dare say he is an unintelligent man or question his capability. Based on thirty or more years' experience as manager of some of the largest mines in Colorado, Arizona, Oregon and elsewhere. The report in question is of a very favorable nature, indeed, so much so, that he predicts that if properly handled the Imperial will eventually be one of the great mines of British Columbia. There is no guessing or presuming in Mr. Gilroy's statement; he makes an open and above-board declaration, giving his reasons therefor.

Now this mine has been partially opened up and considerable quartz crushed by parties who had it under bond. These parties have forfeited this bond by non-fulfilment of

conditions, thus giving the impression that the property is practically worthless. This forfeiture naturally depreciates the financial value of the mine to the owners, but if done in good faith after a competent working test, is quite correct and reasonable on the owner's part. But, according to Mr. Gilroy's contention, the mine was not intelligently worked by the bonders and he gives several striking instances bearing on it in his report. For example, he mentions the driving of a tunnel in such a direction that if it had been continued a little further it would have landed the workmen in the open air. Anyone curious in the matter can visit the property and verify this wooden-headed operation for themselves.

Meantime, whose opinion shall the public accept? That of Mr. Gilroy, with his vast experience of over thirty years, or that of certain individuals who may have a heaven-born instinct for mining schemes and the manipulation of English "dough," but who, from former experience and mental calibre, are more adapted to the honorable but humble occupation of sawing wood.

Atlin suffers, but let her not despair. Common sense methods will eventually prevail, we may be sure, and the right men will be fitted into the right places. There have been too many square plugs in round holes hitherto, but amateur experts have nearly run to the length of their tethers and will shortly come up with a jerk which will astonish them. Every man having quartz interests in the district will join in the prayer, May the Gods send that day soon!
