TELEGRAPHIC.

A Budget of Interesting News From Many Quarters.

(SPECIAL TO THE CLAIM.)

Victoria, Mar. 15.—The provincial house opened on the 7th with the usual impressive ceremonies. The socialistic members remained seated when the lieutenant-governor entered the house. Comrade Hawthornthwaite says the slight was intentional and that the socialist members do not propose to recognize what they term the mummeries of parliament, and adds that they will not rise at saying of prayers.

There were six government measures formally placed before the assembly, one of which provides for a decrease of taxation the estimated total of which will be \$125,000. Another provides for the collection of special license fees of \$200 per annum from each traveller representing either a cigar or liquor house outside the province, and another is for the licensing of traders and others defined outside of municipalities. The schedule under the latter measure prescribes some of the following: half-yearly tariff—For billiard and pool tables \$5; for dance halls \$100; for retail merchants or traders \$5; for livery \$10; for bankers \$400 annually and \$100 for each agency.

Mark Bagleson, the liberal member for Lillooet, who, it was thought might resign, has taken his seat.

St. Petersburg, Mar. 15.—There are millions of peasants in the Masan district starving to death. So awful is the state of their hunger and misery that the young female children are being sold, killed and eaten, to sustain life and appease the pangs and tortures of death by starvation and cold.

Ottawa, Mar. 15.—The Dominion returns for eight months show an increase of revenue of over eight million, as compared with the same period last year.

Vancouver, Mar. 15.—All the drug stores in town were closed last Sunday fearing prosecution under the Lord's Day Observance Act if they sold any drugs. The action was strongly condemned by the doctors.

Chicago, Mar. 15.—Alexander Dowie, who claimed to be "Elijah II," shook off his mortal coil last Saturday, at Zion City, and went home. No chariot.

Paris, Mar. 15.—The strike of the electricians which plunged the city into darkness for two nights, ended in a victory for the strikers.

Chematus, Mar. 15.—The Lewisville hotel and several other buildings were destroyed by fire recently.

Winnipeg, Mar. 15.—Henry Anderson, a former clerk in the Bank of England, was arrested near Dominion City, charged with the theft of \$5,000.

The revised elections give the conservatives 27 seats and the liberals 12 seats. Gilbert Plains and Gimli elections are yet to be held.

Wallace, Idaho, Mar. 15.—Steve Adams, the alleged murderer of Governor Stuenberg of this state, has been discharged. The jury hung six to six and failed to reach a verdict.

Sofia, Mar. 15.—M. Petkoff, the premier and minister of the interior, has been assassinated, and M. Gvemiadzeff, the minister of commerce, wounded.

Portland, Mar. 15.—Unless they get a twenty-five cent increase in wages and an eight-hour day granted them the mill workers threaten to tie up all the lumber plants in the west.

Toulon, Mar. 15.—Another appalling marine catastrophe has just occurred, this time in the French navy, causing a wholesale slaughter of lives. From some cause, at present unknown, the magazine on the French battleship Iena exploded wrecking the vessel badly and killing 300 of her crew. A number of people who were on the pier to which the vessel was tied up, were killed and many wounded, from exploding shells.

Seattle, Mar. 15.—The volcano on the island of Akutan, near Unalaska, was in active eruption on February 22d.

Pittsburg, Mar. 15.—Johnstown, Pindley, Pittsburg, and a number of other towns in the district, are experiencing the worst floods in the history of the country. The rivers continue to rise and the people were forced to live in the second stories of their dwellings. Nine people so far have lost their lives.

Despatches from Tokio state that the Great Northern steamship Dakota was wrecked on Sunday the 3rd, off Nagami. She struck a rock when running at full speed, and at once began taking water; shortly afterwards the stern sunk beneath the waves. The distress of the big steamer had been observed and her passengers and crew were rescued by the Japanese ship Omimura. The Dakota sailed from Seattle for the Orient on February 17th, with 94 passengers and 8,000 tons. She is a sister ship to the Minnesota. They two being the largest ships on the Pacific ocean being 630 feet in length and having a carrying capacity of 26,000 tons. The Dakota is a total loss.

Fraudulent Mine Promotion.

The American Mining Congress, a very powerful and well-organized society in the United States, is getting after the 'wild-catter' and fraudulent mine-promoter in strong measures and they are calling on the newspapers of the country to help stamp out the evil.

The same thing applies this side of the line. We have the 'expert' and the 'promoter' pest with us just the same as other countries. The bona-fide men will not feel aggrieved at this statement. They know, better than most, how the bogus man damns the country and makes all the harder the way of the legitimate individual.

We quote a part of a letter sent to the press.

"The co-operation of the press is desired in an effort to rid our indus-

trial system of one of its greatest evils, i. e., that of fraudulent mine promotion."

"Needless for us to say that the press of the country has long been 'knocking' the wild-cat mine promoter, but it seems almost useless as his 'pull' directly or indirectly with the politicians and others who have the power to shield him, gives to the shrewd promoted confidence in his game. To attain success in its campaign, the American Mining Congress has sent a personal communication to the governors and other state legislators urging them to approve of the bill for a federal department of mining. In the bill approved and recommended for enactment at the recent session of the Mining Congress in Denver it is stated that "the co-operation of our government with the American miner, through a department of mining, will give an additional and conclusive proof that American industrial progress can be most permanently advanced."

The magnitude of the mining industry in the United States is away above and beyond what the average man would surmise. The total value of the mineral and metal production of the United States in 1906 was \$1,912,491,572.

Canadians! Just keep your hands on the arms of your chairs and think out quietly the possibilities of our own country. We have a mining area equally as large as the United States, and the industry is yet in its youthful stage. What will the future show when these mountains and streams yield up to the energetic the enormous wealth which they are known to contain. Gold is wealth, wealth is power. Having one we will have the other, and, rightly used, Canada is destined to be one of the great nations of the earth.

Here, in our far-away corner, we must not get despondent or discouraged. We are on the eve of a change, and one that must be for the better. The drought has lasted some time, but a good harvest is in store for those who have waited.

Refreshments were then served and a very enjoyable evening brought to a close. Branigan's band serenaded at the finish.

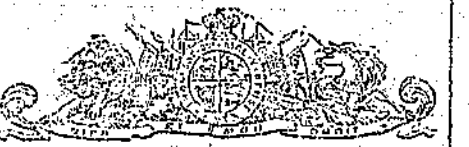

Synopsis of Canadian Homestead Regulations.

ANY available Dominion lands within the Railway belt in British Columbia may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section of 160 acres more or less.

Entry must be made personally at the local land office for the district in which the land is situate.

The homesteader is required to perform the conditions connected therewith under one of the following plans:

(1) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years.

(2) If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased) of the homesteader resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by such person residing with the father or mother.

(3) If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of his homestead, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the said land.

Six months' notice in writing should be given to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa of intention to apply for patent.

Coal lands may be purchased at \$10 per acre or soft coal and \$20 for anthracite. Not more than 320 acres can be acquired by one individual or company. Royalty at the rate of ten cents per ton of 2,000 pounds shall be collected on the gross output.
