MAY 28TH :

A despatch received in Rome from Tokio says the japanese have attacked Talienwan, Their occupation of the junction of the Dality railway with the main Port Arthur line isolates Dalix.

The Japanese captured lifty guns in the Kin Chou fight. Russians left 400 dead on the field. Their loss is said to have been two thousand, and Japanese three thousand, killed or wounded.

A New Chwang despatch says that there is excellent authority for the statement that the Japanese plan to use 100,000 men against Port Arthur and take it by storm in a forthight. They realize that the losses will be severe, but consider it better to risk that than keep a large army idle for three months. They do not propose to peretrate into the interior any further than Mukden

A despatch from Tokio says the Russians have abandoned Nan Quan Ling and have been driven from San Chi Li Hu, retreating towards Port Arthur

St. Petersburg does not disguise the fact that Russians can offer but little resistence to the advance of the Japanese, and must now relife within the fortress of Port Arthur and detend themselves against siege.

DREDGING.

Tientsin says it is reported that Atlin's First Dredge Proves a Grand Success.

Our liditor, accompanied by Mr. D. Ross, manager of the Bank of Commerce, paid a visit to the dredge last Tuesday, where they were very cordially received by the general manager, Mr. O. T. Switzer. who kindly showed them over the dredge and explained its workings, which have already been fully described in previous issues of this paper.

The dredge today is in full oper ation and the line of buckets pours a steady supply of wash into the sluice, which is carried away by an average of 2,000 inches of water, taised for the purpose by a 6 and 10 inch pump.

In the wash, at intervals, enor mous boulders are to be seen, many weighing over a ton, all of which are easily passed through the revolving screen and thoroughly washed by a steady stream of water. under pressure before being automatically dumped over the side of the dredge.

Owing to the fact that a face to bedrock must be opened up before the dredge can move ahead, the accumulated tailings have for the moment to be shovelled, away, which necessitates stopping the dredge for a while every half hour; but this stoppage will not, however, be necessary as soon as bedrock is reached and the face dredged out.

On Tuesday the dredge was employing lourteen men to run two shifts, and on Thursday a third shift will be put on, making a total of twenty-one men, who will keep the dredge working steadily night and day. As soon as the face (which is to be 150 feet wide and of a circular form) is fully opened up, the gang of men now employed at shovelling tailings will be laid off and all the labor then required to run the monster machine for three eight-hour shifts will be eight men and a cook. The electric power house employs six men and a cook.

Applications for leases over this portion of the creek have been refused ihree times, it being deemed advisable by the government to keep that portion open for the accommodation of those operating the benches on either side; I have therefore requested the mining recorder not to accept any applications for record between the points mentioned.

Sir Henry M. Stanley, the African explorer, died last mouth. He was originally John Rowlands, and was born of obscure parents in Wales in 1841. When a small boy, he worked his way to New Orleans as a cabin boy and there adopted the name of a merchant for whom he worked for many years. He served in the Confederate army and afterwards was in the United States navy. He became a newspaper reporter and later was war correspoident for the New York Herald. It was while in the employee of the Herald that he found Livingstone and became famous. He devoted many years to African explorations. and wrote voluminously on that continent and his experiences there. He had made his home in England for twenty years and was a member of parliament. In another column of this issue we publish a letter from the Government Agent stating that the bed of Pine Creek, from Gold Run to Discovery, has been reserved for the purpose of permit ting the owners of bench leases to utilize that part of the bed of Pine Creek for a dumping ground. We are pleased to note that the government have realized the importance of such a measure, which is decidedly advantageous to the individual miner; in fact, all worked out creek beds should be reserved for the same purpose and thus do away with useless litigation, trouble and delay of operations, both to individuals and companies, through the personal ownership of the only available means of disposing of their tailings. The reservation of worked out ground for the purpose mentioned is a measure that does good to all and harm to none and should therefore be respected and strictly observed.

The Deepest Gold Mine.

What is believed to be the deepest gold mine in the world is being worked at Bendigo, Australia. The mine in question, which is called the New Chum Railway Mine, has sunk its main shaft to a depth of 3,900 feet, or only 60 feet short of three quarters of a mile. The chief problem is how to keep the tunnels and general workings cool enough for the miners to work in at such a depth. It is usually about 108 degrees, and, to enable the men to work at all, a spray of cold water let down from above has to be kept continually playing on the bodies-naked from the waist upward—of the miners. Even then they cannot work hard, or they would faint from exhaustion.

IN TROUBLE

Hooley, the Famous Promoter Arrested in London.

Tera Hooley, the company promoter, whose career astonished the world a few years since, was arrested in London a short time ago, charged with conspiracy, to defraud. Hooley's colossal bankruptcy, and the proceedings arising therefrom, was the sensation of 1898. He has since been connected, with various schemes, which led to the court proceedings. The capitalization of companies which were promoted by him amounted to \$65,000,000.-The Daily Alaskan.
